Covering a Game

Media members wishing to cover Virginia Tech home baseball games from the English Field press box should contact Dave Smith in the SID office. There is no charge for admission to Virginia Tech home baseball games and a credential is not needed to enter English Field. Seating in the press box, however, is by request only and is assigned on a priority basis in accordance with athletic department media policies. All requests should be made prior to game day. Non-working individuals, such as spouses,

dates, friends and fans, will not be permitted in the press box or on the field during the game. Seats in the working area of the press box are not available for major league scouts.

Rosters, statistics and press guides will be available to the media and scouts prior to the game and a final box will be compiled for distribution at the conclusion of each contest. Postgame media interviews, cleared through the sports information office, are allowed on the field shortly after the conclusion of each game or double-header. Phone lines and access to the Internet are available in the press box to file stories.

Photography

Accredited photographers or cameramen on assignment may shoot from the top of the dugouts or from inside the fence beyond the dugouts. When shooting from inside the fence, no equipment should be placed

on the field of play. Tripods are not allowed inside the fence. The roof of the press box can be made available for working photographers or cameramen upon request. The position of all photographers and cameramen is always subject to the discretion of the umpires. Freelance photographers and fans are not allowed on the dugouts or inside the fences.

Visiting Radio

Visiting team radio crews wishing to broadcast games from English Field should contact the SID office well in advance of the game for clearance and information on the availability of space and telephone lines.

Virginia Iech Invent the Future

Just Virginia Tech, Please

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University the school is commonly referred to as Virginia Tech. There is no such school as Virginia Tech University.

Founded in 1872 as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the school changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1895. Alumni and media shortened the name to VPI before Virginia Tech became the primary popular reference. The university officially became a state university in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply Virginia Tech. Virginia Tech University, VA Tech, VPI and SU, VPI&SU and VT are not recognized names and should not be used.

ACC All-ACCess



Tech on Radio

For the fourth consecutive season, Virginia Tech baseball will have a commercial radio package. This season, the Cumulus Radio Group will broadcast selected Tech games, including ACC contests. Information on the entire 2007 broadcast schedule, along with stations and times, will be posted on Virginia Tech's athletic Web site, www.hokiesports.com.

Coverage will begin 15 minutes prior to the first pitch with the pregame show including an interview with Tech head coach Pete Hughes. At the conclusion of each game, the postgame show will include comments from Coach Hughes and a featured player.

Torye Hurst will handle the play-by-play duties again this season. Hurst broadcast Tech's BIG EAST Conference Tournament games for two seasons

prior to taking on the broadcast duties two years ago during the Hokies' first season in the ACC. He has also announced selected women's basketball games and served as the Tech baseball public address announcer for three seasons. Prior to Tech, Hurst served as the PA announcer for the Augusta GreenJackets Class A minor league baseball team in Augusta, Ga., and following college, was the playby-play announcer for University of Southern Mississippi women's basketball for four seasons.

The Atlantic Coast Conference

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 54th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate athletic conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 100 national championships, including 52 in women's competition and 48 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 71 times in women's action.

The Wake Forest Demon Deacons captured the league's first baseball national title in 1954, just the second season of ACC baseball. The Miami Hurricanes, who joined the ACC for the 2004-05 season, has claimed four national hardball titles (1982, 1985, 1999, 2001) over the past 24 years.

Last year, the ACC tied the league record set in 2005 as seven teams took part in NCAA Tournament play, including Clemson, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Miami, North Carolina, NC State and Virginia. It marked the fourth time in ACC history that at least six teams received a bid into the national tournament. Over the last 10 years, the current 12 ACC schools have made 65 NCAA Tournament appearances, winning 65 percent of their games (219-139) and making 16 trips to the College World Series.

For the first time in conference history, the ACC sent a league-record four teams to compete in the 2006 College World Series. The ACC joined the Southeastern Conference as the only two conferences in the nation to have four teams represented in the eight-team field as Clemson, Georgia Tech, Miami and North Carolina all advanced to play in Omaha's Rosenblatt Stadium. It marked only the third time in the 60 years of the CWS that this feat has happened. North Carolina proceeded to the championship final for the first-time in school history where the Tar Heels faced Oregon State in a best-of-three championship series. The Beavers would win the series 2-1, but not before a valiant effort put forth by the Tar Heels.

The 2006 ACC baseball postseason was one for the record books. Not only did the ACC finish with the most wins (31) and the highest winning percentage (.674) among the 29 other conferences competing in last year's NCAA postseason, but the ACC also set a league record for the most teams to make it to the CWS. With a 31-15 record, the ACC posted a winning percentage of .674, the third best postseason showing in conference history.

For the 15th straight season, the ACC posted a non-

conference winning percentage over 61 percent, winning 75 percent of the games played against non-conference opponents in 2006. The ACC was 255-86-1 a year ago, pushing the conference's record to 3,669-1,470-19 (.713) in non-league play since 1990. The 255 wins set a league record for non-conference victories in a single-season. The previous record of 249 wins was set back in 2002.

2006 also marked the first season in divisional play for the ACC as Clemson claimed the Atlantic Division title, while North Carolina took home the Coastal Division crown. The Baseball Grounds of Jacksonville was the site of the 33rd ACC Baseball Championship. The Tigers would claim their ninth conference title and first since 1994, as Clemson defeated NC State 8-4 in the championship game. The finals also marked the second straight year that the top-seeded team in the tournament faced the seventh-seed. A championship record 73,251 fans were in attendance during the five-day tournament in Jacksonville.

The ACC has consistently infused Major League Baseball with talented players. The current 12 ACC schools have had 531 players selected in the MLB Draft since 1994, including 47 first-round picks. Last year, the ACC had 50 student-athletes selected in the Draft including five chosen in the first-round, extending the ACC's streak of at least one student-athlete selected in the first-round to 15 consecutive years. The Clemson Tigers led all schools with 10 players picked in the 2006 Draft. The ACC has produced four number one overall picks in North Carolina's B.J. Surhoff in 1985, Florida State's Paul Wilson in 1994, Clemson's Kris Benson in 1996 and Miami's Pat Burrell in 1998.

2005-06 in Review

The 2005-06 academic year concluded with the league pocketing an all-time high six national team titles and 15 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 57 national team titles over the last 16 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 24 of the past 26 years.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2006-07 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast
Conference was founded on
May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield
Inn near Greensboro, N.C.,
with seven charter members —
Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North
Carolina, North Carolina State,
South Carolina and Wake Forest
— drawing up the conference
by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal

of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine

members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

Hokies Open New Era with Simple Goal

Pete Hughes is familiar with the Atlantic Coast Conference, but he is still learning about his new team as he prepares for his first season as the head baseball coach at Virginia Tech.

Hughes, the head coach at Boston College the past eight seasons, took over the Tech helm when veteran coach Chuck Hartman retired following 28 seasons in Blacksburg and 47 years as a collegiate head coach.

"I'm familiar with the league," says Hughes, who guided BC during its first season of ACC competition last spring. "I've also got a pretty good feel for our team personnel-wise, but you never know what you've got

until you're in the heat of the battle ... when you are really competing with a team."

Hughes takes over a Tech program with a long winning tradition that has struggled the past two years in its transition from the Atlantic 10 and BIG EAST conferences to the prestigious ACC. The Hokies' back-to-back losing seasons in 2005 and 2006 marked the first consecutive losing records in the sport since 1957-58.

"The ACC ... it's the best league in the country," Hughes says. "There are no off weekends. But I'm not going to get caught up in the league right now. I'm going to get caught up in

making Virginia Tech the best baseball program it can be this vear."

During fall practice, Hughes and his staff evaluated the personnel, dictated the tempo at which the staff coached and at which the players would be expected to play, and changed work habits to the level the staff was used to.

"I think our kids have made adjustments," Hughes says. "I think they are in shape and I believe their work ethic has improved. It was a productive fall from that standpoint."

Tech will be heavy on experience in 2007, especially in the field, where every starter returns. The key to success, however, lies elsewhere.

"We have some very good senior leaders, but most of them are positional players," Hughes points out. "Our biggest question mark is going to be on the mound. In order for us to have success this year, we need to maximize our abilities on the mound."

None of the pitching roles were solidified in the fall, but seniors David Cross, Greg Fryman and Adam Redd, along with junior Randy Buffington, will be on hand to help anchor the staff. Last season, they combined for 78 appearances and 221.2 innings of work.

Veterans abound at the Hokies' other positions, led by senior shortstop Warren Schaeffer, who has missed just two games during his Tech career, while starting the remaining 158.

"Defensively, this will probably be the best team I've ever coached," Hughes says. "That includes outfield play and infield play."


Offensively, Hughes likes to use aggressive play to force the action, no matter where or whom he is playing.

"I really want us to be aggressive offensively, both at the plate and on the base paths," Hughes says. "I'm not sure we're comfortable doing that yet, but that's how I want to play.

"We need to play well at home and steal a couple of series on the road," he adds. "The keys to stealing wins are don't walk anybody, play good defense and get two-out hits. That's a team that is fundamentally sound, confident and competitive. If we can do those three things, we'll steal some wins, we'll overachieve."

Hughes is anxious to find out just what kind of competitors he's got. His goal is a simple one.

"It's to be better than we were last year," he says, "and I think we can do that."

Catchers

Coach Hughes and his staff listed catcher as one of their major concerns following fall practice. With returning starter Matt Foley coming off wrist surgery and limited depth available, plenty of attention will be paid to the position during the preseason.

Foley, who now has a clean bill of health, heads into his senior season with a chance to put any disappointments from his first three seasons behind him and become a team leader.

No one would like that better than Hughes.

"We're looking for senior leadership in the catcher position," Hughes says. "To have that this year would be a bonus. Matt has gotten himself in the best shape of his career and has a chance to have a great year. He's a key for us. To have success this year, we need for him to have a good year, handle our pitching staff and stay healthy."

Foley, who has 72 career starts behind the plate, is a good

receiver with the ability to throw out runners. His hard work in the strength and conditioning program should help him improve at blocking low pitches.

Freshman walk-on Anthony Sosnoskie was one of the most pleasant surprises of the fall, working his way into the No. 2 slot behind Foley. Sosnoskie got better every week, both behind the plate and in the batter's box, and will play an important role this spring.

Infielders

The starting infield is expected to remain intact from last season with the only

variation at first base, where starter Sean O'Brien might be used at times in the outfield.

The strength will remain up the middle where senior shortstop Warren Schaeffer and junior second baseman Matt Hacker will team-up for the third consecutive season. Last year, they committed a combined total of just three errors in ACC play, and only 17 overall.

Schaeffer fielded .969 with seven total errors and enjoyed his best season offensively with a .286 batting average. His 30 runs scored, 12 doubles and three home runs were also personal bests.

Hacker, who fielded .960 on the year, finished second in batting on last season's squad with a .296 average. He led the team in runs scored (44) and hits (64) and tied for the lead in doubles with 14.

Senior Bryan Thomas returns at third base, where he has been a starter the past two seasons. He batted .294 in 2006 and led the team in runs batted in with 48. Thomas would like to return

to the form that saw him hit .384 overall and .396 in ACC games as a sophomore.


O'Brien led the team with a .317 batting average last year after missing the entire 2005 season due to shoulder surgery. He batted .372 on the way to first-team all-BIG EAST and freshman All-America honors as a starter in 2004. O'Brien has improved his defensive play around the first base bag and picked up some speed after dropping weight in the fall. He will be one of the keys to the Hokies' offense.

Sophomore Luke Padgett, who also has the potential to give the Hokies' an offensive boost, will provide depth at the corner infield positions. If Padgett has a good preseason at the plate and cuts down on

his strikeouts, the coaches are likely to find a spot for him in the lineup. That could lead to O'Brien seeing some time in the outfield, where he began his Tech career.

Backup for the middle infield positions will come from sophomore Nate Clark, who may be one of the Hokies' most underrated players due to the presence of Schaeffer and Hacker. Clark is a solid defensive performer in his own right, and does some things offensively that fit in well with the coaching staff's philosophy.

Freshman third baseman Brandon Lower, the only newcomer to the infield, impressed the coaches during the fall, but will miss the season after undergoing hip surgery in early January.



Outfielders

Like the infield, Tech's outfield is filled with experienced players. The player to watch, however, may well be a rookie.


Freshman Steve Bumbry, whose father played 14 years with the Baltimore Orioles, was one of the pleasant surprises of the fall, displaying excellent defensive skills and a good approach at the plate. His performance vaulted him into an opportunity for early playing time and a starting job in left field. The left-handed hitting newcomer can also handle the center field duties if needed.

Speedy senior Nate Parks returns in center, where he has started 94 games over the past two seasons. The coaches love his 33 walks and 30 stolen bases from last season, but he will have to cut down on his

39 strikeouts and put the ball in play on a consistent basis in order to help Tech be successful.

Like Parks, returning right fielder Jose Cueto struck out too much in 2006. Cueto took a big step toward remedying the problem during the fall, reclaiming his job with hard work on every phase of his game. The junior outfielder has the ability to be a key contributor to the Hokies' offensive plan.

Additional experience in the outfield is provided by sophomore Sean Ryan and senior Billy Marn. Ryan, who rates as the Hokies' best defensive outfielder, can play any of the three positions and could challenge for a spot if his offensive skills continue to improve. Marn, a starter last season, could figure in at left field if he becomes more consistent at the plate.

Starting first baseman Sean O'Brien could also see some action in the outfield when the Hokies want to get their best offensive lineup in the game. O'Brien saw some time in right field as a freshman. Meanwhile, junior college transfer Travis Willson, another outfield candidate, will be sidelined for the season after undergoing wrist surgery.

Designated Hitters

The leading candidates for the designated hitter spot are likely to be sophomore Luke Padgett and senior Billy Marn, but others could emerge as the spring unfolds.

Padgett got the most starts at the DH spot last season (20) and has good power potential. If he shows consistency with the bat and makes more contact, the coaches will find a spot for him, which could include designated hitter duties.

Marn was the primary designated hitter in 2005. He led the team in home runs that season with six and batted .307. After dropping to .257 last year, the right-handed batting senior is working to regain his eye at the plate. If successful, DH is one of the spots where he could contribute.

Pitchers

There's no debate about the biggest question mark on the 2007 Tech squad. It's the pitching staff.

Heading into preseason practice, no defined roles had been assigned. Every member of the staff was being prepared as if they would be pitching opening day.

"We (the staff) didn't come in until June, so there is nothing in stone," says associate head coach Dave Turgeon, who oversees the pitching staff. "We are going to try to maximize what we have and put every guy on the pitching staff — whatever his abilities — in a position to use those abilities in a positive way to help us win baseball games."

The Hokies will be counting on a nucleus of upperclassmen to help provide leadership and innings.

Included in that group are senior Adam Redd and junior Randy Buffington, who rank as two of the team's best competitors on the mound. Redd has proven to be a bulldog during his 47 career appearances at Tech. He has posted a career 7-2 record and 3.94 earned run average. Buffington, the hardest thrower on the staff, has


pitched in 39 games over two seasons and could play a big role this spring after showing much-improved command of his pitches during the fall.

The team will also be looking for substantial contributions from seniors David Cross and Greg Fryman, who like Redd and Buffington, are righthanders. Cross led the 2006 team with 14 starts and 79.1 innings pitched. He has the pitches and ability needed to be successful in the ACC. Fryman also has the experience and potential to be a contributor. He was second to Cross in starts (11) last year, while pitching in a total of 17 games. He now has 40 career appearances.

Lefty Evan Fredrickson and right-hander Rhett Ballard, two

young pitchers who picked up some valuable experience last year as freshmen, could push for expanded roles this season. Fredrickson has outstanding potential, but must gain a better command of his pitches. He finished 0-3 during his 12 appearances in 2006, but allowed just 21 hits in 22.2 innings and held opponents to a .244 batting average. Ballard also showed some potential, appearing in 19 games - six as a starter — and posting a 3-3 record. He worked 55 innings, the fourth-highest total on the

The wildcard of the staff might be senior left-hander Andrew Wells, who has seen little action since suffering an elbow injury in 2004. Wells was



Young southpaw Evan Frederickson is competing for a bigger role in 2007.


started 22 games during his first two seasons at Tech. Now, as a fifth-year senior, he has made tremendous strides and has a chance to pitch injury-free for

the first time in almost three vears. If he returns to form, it could provide an important boost for the staff.

Right-hander Scott Stoehr and southpaws Josh Canova and Casev Herald are the other returnees from last year's squad. Canova saw the most action of the three, pitching in 12 games in relief and compiling a 1-1 record. Rob Waskiewicz, who was redshirted last season after undergoing elbow surgery, is still recovering and is not expected back until sometime during the season.

The pitching staff will be rounded out by a group of newcomers — true freshmen Brandon Fisher and Rob Whitley, and sophomore walk-ons Brett Fox and Dave Zappacosta.

"Overall, we know where we're deficient and know where we have to improve as a team," Hughes says. "I just want our kids to be competitive and work hard because we have no margin for error. We have to maximize our abilities."

Meet THE HOKIES



Pete Hughes

Pete Hughes, who has earned a reputation for producing results on the field and in the classroom during his 10 years as a head coach on the collegiate level, took over the reigns of the Virginia Tech baseball program in early June, following the retirement of Hall of Fame coach Chuck Hartman after 28 years at Tech and 47 years as a head coach.

"I am pleased and proud that we have been able to attract an outstanding young head coach to follow one of the winningest coaches in NCAA history," said Jim Weaver, Tech director of athletics, in making the announcement. "Pete Hughes is familiar with the Atlantic Coast Conference and knows Virginia Tech, having competed against us in recent years in both the BIG EAST and the ACC. He also knows that we want to be a nationally competitive baseball program. I believe Coach Hughes is the right person for Virginia Tech at this moment in time."

Hughes, 39, spent the last eight seasons as the head coach at Boston College, where he compiled a 250-181-2 record. He also was the head coach at Trinity University in Texas for two seasons (1997-98), guiding the Tigers to a 52-30 mark.

Prior to Hughes' arrival, Boston College averaged 13 wins a season over 35 years. During their eight seasons under Hughes, the Eagles averaged 31 wins per year. In 2005, he led BC to a school record 37 wins and his squad was named the Division I New England Baseball Team of the Year.

During his first two seasons at Boston College, Hughes guided his teams to back-to-back single-season school marks for win improvements (nine). He took over a team that finished 17-23-1 during the 1998 season and coached it to a 26-21-1 record in 1999. The following season, the Eagles posted a 35-20 record and made just their

second-ever appearance in the BIG EAST Tournament.

Hughes was named BIG EAST, New England and ABCA/Diamond Division I Northeast Region Coach of the Year following the 2000 season. He also earned BIG EAST Conference Coach of the Year honors in 2002 and was the New England Coach of the Year again in 2005. Hughes took the Eagles to the BIG EAST Tournament a total of five times in seven seasons.

Last season, Boston College posted a 28-25-1 record during its first year of Atlantic Coast Conference competition and finished fourth in the Atlantic Division. Among the Eagles' ACC victories were three wins against the Hokies in Blacksburg, along with two wins versus Georgia Tech and a victory against Clemson, both of which went on to participate in the 2006 NCAA College World Series.

During his tenure at Boston College, 25 BC players were drafted or signed pro contracts and four received All-American honors. Pitcher Chris Lambert was selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the St. Louis Cardinals in 2004, becoming the first-ever Boston College player to be selected in the opening round.

Twenty-two of the 25 BC players who were drafted or signed pro contracts during Hughes' eight seasons were undrafted out of high school, a further testament to his commitment to developing and helping players reach their full potential.

Even more impressive was the Eagles' academic success under Hughes. During his eight seasons at Boston College, the baseball program had a 100 percent graduation rate.

At Trinity University (Texas), Hughes inherited a team that had averaged 11 wins per season in each of the previous 17 years. In just two years with the program, Trinity averaged 26 victories and won 63 percent of its games under Hughes, setting the school record for wins (33) and earning a regular season conference championship during his second and final season in 1998.

Hughes began his coaching career at Hamilton College in New York in 1990-91 and found himself torn between football and baseball. During his year at Hamilton, he served as an assistant in football and held the top assistant and recruiting coordinator jobs for baseball. He continued his dual-sport coaching roles in the very same



capacities at Northeastern University in Boston from fall 1991 through spring 1996. When he started his stint with the Huskies, he was the youngest full-time assistant coach in the Division I-AA football ranks, but when he left, he was headed to the state of Texas to be a college baseball head coach.

As a player, the Brockton, Mass., native was a four-year standout as a third baseman on the diamond and a four-year starter at quarterback on the gridiron at Davidson College (1986-90). Hughes was captain of the baseball team as a senior in 1990 and graduated that year with a bachelor of arts in sociology/anthropology.

Hughes and his wife Debby have five children, sons Thomas, 10, Hal, 8, Dominic, 6, and PJ, 2, and a daughter Grace, 4.

Pete Hughes On ...

Coaching Philosophy

"My goal is to never get out-competed or out-worked, and to be very aggressive and force the action no matter where we are playing or who we are playing. That's been my style, that's been my MO, and I think kids who have bought into that mindset have reached their potential and then some."

Academics

"As far as evaluating our program from top to bottom, academic performance will always be at the top of my list. We are going to overachieve in the classroom. Without a doubt, performance and effort in the classroom correlates to performance and effort on the baseball field."

Graduating Players

"That's my job. I have a huge responsibility to do that. The only kids I want to coach are kids who are motivated to graduate and are motivated academically. I don't want to coach anybody who has different ideals than that."

Conditioning

"Strength and conditioning is the quickest way for us to have success. It has already started in our program and our kids are already seeing added benefits from what we do strength and conditioning-wise and from the emphasis our staff places on it."

Community Involvement

"I think it's important for kids at this stage to get out of their comfort zone ... to get out and do more than what they are doing in their regular academic and baseball lives. Doing things other than athletic related activities together is healthy for the team and healthy for the individuals. My family and I have raised over \$250,000 for cancer research over the years. There are bigger things out there other than college athletics — and our players need to know that."

Summer Baseball

"Summer baseball is a priority for us. We will always work to get our kids placed in the best leagues in the country so they can develop and become better players. Our guys who want to reach their potential in baseball are going to play summer baseball at the highest levels."

The Right Kid

"I just love high energy, competitive kids who care about being good students and good people. When you find that, then you've got something to work with ... then you look to see if they can play."

Dave Turgeon Associate Head Coach

Associate head coach Dave Turgeon arrives in Blacksburg by way of Duke University, and in addition to several coaching stints in both college and the minor leagues, he also had an extensive playing career that traveled him around the globe.

Turgeon was the first staff member named by new head coach Pete Hughes, and will serve as the pitching coach at Tech. He and Hughes are not strangers, however, as Turgeon coached under Hughes at Boston College, and the two were teammates during their collegiate playing days at Davidson College.

"Dave will be an unbelievable asset in carrying on the winning tradition of Hokie baseball," said Hughes. "In just four years at the college level, he has become one of the most respected recruiters and evaluators in the country. Also, Dave will get the best out of our pitching staff. Instructionally and being able to motivate on a daily basis, he is the best I've ever been around."

Turgeon was the associate

head coach and recruiting coordinator at Duke University during the 2006 season. He spent the 2005 and 2004 seasons as the associate head coach/pitching coach at the University of Connecticut and

oversaw the pitching staff and recruiting for Hughes at Boston College during the 2002-03 academic year.

While a member of the BC staff, Turgeon worked directly with pitcher Chris

Lambert, who was the St. Louis Cardinals' first-round draft pick and the 19th overall selection in 2004. During his tenures at Boston College and UConn, both teams saw their earned run averages drop and they both set records for wins.

Turgeon has an extensive

background as both a player and manager in the professional ranks to go with his collegiate coaching experience.

Prior to joining the staff at Boston College, Turgeon enjoyed a 13-year professional playing

career — the first five in the field where he advanced to the AA level. and the last eight as a pitcher where he rose to the AAA level. He then managed and coached three years in the Cleveland **Indians** organization.

From 1987-90, Turgeon was an infielder in the New York Yankees system and played for both Stump Merrill and Buck Showalter. From 1991-1999, he played in Holland (1991), France (1992), Taiwan (1993-96, 1998) and Mexico (1997-99). In 1998, he returned to the United States



and played for the Rochester Red Wings, the Baltimore Orioles' Class AAA affiliate.

During his professional playing days, Turgeon was a three-time all-star selection in Taiwan. He also captured 1998 Player of the Year honors with the Reynosa Broncos, a Class AAA team in the Mexican League.

After concluding his playing career, Turgeon served in various coaching capacities with the Indians. He managed the Burlington Indians of the Appalachian League in 2000 and the Mahoning Valley Scrappers of the New York-Penn League the following season. In 2002, Turgeon worked at the Indians' extended spring training in Winter Haven, Fla.

The Groton Conn., native is a 1987 graduate of Davidson College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history. Turgeon was a three-time All-Southern Conference selection at third base for the Wildcats. He earned all-region honors his senior year, when one of his teammates was freshman Pete Hughes. In 2005, Turgeon was inducted into the Wildcat Hall of Fame, and in 2006, he was inducted into the St. Bernard High School Hall of Fame in Uncasville, Conn.

Turgeon was the third in his family to play professional baseball. His brother, Steve, played in the St. Louis Cardinals organization, while his other brother, Mike, was a minor league player of the year and batting champ with the Chicago Cubs and San Francisco Giants organizations.

Turgeon and his wife, Theresa, have four children; Calli, Allisa, Christian and Francesca.

Mike Gambino Assistant Coach

Assistant coach Mike
Gambino joins the Virginia Tech
staff not only with playing
and coaching accolades on his
resumé, but with professional
scouting experience as well.
He will serve as the Hokies'
recruiting coordinator and will
work with Tech's infielders and
hitters. Much like associate head
coach Dave Turgeon, Gambino
has a history with head coach
Pete Hughes, having both played
and coached for him at Boston
College.

"We are very fortunate to have someone with Mike's extensive background on our staff," Hughes said. "We believe his talents as an instructor and as a recruiter/evaluator will be instrumental in carrying on the winning tradition of Hokie baseball. I have had the pleasure of both coaching Mike and working with him. He is loyal, a tremendous worker and a true competitor — all qualities that we need to have in our program to win in the ACC."

Gambino, 29, comes to the Hokies from the Detroit Tigers, where he worked as a regional scout. Gambino was an infielder for Hughes at Boston College from 1995 through 2000, earning the team's leadership award as a redshirt sophomore in 1997-98. He was named secondteam All-New England and made the BIG EAST Academic team following the 1999 season. In 2000, Gambino collected a school record 78 hits on the way to earning first-team All-Big East, All-New England and All-Northeast Region honors.

Following his collegiate playing career, Gambino spent two seasons as a minor league infielder for the Boston Red Sox. In February 2002, he became a special assistant to the Red Sox Major League staff. In that capacity, he assisted the coaching staff with all on-field activity and aided the scouting department with coordinating the Amateur Draft.

Gambino was a coach for the Lowell Spinners, the Red Sox Short Season-A team in the New York-Penn League, from JuneSeptember 2002. He worked with hitters and infielders and coached first base for the Spinners. He also assisted with all game and prospect reports.

When the season concluded, the Red Sox sent Gambino to the Major League Baseball Scout Development Program.

returned to Boston College as a volunteer coach for Hughes. He coordinated the developmental program for hitters and infielders, and also coordinated BC's summer baseball camps.

After two seasons with the Eagles, Gambino moved back to the pro ranks in November 2005 to become an area scout for Detroit, working in the Northeast and Deep South (Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi).

Gambino, who received a bachelor's degree in English and theology from BC, is a native of Garrison, N.Y.

Gambino's Philosophy On ...

Hitting

"First and foremost, our hitters need to get a good pitch to hit. You can have the best swing in the world, but if you consistently swing at bad pitches and pitches out of the zone, it becomes very hard to have success at the plate.

After that, my overlying theme is to 'keep it simple.' I don't believe in a 'cookie cutter' approach to hitting — or making every hitter do the exact some thing at the plate. There are a few basic things that all good hitters must do, but there are numerous ways to do them. Our guys have all had some level of success to get here, so let's figure out what it is that they do well and help them stay there. Hitting is all about comfort, and if you manufacture swings, players cannot ever really get comfortable.

As a team, we'll stress a short, quick and inside approach to the baseball, with good extension through the baseball. We'll focus on our situational hitting — especially our two-strike approach — and getting a good pitch to hit. We will not spend a lot of time trying to rework swings and make all of our guys look the same, as that is counterproductive, in my opinion."

Recruiting

"The first thing we will do is focus on recruiting the best players in the state of Virginia. This is a state that takes high school baseball very seriously. There are a lot of great players playing in successful programs for very good coaches, and we will do our best to find and recruit Virginia kids who fit the mold of what we want our team to look like.

Beyond that, we would like to capitalize on the fact that Virginia Tech has a great reputation nationally — both in terms of the quality of the education and the state of its athletic program. That will allow us to recruit the whole country to find the right players.

Coach Hughes is great to play for because he expects and demands a lot out of his players (on and off the field) and will do everything in his power to make sure a player works hard, plays hard and competes. He's also very honest and upfront, both with praise and constructive criticism, and his players always know where they stand with him. When you play for him, you know you will get the most out of your ability.

All of the above helps give us a model for the type of player we want in our program. We look for tough, competitive kids who want to come in and outwork and out-compete everyone, both athletically and academically. We look for kids who we feel will represent this university and its baseball program well in all aspects — on the baseball field, in the classroom and in the community."

Tom Mackor

Volunteer Coach

Tom Mackor, a former infielder at Boston College, is the volunteer coach on Pete Hughes' new baseball staff at Virginia Tech. Mackor's duties include working with Tech's outfielders, assisting with the hitters and coordinating the Hokies' camps and clinics. He will also coach first base for the Hokies.

"Having Tom on the staff is like having another full-time coach," Hughes says. "He will be a great asset for us. He knows the game and is hungry to be in this business. He was with me for four years as a player at Boston College, and he was the most unselfish player I've ever been around. He's exactly the type of person you want associated with your program."

Mackor, 23, joins the Tech staff after working last year as an assistant coach at Methuen High School in Massachusetts. He played four seasons for Hughes at BC, where he started 10 of 12



BIG EAST Conference games as a sophomore in 2003 and batted .250. Mackor missed all but seven games of his junior year with a shoulder injury, but returned to action in 2005 and enjoyed his best season with the Eagles, hitting .278.

A 2005 Boston College graduate in communications, Mackor is from Salem, N.H. He was a baseball and football standout at St. John's Prep in the Boston High School Catholic League before enrolling at BC.

Athletic trainer Jimmy Lawrence has earned both respect and popularity through his outstanding work with Virginia Tech student-athletes during the past 28 years.





Academic Support

The success of Virginia Tech's baseball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and was a school-best 74 percent for 2005. This marks the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better. Additionally, more than 83 percent of Tech's student-athletes who have completed their eligibility have graduated.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, Virginia Tech's student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2005 calendar year, 378 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:



encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.


SAASS provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

During the summer of 2006, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms, and direct access to the SAASS staff. This new complex is a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides

Study Hall is mandatory for all freshmen, transfers, and currently-enrolled students with an overall GPA below 2.30

Academic and Athletic Eligibility

All Student-Athletes

Academic records are monitored to ensure that all student-athletes are making progress towards their degree.

Athletic Performance

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. Always striving to be on the cutting edge, Virginia Tech has combined strength and conditioning with nutrition and sport psychology to the benefit of its student-athletes. At Tech, these areas are part of the student-athlete's preparation for game day and for life.

Strength & Conditioning

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

The baseball team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 in honor of Haren, a former Hokie football player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department. Altogether, Tech has more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.


Gentry, who received his doctorate in curriculum and instruction from Virginia Tech in 1999, is in his 18th year as the director of strength and conditioning. His duties include overseeing the strength and conditioning training of athletes in all varsity sports at Virginia Tech.

Assistant Director of Strength and Conditioning Terry Mitchell serves as the fulltime performance coach of the baseball team, and he is aided by graduate assistant Mason Baggett.

Mitchell is a 1994 graduate of Lee (Tenn.) University, and

he earned a master's in health promotions at Tech in 2004.

Baggett recently completed his collegiate career as an offensive lineman for the Hokies' football team.

Nutrition

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life, and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel works individually with student-athletes to provide them with information they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance.

She also designs individual meal plans for athletes. Freel

gives an on-campus dining education seminar. She also provides over 300 athletic department recipe books and supplement bars for every athletic team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our student-athletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel says. "The individualized nutrition education allows me and the athletes to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The BOD POD is found in many professional training facilities, such as Major League Baseball and the NFL. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

Sport Psychology


Virginia Tech also offers another important service to all its student athletes — sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.


Bennett meets with student athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement.

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

A new addition to the sport psychology resources is the Dynavision 2000, a unique conditioning and training program designed to increase focus and concentration, improve coordination and visuomotor reactions, and increase peripheral awareness. Virginia Tech is privileged to be one of only a handful of schools with this cutting-edge technology.





Student Life

The Athletics Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech is committed to developing the total student-athlete. Megan Armbruster and Patricia Lovett are dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through the programs that this office administers.

Personal Development

Virginia Tech studentathletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

Community Outreach

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart." Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. In collaboration with the Virginia

Tech Corp of Cadets and student leadership, the "Hokies with Heart" program works together with the Montgomery County Public Schools System to visit with local school kids about the importance of education and character development. In 2006, the student-athletes also volunteered with the Montgomery County Christmas Store, the Hokies United Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund, Virginia Tech's Relay for Life campaign, and the Special Olympics.

Each athletic team at Virginia Tech is encouraged to select one local charity on which to focus their philanthropic efforts throughout the year. The baseball team has a partnership with the American Red Cross blood services division.

Career Development

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resumé design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and co-ops during their college careers.

Academic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.00 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2005 calendar year listed 378 student-athletes with this honor. Neil Savage of the men's swimming & diving team, and Lindsay Pieper of the women's lacrosse team, received the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics. The award is given to one male and one female student-athlete who demonstrate leadership, outstanding academic excellence and community involvement. The recipients of the award receive a \$5,000 scholarship donated by Dr. Bill and Peggy Skelton.

Several athletes from the Virginia Tech baseball team have received various academic awards. Seventeen Hokies were named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2005. Andrew Wells was named to the 2005 Virginia Tech All-Academic Team for attaining the highest GPA in 2005 on the baseball team.

Athletic Excellence

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season. The baseball team representatives are Sean O'Brien and Bryan Thomas.

Sports Medicine

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an everchanging and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes.

The department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of athletes.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its fifth full year in the new 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. With its completion, Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000

square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally.

The new room allows the staff to utilize the former Merryman Center facility for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. The treatment room has numerous treatment modalities, including portable X-ray, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot and cold packs and a lumbar/cervical traction unit. There are also offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment.

After the sports medicine staff diagnoses and treats an ill or injured athlete, the staff then starts collaborative work with the strength and conditioning staff to give the best injury prevention and performance enhancing programs possible. The training, medical, and strength and conditioning staffs each have a role in bringing the athlete back quickly and ready to play. After an injury, an athlete will go through rehabilitation and physical therapy. Athletes are then moved to weight training, as they become able.

The strength and conditioning staff uses specific programs for each injury in an effort to get the athlete back quickly. Prior to return to full participation, the athlete will also complete a series of drills and progressions that are specific to the athlete's position that will help insure that the athlete is ready to


return with a greatly reduced risk of re-injury.

The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athlete year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity.


A vital part of studentathletes' services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center and counseling services are available on one side of McComas Hall, while recreation sports and fitness programs are available on the other. The center also has a fully operational diagnostic laboratory, X-ray facilities and eight full-time physicians.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Athletic trainer Jimmy Lawrence works directly with the baseball team, attending practices and traveling with the team.




The Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room is the centerpiece of Tech's sports medicine facilities.






















English Field

Scenic English Field continues to provide Virginia Tech with a first-class campus setting for college baseball, day or night. The field, which was officially dedicated during a special ceremony on April 8, 1989, is named for the late E.R. 'Red' English and his wife, Ruth, who provided financial support for construction of the field.

Located at the intersection of Rt. 314 and Duckpond Drive, English Field features 1,033 permanent chair-back seats in its concrete stands. The seats were made possible through a contribution by an anonymous donor. The stands also include easy-access handicapped sections, which are located at the top of the stands on each side of the center section.

One of the most popular features of English Field is "The Hill", a grass-covered bank along the left field line where baseball fans can continue the Tech tradition of sunbathing while watching the Hokies.

A completely new drainage system was installed during fall 2005, along with a new eightfoot wooden outfield fence and a new net backstop behind the plate. The previous spring, a new scoreboard and message center were added along with additional landscaping and a concrete patio behind the stands.

Prior to the 2004 season, a new lighting system was installed. The Hokies played their first baseball game under the lights in Blacksburg on April 28, defeating VMI, 8-0.

A permanent press box was completed in January 1997. The two-story building located at the top of the stands behind home plate provides a working area for media, as well as two broadcast booths. It also houses a concession stand and restrooms.

The field, which was constructed by the S. Lewis Lionberger Company, has dimensions of 330 feet down the lines, 375 feet in the power alleys and 400 feet to center field. The natural grass surface is composed of a mixture of rye and bluegrass.


Other features include spacious dugouts faced with Hokie Stone, bullpens that are located beside each dugout and a practice hitting cage along the right field line. Security fencing was added in January 2003. The landscaping also allows for further expansion of the facilities as needed.

E.R. English, a native of Altavista, Va., played as an offensive and defensive guard on Virginia Tech football teams from 1930-33 and graduated from Virginia Tech in 1934. English contributed to Tech athletics for over 50 years and was one of the founders of The Student Aid Association in 1949. He served as president of that organization two of its first three years. English received the most outstanding alumni award at Tech in 1984.


Through a generous gift from alumnus George Sampson, the home team dugout was named for long-time Tech baseball coach G.F. 'Red' Laird during a ceremony on April 12, 1991. Laird recruited and coached Sampson at Tech.

The Hokies opened play at their new home with a 7-2 victory against George Mason University on March 22, 1989, and went on to post a 17-7 home record during their first season in the facility. Tech's 18-year mark at English Field is 298 wins, 136 losses and three ties.

Prior to the opening of English Field, Tech played its home baseball games at Tech Park, where it compiled a 431-122-1 record over 34 seasons.

113 Seasons of Tech Baseball

They've been playing the game of baseball in these mountains for a long time. It's been played on the Drill Field and in a bandbox called Tech Park. Players with names like "Boots" and "Hooks" cleared the pebbles on the infield dirt for guys named Jim Stewart and Franklin Stubbs. They played as members of the Corps of Cadets and as members of the Pamplin School of Business. R.B. Prince coached the Orange and Maroon when V.P.I. won the South Atlantic championship. Coach Red Laird swapped fishing stories and made a young man named Johnny Oates lose weight. And a fiesty skipper named Chuck Hartman came to Blacksburg in 1979 and 28 years later retired as the fourth-winningest coach in NCAA Division I history. From "Jockey" Kircher, to fly balls off the left fielder's head, to windy Blacksburg springs, these mountains have stories to tell — over 100 years of stories.


Virginia Tech had a baseball nine before it even had the name Virginia Polytechnic Institute. In the spring of 1892, cadets playing for the Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College bumped over a Brush Mountain trail to play an outfit called the Newports. The cadets representing V.A.M.C. defeated the Newports, 18-8. By 1894, class baseball teams and rivalries within the Corps were

established. These Corps teams supplied players to the varsity squad.

Up to the early 1960s, most members of Virginia Tech's student body were in the Corps of Cadets. But, with or without life in the barracks, Virginia Tech baseball has had its share of success.


The 1915 club won the South Atlantic championship by posting a 21-0 record, the only undefeated season ever in the sport. The team captain, Skinny Bruce, hit a team-leading .474 and fielded 1.000 at his left field post, which earned him a trip to Washington to play with the Senators. In the Washington and Lee game that year, Tech was down 8-3 going into the ninth, but scored five runs to tie, including three on a home run by shortstop Jimmy Powell. The Hokies won in the 10th. A pitcher named Ernest King Bibb hurled a one-hit, 3-0 shutout of Hampden-Sydney to open the season and closed it with a two-hit, 1-0 blanking of Roanoke College to keep Tech's record perfect. "Boots" Williams knocked in the only run.

The first Tech team to reach the NCAA baseball playoffs was Coach Red Laird's 1954 club. Virginia Tech went 12-6 during the regular season and eliminated Clemson in the first round of the NCAA tournament by winning, 11-10, at Clemson



The school's next sweet season came in 1969 when the Laird-coached Tech squad went 26-5 and was invited to the NCAA playoffs in Gastonia, N.C. There, the Hokies beat Furman before losing to Mississippi and North Carolina to finish with a 27-7 ledger. Senior pitcher Steve Pittman went 6-0 and Dean Hahn posted a 5-0 record and hit .367 while playing first base. Junior Eddy Oates went 7-2 on the mound and also hit .313. Outfielder Steve Rosson also swung a big stick for Tech, hitting .343.

The diamond Hokies' next trip to the NCAA tournament was in 1976 under Coach Bob Humphreys. Tech went 33-7 during the regular season and six

and Duke Dickerson carried the pitching load. Rick Wade, a team leader on and off the field, hit .312 for the Hokies and Dennis Duff hit .336. The '77 Hokies participated in the NCAA Mideast Regionals.

Humphreys stressed pitching and defense during his five-year stint as the Hokies' head coach and produced a .692 winning percentage. His teams stood in contrast to the power-hitting lineups that Coach Chuck Hartman coached in the early 1980s. Led by sluggers Franklin Stubbs, Billy Plante, George Canale and Trey McCov, the Hammerin' Hokies took full advantage of the cozy confines of Tech Park during the decade of the 1980s. Stubbs hit 29 dingers for Tech in 1981 to lead the nation and tie the NCAA record at that time for home runs in a season. Loyal Hokie fans remember Stubbs as a mobile power hitter who just missed becoming the first 30-30 player in Division I history. The first baseman stole 34 bases in addition to his 29 homers, to lead the team to a 48-9 mark.

The next season, third baseman Jim Stewart, who hit 18 home runs and drove in 68 runs, joined Stubbs as an All-American. That 1982 Hokie nine became the first Tech team to win 50 games in a season and had seven of its members
— Stubbs, Stewart, Brian Rupe,
Jay Phillips, Ray Perkins, Jimmy
Foit and Mark Krynitsky, sign
pro contracts. Coach Hartman's
teams rolled up 398 wins in
the 1980s, won 71 percent of
their games and three times
finished the season ranked in
the Top 20. During the 1987
season, Hartman became Tech's
winningest coach.


In 1989, Hartman and the Hokies moved to spacious English Field, a classy new baseball-only facility at the southwest corner of campus. The deeper fences of the new field would cause a decline in Tech's power numbers but not in the program's success.

The 1994 team was bumping along through a rebuilding year. Hartman's young team was 28-23 after concluding the regular season. Then, faster than you could say Brian Fitzgerald, the Hokies were champions and headed to the NCAA Tournament. Tech used outstanding pitching and solid defense to capture its first-ever Metro Conference Tournament title.


The Hokies were seeded sixth in the '94 Metro Tournament on the basis of their 8-9 record in conference play. The Tech nine met No. 3 seed South Florida in the first round. Fitzgerald, the team's

sophomore ace, pitched a twohit, complete-game shutout as Tech won 2-0. Next came No. 2 seed Southern Mississippi, Third baseman Bo Durkac doubled. tripled and drove in two runs to lead the offensive attack, and Ron Preston pitched into the ninth inning as the Hokies won 6-4. Senior Rob Gibson continued Tech's mound heroics with a stellar performance against UNC Charlotte, the tournament's No. 1 seed. Gibson allowed just one hit in a 4-1 Tech win.

Tulane stalled Tech's drive to the title by knocking off the Hokies, 6-3, on the final day of the event in Louisville, Ky. The Green Wave's win set up a championship game between the two teams. Tulane jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the second inning of the title game, but the Hokies fought back. By the end of the fifth inning Tech had taken the lead, and Fitzgerald

It was the Hokies' first-ever win over a Top 10 foe during NCAA tournament competition. The following year, the Trojans returned to win the College World Series and earn the national championship.

Tech won two games on the last day of the 1999 A-10 Championships to earn another NCAA regional trip. Tournament MVP Larry Bowles contributed 10 hits, 14 RBIs, two home runs and a 12-strikeout, completegame pitching victory during the conference event. The Hokies repeated as champions again in 2000 behind an MVP performance by outfielder Addison Bowman.

The following year, Virginia Tech made another conference move, becoming full-time members of the BIG EAST. It didn't take Hartman and his Tech nine long to become comfortable in their new home. The Hokies

advanced to the finals of the BIG EAST championships during their first season in the league and shared the conference's regular-season title with Notre Dame in 2002.

Pitcher Joe Saunders, who posted three straight nine-win seasons during that stretch, became Tech's highest pick in the summer Major League Baseball amateur draft following the 2002 season. The Anaheim Angels took the junior left-hander with the 12th pick of the first round.

Another junior, outfielder Brad Bauder, also made headlines in 2002. Bauder had one of the greatest games in collegiate history when he went 8-for-8 against Georgetown, hitting for the cycle and contributing four home runs, seven runs scored, 14 RBIs and 23 total bases.

Up until the 1970s, the team was comprised mostly of members of the student body who had been recruited for

other sports or tried out for the baseball team of their own volition. Many baseball players were multiple-sport athletes. In 1902, future College Football Hall of Fame inductee Hunter Carpenter played on the gridiron in the fall and the diamond in the spring. In the 1930s, Al Casey starred in football, track and baseball. Harry Bushkar was recruited on a football scholarship in the early 1940s and played football, basketball and baseball before signing with the Yankees' organization. In the 1950s, Howie Wright was a standout catcher on Tech's 1954 NCAA baseball team and a star halfback on the Hokies' unbeaten and nationally-ranked 1954 football team.

During the 70s, Tech's baseball program was expanded and the head coach no longer doubled as the assistant football or basketball coach as men like Mac McEver and Red Laird had done for many years. With one sport to concentrate on and an increased budget, coaches Humphreys and Hartman were free to spend more time on the recruiting trails. The move paid off. Since 1974, when Humphreys began his five-year coaching stint, Tech baseball has averaged 33 wins a year and has had just three losing seasons.

Tech's longest conference affiliation began in 1921 when the Hokies became a charter

member of the Southern Conference. During the early years, the conference was composed of most of the teams that now make up the Southeastern Conference and the ACC. Tech remained in the league until June 1965, when it withdrew to become an independent. The Hokies played baseball as an independent until joining the Metro Conference after the 1978 season.

When Tech joined the Southern Conference, the baseball team was still playing its home games on an area that was part of what is now the Drill Field. The area was first called Sheib Field, and later Gibboney Field. After it was re-graded and enlarged in 1909, it was tabbed Miles Field. In 1926, Miles Stadium was constructed behind the War Memorial Gym and became the home for football, track and baseball. It wasn't until 1955 that the baseball team got a home of its very own. Tech Park, which eventually became nestled between Cassell Coliseum and Lane Stadium, had both dugouts and home run fences. Coach Hartman believes the ball jumped out of Tech Park particularly well to right field and is an expert witness after coaching Stubbs, Plante, Canale and McCov, all of whom hit more than 20 home runs in a single season.

One former Hokie who was still plying his craft in

the pros when Stubbs first started banging down the walls in Blacksburg was former Baltimore and Texas manager, Johnny Oates. Oates came to Tech looking for an education and a win over VMI. He left with a pro contract and a win over an Alabama team that had Kenny Stabler as a member. In fact, Oates' pro career may not have come to fruition if not for stern words from Coach Laird. After coming to Tech, Oates' playing weight ballooned from his normal 185 to 215. Oates remembered Laird summoning him to his office and asking the youngster in a sarcastic tone if Oates wanted to let a chance at a pro career slip away. After a winter of wrestling and running, Oates returned to his normal playing weight.

Oates played much of his sophomore season in 1966 with an injured heel. Before a home game with UNC that year, Laird struck a gentlemen's agreement with Tar Heel coach Walter Rabb, an old fishing buddy, that would allow a pinch-runner for Oates every time he reached base yet still allow the Tech standout to remain in the game as the catcher. During the first eight innings of the game, Oates walked three times and singled twice. His pinch-runner, Mike Knight, scored five times. In the bottom of the ninth inning, Oates hit a three-run homer to give the Hokies a 15-14 victory.




Johnny Oates starred for the Hokies in the mid-1960s and went on to become a major league player and manager.

There are other stories of what it was like to play baseball at Virginia Tech. Outfielder Wilson Bell never forgot being hit in the head by a fly ball and having his center fielder toss him a glove for 'noggin' use only. Chuck Hartman fondly remembers two streakers on a motorcycle zipping behind the outfield fence during a game at Tech Park.

There are plenty of baseball stories in these mountains, and with Virginia Tech now in the Atlantic Coast Conference and welcoming a new young coach to the helm, there are plenty more still to be written.

Arrived in the majors in 1923 as a left fielder and third baseman with the Cleveland Indians ... Played two seasons with the Red Sox and one with the Reds ... Was a career .278 hitter in the majors.

Buddy Dear, 2b

Starred as a shortstop at Tech from 1925-27 ... Signed with the Washington Nationals and played in one major league game before an injury cut his career short in 1927.

Cloy Mattox, c

A member of Tech teams from 1927 through 1929 ... Made it to the major leagues with the Philadelphia Athletics in '29, playing in three games.


Toby Atwell, c

Played on the 1943 Tech squad ... Did not show up in the majors until 1952 when he was 28-years old ... Spent five seasons in the big leagues, playing for three different teams ... Batted .290 for the Cubs in 1952 and carried a .289 batting average for the Pirates in 1954 ... Finished his career with the Milwaukee Braves in 1956.

Leo Burke, of/utility

A three-sport letterman at Tech who turned to pro baseball following his graduation in 1956 ... Played for the Baltimore Orioles in 1958 ... Also played for the Los Angeles Angels, St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs ... Saw action at every position except pitcher during his major league career, which lasted through the 1965 season.

Johnny Oates, c/manager

Signed with the Baltimore Orioles in 1967 after his junior season at Tech ... Spent 11 seasons as a major league player with Baltimore, Atlanta, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and the New York Yankees before retiring in 1981 ... Managed Yankee AA and AAA teams to playoff berths in 1982 and 1983, respectively ... Took a position as the Chicago Cubs' bullpen coach in 1984 ... Moved to the Baltimore organization in 1988 ... Was named the Orioles' major league manager during the 1991 season ... Selected the American League Manager of the Year by The Sporting News in 1993 ... His 237-199 record from 1991-94 was the third-best in the American League for that span ... Signed a contract as manager of the Texas Rangers in October 1994 ... Earned American League Manager of the Year honors in 1996 after guiding the Rangers to the AL West championship.

Franklin Stubbs, 1b/of

Was a first-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1982 after his junior season at Tech ...

Got his first call to the majors in April of 1984 ... Shared first base duties for the World Champion Dodgers in 1988 and started all five World Series games against Oakland that season ... Was traded to the Houston Astros prior to the 1990 season ... Set a Houston club record for home runs by a lefthanded hitter with 23 ... Signed a three-year free agent contract with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1991 ... Joined the Atlanta Braves' organization after retiring as a player ... Spent five seasons as a roving hitting instructor for the Braves ... Hitting coach for the Myrtle Beach Pelicans past two years ... Named coach for the Mississippi Braves for 2007.

Mike Williams, p

Signed with the Philadelphia Phillies in 1990 after his junior year at Tech ... Was called to the majors during July of 1992 ... Pitched a three-hitter in his second major league start for a 9-3 victory against the Los Angeles Dodgers ... Split time between the majors and Triple-A in 1993 and '94 ... Appeared in 33 games for the Phillies in 1995, including eight starts ... Compiled a 3-3 record and 3.29 ERA ... Moved into the starting rotation in 1996 ... Signed as a free agent with Kansas City and


saw action on the AAA and major league levels in '97 ... Pitched in 37 major league games as a reliever for the Pittsburgh Pirates in '98, compiling a 4-2 record and 1.97 ERA ... Led the Pirates in saves with 23 during the 1999 season ... Made 72 appearances in 2000 posting 24 saves and a 3.50 ERA ... Had 22 saves for Pittsburgh in 2001 before being traded to the Houston Astros in August ... Finished with a 6-4 record, including a 4-0 mark with the Astros ... Re-signed with the Pirates ... Set a Pirates club record with 16 consecutive saves in 2001, then posted a club-record 46 saves in 2002 ... Pitched in the 2002 Major League All-Star game and was chosen for the game again in 2003 ... Posted 25 saves in 40 games for the Pirates in '03 before being traded to Philadelphia ... Had three saves for the Phillies as a setup man... Retired before the 2004 season.


George Canale, 1b

Hit a home run in his second major league at bat ... Was called up again in 1990 ... Was traded to Montreal and then to Cleveland where he spent most of the 1992 and 1993 seasons at the AAA level.

Brad Clontz, p

Was drafted in the 10th round and signed by the Atlanta Braves in 1992 ... Named the Southern League Pitcher of the Year in 1994 after saving 27 games at Greenville and posting a 1.20 ERA ... Saved 11 more regular season games at Richmond and won the Rolaids Relief Man award as the top reliever in the minor leagues ... Worked as a closer, then a

setup man during his major league rookie season in 1995 ... Finished with an 8-1 record, four saves and a 3.65 earned run average ... Led the National League in relief wins ... Signed with the Dodgers prior to the 1998 season ... Saw some major league action with LA in '98 and with the Pittsburgh Pirates in 2000.

Kevin Barker, 1b

A third-round draft pick of the Milwaukee Brewers following his junior season at Tech in 1996 ... Started 1999 at Triple-A and had 23 homers and 87 RBIs when he was called up to the majors in mid-August ... Played in 38 major league games for the Brewers, starting 29 ... Hit .282 with three doubles, three home runs and 23 RBIs ... Saw action in 40 games during the 2000 season, batting .220 with five doubles, two homers and nine RBIs ... Moved to the San Diego Padres organization and saw action in seven major league games in 2002 ... Appeared in 12

games for the Toronto Blue Jays in 2006, batting .235.

Brian Fitzgerald, p

Was drafted in the 20th round and signed by the Seattle Mariners in 1996 ... Was called to the majors during the 2002 season ... Pitched as a reliever in six games, working 6.1 innings ... Did not have a decision ... Retired from baseball in 2003.

Joe Saunders, p

The 12th overall pick in the 2002 draft by the Los Angeles Angels ... Was called to the majors in 2005 to start against the Toronto Blue Jays in October ... Pitched 7.1 innings allowing five hits and two runs ... Left the game with a lead but ended up with a no-decision ... Returned in September to pitch one game ... Earned those honors by hitting .417, driving in 83 runs, stealing 34 bases and slugging 29 home runs ... Set nine school records and led the nation in home runs and slugging percentage (.969) ... The following season as a junior, he was named to The Sporting News' All-America team.

Jim Stewart, 3b/p Seabrook, Md.

Was named as the firstteam third baseman on the 1982 American Association of College Baseball Coaches' All-America team following an outstanding senior season ... Led the team with a .404 batting average ... Contributed 88 hits (a school record at the time), 18 home runs and 68 RBIs ... Also aided the Tech cause as a short reliever, compiling a 4-1 record with four saves and a team-leading 2.31 earned run average.

George Canale, 1b Roanoke, Va.

Led the nation in home runs with 29 as a junior (1986) on the way to earning first team All-America honors from *Baseball America* and *The Sporting News* ... Led the team in hitting with a .373 average ... Also contributed 71 runs batted in, 76 runs scored and a team-high 47 bases on balls ... Established school career marks for home runs (76), total bases (502) and runs batted in (227) ... Considered Tech's top defensive first baseman.





Trey McCoy, If Virginia Beach, Va.



First Baseball Number Retired

The familiar No.1 will no longer be seen on a baseball jersey at Virginia Tech. Hall of Fame coach Chuck Hartman's jersey and number were retired during a special ceremony on Sept. 22, 2006. Hartman retired from coaching in June, following 28 seasons at Virginia Tech and 47 seasons on the collegiate level, His number is the first baseball number to be retired at Tech.

Hartman earned the highest recognition a collegiate coach can receive when he was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame during the ABCA 2004 annual convention in San Antonio, Texas. The honor came just a little over a year after his induction into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame in November 2002, and was magnified by the fact that he was already a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame.

Hartman's overall coaching record of 1,444-816-8 places him fourth in alltime wins among Division I baseball coaches. His final record at Tech is 961-591-8. He became Tech's winningest baseball coach in 1987 and guided Tech to more victories than any other coach during the university's athletic history.



First Baseball Jersey Retired

Virginia Tech retired the jersey of former Tech baseball great Johnny Oates on May 4, 2002 during a special ceremony prior to a double-header against Connecticut at English Field.

Oates was presented with a framed jersey in recognition of the honor and a special display with his name and number has been placed on the front of the press box. Oates' jersey is the first baseball jersey to be retired by Virginia Tech. His number 15 remains available to future Tech players.

Oates came to Blacksburg in 1965 and was an outstanding catcher for the Virginia Tech baseball team. He hit .410 in 1966 and .342 in 1967 before signing with the Baltimore Orioles after his junior season. Oates spent 11 seasons in the major leagues as a player, seeing action in two World Series with the Los Angeles Dodgers and one with the New York Yankees. After retiring as a player in 1981, Oates tried his hand at coaching, and went on to become the major league manager of the Baltimore Orioles and the Texas Rangers.

Oates was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 1983. He died Dec. 24, 2004.



Hokie Stone

Hokie Stone is used to construct most of the buildings on the beautiful Tech campus. This natural rock is 475-million-year-old dolomite limestone, mined from a quarry located less than a mile from Cassell Coliseum.

In constructing the buildings at Tech, a stone mason shapes individual stones, arranges them and cements them together with mortar to create walls of great strength and durability.

What Is a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official University school colors, Chicago maroon and burnt orange, also were introduced in 1896. The colors were chosen by a committee because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

A Great Place To Learn and Grow

Beginning in 1872 with 132 students and two programs of study, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With about 25,800 full-time students in Blacksburg and more than 2,000 other students statewide, the university produces world-class scholarship in a challenging academic environment. University tradition is firmly rooted in our motto, Ut Prosim (That I May Serve), and our historic land-grant mission is brought to life through learning, discovery, and engagement.

Learning

Virginia Tech's challenging academic standards attract high-achieving students. Our eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School offer more degree programs than any other university in the state with 60 undergraduate and 140 graduate offerings. Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in developing and using instructional technologies. Some 85 percent of our departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 60,000 enrollments since 1998.

Discovery

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures of about \$290 million, Virginia Tech is ranked 55th among research universities in the United States. The university, which has more than 100 research centers, also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and near the

top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in more than 3,500 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

Engagement

As part of our outreach mission and in adherence to our motto, we serve and engage the citizens of the commonwealth, the nation, and the world. Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of economic and community development projects. These efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live.

Professionals, organizations, and communities tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers. Virginia Tech has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques, such as satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer

conferencing, and Web-based courses, to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.

The Inn at Virginia Tech & Skelton Conference Center on campus and The Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center in Roanoke, both owned by Virginia Tech, support the university's outreach mission by working with faculty to plan and host conferences and continuing education and professional programs.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$30 million in funded economic development projects in 27 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2005-06, about 1,870 students from 117 foreign countries studied at Tech, while more than 800 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative
Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for more than 90 years. With 107 city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.


Tech Improves Ranking Among 'Best Values' in Public Colleges

Virginia Tech has advanced its position among the top public colleges and universities in the nation that offer a first class educational experience at a bargain price, according to *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* magazine.


The Kiplinger "100: Best Values in Public Colleges" list, released in January, ranks Virginia Tech eighteenth among 100 institutions "that combine outstanding economic value with a first-class education," according to the publication's editors. On the 2006 list, Virginia Tech was ranked twentieth.

Kiplinger's top 100 colleges are identified from a pool of over 500 public four-year colleges and universities, and are ranked according to academic quality, cost, and financial aid opportunities. Schools that make the list traditionally work to keep costs down through a variety of creative financing initiatives, such as funds obtained from licensing fees associated with university-branded apparel and other items, and through private fundraising initiatives.

Although four other Virginia institutions — University of Virginia, University of Mary Washington, James Madison University, and George Mason University — also appear on this year's list of the top 100, Virginia Tech continues to be the lowest-cost public university in the state, and the lowest cost Virginia institution on *Kiplinger's* list. Of a total of 15 four-year public colleges and universities in the commonwealth, Virginia Tech still has the lowest overall cost to attend (tuition, mandatory fees, and room and board).





Charles Steger University President

Now in his seventh year as President of Virginia Tech, Dr. Charles Steger has charted a course to bolster the university's research enterprise and compete among the nation's premier research institutions. Under his direction, the university has adopted a strategic plan, which is guiding the growth of the research enterprise, fostering outreach initiatives and increasing quality across all aspects of the academic community.

In his previous role as Vice President for Development and

University Relations, Steger built a critical base of private support when he led the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which raised more than \$337 million. Today, private support from Virginia Tech's alumni and friends continues to play an essential role in this university community. Last year, the university raised more than \$67 million, a 23.5 percent increase over the previous year.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span five different decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the College of Architecture and Urban Studies in 1981, he was, at age 33, the youngest architecture dean in the nation. His most recent publications include book chapters on the topics of the business of education and the university presidency.

Steger received his Bachelor of Architecture degree, Master of Architecture degree and Ph.D., in environmental science and engineering from Virginia Tech.



Jim Weaver Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 61, was appointed on Sept. 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader on behalf of Tech athletics. In his years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes and improving Tech's facilities.

A major addition to the west side of Lane Stadium opened last summer. In addition to luxury suites and other game day amenities, the structure houses a ticket office, athletic fund offices, an Athletics Hall of Fame and a new student academic services area.

Improvements to the baseball field include lights, a new drainage system, outfield fence and backstop.

Weaver presided over Tech's move into the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004-05, when Virginia Tech and Miami were officially introduced as the 10th and 11th members of the ACC, effective July 1, 2004.

Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Weaver brings a "Penn State mentality" to the position. He says that various schools' interest in him as a reformer through the years can be traced to Penn State and its reputation

for how it conducts business in intercollegiate athletics.

It was with the Nittany Lions' football team that Weaver first made a name for himself in athletics. A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver was a center and linebacker on Penn State teams coached by the legendary Rip Engle and Joe Paterno.

Weaver graduated from Penn State in 1967 with a bachelor's in psychology and rehabilitation education. He received a master's in college counselor education, also from Penn State, in 1968.

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons — Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.

by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the potential of the quaint town.


Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that distinguish the area.


The region features a moderate climate and four distinct seasons.

Athletic Success

Virginia Tech has a long and proud athletic tradition, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. For the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference — a move that has already helped the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger.

Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle.

The success of the baseball program is only part of the story.

Tech's nationally-known football team has had unprecedented success over the past decade. The Hokies have played in 14 consecutive bowl games. This past season, the Hokies won 10 games, joining Southern Cal and Texas as the only schools to have won 10 or more games each of the last three years. The Tech football team captured the ACC Championship in its inaugural season in the league, won BIG EAST Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

Last year, Spyridon Jullien won NCAA titles in the indoor weight throw and the outdoor hammer throw, leading the Tech men to a 12th-place finish in the outdoor track & field championships and a 14th-place finish in the indoor championships. The women's team, meanwhile, placed 25th at the indoor championships.

The women's basketball team has advanced to postseason play nine-straight seasons, including NCCA Tournament appearances the last four years. The men's team received a bid to the NIT during the 2004-05 season.

The men's soccer team and women's softball squad have been to back-to-back NCAA Championships during the past two years, while the women's soccer team reached the postseason for the first time in its history during 2004. The women's soccer team was recognized by its ACC peers with a fall sportsmanship award for 2005, while the men's team picked up a sportsmanship award in 2006.

In 2001, the Hokie golf team won a nation's-best six tournaments, including the BIG EAST Golf Championship, and went on to record an eighth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Golf Championship.

Tech's baseball and men's tennis teams have also participated in NCAA postseason competition in recent years, as have individuals from wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and track & field.

Prior to joining the ACC, Virginia Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference in 1991, and a member of the BIG EAST in all other sports except wrestling beginning in 2001.
