Virginia Tech Gator Bowl Practice Procedures

Coach Frank Beamer will be available to the media at the beginning of practice at the practice site. Once dressed, Tech players will be available for an interview period prior to practice except the practice on Dec. 31. Media members are encouraged to arrive at the practice field early as the schedule may fluctuate. The first three periods of practice (approximately 30 minutes) will be open to the media, including still photographers and videographers. Media members must remain on the sidelines once practice begins. Following the first three periods, practice will be closed. Members of the Tech team will not be available for interviews at the team hotel.

Virginia Tech Travel Plans

The majority of the Virginia Tech football team will travel individually and convene in Jacksonville. The official party will travel by charter jet and will arrive in Jacksonville at approximately 10:30 a.m., on Wednesday. Dec. 26. While in Jacksonville, the Hokies will be headquartered at the Marriott at Sawgrass Resort, and will practice at the University of North Florida. The team will return home Jan. 2.



2001 Season Review

The Winding Road to an 8-3 Season Lands Virginia Tech in Jacksonville

If you would have asked any writer, television analyst or even the most die-hard Hokie fan last February if they thought the Hokies would go 8-3 without Michael Vick and Lee Suggs, most would have said "probably not."

But here is Virginia Tech, without its two big stars from an 11-1 season a year ago, playing in its second consecutive Toyota Gator Bowl and ninth straight bowl, overall.

Most thought that with the Hokies' favorable schedule, tough running game and suffocating defense, they might be able to overcome losing Vick, the No. 1 overall pick in last year's NFL Draft.

No one considered the possibilities of Tech having such a successful season without Suggs — the top scorer in Division I-A football last season and a Heisman candidate this year.

But it's a reality thanks to a great team effort, one of the nation's top defenses and several big wins.

several big wins.

As a first-year starter at quarterback, redshirt-junior Grant Noel led the Hokies to an 8-3 regular-season record.

Now, the Hokies travel to Jacksonville, Fla., for a showdown with the Florida State Seminoles. The road to northern Florida has been twisting, difficult and long, but the Hokies navigated it fairly well and are set for another battle in Alltel Stadium.

The season started on Sept. 1 with a home date against Connecticut. A beautiful summer afternoon at Lane Stadium turned sour in the third quarter when Suggs went around the left side for a nice gain. At the end of the run, his left knee buckled and Suggs collapsed. His ACL and medial meniscus were torn. His season was over. And many predicted so was the Hokies'.

The game, as did the season, continued. The Hokies rolled over the Huskies, 51-10 as first-time starter at quarterback Grant Noel threw for three scores.

But many questions were left to be answered. Could Noel run the show without a dominating back behind him? Could the new tandem of Keith

Burnell and Kevin Jones fill in for Suggs? Could the defense shoulder the load of a now vulnerable offense?

Those auestions were answered the following week when the Tech defense dominated a dangerous Western Michigan offense in a 31-0 victory at home. Burnell, the new starting tailback, ran for 74 yards and a score while Jones ran for 75 vards.



The Tech defense posted a nation's-best four shutouts this season. During the Hokies' 50-0 win at Rutgers, linebacker Jake Houseright picked off a pass and bowled through a would-be tackler.

The defense continued to dominate the next week at Rutgers, posting another shutout. In the 50-0 win, Noel tied a school record with four TD passes, including three in the first quarter, and the defense forced six turnovers in the convincing victory.

After a week off, Tech overcame a slow start to down UCF, 46-14. The Golden Knights scored late in the first stanza to take a 7-0 lead. It marked the first time all season the Hokies had trailed in a game. But Tech came right back to take a 19-14 lead before scoring 27 unanswered points to end the game and move to 4-0.

Game No. 5 was supposed to be Tech's first real test of the year. West Virginia is an intimidating place to play. Noel, from West Virginia, was supposed to be rattled playing there, and the Mountaineers had a tough running back in Avon Cobourne.

The contest never lived up to the hype as Tech rolled to a 35-0 victory at Mountaineer Field. It marked the third shutout of the year in five games for the Hokie defense, which limited Cobourne to just 31 yards rushing. Burnell posted his first career 100-yard rushing game and scored two touchdowns, and the Hokies' offense piled up 412 yards of total offense.

Win No. 6 came against a pesky Boston College team that had provided trouble for the Hokies in the past. The Eagles came in hot, with a 4-2 record and one of the top running backs in the nation in William Green.

Tech jumped out to a quick 34-0 lead and never looked back in winning 34-20. Kevin McCadam returned a fumble for a score and André Davis recorded 209 all-purpose yards, including 112 yards and two touchdowns receiving.

The defense shut down Green, limiting him to just 74 yards on 21 carries, marking the only game all season Green failed to reach the 100yard plateau.

The next two games were ones Hokie faithful would like to forget. Game No. 7 proved to be a tough battle between a surging Syracuse team and a confident Hokie bunch.

The Orangemen jumped on top early and held off a late charge to end the Hokies' 16-game home winning streak with a 22-14 victory.

The hangover from the Syracuse game carried over to the next week, as the Hokies were handed one of their worst losses in recent history by Pittsburgh.


The Panthers came out fired up and put the game out of reach by halftime. In the end, Tech was handed a 38-7 loss and was sent back to Blacksburg wondering where the swagger of that 6-0 bunch just two games earlier had gone.

The remedy for the Hokies' blues came in the form of Temple at Veterans Stadium. After struggling early, Tech got on track en route to a 35-0 victory. The shutout was Tech's fourth of the season, the most since 1983.

Freshman Kevin Jones made his first career start in front of his hometown fans and didn't disappoint. He had scoring runs of 11 and 87 yards on the way to a 155-yard rushing performance.

Back on the winning track, Tech took to the road for the third consecutive time for Game No. 10. This contest pitted the Hokies against arch-rival Virginia in a battle for the Commonwealth Cup.

Jones got his second start and once again showed why he was so highly rated coming out of high school. The true freshman carried the ball 37 times for 181 yards and a score while the combination of Noel and Davis connected twice for scores in the first half.

A 31-0 lead was all the defense would need for the Hokies' third straight win over the Cavaliers. In the end, the Cavs were held to eight yards rushing and the Hokies recorded six sacks in the 31-17 win.

After a rare Thanksgiving weekend off, the Hokies prepared for what many thought would be the game of the year. Although it didn't feature two undefeated teams, the Hokies had a chance to spoil Miami's bid to play for the national championship in the Rose Bowl.

Tech jumped out to a 3-0 lead, but found itself down 20-3 at the intermission. Behind 160 yards from Jones and two touchdown runs from fullback Jarrett Ferguson, Tech battled back in the second half.

The Hokies had a chance to pull off the upset of the season when Eric Green blocked a punt and Brandon Manning returned it for a score, but the two-point conversion failed and Miami eventually escaped with a 26-24 victory and national title hopes still alive.

Despite some staggering losses, the Hokies are 8-3 and playing in the Toyota Gator Bowl. The site of their bowl game is about as familiar as their opponent. The New Year's Day game will mark the 31st meeting between the Hokies and 'Noles with FSU leading the series 19-10-1.

The last battle between these old rivals came after the 1999 season with the Seminoles taking a 46-29 Nokia Sugar Bowl victory on the carpet of the Louisiana SuperDome in New Orleans to claim the national title.

Now, the rematch comes two years later on the grassy surface of Alltel Stadium in what has become a postseason home for the Hokies.

Although the stakes aren't quite as high as when these two last met, the intensity will definitely match the 2000 contest. And as the Hokies look for a little payback for the Sugar Bowl game, Tech fans know one way or another, the 2001 season has been a success.

All that's missing is another postseason bowl victory.



Gator Bowl Notes

Virginia Tech vs. Florida State

The Tech-FSU Series

When Virginia Tech and Florida State meet in the Toyota Gator Bowl, it will mark the 31st meeting between the two and the first since the battle for the national championship at the 2000 Sugar Bowl.

Tech is Florida State's oldest out-of-state rival, having first met in 1955. The Hokies and 'Noles have met 30 times before, with FSU holding a 19-10-1 lead in the series. The Tech series is the third-longest in FSU history behind Florida (46 times) and Miami (45 times).

The last meeting between these two schools came on Jan. 4, 2000 in the Louisiana Superdome as the two battled for the national championship. The Hokies led 29-28 heading into the final period, but the Seminoles proved too tough in winning 46-29.

That meeting in New
Orleans was the first in nearly
a decade as the two met on
Oct. 12, 1991 with No. 1 FSU
taking a 33-20 victory at the
Citrus Bowl in Orlando. That
game marked head coach
Frank Beamer's first neutral
site contest.

Number One

Virginia Tech has won the BIG EAST Championship three times in the past seven years. In nine years of round-robin play in the BIG EAST, Virginia Tech tops the win list.

Tech's last victory against FSU came in 1975, a 13-10 win at Lane Stadium. Florida State has won the last 10 meetings. Tech is 5-12 vs. FSU at Doak Campbell Stadium, 5-5-1 in Blacksburg and 0-2 at neutral sites.

The series has been a close one in the past, with 20 of the 30 contests being decided by 14 points or less. Thirteen games have been decided by 10 points or fewer. But there have been some lopsided games in the series, too. Tech's largest margin of victory was a 56-21 win at Tallahassee in 1974, while FSU's was a 41-7 victory at Blacksburg in 1989.

Beamer is 0-5 vs. Florida State as a head coach while FSU's top man, Bobby Bowden, is 13-0 vs. Tech as a head coach, including three wins while at West Virginia.

The series also has produced some of the biggest plays in both schools' history. Larry Key's 97-yard run against the Hokies in 1976 still stands as both the longest run in FSU history and the longest run given up by Tech.

Jimmy Jordan's 96-yard pass to Kurt Unglaub in the 1976 game stands as the longest pass in Seminole history and the secondlongest pass play Tech has ever given up.

The longest field goal in Virginia Tech history was kicked against FSU. Wayne Latimer booted a 61-yarder against the 'Noles in the 1975 game. Leon Bright's 100-yard kickoff return against the Hokies in 1974 still stands in a tie as the longest ever by a Tech opponent.

Noting the Gator

The Hokies are 1-2 all-time in the Gator Bowl, and 1-1 in Alltel Stadium. The Hokies gained their first taste of

victory in the Gator Bowl last season when they beat Clemson, 41-20.

Tech lost to North Carolina, 42-3, at Alltel Stadium following the 1997 season. In the 1994 Gator Bowl, the Hokies lost to Tennessee, 45-23. The game was played at Ben Hill Griffin Stadium in Gainesville due to the construction of Alltel Stadium.

The Seminoles are 3-0-1 all-time in the Gator Bowl. FSU made its first appearance in the bowl in 1964, downing Oklahoma 36-19. The 'Noles and Penn State battled to a 17-17 tie in the 1967 Gator Bowl. In the 1982 Gator Bowl, FSU downed West Virginia, 31-12.

The Seminoles beat Oklahoma State, 34-23, in the 1985 Gator Bowl.

FSU is 2-0 all-time in Alltel Stadium, recording wins over Duke (51-23) in 1999 and BYU (29-3) in 2000.

Postseason Records

Florida State is 18-10-2 alltime in bowl games. Bowden is 17-6-1 in postseason play as the head coach at FSU following last year's loss to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. Virginia Tech is 5-9 in its bowl appearances following last year's victory in the Gator Bowl. Frank Beamer is 4-4 as a head coach at Tech in bowl games.

Sunshine State Facts

The Hokies have played 55 football games against schools from the state of Florida, posting a 19-35-1 record. The Hokies are 10-19-1 against Florida State, 5-14 against the University of Miami, 2-0 against both UCF and Tampa and are 0-2 alltime against the Gators of Florida.

In games played in the Sunshine State, Tech is 11-25. The Hokies are 2-0 at Tampa, 5-12 at Tallahassee, 2-9 at Miami (2-8 against the University of Miami; 0-1 in the Orange Bowl), 1-1 in Jacksonville, 0-2 at Gainesville (0-1 vs. the University of Florida; 0-1 in the Gator Bowl) and 1-1 at Orlando (1-0 vs. UCF; 0-1 vs. FSU).

Goin' Home

Florida has been a prosperous state for the Hokies, who have signed some of the top talent in the state in recent years. In fact, Florida is the second-most represented state on the Hokies' team behind the state of Virginia. There are 12



Hokies who hail from the Sunshine State. No one on the team is from Jacksonville, but Bartow (Terrell Parham), Clewiston (Thenus Franklin, Eric Green), Delray Beach (T.J. Jackson), Plantation (Cols Colas), Plant City (Wayne Ward), Pompano Beach (James Miller), Tallahassee (Derrius Monroe), Tampa (Chris Buie, Garnell Wilds) West Palm Beach (Dan Wilkinson) and Winter Haven (Billy Hardee) are all Florida hometowns of current Hokies.

Cols Colas is one of a dozen Hokies from the Sunshine State.

Like a Rock

One of the most important things Coach Frank Beamer has brought to the Virginia Tech football program is stability. Beamer is finishing his 15th season at the Tech helm. Prior to Beamer no other football coach in school history had served more than 10 seasons as the head coach and only four men had held the head coaching job for more than six seasons.

Only three of the 117 other Division I-A head football coaches have been at their current school longer than Beamer. They are Joe Paterno at Penn State (36 yrs.), Bobby Bowden at Florida State (26 yrs.) and Fisher DeBerry at Air Force (18 yrs.).

Assistant head coach Billy Hite (24 yrs.), defensive coordinator Bud Foster (15 yrs.) and offensive coordinator Rickey Bustle (14 yrs.) have a combined 53 years of coaching experience at Virginia Tech.

Beamer's current 15-year tenure at Tech is the longest among Division I-A coaches currently at their alma mater.

Conference Honors

Virginia Tech had five players named All-BIG EAST this year, including four on the first team. André Davis, Ben Taylor, Ronyell Whitaker and David Pugh were all named to the first team. In addition, Chad Beasley was named to the second team. True frosh Kevin Jones was named the conference's Rookie of the Year.

What's a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy!; Tech! Tech! V.P.I! Sola-Rex Sola-Rah; Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!!; Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

Record-Breaking Fullback

Senior Jarrett Ferguson has started 44 games in a row at fullback, but his finest year has been the 2001 campaign.

Besides being one of the best blockers around, the

Goodview, Va., native has set three Virginia Tech records this season for fullbacks.

His 25 receptions, 256 receiving yards and three touchdown receptions are all modern-day records for a Tech fullback.

His on-field

accomplishments rival those of his in the classroom.

His 872 career punt return vards and 15.8 career average are both school records. His four punt returns for scores tie the school mark.

He's also a threat receiving as his 103 career receptions tie him with Mike Giacolone for third place all-time at Tech and his 1,986 yards receiving also rank third. He is tied for second with 18 career receiving TDs.

Davis also has 121 yards and four TDs rushing in his career, as well as a 21.8 yard average on kickoff returns.

Talented True Frosh

Kevin Jones came into Blacksburg last August as one of the top incoming freshmen in America. He didn't disappoint.

In his first season as a Hokie, he has led the team in rushing with a freshmanrecord 957 yards, starting the last three games. He also scored five touchdowns on the year.

For his efforts, he was named the BIG EAST's Rookie of the Year, as well as to The Sporting News' Second-Team Freshman All-America team.

Nine in a Row

Virginia Tech is one of only seven teams to go to nine bowls in the last nine years. The other six teams are Florida, Florida State, Kansas State, Michigan, Nebraska and Tennessee.

In the Polls

Over the past nine seasons, the Associated Press has released 142 Top 25 polls heading into this year's postseason. Of those 142 polls, Tech has been ranked in the poll 115 times, including each of the last 51 polls.

A Defensive Terror

Senior Ben Taylor has been a force for the Tech defense for several years, but his final year was easily his best.

The Bellaire, Ohio, native finished the year with 121 total tackles, 18 TFL, 4.5 sacks, two fumble recoveries, one forced fumble and an interception.

He was Football News' Second-Team All-American, a third-team A-A selection by The Sporting News, a firstteam All-BIG EAST selection, a finalist for the Dudley

Award, given to the top player

During Tech's nine-year bowl blitz that began in 1993, 16 Hokie players have won All-America honors. The latest addition to that list is defensive tackle David Pugh, who was a third-team A-A selection by The Sporting News. Ben Taylor earned A-A honors for the second straight vear.

Pugh was a force inside, recording 50 tackles, 14 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks in 2001.

Taylor made several All-America teams in 2001, including Football News (2nd team) and The Sporting News (3rd team).

Last year, wide receiver/ punt returner André Davis, senior offensive lineman Matt

David Pugh was named a third-team All-American by The Sporting News this season.

Lehr, tailback Lee Suggs and linebacker Taylor garnered national honors.

Davis was named a firstteam All-American by the American Football Coaches' Association after finishing second in the nation in punt return average and returning three punts for touchdowns. Lehr, who allowed just a halfsack in his senior year, was named a second-team All-American by the Walter Camp Foundation. Suggs was a third-team pick by Football News and The Associated Press. Taylor, who led the team in tackles with 103, was also a third-team selection by the AP.

In 1999, quarterback Michael Vick, cornerback Anthony Midget, linebacker Jamel Smith and defensive end John Engelberger were all named All-Americans.

Vick, last year's BIG EAST Offensive Player and Rookie of the Year, was named to The Sporting News First-Team All-America squad. Along with Smith and Engelberger, Vick was also named to The Associated Press secondteam. Midget was voted to The Sporting News Third-Team All-America team.

By making the first-team All-America squads of the six major teams, defensive end Corey Moore became just the second unanimous All-American in Tech history. The repeat BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year was named to the 25-man Burger King Coaches All-America team for the second consecutive year. He was an Associated Press, a Football News, a Walter Camp Foundation, a Football Writers and a Sporting News first-team selection in 1999.

Derek Smith joined Moore on the Football News All-America team as a third-team pick. Center Jim Pyne started the streak by becoming Tech's first unanimous All-American in 1993. Defensive end Cornell Brown was a consensus pick in 1995 and a first-team pick by Walter Camp again in '96. Defensive tackle J.C. Price made the AP third team in

1995 and center Billy Conaty was a first-team choice of The Sporting News the following year. Pierson Prioleau was named third team by The Sporting News in 1997.

The Game on TV

The Toyota Gator Bowl matchup between Virginia Tech and Florida State will be televised by NBC. This will be the Hokies' third appearance on the network. Tech is 1-1 alltime on NBC, with both games televised being Gator Bowls. Tech's first appearance on NBC came in the 1998 Gator Bowl, when Tech played North Carolina. Last year's Gator Bowl was also on that network. Virginia Tech is 50-13 in televised football games the past seven seasons.

One of the Nation's Top Coaches Has Kept Virginia Tech In the Spotlight

During his 15 seasons at the helm, Frank Beamer has guided the Virginia Tech football program to unprecedented success with nine straight bowl appearances, three BIG EAST Conference titles, a trip to the national championship game and an average of nine wins a year since the beginning of the 1993 season. The Hokies' 47-13 record over the past five

seasons

makes them the nation's eighth winningest Division I-A football program during that span.

Winning has been just part of the success story for Beamer, one of the nation's most respected and popular collegiate football coaches. He and his staff have developed a wide-spread reputation for getting the most out of their players. That reputaton has

never been more warranted than in 2000 and 2001.



Under Beamer, Tech is one of just seven Division I-A teams to receive a bowl bid each of the last nine years. Last season, the Hokies earned their first Toyota Gator Bowl championship with an impressive 41-20 victory over Clemson. A spot in the Nokia Sugar Bowl to play No. 1 Florida State for the national championship focused widespread attention on Virginia Tech and its football program following the 1999 season. And although the Hokies fell short in their bid for the national title, they proved that they belong among the top teams in the college ranks.

For his part in the Hokies' magical 1999 season,

Beamer earned eight national coach of the year awards. He was named the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year, the GTE Coach of the Year. the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year, the Paul 'Bear' Bryant Coach of the Year, the Associated Press Coach of the Year, the Walter Camp Football Foundation/Street &

Smith's Coach of the Year, the Maxwell Football Club Coach of the Year and the Woody Haves Coach of the Year. He also was named the BIG EAST Conference Coach of the Year for the third time.

There have been plenty of other accolades for the Hokies' coach. In a survey of Division I-A football coaches conducted by Bloomburg News in the fall of 2000. Beamer was named the best coach a school could hire to run its football program. Last January, he was honored as the NCAA Coach of the Year by The Piaskin Club of Washington, D.C. In May, an on-line newspaper named him the best coach currently in the college football ranks because of his ability to place Tech among the nation's elite year in and year out.

Following consecutive 10-2 seasons in 1995 and 1996. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Conference Coach of the Year by the league coaches. He was one of five finalists in the voting for the 1995 National Coach of the Year. In 1996, The Sporting News queried writers from around the country and asked them to rate the coaches in various conferences. In the BIG EAST, those writers rated Frank Beamer the best coach on game day, the best in game preparation, the best as a motivator, the best as a teacher, the best in big games and the best overall. In 1999, The Sporting News ranked the nation's top coaches in terms of their ability to get the most out of their players. Beamer was picked No. 9 in Division I-A. Three times in the past four years, TSN has rated the Tech coach tops among BIG EAST

head coaches. This year marked the fourth straight year TSN ranked the Hokies' football coaching staff as the best in the conference.


The rise of the Tech football program has made Beamer a man in demand. It has opened doors to places he may never have dreamed of as a youngster growing up in Southwest Virginia.

In September 2000, Beamer was invited to the White House where he joined a select group that stood in the Rose Garden behind then-President Bill Clinton as he made remarks on the Conservation and Reinvestment Act. Beamer was one of the keynote speakers at the American Football Coaches Association Convention in 2000 and last April, he joined former Prime Minister of Great Britain, Lady Margaret Thatcher, as one of the featured speakers at SUCCESS 2001, one of the nation's most popular business seminars

The Beamer success also has made him a much soughtafter coach. In recent years, he has been pursued by numerous other schools and drawn interest from professional football teams. But in the end, his loyalty has remained with the Hokies.

Beamer always has put Virginia Tech first — ever since he starred as a defensive back for the Hokies in his undergraduate days in the late 1960s, and surely throughout his 15 years as head coach of the Hokies. He has given the Tech program a sense of stability enjoyed by just a hand full of other Division I-A schools. Only three other active Division I-A head coaches have been at their current school as long as Beamer.

Three times in the past 12 years, he has given back part of his earnings to the university. In the summer of 1996, he and his wife Cheryl, for the second time in six years, presented a \$50,000 gift



to Tech. Both gifts were earmarked for improvements to facilities.

In 1990, Beamer received a new contract and a substantial pay raise. He refused the raise. however, until such time that all classified and faculty employees of the university could have the same opportunity for pay raises. Most state salaries had been frozen at the time.

Another indication of Beamer's love for the university came on the night he was inducted into The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 1997.

He called it the biggest honor of his entire career. With the induction, he became the first active coach at the university to be honored in that fashion.

Beamer's overall record at Tech now stands at 107-64-2. He became Tech's winningest football coach ever during the 1997 campaign. Counting six years as head coach at Murray State prior to joining the Hokies, Beamer's overall 21vear record is 149-87-4. That record ranks him sixth among active Division I-A coaches in wins.

The 55-year-old Beamer, first alumnus to guide the Hokies since the 1940s, took over the Tech reins from Bill Dooley in January 1987. He began work a few days after the Hokies had beaten North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl. It took a while for him to get the Hokies moving in the right direction because the football program was hit with NCAA sanctions at the time.

But everything came together in the 1990s. The Techmen finished 9-3 in 1993 after beating Indiana, 45-20, in a wild Independence Bowl

game. Tech followed up with an 8-4 season in 1994, losing to Tennessee, 45-23, in the Gator Bowl.

The Tech teams in 1995 and 1996 were among the best in school history. The 1995 team swept the BIG EAST Conference championship outright and the 1996 club tied for the title with Syracuse and Miami.

The 1995 team was 9-2 during the regular season and then came up with a stirring 28-10 victory over Texas in the Sugar Bowl. The 1996 team went 10-1 during the regular season and lost to powerful Nebraska, 41-21, in the Orange Bowl after giving the Cornhuskers a fierce battle for three quarters.

The Hokies fell to 7-5 in 1997 and were beaten badly by North Carolina in the Gator Bowl, 42-3. But they came right back with a 9-3 mark in 1998 that included an impressive 38-7 victory over Alabama in the inaugural Music City Bowl in Nashville, Tenn.

The two winningest seasons in school history followed in 1999 and 2000 with the Hokies posting back-toback 11-1 records. Tech registered its first-ever 11-0 regular-season record in '99 before losing its national championship battle with FSU.

In 2000, the Hokies' only blemish was a loss at Miami in the ninth game of the season. Both seasons, Tech climbed as high as No. 2 in The Associated Press poll, finishing No. 2 in '99 and No. 6 last year. The Hokies climbed as high as No. 5 in this season's AP poll and currently stand 15th.

Beamer's early Tech teams also registered many exciting victories. One of the most impressive came in 1990 when the Hokies capped the year with a 38-13 victory over arch-rival Virginia before a crowd of 54,157, which at the time was the largest ever to see a college football game in the Commonwealth of Virginia. During the 1989 season, Tech knocked off ninth-ranked West Virginia and star quarterback Major Harris, 12-10, in Morgantown.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. He received a Bachelor of Science in distributive education from Tech in 1969 and a master's in guidance from Radford in 1972. Then came the start of the Beamer coaching career.

He began as an assistant at Radford High School from 1969 through 1971. Then after one season as a graduate assistant at the University of Maryland, he went to The Citadel where he worked five seasons under Bobby Ross and one year under Art Baker. His last two years at The Citadel, Beamer was defensive coordinator.

In 1979, Beamer went to Murray State as defensive coordinator under Mike Gottfried. He was named head coach at Murray State in

1981 and went on to compile a six-year record of 42 wins, 23 losses and two ties.

The Tech coach was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football. basketball and baseball.

Beamer is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children. Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Tech and now a graduate assistant at Tennessee; and daughter Casey, a junior at Virginia Tech.

During the Frank Beamer era at Virginia Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offensive team, the defensive team and the special teams. It's called

Beamer Ball, and it has helped propel the Hokies to new heights.

Each of Tech's last eight teams are ranked among the top 10 highest scoring grid squads in school history. What sets Beamer Ball apart are the contributions made by the defense and special teams. During the last eight seasons, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown. And 20 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams.

Altogether, the Hokies' defense and special teams

have combined to contribute 70 touchdowns since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 53 in Tech's last 97 games. Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 44 TDs, with 26 coming on pass interceptions, 16 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 26 TDs, including 13 on blocked punts, seven on punt returns, three on kickoff returns, two on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned

a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first touchdown under Beamer, and it was scored on special teams.

Since the start of the '87 season, a total of 52 different players on Tech's defense and special teams units have scored touchdowns. Eleven of those players — Don Stokes, Jock Jones, Roger Brown, Lawrence Lewis, Antonio Banks, Jim Baron, Keion Carpenter, Pierson Prioleau, Anthony Midget, Cory Bird and Kevin McCadam — scored twice. Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall scored three times and

Beamer Ball's emphasis on special teams produces more than touchdowns. During the 1990s, Tech blocked more kicks than any other Division I-A team. In 1998, the Hokies ranked eighth nationally in punting and in 1999, they were ninth nationally in kickoff returns. Last season, Tech led the nation in punt returns and this year the Hokies are tied for 10th.

Tech's tradition for blocking kicks during the Frank Beamer

era has produced 90 blocks in Beamer's 173 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 46 punts (13 for TDs), 23 field goals and 21 extra points. Sixty-three of those blocks came during the 1990s when Tech blocked 31 punts. 18 PATs and 14 field goals.

In 1998, the Hokies set a school record when they blocked 10 kicks during the regular season and two more in their Music City Bowl game against Alabama.

Since joining the BIG EAST Conference in 1991, the Hokies have posted at least three blocked kicks against every team in the league. During that span, Tech has blocked nine kicks against Pittsburgh, eight versus Miami, six against West Virginia, five versus Rutgers, four against Boston College and three against Syracuse and Temple.

In the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 16 times, including two in this season's game with Miami.

The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman

Bernard Basham and safety Keion Carpenter who each posted six blocks during their Tech careers. Basham blocked three field goals and three PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

Beamer Ball has had a major impact on Tech's 83-24 record over the past nine seasons. During that span, the Hokies are 36-5 in games when they score at least one defensive or special teams touchdown and 35-11 when they block at least one kick.

Billy Hite

Associate Head Coach and Running Backs Coach

Billy Hite, who has roamed the Virginia Tech sidelines longer than any other football coach in school history, entered his 24th season on the Tech staff with the new title of associate head coach. Hite was promoted to the new position in December 2000

and continues to oversee one

of Tech's most successful

positions — the running backs. Hite came to Blacksburg as a member of Bill Dooley's football staff in 1978. He served as a recruiter and head jayvee coach his first two years, then took over as the offensive backfield coach in charge of tailbacks and fullbacks in 1980.

Hite remained at Tech when Frank Beamer took over in 1987 and was elevated to the position of assistant head coach by Beamer the following year. His primary coaching responsibility continued to be Tech's running backs.

In 1989, Hite filled in as the acting head coach when Beamer was sidelined following coronary angioplasty surgery and had to miss a home game versus Tulane. Hite didn't let the Tech faithful down as he led the Hokies to an emotional 30-13 victory.

During the mid-1980s, Hite was credited with the development of Tech's famed "Stallions" backfield that featured Maurice Williams and Eddie Hunter. While at Tech, he has coached eight of the Hokies' top 10 all-time rushing leaders. Eighteen of his running backs have gone on to sign with NFL teams.

Last season, tailback Lee Suggs shattered school and BIG EAST Conference scoring records on the way to leading the nation in touchdowns (28) and scoring (168 points). Suggs, who also led the conference in rushing, was selected the Co-BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year.

This year, with Suggs sidelined by an injury, true freshman tailback Kevin Jones came on to lead the team in rushing and set a Tech record for rushing yards by a

freshman. The 2001 season also saw senior Jarrett Ferguson establish new singleseason receiving records for a Tech fullback.

A native of Hyattsville, Md., Hite was a former star tailback at the University of North Carolina. He received one of his highest honors when he was inducted into the DeMatha High School Hall of Fame in 1992. As a player at North Carolina under Dooley, Hite helped the Tar Heels to a 28-6 record, two ACC titles and two bowl games during his undergraduate days from 1970-73. He received a bachelor's degree in education in 1974.

Hite began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UNC in '74. He was a parttime assistant for the Tar Heels from 1975-77.

Hite is married to the former Anne Heen of Memphis, Tenn... whom he met at North Carolina when they were students. They have two daughters, Kirsten Marie, 16, and Bryn Elizabeth Louise, 12, and a son, Griffin William, 8.

In his spare time, Hite enjoys playing basketball and racquetball.



Rickey Bustle

Offensive Coordinator and Quarterbacks Coach

Rickey Bustle, who is highly-regarded for his ability to develop quarterbacks and high-scoring offenses, is in his 14th season as Virginia Tech's quarterbacks coach and eighth year as the Hokies' offensive coordinator.

In 1999 and 2000, Bustle had a No. 1 offense, followed by a No. 1 draft pick. In 1999. Tech's offensive unit averaged a national-best 41.4 points per game as the Hokies advanced to the national championship game. Following the 2000 season, Tech quarterback Michael Vick was the first player taken in the NFL draft.

This season, under Bustle's watchful eye, Grant Noel threw 16 touchdown passes, the most by any Tech first-year starter.

During his stay at Tech, Bustle has coached some of the school's most successful quarterbacks, including Vick, who many consider the most talented quarterback ever to play the game.

In two seasons at Tech, Vick posted a 20-1 record as a starter. Bustle also helped develop Maurice DeShazo, the Hokies' all-time leader in total offense and touchdown passes; Will Furrer, who passed for over 5,900 yards; and Jim Druckenmiller, who was a twotime All-BIG EAST pick and guided the Hokies to back-toback 10-2 seasons.

In Bustle's eight seasons as offensive coordinator, the Hokies have fielded the eight highest-scoring teams in school history, posted a 75-20 record and won three BIG EAST Conference Championships. The Hokies have been to a bowl every year Bustle has been the offensive coordinator. including last season's appearance in the Toyota Gator Bowl.

Bustle, who has also earned a reputation as an outstanding recruiter, came to Tech with Frank Beamer in 1987 as the Hokies' quarterback coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1993 and directed the '93 offensive unit that scored a then-schoolrecord 400 points and rolled over Indiana, 45-20, in the Independence Bowl. In 1994, Bustle accepted the position of offensive coordinator at the University of South Carolina. He helped the Gamecocks to a 7-5 record that included a Carquest Bowl win over West Virginia.

After just one season away from Blacksburg, Bustle decided to rejoin the Tech staff and helped the Hokies to a 10-2 record and a Sugar Bowl win over Texas. In 1999, Tech set school marks for total offense (4,970 yards) and points (455).

Bustle was a four-sport athlete at Summerville High School in South Carolina and earned three varsity letters as a wide receiver at Clemson. Following his graduation in 1977, he coached two seasons as a graduate assistant for the Tigers.

In 1979, he became defensive coordinator for Gardner-Webb College in North Carolina. He joined the staff at East Carolina in 1980. serving two seasons as the

Pirates' defensive backfield coach and one year as the receivers coach.

In 1983, Bustle became the running backs coach for the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL. The following year, he joined the staff at Northeast Louisiana, where he served as the running backs coach for two seasons before becoming the offensive coordinator in 1986.

Bustle is married to the former Lynn Sanders of Charleston, S.C., who received her Ph.D., in curriculum and instruction from Tech in December 1997. They have a son, Brad, who is 14 years old.







Defensive Coordinator and Inside Linebackers Coach

Defensive master-mind Bud Foster, a finalist for the Broyles Award, is in his 15th season as a member of Frank Beamer's football staff at Virginia Tech. This is the second time in three seasons that Foster has been a finalist for the award, which is given to the nation's top assistant football coach.

Foster has helped mold nationally-ranked defenses during each of his seven years

as the Hokies' defensive coordinator. Under Foster's guidance, this year's defense has proved to be one of the nation's best, ranking among the top eight teams in Division I-A in six different categories.

In 2000, Foster took a defense that returned just three starters and turned it into a unit that led the BIG EAST in rushing defense, placed 16th nationally against the run and tied for third nationally in interceptions.

After helping Tech to the national championship game in 1999, Foster was one of five finalists for the 1999 Broyles Award. In June, 2000 he was recognized as the 2000 Division I-A Defensive Coordinator of the Year by *American Football Coach* magazine. Tech's 1999 defensive unit led Division I-A in scoring defense and ranked third in both total and rushing defense.

Following the 1998 season, Foster was pursued by the University of Florida for its defensive coordinator position, but he opted to continue his long-standing football association with Beamer. That association dates back to 1979 when Foster was a strong safety and defensive end at Murray State, and Beamer was the defensive coordinator. Foster began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at MSU in 1981. Beamer's first season as the head coach.

Since coming to Tech in 1987, Foster has helped build the Hokies into one of the hardest-hitting defensive units in college football. During that time, he has worn several coaching hats. Foster coached the inside linebackers for one year in 1987, then tutored the outside linebackers for the next five seasons. He assumed responsibility for both sets of linebackers prior to the 1993 season and also took over special-teams coaching that year. The following year, he coached the inside linebackers and special teams. Foster assumed the position of codefensive coordinator in 1995 and took over as the sole

defensive coordinator in '96. The inside linebackers continue to be his primary responsibility.

During his tenure at Tech, Foster has coached All-Americans Ben Taylor and Jamel Smith and five other linebackers who have earned All-BIG EAST Conference honors. Each year since the BIG EAST began round-robin play in 1993, Foster has had a linebacker tabbed allconference. Along with Taylor and Smith, Tech's other All-BIG EAST linebackers have been Ken Brown, who was secondteam in 1993 and first-team in 1994: George DelRicco, a firstteam pick in 1995; and secondteam picks Myron Newsome in '96. Steve Tate in '97 and Michael Hawkes in '99.

A 1981 graduate of Murray State, Foster was an outstanding strong safety and outside linebacker from 1977 to 1980. After two years as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Foster was elevated to a full-time staff position. The Nokomis, Ill., native, coached outside linebackers for three seasons before taking over the inside and outside linebackers in 1986. He also served as the Racers' recruiting coordinator and worked with special teams.

Foster and his wife Jacqueline have three children: Ammie, 22; Grant, 15; and Hilary, 13. In his spare time, Foster enjoys spending time with his family.


Assistant Head Coach and Offensive Line Coach

Bryan Stinespring, who was promoted to assistant head coach in December 2000, is finishing his fourth season as Virginia Tech's offensive line coach and his ninth year as a full-time coach on Frank Beamer's

One of the brightest young coaches and recruiters on the collegiate scene, Stinespring took over the offensive line duties in the spring of 1998 and helped mold Tech's young line into a unit that showed steady improvement during the '98 season. Two members of that line — tackle Derek Smith and guard Dwight Vick went on to sign with NFL teams.

In 1999 and 2000, the offensive line helped clear the way as the Hokies set new BIG EAST rushing marks in back-to-back seasons. Center Keith Short, guard Matt Lehr and tackle Dave Kadela all earned second-team All-BIG EAST honors in '99. Lehr repeated as a second-team pick in 2000, while Kadela moved to first team. This season. Stinespring has taken a line that featured four new starters and built a unit that has improved with each game.

Prior to taking over his current duties, Stinespring coached Tech's tight ends and assisted with the offensive line for five seasons. He also has served as the Hokies' recruiting coordinator the past seven years and has been instrumental in helping attract top high school talent to campus.

Stinespring initially joined the Tech staff in 1990 as a graduate assistant coach and spent two seasons in that capacity helping with the offensive line. He served as a teacher and coach at Lexington High School and helped the football squad win its lone state championship in 1988. Wide Receivers Coach

Tony Ball's knowledge of the wide receiver positions and enthusiasm for the game of football have helped Virginia Tech to a 39-8 record, two bowl championships and an appearance in the national championship game.

Ball, who has 15 years of collegiate coaching experience, is completing his fourth season as Tech's receivers coach. He has shown an ability to motivate and prepare young players and has been instrumental in the development and success of current senior star André Davis. Davis, who was listed as the top senior receivier for the 2002 NFL Draft by The Sporting News, has become one of the nation's top big-play threats under Ball's watchful eye. Davis is closing out his Tech career ranked among the

Hokies' top three in career catches. receiving yards and touchdown receptions.

Ball came to Tech in 1998 after serving three seasons as an assistant at the University of Louisville. where he coached the receivers. Prior to his stint with the Cardinals, Ball worked with the running

backs at Holy Cross for three seasons. He coached the receivers at his alma mater, UT-Chattanooga, on two different occasions once in 1988 and for two seasons in 1990-91. In between, Ball coached the running backs at East Tennessee State in 1989.

During the summers of 1996 and 1997, Ball participated in the National Football League's Minority Internship Program with the Baltimore Ravens.

Ball began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Austin Peav in 1985 and 1986. While at Austin Peav. he earned a master's in health and nutrition. He served as restricted earnings coach at the University of South Carolina in 1987, working with the running backs and helping the Gamecocks to the Gator Bowl. His first full-time coaching position came at UTC the following year.

Ball played football for the late Joe Morrison at UT-Chattanooga. He was a

Strong Safety and Outside Linebackers Coach

From player development to recruiting success to coaching style, Jim Cavanaugh has made a major impact on Virginia Tech's football program during his six seasons in Blacksburg.

A veteran of 28 years as a full-time coach on the collegiate level, Cavanaugh joined the Tech staff in 1996 as coach of the strong safeties and outside linebackers. During his first season on the job, outside linebacker Brandon Semones led the team in tackles and earned second-team All-BIG EAST honors.

Cavanaugh has since helped in the development of highly-successful safeties Pierson Prioleau, Cory Bird and Kevin McCadam. Prioleau was a first-team All-BIG EAST pick in 1997 and 1998 and earned third-team All-America recognition from *The Sporting News* in '97. He was a fourth-round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 1999. Bird was tabbed a second-team All-BIG EAST pick and was selected in the third-round of the 2001 NFL draft by the Indianapolis Colts. McCadam, meanwhile, has been one of the keys to Tech's success in 2001.

Along with his success in developing the Hokies' current talent, Cavanaugh has also been instrumental in bringing top-notch new talent to the Tech program. Over the past three years, his recruiting skills have helped the Hokies attract, among others, prep All-Americans Michael Vick, Nathaniel Adibi and Bryan Randall.

Tech's appearance in the 2002 Toyota Gator Bowl will mark Cavanaugh's 18th postseason game as a coach.

The Hokies have been to bowls in each of his five seasons on the staff.

A former star receiver at William & Mary, Cavanaugh has worked at two other Virginia schools — VMI and the University of Virginia — during his collegiate coaching career.

Cavanaugh coached at the University of North Carolina for eight years and from 1982 through 1987, he worked under Bobby Ross and Joe Krivak at Maryland. He served two years at North Carolina State, three years under coach Bob Thalman at VMI, one year at Virginia and two years at Marshall. Cavanaugh began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at North Carolina State in 1972.

During his years as a receiver at William & Mary, Cavanaugh surpassed the Tribe career record in receiving with 117 catches and over 1,600 yards. He also earned honorablemention All-America honors in 1967 and was co-captain of his team in 1969. Cavanaugh was inducted into the William & Mary Sports Hall of Fame in April.

Married to the former Marsha Carnell, he has two children, Ryan, an Appalachian State graduate who works for the Indianapolis Colts and married Melissa Searls in June; and Lauren, who is a senior at Virginia Tech.

Tight Ends and Offensive Tackles Coach

Danny Pearman continues to play an important role on the Virginia Tech coaching staff through his work with the Hokies' tight ends and offensive tackles.

Pearman, who is in his fourth season at Tech, has seen his hard work with the tight ends pay extra dividends the last two seasons. During the 2000 season, former walkon Browning Wynn earned

second-team All-BIG EAST honors at tight end, while teammate Bob Slowikowski contibuted a key 72-yard touchdown pass against West Virginia — the longest reception ever by a Tech tight end. This season, both players have contributed valuable senior leadership to a rebuilding offensive unit.

Pearman brought experience and a sound football background to the Tech staff in 1998, just in time to help the Hokies to a surprising 8-3 regular season record and a 38-7 victory over Alabama in the Music City Bowl. He helped bring along

an inexperienced group of tight ends and also aided in the development of tackle Derek Smith, who was drafted by the Washington Redskins following the season.

Prior to coming to Blacksburg, Pearman helped coach the University of Alabama to six bowls and a national championship between 1990 and 1997. After helping guide the Crimson Tide to the national championship in 1992, he contributed to the Tide winning Southeastern Conference Western Division championships the next four

Pearman was a graduate assistant at Alabama for two years, then served as coach of the offensive tackles from 1991 to 1996. He coached the defensive tackles and special teams in 1997.

A native of Charlotte. N.C., Pearman won three

letters as a tight end at Clemson from 1983 through 1987. In his playing days, he was named a strength and conditioning All-American. He helped the Tigers win two Atlantic Coast Conference championships.

Following graduation. Pearman began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Tigers in 1988 and 1989. The Tigers again won the Atlantic Coast Conference championship in '88 and went to bowl games both of Pearman's seasons as a graduate assistant.

Pearman has a bachelor's degree in finance and a master's in business administration, both from Clemson. He is married to the former Kristy Sewell of Birmingham, Ala., and they have a daughter, Taylor Brooke, 5, and a son Tanner Ryan, 2. In his spare time, Pearman enjoys golf, jogging and fishing.

a great deal of success in a short period of time at Virginia Tech. In just three seasons on the Tech staff. Ward has coached in a national championship game, produced a secondary that has helped the Hokies finish among the national defensive leaders, and spearheaded the recruiting of the nation's top

"Whammy" from his playing days at Alabama - is in his third year as the coach of Tech's cornerbacks and free safeties. His work with the secondary in 1999 contributed to the Hokies finishing No. 3 in total defense and No. 7 in pass efficiency defense. Last year, Tech tied for third nationally in interceptions and this season. Tech ranked second in total defense, third in pass efficiency defense, eighth in passing defense and tied for seventh in interceptions.

Ward was instrumental in Tech's signing of Pennsylvania running back Kevin Jones last February. Jones, the most highly-touted player ever to sign with the Hokies, was rated the top high school football player in the country by numerous recruiting services and publications. Jones set several freshman records while leading Tech in rushing this season.

Prior to joining the Tech coaching staff, Ward was a coach at UT-Chattanooga and Alabama. He was named the defensive coordinator at UT-Chattanooga in 1998 after serving as the Mocs' running

backs coach in 1997. Prior to working with the running backs, Ward was the defensive backs coach. He coached strong safety Ron Faugue, who earned both second- and third-team All-America honors in 1996.

An Alabama native, Ward starred for the Crimson Tide from 1986-90. He helped lead Alabama to a 33-15 record and a Southeastern Conference Championship during his career. He was also tabbed Special Teams Player of the Year by The Sporting News in 1990 as the Tide's unit ranked No. 1 in the nation. Ward played on four bowl teams, helping lead 'Bama to two Sun Bowl victories.

Ward served two seasons as a graduate assistant at Alabama before spending one season as an assistant coach at Newnan High in Newnan, Ga. While a graduate assistant, Ward helped coach the Tide to victories in the 1991 Blockbuster Bowl and the 1993 Gator Bowl. He joined the UTC staff as the secondary coach in

Defensive Line Coach

Charley Wiles, a former All-America player for Frank Beamer at Murray State, is finishing his sixth season as Virginia Tech's defensive line coach. Wiles has played a huge role in the Hokies' recent

During Wiles' six seasons directing the Tech line, he has helped develop some of the nation's finest players, including current senior standouts David Pugh and Chad Beasley who earned first- and second-team All-BIG EAST honors, respectively, in 2000.

In 1999, Wiles directed end Corey Moore, who won the Mike Fox/Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's best defensive player and the Lombardi Award as the best lineman. Moore also became Tech's second unanimous All-American and was chosen the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year for the second consecutive year.

Wiles also coached John Engelberger, who was named second-team on The Associated Press All-America team and was selected first-team All-BIG EAST after earning second-team honors in 1998 and 1997.

Overall, six of Wiles' players have won All-BIG EAST honors and three have earned All-America recognition. End Cornell Brown was an All-American and a first-team BIG EAST pick in '96 and tackle Kerwin Hairston was a first-team BIG EAST selection in 1997. Williams made the second team in 1999.

During the 1999 season, Wiles coached a veteran line that he helped mold into what The Sporting News rated as the best Division I-A defensive line in the college ranks prior to the season. That line helped the Hokies finish first in the nation in scoring defense and third in rushing defense and total defense. This year's defensive line was rated as the fourth-best in the Division I-A ranks by The Sporting News.

Wiles is on his second tour of duty at Tech. He originally joined Beamer's Tech staff as a graduate assistant in 1987 and worked in that capacity for two years.

Wiles first had a playercoach relationship with Beamer, when Beamer was the head man at Murray State. Wiles was a Kodak Division I-AA All-American as an offensive lineman in 1986.

When he left Tech after the 1988 season. Wiles spent a year on the staff at East Tennessee State. He then returned to Murray State for a six-year coaching tenure, winding up as the Racers' co-defensive coordinator. In 1995, he helped coach the Racers to an 11-0 regular-season mark and a berth in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. Wiles also served as Murray State's recruiting coordinator. helping land many of the Racers' top players.

Wiles rejoined Beamer at Tech in 1996, fulfilling a goal he had set during his first stint in Blacksburg. The Hokies have competed in bowl games during each of his five seasons on the staff.

A native of De Land, Fla., and a three-sport star at De Land High School, he is married to the former Andrea Wilder of Booneville, Ind. They have a daughter, Kendell, who is 5, and a son Eric. who is 2.

Ballein served on Beamer's first Virginia Tech staff in 1987 as a graduate assistant coach. In 1988, he accepted a position as running backs coach at Western Kentucky University. He returned to Tech a year later as recruiting coordinator.

With his office adjacent to Coach Beamer's, he is often considered Beamer's righthand man. He deals mostly with the administrative side of the football program, but is one of the favorites among players. His office is a preferred hangout of Tech players, and he is one of the most beloved and respected members of the staff.

"I don't think [Coach] Beamer could operate

without Ballein." said former Tech standout Corey Moore. "Ballein's a guy on the ball. Plus, he's kind of a favorite among the players, too."

Ballein is married to the former Stephanie Green, who was a basketball player at Tech in her undergraduate days. They have two daughters, Jordan Gray, 6, and Jalyn Ann, who is 3.

John Ballein holds one of the most important positions in Virginia Tech athletics as associate athletic director for football operations. He was promoted to the position during the summer of 2000 in recognition of his excellent work for Coach Frank Beamer and his program.

Called "the No. 1 administrative assistant in the country" by former Tech AD Dave Braine, Ballein is responsible for all operations dealing with the football program. He continues to serve as assistant to head coach Frank Beamer and as departmental recruiting coordinator, jobs he performed prior to his promotion.

"You name it and John Ballein does it." Beamer said in a Dec. 18, 1999 article on Ballein in The Roanoke Times. "Just everything that goes on around here — our travel. our recruiting, our camps, our clinics. He is absolutely the best."

A native of Bentleyville, Pa., Ballein was a linebacker at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and graduated from there with a degree in health and physical education in 1983. He later earned a master's in education from Old Dominion University in 1985.

Tech Opens With Victory Over UConn

Pone Connecticut

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Quarterback Grant Noel passed for three touchdowns to lead Virginia Tech to a 52-10 season-opening win against the University of Connecticut before a sellout crowd at Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field.

Noel, making his first collegiate start, completed 16 of 20 passes including first-half touchdown tosses of 47, 19 and 8 yards. The redshirt junior's 19-yard scoring pass to André Davis gave Tech a 28-10 lead at the half.

UConn trailed just 14-10 after the first quarter, but the Tech defense shut the Huskies out the rest of the way. The Hokies held Connecticut to just four first downs and 88 total yards during the final three quarters of play.

A CLOSER LOOK: Virginia Tech 52 · UConn 10

- ◆Virginia Tech piled up 606 yards of total offense in its 52-10 victory over Connecticut. The total was the fifth-best in school history and fourth-best during Frank Beamer's 15 seasons as head coach. The last time the Hokies had more total offense in a game was during a 1995 victory over Akron. Tech collected 638 yards of offense in that contest.
- ◆Tech's 323 yards passing were the most by a Tech team since 1993 when the Hokies threw for 339 yards during a home win against Temple.
- ◆ Eleven different Tech players caught at least one pass in the game against UConn. The last time Tech had at least 11 different players catch a pass in game was during a 33-20 loss to No. 1 Florida State at Orlando in 1991. Tech also had 11 players contribute catches in that game.
- ▶ Tech got two touchdowns from three different players during the UConn game. Flanker André Davis (Niskayuna, N.Y.) caught a pair of touchdown passes, while tailbacks Lee Suggs (Roanoke, Va.) and Keith Burnell (Chesapeake, Va.) both had a pair of TD runs. It marked just the third time in Frank Beamer's 15 seasons at Tech that three different players scored two touchdowns in the same game. The last time was during a 1999 win at Temple, when Davis, quarterback Michael Vick and tailback André Kendrick each posted two TDs. The Hokies also got two touchdowns apiece from tight end Bryan Jennings, fullback Brian Edmonds and tailback Shyrone Stith during a 1996 game at Boston College.

Defense Shines in Victory Over WMU

Western Michigan

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech's defense held Western Michigan to 166 yards of offense to win its firstever football meeting with the Broncos. The game also marked the Hokies' first football game against a team from the state of Michigan.

Tech capitalized on a blocked punt by Wayne Ward and a pass interception by rover Kevin McCadam to build a 10-0 lead. The Hokies got the football at the WMU 16 after Ward's block and took just two plays to score a touchdown. McCadam's pick put Tech at the Broncos' 22 and led to a Carter Warley field goal.

Defensively, the Hokies held Western Michigan out of Tech territory until the third quarter. Overall, WMU ran just 10 offensive plays on Tech's side of the 50. The Broncos got 113 of their 166 yards during the first half and managed just seven first downs during the entire game.

A CLOSER LOOK: Virginia Tech 31 · WMU 0

- ◆Tech's 31-0 win over Western Michigan marked the Hokies' 14th-straight football victory at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. That set a new record for consecutive wins at Lane Stadium, surpassing the old mark of 13 set during the 1979-81 seasons. The school record for consecutive victories in Blacksburg is 23, beginning during the 1914 season and ended in 1920. Tech played its games on Miles Field at that time.
- ■Western Michigan was just 1-for-13 on third-down conversions against the Hokies. WMU's lone successful attempt came on its first third-down play of the game.
- ■WMU's 103 penalty vards were the most for a Tech opponent since Clemson had 116 yards in penalties during a 1998 game against Tech. The Broncos' 13 penalties were the most by a Tech foe since Miami had 13 in 1998.
- For the second straight game, 11 different Tech players caught at least one pass. Tech has not had 10 or more players catch passes in back-to-back games during Frank Beamer's tenure as coach. Prior to the Western Michigan and UConn games, the last time Tech had at least 11 different players catch a pass in a game was during a 33-20 loss to No. 1 Florida State at Orlando in 1991. Eleven Tech players caught passes in that game.
- ◆The WMU game marked just the ninth time since 1950 that the Hokies held an opponent to just one rushing first down.

Quarterback Grant Noel ran for one touchdown and passed for another. He also directed a 10-play, 98-yard touchdown drive during the third quarter.

Open BIG EAST Play With Shutout

PISCATAWAY, N.J. — Virginia Tech got 28 first quarter points from its offense and a second-straight shutout from its defense to open BIG EAST Conference play with a 50-0 victory at Rutgers.

Quarterback Grant Noel passed for four touchdowns, including three in the opening 15 minutes, to give Tech its ninth-straight win over the Scarlet Knights. The Tech offensive unit also piled up over 200 yards on the ground for the 23rd time in its last 25 games.

The Hokies capitalized on six Rutgers turnovers. beginning with an interception by linebacker Brian Welch on Rutgers' second offensive play of the game. Welch returned his interception to the Scarlet Knight 1-yard line to set up a quick Tech touchdown. Defensive tackle Channing Reed finished the scoring with an 8-yard fumble return for a touchdown late in the fourth quarter. The Hokies held Rutgers to just 102 total yards of offense.



- ■By shutting out Rutgers, 50-0, Virginia Tech posted back-to-back shutouts for the first time. since the 1983 season when Tech blanked Louisville and VMI in consecutive games. After giving up 10 points in the first quarter of its season opener against UConn, Tech put together 11 straight scoreless quarters.
- Tech's 28 first guarter points at Rutgers represented the most points by the Hokies in the first quarter of a game since 1992. That year, Tech had 28 points during the first quarter of a 50-49 loss at Rutgers.
- Redshirt junior quarterback Grant Noel (Ridgeley, W.Va.) tied a school single-game record with four touchdown passes against Rutgers. Don Strock set the mark in 1972 against Ohio University. Maurice DeShazo equalled the mark twice during the 1993 season in games against Maryland and Temple. It was also tied by Michael Vick in 1999 at Rutgers.
- ◆Three Tech players receiver Terrell Parham (Bartow, Fla.), tight end Keith Willis (Norfolk, Va.) and defensive tackle Channing Reed (Trenton, N.J.) — scored their first collegiate touchdowns during the win at Rutgers.
- ◆Tech defensive players Brian Welch (Fairfax, Va.), Billy Hardee (Winter Haven, Fla.) and Jake Houseright (Gate City, Va.) posted their first interceptions to help Tech to victory at RU.
- ◆Eric Green (Clewiston, Fla.) posted his second career blocked punt during the fourth quarter of the RU game. Green's block was eventually recovered in the end zone by the Scarlet Knights for a safety. It was Tech's first safety since a 1999 game at West Virginia.

Tech Overcomes Slow Start To Beat UCF

BLACKSBURG, Va. -Virginia Tech found itself behind for the first time all season before pulling away for a 46-14 victory over UCF in front of a sellout crowd at Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field.

Tech trailed 7-0 after the first guarter and led by just 19-14 early in the third period before posting 27 unanswered points. The Hokies capitalized on three interceptions, two fumble recoveries and a blocked punt for 29 of their 46 points.

The Hokies finished with 232 yards on the ground and 203 yards through the air. Tailbacks Kevin Jones and Keith Burnell led the rushing attack with 90 and 82 yards. respectively. Tech got an extra aerial lift when punter Vinnie Burns completed a 33vard pass to cornerback Garnell Wilds on a key fake punt early in the third quarter. The play set up a TD by Burnell that gave Tech a 26-14 lead.

- ■When Tech fell behind UCF, 7-0, in the first quarter, it marked the first time the Hokies had trailed during the 2001 season. The points broke a string of 11 consecutive scoreless quarters registered by the Tech defense. The last points scored against the Hokies came on a TD by UConn in the first quarter of Tech's season-opening game.
- For the second straight game, Tech blocked a punt for a safety and posted a defensive touchdown. The Hokies' Brandon Manning (Harrisburg, Pa.) blocked a UCF punt out of the end zone for a safety in the second quarter and rover Kevin McCadam (Lakeside, Calif.) returned an interception 69-yards for a TD in the fourth quarter. Tech's last fake punt attempt under Beamer was an option run against Florida State in the 2000 Sugar Bowl.

- Prior to their 35-0 win at West Virginia, the Hokies had never scored more than 28 points in Morgantown. It was WVU's worst shutout loss at home in 41 years, dating back to a 45-0 loss to Syracuse in 1960.
- The shutout was Tech's second this season against a BIG EAST team. That marks the first time the Hokies have posted two BIG EAST shutouts in a season and ties the league mark set by Miami in 1992. Earlier this season, Tech blanked Rutgers, 50-0, on the road. The last time the Hokies had two shutouts on the road in a season was in 1998 when they had shutouts at Clemson, BC and UAB.
- Quarterback Grant Noel (Ridgeley, W.Va.) suffered the first interceptions of his career during the WVU game. Noel had thrown 108 consecutive passes without an interception before having one picked off near the end of the first quarter. He fell just short of Michael Vick's school record string of 111 passes without an interception set in 1999.
- **☞** Defensive end **Jim Davis** (Richmond, Va.) posted his first pass interception during the West Virginia game and returned it 27 yards for his first touchdown. It marked the third-straight game in which the defense has contributed a TD. In both 1993 and 1995, Tech scored a defensive touchdown in each of its last two regular-season games and then in a bowl game. This season, however, marked the first time under Coach Frank Beamer that Tech had scored a defensive TD in three consecutive regular-season games.

Luke Owens (Grundy, Va.) made his first career start in Tech's win over the Mountaineers. Owens moved into the right guard spot in place of starter Jake Grove, who was slowed by a broken hand.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. — Virginia Tech's defense continued its stellar play as the Hokies blanked BIG EAST rival West Virginia, 35-0. before a sellout crowd at Mountaineer Field. It was the most lopsided win by either team in the series since the very first meeting in 1912 when Tech won 41-0.

The Hokies held the Mountaineers to 174 total yards of offense and never let the home team penetrate closer than the Tech 23-yard line. The defense also contributed a touchdown for

the third straight game.

Tailback Keith Burnell posted his first career 100yard rushing game and scored two touchdowns to lead the offense. Burnell finished with 102 yards on 22 carries, including touchdown runs of 1 and 10 yards. Overall, the Hokies' offense piled up 412 vards, with 224 coming on the ground.


André Davis set up one touchdown with a 53-yard punt return and another with a 39-yard pass reception. Davis finished the game with 206 allpurpose yards.

Hokies Ground Eagles in BIG EAST Tilt

Boston College

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech put Boston College away early during an important, 34-20, BIG EAST win at Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field. The Hokies scored 21 first-quarter points and led 34-0 before BC got on the board with three late scores.

Tech quarterback Grant Noel passed for two touchdowns and ran for another in helping the Hokies to the Homecoming win. Noel hooked up with flanker André Davis on a 37-yard TD pass on Tech's first possession,

then scored on a run from the one on the Hokies' second drive of the game. Noel and Davis also combined on a 34yard scoring pass in the third quarter. Tailback Keith Burnell aided the cause with 111 vards rushing on 19 carries.

Tech's defense supplied a touchdown for the fourth straight game when defensive end Jim Davis tipped away an option pitch by BC quarterback Brian St. Pierre and rover Kevin McCadam scooped up the loose ball and returned it nine yards to the end zone.

A CLOSER LOOK: Virginia Tech 34 · BC 20

- After piling up 213 yards rushing against Virginia Tech during the 2000 season, Boston College managed just 58 yards on the ground during its 34-20 loss in Blacksburg. BC tailback William Green, who came into the game as the nation's No. 5 rusher at 142.6 yards a game, was held to 74 yards on 21 carries by the Hokies' top-rated defense. It marked the only time during the season that Green failed to reach 100 yards rushing.
- **▼Kevin McCadam** (Lakeside, Calif.) returned a fumble nine yards for a touchdown against Boston College. It marked the fourth straight game in which the Tech defense scored a touchdown — a first in Frank Beamer's 15 seasons as head coach. Tech had scored defensive touchdowns in three consecutive games on three other occasions under Beamer.
- Senior flanker André Davis (Niskayuna, N.Y.) caught six passes for 112 yards against the Eagles. The performance marked the seventh time Davis had posted over 100 yards receiving in a regular-season game and the eighth time overall. In 1999, Davis had 172 yards against BC, 157 yards versus Rutgers, 138 yards against West Virginia, 121 yards at Temple and 110 yards in the Virginia game. Last season, he turned in 127 receiving yards against WVU. Davis also had 108 receiving yards versus Florida State in the 2000 Sugar Bowl.
- Tech failed to rush for 200 yards in the BC game, marking the first time since last season's loss at Miami that the Hokies had not registered 200 yards on the ground, a stretch of eight games. It also ended a string of 13 straight home games in which the Hokies had gained 200 or more vards on the ground, dating back to the UAB game in 1999.



BLACKSBURG, Va. — Syracuse beat Virginia Tech at its own game, using good special teams play, aggressive defense and its running game to hand the Hokies a 22-14 home loss. The Syracuse victory snapped a nine-game Tech winning streak and produced the Hokies' first home loss since the 1998 season.

SU's special teams contributed a punt return for a touchdown and a blocked punt that set up a field goal. Meanwhile, the 'Cuse defense limited Tech's highlyranked running game to minus-three yards in the first

half and 90 yards overall. The Hokies compounded their problems with two fumbles. one of which led to a touchdown, and a costly penalty that helped keep another Syracuse scoring drive alive.

The Orangemen played error-free football and controlled the game offensively behind the efforts of quarterback R.J. Anderson and tailback James Mungro. Syracuse finished with 168 vards on the ground against a Tech defense that had held each of its first six opponents to an average of 42.5 yards rushing.

A CLOSER LOOK: SU 22 • Virginia Tech 14

- Syracuse's 22-14 win ended Virginia Tech's schoolrecord 16-game winning streak at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Tech's last home loss was a 36-32 defeat at the hands of Virginia on Nov. 28, 1998. The win also ended a ninegame overall Tech winning streak that dated back to a 41-21 loss at Miami last season. The SU victory — the Orangemen's first in Blacksburg since 1987 — also produced a bit of irony. Last season, Tech posted its first win at Syracuse since 1986 by the same score, 22-14.
- ◆Tech managed just 14 points in its loss to the Orangemen, the Hokies' lowest point total since finishing with just three points in a loss to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl on Jan. 1, 1998. The last time the Hokies had 14 points or fewer in a regular-season game was against Navy during the 1995 season. Tech's point total against Syracuse broke a school-record string of 37 straight games in which the Hokies had scored 20 or more points.
- Tech's 90 yards rushing versus Syracuse marked the lowest rushing total for the Hokies since a 1997 loss at West Virginia when they managed just 66 yards on the ground.
- ■When Syracuse's Jamel Riddle returned a punt for a touchdown against the Hokies, it marked just the third time a punt had been returned for a TD against Tech since Coach Frank Beamer arrived in 1987. The most recent TD return was by Florida State's Peter Warrick during the 2000 Sugar Bowl. The only other return was during the 1988 season.
- ■When David Tyree blocked a Tech punt to set up a Syracuse field goal, it marked the second straight year that Tyree had blocked a punt against the Hokies.

Panthers Hand Tech Second Straight Loss

Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — The University of Pittsburgh broke a 7-7 tie with 31 unanswered points to defeat Virginia Tech, 38-7, at new Heinz Field. The loss equalled Tech's worstever BIG EAST defeat, a 52-21 loss at Syracuse in 1996.

Pittsburgh struck for three touchdowns through the air on the way to a 24-7 halftime advantage. The Panthers finished with 393 total yards, including 245 passing. The Pittsburgh defense also played a major role, holding

Tech to just 15 yards on the ground, 151 yards overall and contributing an interception return for a touchdown.

Tech's only score came when Lamar Cobb blocked a field goal attempt and Ronyell Whitaker returned it 71 yards for a first-quarter touchdown. The Hokies were held to four first downs and 67 total yards in the first half. Tech hurt its own cause by committing 11 penalties and losing a pair of fumbles during the game.

A CLOSER LOOK: Pittsburgh 38 · Virginia Tech 7

- ◆Tech's loss to Pittsburgh gave the Hokies back-to-back losses for the first time since 1997. That year, Tech ended the regular season with two straight losses, then dropped a 42-3 decision to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl.
- Tech's seven points in its loss to the Panthers marked the lowest point total for the Hokies since they scored just three points in a loss to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl on Jan. 1, 1998. The last time Tech had seven points or fewer in a regular-season game was in a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati during the 1995 season.
- Shawntae Spencer's 68-yard pass interception for a touchdown was the first interception for a TD against Tech since Miami's Edward Reed posted a 44-yard touchdown return last season. Spencer's return was the longest against Tech since 1995 when Cincinnati's Brad Jackson scored on a 71-yard interception.
- Tech's 15 yards rushing against the Panthers were the fewest for the Hokies since being held to minus-14 yards on the ground by Miami during the 1994 season.
- return of a blocked field goal against Pittsburgh was the first TD of his Tech career. Whitaker (Norfolk, Va.) scored two points on a defensive PAT at Rutgers in 1999. The blocked field goal was the first field goal returned for a TD by Tech since 1993 when Antonio Banks had an 80-yard return for a touchdown in an Independence Bowl win over Indiana.
- Tech's 120 yards in penalties were the most by a Tech team since 1992 when the Hokies were penalized 122 yards during a 50-49 loss at Rutgers.




Hokies Snap Losing Skid With Win at Temple

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — True freshman Kevin Jones rushed for 155 yards and two touchdowns in his first collegiate start as Virginia Tech snapped a two-game losing streak with a 35-0 shutout win over Temple at Veterans Stadium.

Jones provided a spark for the Tech offense, which had produced a combined total of just 105 yards on the ground during back-to-back losses to Syracuse and Pittsburgh. Jones' 11-yard touchdown run in the second quarter gave the Hokies a 14-0 halftime lead and his 87-yard TD burst in the third period broke the game open. Tech finished with 225 yards and three TDs on the ground and also got a pair of touchdown passes from quarterback Grant Noel, who hit on 11 of 15 attempts.

While the offense was getting back on track, the Tech defense was busy posting its fourth shutout of the season. With five firsttime starters in the lineup,

the defense held the Owls to 237 total yards, including just 60 rushing. The Hokies intercepted four Temple passes.

Tech's 35-0 shutout victory at Temple marked the Hokies' third shutout of the season against a BIG EAST team and their fourth overall. The last time Tech posted

> four shutouts in a season was 1983. The Hokies have accomplished that feat just three times (the other was 1938) since recording five shutouts during the 1935 season.

True freshman Kevin Jones (Chester, Pa.) rushed for 155 yards against the Owls. He was the first true freshman to rush for 100 yards for Tech since Shyrone Stith gained 119 yards at Akron in 1996. Jones' 155 rushing yards were the most by a true freshman at Tech since 1987 when Jon Jeffries posted 160 yards on the ground against Cincinnati.

☞Kevin Jones' 87-yard touchdown run against the Owls was the fourth longest running play by a Tech player since 1950.

His run was the longest by a Tech freshman over that same span and was the longest by any Tech player in a BIG EAST game.

- ◆André Davis' 41-yard touchdown catch in the Temple game was the 16th of his career, giving him sole possession of third place at Tech for TD receptions. Davis (Niskayuna, N.Y.) entered the game tied for third with Carroll Dale.
- **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) posted the first touchdown catch of his Tech career when he hauled in a 34-yard toss from Grant Noel (Ridgeley, W. Va.) in the fourth quarter of the Temple game.
- **☞DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.), one of five defensive players who made their first Tech starts at Temple, was in on a personal-best 11 tackles. The freshman cornerback also notched his third interception of the season and broke up two passes.

Fast Start Propels Tech To Big Win Over UVa





CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — Quarterback Grant Noel threw three first-half touchdown passes as Virginia Tech handed rival Virginia a 31-17 loss in front of the largest crowd to see a college football game in the Commonwealth of Virginia and a national ESPN television audience.

Tech took advantage of five UVa turnovers to build a 31-0 lead by the end of the first half. Noel's three TD passes all came in the first 17 minutes of play, with two going to senior flanker André Davis. The Cavaliers managed to get on the scoreboard in the second half, but Tech's defense and the running of freshman tailback Kevin Jones helped the Hokies control the game.

Led by linebacker Ben Taylor, the Hokies' defensive unit held Virginia to just 269 total yards, including only eight yards rushing. Tech posted six sacks, recovered three fumbles (two on special teams), picked off two passes and blocked a punt.

A CLOSER LOOK: Virginia Tech 31 • UVa 17

- During their 31-17 victory at Virginia, the Hokies held the Cavs to just eight yards rushing. That's the lowest rushing total on record for UVa in a game against Tech. The previous low was 10 yards rushing during the 1982 meeting.
- ◆True freshman Kevin Jones (Chester, Pa.) rushed for 181 yards on 37 carries against Virginia. Jones' performance marked the highest single-game rushing total on record for a Tech freshman and stands second only to quarterback Michael Vick's 210 rushing yards at Boston College in 2000 as the top rushing game in Coach Frank Beamer's 15 seasons at Tech.
- **▼Kevin Jones**' 37 rushing carries against Virginia were the most for a Tech player since Cyrus Lawrence carried the football 38 times versus the Cavaliers in 1981.
- Willie Pile (Alexandria, Va.) intercepted passes at the Tech 8-yard line and the Tech 1-yard line to stop Virginia drives. The picks gave the redshirt junior free safety 10 career interceptions, placing him in a five-way tie for 10th alltime at Tech. One of the former players Pile passed on the career list was current coach Frank Beamer, who had nine picks during his Tech career (1966-68).
- Wayne Ward (Plant City, Fla.) blocked a punt during the win over Virginia. It was the second blocked punt of the season for Ward and the fourth of his Tech career.
- Grant Noel (Ridgeley, W.Va.) passed for three touchdowns against UVa. The last Tech quarterback to throw three TD passes in a game against the Cavs was Will Furrer in 1990. That gave Noel 16 TD passes on the season, equalling the fourth-best season total at Tech.



Tech Gives Top-Ranked Hurricanes a Scare

BLACKSBURG, Va. -Virginia Tech came painfully close to ending No. 1 Miami's undefeated season before falling in a hardfought, 26-24, loss to the 'Canes at Lane Stadium.

Tech. which trailed 20-3 at halftime, staged a fierce second-half comeback, scoring twice within a 2 1/2minute span of the fourth guarter. The second of those two touchdowns, a blocked punt return by Brandon Manning, cut the Miami lead to just two points with 6:03 remaining. A two-point conversion pass that could have tied the game fell incomplete. Miami ended the Hokies' final threat with an interception at the UM 31 with just under five minutes left.

An inspired defensive performance helped Tech stay within striking distance despite committing five turnovers. The Hokies held the 'Canes to 132 total yards

- ◆Virginia Tech's 24 points were the second-most against Miami all season and the twopoint final margin was the closest of the year for the 'Canes. Going into the game, Miami had held eight of its first 10 opponents to seven points or less. Florida State scored 27 points in a loss to UM and Pittsburgh managed 21 points against the Hurricanes.
- ◆True freshman Kevin Jones (Chester, Pa.) rushed for 160 yards against the Hurricanes, the most yards by an opposing player against the 'Canes during the 2001 season. His 56-yard run in the third quarter was also the longest against Miami during the season. Jones posted his third-straight 100-yard rushing game. He is the first Tech freshman to post three 100-yard rushing games in a season since Jon Jeffries finished with three in 1987. Roscoe Coles also had three 100-yard rushing games as a freshman in 1974.
- ►When Grant Noel (Ridgeley, W.Va.) passed to Terrell Parham (Bartow, Fla.) for a two-point conversion against Miami, it marked Tech's first successful two-point conversion since the 1996 season when Angelo Harrison caught a Jim Druckenmiller pass for two points against Akron.
- ◆Redshirt freshman Jason Lallis (Mitchellville, Md.) registered his first collegiate sack in the second guarter of the Miami game. It was only the fourth sack allowed by UM all season.
- Tech blocked two kicks against Miami. Defensive tackle **David Pugh** (Madison Heights, Va.) blocked a field goal in the first quarter that led to a Tech field goal. During the fourth quarter, Eric Green (Clewiston, Fla.) blocked a punt that was picked up by Brandon Manning (Harrisburg, Pa.) and returned for a touchdown.



Hokies Earn Ninth Straight Postseason Trip With Invitation to Gator

With its invitation to the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville. Fla., Virginia Tech will become one of just seven teams in the nation to make its ninth straight bowl appearance.

After a 10-1 effort in the regular season a year ago, the Hokies were also rewarded with a trip to the Gator Bowl, where they faced a tough Clemson team.

In what turned out to be Michael Vick's final game in a Tech uniform, the Hokies put on an impressive show on offense and defense in rolling to a 41-20 victory in front of nearly 20.000 Hokie faithful and a packed Alltel Stadium.

Tailback Lee Suggs ran for three scores and the defense limited the Tigers to 88 yards rushing as the Hokies earned the fifth bowl win in school history.

In the 1999 season, after a perfect 11-0 regular season campaign, the Hokies returned to the Nokia Sugar Bowl — this time to play for


the national championship.

Tech once again put on a great show after a furious comeback led by quarterback Michael Vick. The Hokies led heavily-favored Florida State heading into the fourth quarter before falling to the top-ranked Seminoles, 46-29.

Tech's 28-10 Nokia Sugar Bowl victory over Texas in 1995 stands alone as the Hokies' biggest win in football postseason play. But the Techmen always seem to find a way to create a special brand of excitement anytime they line up in a bowl game.

The 1995 Sugar Bowl was special, indeed. It was, at the time, the most prestigious bowl appearance ever for the Hokies and they made the most of it. Tech overcame a 10-point deficit to beat Texas and score one of the most stirring victories in the school's athletic history.

The momentum changed dramatically when game MVP Bryan Still returned a punt 60

yards for a Tech touchdown with 2:34 left in the first half.

Tech gained a lead in the third quarter (14-10) on a 1yard plunge by Marcus Parker. Then Still got back into the act. He hauled in a 54-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Jim Druckenmiller on a play that spelled doom for the Longhorns.

It was Tech's defense that accounted for the team's final touchdown with 5:06 left in the game. All-American Cornell Brown picked up his second sack of the game, causing a fumble. Tackle Jim Baron scooped up the ball and ran 20 vards to score.

In 1996, the Hokies played Nebraska in another Alliance bowl, the FedEx Orange Bowl. That game, too, was a pressure cooker from start to finish. Nebraska won, 41-21, but had led by only three points at 24-21 late in the third quarter.

Other bowl games also have provided high excitement for Tech fans.

Who will ever forget The Kick? It ended perhaps the most stirring bowl game of the 1986 season as Virginia Tech's Chris Kinzer booted a 40-yard field goal to vault the Hokies past North Carolina State in the New Peach Bowl. The 25-24 victory came with no time showing on the clock and provided Tech with one of its top moments in football history.

The winning drive started with 1:53 remaining in the

game. Tech covered 57 yards in 11 plays to move to the State 23-yard line. In the drive, Tech converted a crucial fourth-and-three to move to the N.C. State 28-yard line with 15 seconds remaining. Tech was whistled for holding on the next play which forced the Hokies to try for a game-winning touchdown pass. Tech wingback David Everett was interfered with by a Wolfpack defender at the goal line and that set up the big moment for Kinzer.

Almost as dynamic was Tech's 45-20 win over Indiana of the Big Ten Conference in the 1993 Independence Bowl

The last minute of the first half of the Independence Bowl will be most remembered for its unbelievable action-packed ending. Virginia Tech was leading Indiana, 14-13, with only 35 seconds left until halftime. Indiana had the ball on the Tech 49-yard line, when DeWayne Knight exploded through the IU offensive line to cause a fumble. J.C. Price had his hands on the ball but could not control it. That is when Lawrence Lewis got "the world's greatest bounce," returning the loose ball 20 yards for a touchdown to give Tech a 21-13 lead over the Hoosiers.

The Hokies, however, were not finished with their dramatics. Tech's Jeff Holland blocked a Hoosiers' field goal try with no time left in the first

half and Antonio Banks settled under the ball and raced 80 yards for a score to give the Hokies a 28-13 halftime lead.

In Tech's first trip to the Independence Bowl in 1984, Outland Trophy winner Bruce Smith led Tech against the Air Force Falcons. Tech's powerful defensive unit held Air Force to only three first downs in the first half, but the Falcons got rolling in the second half. Quarterback Bart Weiss, named the game's Most Valuable Player, was the ringleader as Air Force won the battle, 23-7.

The first bowl bid that Tech received came following the 1946 season, when the Hokies played Cincinnati in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Texas. An early snow covered Blacksburg that year and threatened to end all football practices. Bulldozers and snow plows were used to clear a practice area on the Drillfield and the Hokies got in their bowl preparations. The Tech team encountered more snowy weather when it reached El Paso. The Cincinnati team handled the weather and the Hokies. winning 18-6.

It was not until 1966 that Tech received another bowl bid. This time, the Hokies were chosen to participate in the Liberty Bowl at Memphis, Tenn., against Miami (Fla.). The Hokies were 8-1-1 entering the contest and were led by All-American defensive back Frank Loria.

Miami, ranked ninth

nationally, won 14-7, in a hard-hitting defensive struggle. The Techmen scored first on a 2-yard plunge by Tommy Francisco. But the Miami defense held Tech to only one first down in the last three quarters.

Tech returned to the Liberty Bowl two years later in 1968, and squared off against Mississippi. The Hokies were 7-3 after a rocky 2-3 start and were led by another defensive All-American, linebacker Mike Widger. Ole Miss had a quarterback by the name of Archie Manning and he sparked the Rebels to a 34-17 victory after Tech had taken a 17-0 first-quarter lead.

A member of Tech's 1966 and '68 bowl teams was none other than current head coach Frank Beamer, who was a starting defensive back. He was credited with three tackles in the 1968 game.

Tech next went bowling against Miami (Fla.) in 1980 and lost 20-10 in a hardfought Peach Bowl contest. That Hokie team sported an 8-3 record and featured one of the finest defensive units in college football.


Tech tailback Cyrus Lawrence emerged as one of the biggest stars of the game. He rushed for 134 yards and scored the lone Hokie touchdown. Ashley Lee, then a freshman linebacker, had 15 tackles for the Techmen.

At the end of the 1994 season, the Hokies fell to a tough Tennessee team, 45-23, in a transplanted Gator Bowl

contest at Florida Field in Gainesville.

The high-powered Volunteer offense totaled 495 yards in the affair behind quarterback Peyton Manning (Archie's son) and their highlytouted tailback James (Little Man) Stewart. Stewart, Tennessee's all-time leading rusher, ran for three touchdowns and threw for another score en route to earning the game's Most Valuable Player award.

Tech's Dwayne Thomas would not be outdone. dazzling the 62.200 fans in attendance by rushing 19 times for 102 yards and one touchdown. Thomas had a 1yard burst for a score in the second quarter and rambled 27 yards to set up Maurice DeShazo's 7-yard touchdown run in the third quarter.

The Hokies made their second trip to the Gator Bowl following the 1997 season to face North Carolina.

The Tar Heels impressed a crowd of 54,116 at Alltel Stadium by passing for 318 yards and grinding out 124 on the ground on the way to a 42-3 victory. Tech was held to a total of 185 yards, its lowest total of the season. The Hokies' only points came on a 40-yard field goal by Shayne Graham late in the third quarter.

Tech bounced back strong in 1998 by capping a 9-3 season with an eve-opening. 38-7, victory over Alabama in the inaugural Music City Bowl in Nashville. A sellout crowd braved freezing rain and a wind chill that dipped below 15 degrees to watch Tech post its first-ever win against Alabama.

The winning margin was the largest ever in a bowl game for the Hokies, while the losing margin was the secondworst in a bowl game for the Tide. Tech clung to a 10-7 lead at halftime before pulling away in the second half behind the defensive and special teams play of bowl MVP Corey Moore. The junior defensive end forced an interception that set up a Tech touchdown midway through the third quarter. Minutes later, he blocked an Alabama punt to pave the way for another Hokie TD. Tech went on to secure the win with two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter.





And Torgersen Hall brings together campus organizations devoted to developing and applying instructional, communication, and information technologies.

Virginia Tech was established as an all-male military school dedicated to the original land-grant mission of teaching agriculture and engineering. Today it is a coeducational, top-50 research institution with recognized programs in music, business, architecture, and the humanities, as well as its traditional strengths in the sciences, engineering, and technology.



While participation in the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets is no longer mandatory, the corps remains a proud tradition of the university with some 700 cadets. Virginia Tech and Texas A&M are the only two

schools in the nation with a military component inside a larger civilian population.

The university is organized into eight colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences. Architecture and Urban Studies. Arts and Sciences. Pamplin College of Business. Engineering, **Human Resources** and Education. Natural Resources. and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary

Medicine. Together, they offer about 170 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs.

The university's 2,600-acre main campus has more than 100 campus buildings, hundreds of research laboratories, the Donaldson Brown Hotel and Conference Center, and an airport. Next to campus is the 120-acre Corporate Research Center, home to more than 100 companies. Within five miles of campus is a 1,700-acre research farm.

Many of Virginia Tech's traditions and strengths are rooted in the university's motto, Ut Prosim: "That I May Serve," and its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through public service and outreach activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, Virginia Tech disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. It is a university that puts knowledge to work.

Blacksburg, Virginia — College Town, U.S.A.

Throughout the years, the town of Blacksburg and Virginia Tech have worked hand in hand to create a better community. Established as a farming community in 1798 by John and William Black, the town has thrived to rank among the nation's elite living environments.



In addition to being home to the Tech campus, Blacksburg was ranked among the top 20 retirement locations in the United States by *Rand McNally*. Local businesses and industries are drawn to the potential this quaint town has to offer. Blacksburg is gradually becoming more developed, making room for more businesses to flourish, however, the level of development is carefully controlled.

With a population of around 36,000 people and a major university, there is particular attention paid to the unique balance that preserves the atmosphere of a small town.

Blacksburg is located on a plateau between the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Alleghany Mountains, 2,100 feet above sea level. It is easily accessible in Southwestern Virginia on U.S. 460 near Interstate 81, only 40 miles southwest of Roanoke. Residents enjoy the beauty of the area and the close proximity to a variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Claytor Lake and the New River.



Charles W. Steger, president of Virginia Tech since January 7, 2000, possesses the breadth and depth of experience to lead the university at a point when higher education must learn to cope with major technology changes permeating education.

Steger has lofty goals for Virginia's leading research university.

"We have challenged ourselves with becoming one of the nation's leading research universities – of being ranked among the 30 best institutions in America. We are committing ourselves to the pursuit of excellence, to advancing scholarship throughout every discipline within every department and of becoming better at everything we do," says Steger.

A registered architect and former dean of Tech's College of Architecture and Urban Studies, Steger was the architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which concluded in 1998, raised \$337 million, \$87 million over its goal.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his bachelor and master's of architecture and a Ph.D., in environmental science and engineering from Virginia Tech. He and his wife Janet, have two sons, David and Christopher.



James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 56, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his four years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech entered competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001

season. Wrestling continues to compete in the prestigious Eastern Wrestling League.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Virginia Tech contracted with GreenTech, Inc., of Richmond, Va., to install its highly innovative, ITM natural grass sports field system in Lane Stadium/Worsham Field for the 2001 season. Under Weaver's direction, lighted football practice fields — conveniently located in the center of the athletics complex

were completed during the spring.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of compliance and concluded his time there as

associate athletic director.

"Jim Weaver was the unanimous choice of our search committee," retired Tech President Paul Torgersen said at a Blacksburg news conference when the new AD was introduced. "The committee was searching for someone with extensive Division I experience, a commitment to compliance, a commitment to gender equity, a commitment to all 21 varsity sports and a vision for conference alignment."

Weaver and his wife Traci have four sons — Josh, Paul, Cole and Craig.


