THE SERIES

- Saturday's football game between Virginia Tech and the University of Virginia will be the 92nd gridiron meeting between the two schools. Tech holds a 49-37-5 edge in the rivalry, which has seen the Hokies win 10 of the last 11 games and 13 of the past 17 contests.

- The series began in 1895 with Virginia winning 38-0. UVa went on to win the first eight meetings between the two schools and built a 20-13-4 advantage in the series by 1953.

- Beginning with the '53 season, Tech bounced back to win 10 of the next 11 meetings and take the lead in the series.

- During Frank Beamer's tenure as Tech's head coach, the Hokies lead 14-9 after winning 42-13 last year on the road.

- From 1923-35, the two met 13 times as members of the Southern Conference with Tech holding a 7-3-3 advantage.

- The Hokies are 19-9-1 in Blacksburg against the Cavaliers, 13-6-1 inside Lane Stadium.

COMMONWEALTH CUP

- The winner of the annual gridiron clash between Virginia Tech and the University of Virginia earns more than bragging rights in the state. In recent years, the winning team has also taken home the Commonwealth Cup.

- The Cup, now residing in Blacksburg, was created in 1996 by the universities to

remain in the possession of the winner of the in-state rivalry each year.

- The Commonwealth Cup, made of marble and cherry wood, is four feet high and weighs more than 100 pounds. The top of the Cup is silver-plated with the names of the two schools.

- The scores of all 91 games in the Tech-Virginia rivalry are engraved on the sides. A map of the Commonwealth of Virginia with Blacksburg and Charlottesville marked with stars has been etched on the front of the trophy, which was produced by Josten's.

- Virginia Tech gained possession of the Cup first by defeating arch-rival Virginia, 26-9, at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field in 1996.

STRONG IN THE ACC ...

- Tech is an impressive 45-10 in ACC games since joining the league in 2004.

... AND STRONG IN NOVEMBER

- Virginia Tech has posted a 23-2 record in November games (21-2 in ACC games) since joining the league in 2004.

SENIOR DAY

- Sixteen players will run out of the tunnel at Lane Stadium for the last time for a college football game Saturday.

- The group has a chance to finish as the winningest class in school history and enters Saturday's contest with a four-year mark of 40-12 with two ACC titles.

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Virginia Tech has won 10 of its last 11 games against the University of Virginia.
- 9 Tech has had nine scoring plays of 65 yards or more this season.
- 8 Jayron Hosley picked off his eighth pass of the season at Miami, the most interceptions for a Tech player in a season since 1967.
- 7 Tyrod Taylor has completed at least one TD pass in each of Tech's last seven games.
- 6 Tech opponents have committed six turnovers in each of the Hokies' last two games.
- 5 Jarrett Boykin needs five catches to take over fifth place in career pass receptions at Virginia Tech.
- 4 The Hokies have now won the ACC Coastal Division title four times in the six seasons the league has been split into divisions.
- 3 Virginia Tech held Miami to three pass completions during the second half of last weekend's road victory.
- 2 The Hokies rank second nationally in pass interceptions with 19.
- 1 Virginia Tech needs one victory to become the only FBS team to have won 10 or more games each of the last seven seasons.



COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 172-55 record over the past 17 seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 24th year as the head football coach at Tech and 30th overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 196-94-2 record and sits with an overall record of 238-117-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 17 consecutive bowl appearances, three ACC titles, three ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999 and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December of 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 64-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Tech and now an assistant coach at the University of South Carolina; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech who now works for the Carolina Panthers. He has two grandchildren, Sutton and Olivia, daughters of Shane and his wife, Emily.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

Beamer, who is the third-winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 238 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is tied for ninth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

• **Frank Beamer**, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.

• Only one of the 120 active Division I-A head football coaches has been at his current school consecutively longer than Beamer: Joe Paterno (45th yr., Penn State).

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy!
Tech! Tech! V.P.I.!
Sola-Rex Sola-Rah
Polytech-Vir-gin-i-ah!
Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

HOUSE OF HORRORS

- Lane Stadium has always been a difficult place for opponents to play and has been dubbed one of the best game-day environments in college football. Tech has a 49-8-1 record versus non-conference teams at home since 1991.
- Virginia Tech has posted a 190-68-6 overall record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.
- Tech is 116-31-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.
- Tech football teams are 350-99-13 all time in Blacksburg, including a 46-7 record since the start of the 2003 season.
- A large part of that impressive record is the home-field environment created by the fans as Lane Stadium has been sold out for 80 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The Hokies went unbeaten and untied in 2008 (6-0), 2000 (6-0), 1999 (6-0), 1996 (7-0), 1993 (6-0) 1980 (6-0), 1975 (5-0) and 1965 (3-0) at Lane Stadium. They went 4-0-1 in 1972 and 2-0-1 in 1966.

A STAFF WITH STAYING POWER

♦ Head coach **Frank Beamer**, in his 24th year at Tech, has had the top four men on his staff in Blacksburg since 1996.

♦ Associate head coach **Billy Hite** has been at Tech since 1978, well before Beamer arrived. His 33 consecutive years on the same staff make him the "Dean" of assistant coaches at the FBS level. In fact, Joe Paterno, the head coach at Penn State (45th year), is the only coach of any title who has been at the same school for more consecutive years than Hite.

♦ Defensive coordinator **Bud Foster** came with Beamer from Murray State in 1987 and took over the defense in 1995.

♦ **Bryan Stinespring** joined the staff as a full-time assistant in 1993 and took over as offensive coordinator in 2002.

♦ Recruiting coordinator **Jim Cavanaugh** has been on the staff since 1996.

♦ Additionally, defensive line coach **Charley Wiles** is in his 15th year in Blacksburg.

♦ The entire 10-man staff has been at **Virginia Tech alone** a combined 148 years. Beamer has had this staff intact since the start of the 2007 season as this staff is in its fourth year together.

BETTER WITH TIME

♦ Tech played its first varsity football game on Oct. 21, 1892, 118 years ago on a small field behind a dorm on campus. Since that time, the Hokies have won 677 games and have improved each decade since the 1970s.

THE STORIED LUNCH PAIL

♦ Taken with the Hokies wherever they go is the storied lunch pail. The Pail served as the inspiration for Tech's record-setting 1995 defense, symbolizing Tech's blue collar approach to defensive football. Every year since, a member of the defense has been responsible for toting a new Pail.

♦ Coach Rod Sharpless, then the co-defensive coordinator along with Bud Foster, brought a lunch pail back from New Jersey and they decided that it would become the symbol of the 1995 defense.

♦ Sharpless' mother-in-law found the now famous original lunch pail in Mercerville, N.J., where it had belonged to a coal miner.

♦ The players put the unit goals, weekly goals, the keys to success for the week and a signed a mission statement before the season in the Pail ... plus the turf from road wins.

♦ Senior defensive tackle **John Graves** is the carrier of the Pail this season.

DEFENSIVE TRADITION

♦ Virginia Tech defensive coordinator **Bud Foster** is the architect of some of the nation's best defenses on an annual basis.

♦ Tech is the only FBS school to have a defense finish in the top 12 in total defense each of the past six years (4th in 2004; 1st in 2005 and 2006; 4th in 2007; 7th in 2008 and 12th in 2009). Check out these numbers Foster's crew has put up:

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Virginia Tech took control in the second half and marched to a 42-13 ACC road win against in-state rival Virginia to end regular-season play with a four-game winning streak.

Tech led just 14-13 at the half before powering for 222 rushing yards and 28 unanswered points over the final 30 minutes of play. Redshirt freshman Ryan Williams led the charge with a career-high 183 yards on the ground and scored four touchdowns for the second straight week.

Quarterback Tyrod Taylor and sophomore flanker Danny Coale hooked up on six passes, four of which provided key yards during three of Tech's touchdown drives.

Virginia started quickly, driving 73 yards on 10 plays for a touchdown on its first possession. The Cavaliers led 10-7 until a 20-yard touchdown burst by Williams gave the Hokies the lead for good with 9:43 showing in the second quarter.

It took Tech just two plays to capitalize on a third-quarter Virginia fumble for a 21-13 advantage. From that point on, the Cavs managed just 77 yards of offense. The Hokies out-gained their rivals 483 yards to 295.

Game Notes

• Receiver Danny Coale equaled a personal best in pass receptions with six against the Cavaliers. His 135 yards receiving were a new career high.

• Tailback Ryan Williams became just the second Tech back on record to score four or more touchdowns in consecutive games. Williams also had four TDs the previous week against NC State. Lee Suggs scored five TDs in a 2000 game at Central Florida and followed the next game with four against Virginia. Suggs also had four touchdowns against Rutgers earlier in the 2000 season.

• Williams posted his ninth 100-yard rushing performance of the season, tying the Tech single-season mark established by Kevin Jones in 2003.

Boise State scored in the final 70 seconds to hand Virginia Tech a disappointing 33-30 season-opening loss before a sell out crowd of 86,587 at FedExField on Labor Day evening.

The Hokies put themselves in an early 17-0 hole with a series of miscues, but managed to battle back to capture the lead in the third quarter.

Tech was up 30-26 before Boise quarterback Kellen Moore connected on his third touchdown pass of the game with 1:09 remaining. The lead changed hands four times during the final 22 minutes of the game.

Tailback Ryan Williams scored three touchdowns and quarterback Tyrod Taylor accounted for 259 of Tech's 314 yards of offense. The Hokies blocked a pair of kicks for the 22nd time under Frank Beamer.

Game Notes

• Six true freshmen dressed for the game, with two – Kyle Fuller (special teams) and Derrick Hopkins (defensive line) – seeing action.

• The last time Virginia Tech trailed 17-0 after one quarter was in 1992 when Miami led 17-0 after the first stanza. UM went on to win that game 43-23.

• There were three blocked kicks in the game. Both teams blocked a punt, and Tech added a blocked extra point attempt.

• It marked the third straight season the Hokies opened the season with a loss at a neutral site.

BLACKSBURG – Quarterback Drew Dudzik ran for two touchdowns and passed for another as James Madison University stunned No. 13 Virginia Tech 21-16, on a rainy afternoon at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The loss was Tech's first in a home opener since the 1995 season and the first to a non-conference team in Blacksburg since the final game of the 1998 season.

With the Dukes trailing 16-7 late in the third quarter, Dudzik engineered a pair of scoring drives to put the visitors ahead. Then, following a Tech fumble, the JMU signal-caller sealed the Hokies' fate with a five-minute-plus drive that ran out the clock. He had help from running back Jamal Sullivan, whose catch and run with a Dudzik pass produced a 77-yard touchdown that lit a fire under the Dukes late in the second quarter.

Tech never punted in the game, but suffered three turnovers and had to settle for Chris Hazley field goals on three of its five trips inside the JMU 25-yard line. The Hokies' only TD came on a 17-play, 94-yard drive in the opening quarter.

Game Notes

- The loss snapped a 32-game home winning streak against non-conference opponents spanning back to the final game of the 1998 season when the Hokies, then in the Big East Conference, lost at home to Virginia 36-32.

- Tech's 17-play touchdown drive against the Dukes was its longest since a 17-play TD drive at NC State in 2005.

- The last time the Hokies allowed a pass of 77 yards or longer was in 2003 when quarterback Rasheed Marshall of West Virginia completed a 93-yard pass to Travis Garvin.

- JMU's second quarter touchdown marked the first time the Dukes had scored against the Hokies in 10 quarters of play going back to 1992. The Dukes were shut out on their last two visits to Lane Stadium.

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech scored 28 unanswered points in the second half on the way to posting its first victory of the season, a much-needed 49-27 decision over the East Carolina University Pirates at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Tailback David Wilson and cornerback Rashad Carmichael played big roles in rallying the Hokies from a 27-21 third-quarter deficit. Wilson ran for two touchdowns in less than five minutes to stake Tech to a 35-27 advantage in the waning seconds of the third quarter. Then Carmichael took over, delivering the big blow with a 68-yard interception return for a touchdown at the start of the fourth quarter. A second interception by Carmichael on the Pirates' very next drive preceded a 69-yard touchdown pass from Tech quarterback Tyrod Taylor to receiver Jarrett Boykin that capped the scoring.

Tech held East Carolina to 83 total yards in the second half after allowing 278 yards over the first two quarters of play.

Game Notes

- Sophomore running back David Wilson scored two touchdowns for the first time in his Tech career with runs of 3 and 8 yards against ECU.

- Defensive end James Gayle, defensive tackle Antoine Hopkins, true freshman cornerback Kyle Fuller and safety Antoine Exum made their first collegiate starts in the win.

- Tech's 49 points were the most for the Hokies in a game against East Carolina. Tech scored 45 points during a 2000 victory at ECU.

- Five Tech backs had rushing carries of 10 yards or more during the game. The Hokies had 12 running plays of 10 yards or more, including a 24-yard run by redshirt freshman Tony Gregory on his first collegiate carry.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. - Virginia Tech used four second-half field goals by Chris Hazley and stout defensive play over the final 30 minutes to open ACC play with a 19-0 shutout victory at Boston College. The win kept the Hokies perfect (7-0) in conference openers since joining the league in 2004.

Tech gained just 164 yards of offense during the first 30 minutes, but still managed to cling to a 7-0 lead at the intermission thanks to a nine-play, 80-yard scoring drive midway through the half. A 30-yard pass from quarterback Tyrod Taylor to tailback Darren Evans was the key play and Evans put the finishing touches on it with a 3-yard run for the touchdown.

Boston College piled up 211 yards in the first half, but failed to score on two trips inside the red zone. The Eagles ran just two plays on the Hokies' side of the field during the second half, while being held to just 39 total yards. Tech's defense posted six sacks, 11 tackles for loss and a pair of pass interceptions during the victory.

Hazley booted field goals on each of Tech's first three possessions of the third quarter. He added a fourth with 3:48 remaining in the game.

Taylor connected on 16 of 21 passes for 237 yards, while David Wilson picked up 67 yards rushing on 16 carries.

Game Notes

- The shutout was the first for Virginia Tech since a 17-0 win over Virginia in Blacksburg in the final regular-season game of the 2006 season. The Hokies' last shutout in a road game was a 45-0 decision at Duke in 2005. The game marked the first time Boston College had been shut out since 1998 when Tech took a 17-0 decision at Alumni Stadium.

- Receiver Dyrell Roberts and tight end Andre Smith both set personal-bests for receptions during the win over the Eagles. Roberts had five catches for 49 yards in the game, while Smith posted four for 44 yards.

- The touchdown by Darren Evans was the first offensive touchdown scored by the Hokies at Alumni Stadium since Lee Suggs ran for a fourth quarter TD in the 2002 game at BC. Tech failed to score on offense during losses at Chestnut Hill in 2006 and 2008.

RALEIGH, N.C. - Virginia Tech came from behind twice in the fourth quarter and completed the biggest come-back victory of the Frank Beamer era with a 41-30 road victory over No. 23 NC State at Carter-Finley Stadium in front of the third-largest crowd ever at the stadium.

The Wolfpack stormed to a 17-0 lead in the first 16 minutes of the game and led 17-7 at the half. David Wilson gave the Hokies a big lift when he returned the second half kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown. Tech went on to outscore the Pack 34-13 over the final two quarters, but didn't take the lead for good until the 1:27 mark when Jarrett Boykin took a Tyrod Taylor pass and weaved 39 yards for a touchdown.

Sophomore Jayron Hosley's third interception of the game set up an insurance TD for the Hokies as tailback Darren Evans capped a 160-yard rushing game with his second score of the day with 28 seconds left.

Game Notes

- Redshirt sophomore receiver Marcus Davis made his first collegiate start in the game as the Hokies opened with a four receiver set. Another sophomore receiver, D.J. Coles, caught his first collegiate passes during the victory.

- Tech's comeback from 17-points down surpassed a comeback from 15 points down at Virginia in 1995 as the biggest come-from-behind win in Coach Frank Beamer's 23-plus seasons in Blacksburg.

- Quarterback Tyrod Taylor's three touchdown passes tied a personal best for the Tech senior who also threw for three scores at Maryland in 2009.

- Andre Smith became the first Tech tight end to catch two touchdown passes in a game since Keith Willis did it against Cal in the 2003 Insight Bowl.

BLACKSBURG - Quarterback Tyrod Taylor ran for two scores and passed for another to pace Virginia Tech to a 45-21 victory over Central Michigan University at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

After CMU opened the game with an 80-yard touchdown drive, Taylor answered with a 72-yard scamper for a TD on Tech's second play of the game and the Hokies never looked back, scoring 38 unanswered points. Taylor added a 7-yard touchdown pass to Andre Smith in the second quarter and chipped in a 15-yard scoring run in the third period. He finished the game with 161 yards passing and 127 on the ground.

Quarterback Tyrod Taylor enjoyed a record-setting day, throwing for 292 yards and tying a career high with three touchdown passes. He hit back-up quarterback Logan Thomas — who was split out as a receiver — for a 3-yard score on the Hokies' opening possession to give the Hokies a 7-0 lead and get the onslaught started.

BLACKSBURG - David Wilson scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter and Rashad Carmichael made a game-ending interception in the end zone as Virginia Tech battled from behind in a wild 28-21 ACC Coastal Division win over Georgia Tech.

The Hokies fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter and didn't catch up until a 15-yard TD run by Wilson early in the fourth period helped pull them even at 14-all. A scoring pass from Tyrod Taylor to tight end Andre Smith gave Tech its first lead, but Georgia Tech, which lost starting quarterback Joshua Nesbitt to injury late in the first half, marched 80 yards in nine plays to knot the score again at the 2:34 mark.

Wilson delivered the crushing blow when he took the ensuing kickoff and raced 90 yards for his second touchdown of the quarter. The victory wasn't sealed, however, until Carmichael's interception in the end zone with eight seconds left.

The Yellow Jackets out-gained the Hokies 426 yards to 335, with Nesbitt accounting for their first two scores on runs of 1 and 71 yards.

Game Notes

- Linebacker Bruce Taylor posted a career-high 14 tackles in the game, while defensive end Steven Friday recorded a personal-best 12 stops.

- David Wilson became the first Tech player in the modern era to return two kickoff returns for a touchdown in one season. Wilson also tied a school mark for career kickoff returns for a TD with two, tying Terry Strock (1959-61).

- Bud Foster coached his 200th game as Virginia Tech's defensive coordinator/co-coordinator. Foster was the co-coordinator in 1995 and took over as the sole defensive coordinator in 1996, a position he has held ever since.

- Quarterback Tyrod Taylor became the Hokies' all-time total offense leader on an 11-yard run during the second quarter. Taylor had 194 yards of offense in the game to up his career total to 8,134 yards, surpassing previous record-holder Bryan Randall (8,034).

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Tyrod Taylor tossed two third-quarter touchdowns passes, and Virginia Tech forced six turnovers, as the Hokies extended their winning streak to eight games with a big 26-10 ACC Coastal Division road win against North Carolina.

As has been the case most of the season, Tech fell behind early as the Tar Heels marched 80 yards on eight plays to start the game with a 7-0 lead. Kicker Chris Hazley kept the Hokies in the game during the first half with three field goals, including a career-long 52-yarder.

UNC's 10-9 advantage disappeared in the third quarter when Taylor and the Tech defense both went to work. Taylor hit receiver Marcus Davis with touchdown throws of 11 and 13 yards, while Hazley added another three-pointer for 17 unanswered third-period points. Meanwhile, Tech's defense shut the Tar Heels down over the final 30 minutes, allowing them just 97 total second-half yards of offense. The Hokies posted four pass interceptions, forced a fumble at the goal line and also came up with a fumble recovery on special teams.

Tech, which play error-free ball, piled up 418 yards of offense, including 249 through the air. Tailbacks Darren Evans and Ryan Williams added 90 and 83 yards, respectively, on the ground.

Game Notes

- Senior place-kicker Chris Hazley extended his string of consecutive field goals made to 17, after making kicks of 52, 38, 26 and 23 yards against North Carolina. Hazley's 17 consecutive field goals made tie a Virginia Tech single season mark set by Chris Kinzer in 1986 and equaled by Brandon Pace during the 2006 season.
- Hazley's 52-yard field goal tied a Tech mark for the longest field goal in an ACC game. Jud Dunlevy booted a 52-yarder in Blacksburg against UNC in 2007.
- Junior safety Eddie Whitley recorded his first collegiate pass interception, and it was a big one for the Hokies. Whitley wrestled a potential TD pass away from a UNC receiver in the end zone with the Tar Heels leading 10-6 in the second quarter.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. - Virginia Tech captured its fourth ACC Coastal Division title in the last six seasons with a strong fourth quarter performance that produced a 31-17 victory over No. 24 Miami at Sun Life Stadium.

The two teams were deadlocked at 17-all heading into the final 15 minutes of play, and that is when the Hokies took charge on both sides of the ball. Tech broke the tie at the 13:24 mark when tailback Ryan Williams sliced through the line and bolted 84 yards for a touchdown. Cornerback Jayron Hosley's eighth interception of the season set up an 18-yard TD run by quarterback Tyrod Taylor to give the Hokies some breathing room with 6:25 remaining.

Tech added interceptions on the Hurricanes' final two possessions. The Hokies also forced three fumbles in the game to help offset being outgained 464 yards to 369.

Miami completed just three of 16 passes for 34 yards in the second half.

Williams rushed 14 times for 142 yards for the Hokies, while Taylor threw a 43-yard touchdown pass to Danny Coale to go with his rushing touchdown.

Game Notes

- Chris Hazley booted a 49-yard field goal into the wind to extend his streak of consecutive field goals made to 18, a new school single-season record. Chris Kinzer made 17 consecutive field goals during the 1986 season. Brandon Pace equaled the mark with 17 straight in 2006. Pace, who connected on his last five field goals in 2005 before starting his senior season with 17 in a row, holds the career mark for consecutive field goals with 22.
- Tyrod Taylor's rushing touchdown was the 22nd of his career, setting a new career mark for Tech quarterbacks. Bob Schweickert (1962-64) held the previous school record of 21.
- Linebacker Tariq Edwards picked up his first collegiate pass interception.
- Ryan Williams' 84-yard run was the fifth-longest run from scrimmage in school history.

MORE ON TECH-UVa

♦ This year's senior class is 3-0 against Virginia and with a win, the Hokies would have a seven-game winning streak against the Cavs, marking the longest winning streak for the Hokies in the series. The longest winning streak in the series for the Hokies is six games (1958-63 and 2004-current). Virginia's longest winning streak in the series is eight games (1895-1904).

♦ The Hokies have actually fared better on the road than at home over the past eight seasons against the Cavaliers. In the four games at Scott Stadium since 2003, the Hokies averaged 40.5 points per game, while in four games at Lane Stadium since 2003, Tech averaged just 19.8 points per game.

♦ Last year, **Ryan Williams** ran for 183 yards and four touchdowns and in 2008, Tech quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** had 137 yards rushing (including a 73-yard run in the third quarter) and 137 yards passing.

♦ In the 2007 win by Tech, **Branden Ore** had 147 yards rushing while **Eddie Royal** had 147 yards receiving.

♦ The 17-0 shutout of the Cavaliers in 2006 was the first in the series by either team since UVa blanked Tech 38-0 in 1991.

♦ Tech's 52 points scored in the 2005 game were the most scored by either team ever in the series.

♦ The 2005 game marked the first time since 2002 that the Hokies had two 100-yard rushers in a game. **Branden Ore** ran for 115 yards on 15 carries against the Cavaliers, while senior starter **Cedric Humes** added 113 yards on 17 attempts. It marked the 28th time since 1962 that a pair of Tech backs had accomplished the feat and the fourth time it was done against Virginia.

♦ In 2004's game, the 0-0 halftime tie was the first game Virginia Tech had played where neither team scored in the first half since a 1990 game at Georgia Tech.

♦ Virginia Tech's 21-9 victory against Virginia in 2002 gave the Hokies their fourth straight win over their in-state rival. The last time either team won four straight in the series was from 1980-83 when Tech took four consecutive meetings.

♦ The 30 combined points by the two teams in 2002 was the lowest total in the series since 1988 when UVa won by a score of 16-10.

♦ During their 31-17 victory at Virginia in 2001, the Hokies held the Cavs to just eight yards rushing. That's the lowest rushing total on record for UVa in a game against Tech. The previous low was 10 yards rushing during the 1982 meeting.

♦ True freshman **Kevin Jones** rushed for 181 yards on 37 carries against Virginia in 2001. Jones' performance marked the highest single-game rushing total on record for a Tech

freshman until **Darren Evans** posted a school-record 253 yards against Maryland in 2008.

♦ **Willie Pile** intercepted passes at the Tech 8-yard line and the Tech 1-yard line to stop Virginia drives during the 2001 season.

♦ **Grant Noel** passed for three scores against UVa in 2001. Before that game, the last Tech QB to throw three TD passes in a game against the Cavs was **Will Furrer** in 1990.

♦ Fullback **Jarrett Ferguson**, who is now a strength coach with the Hokies, ran for two touchdowns against UVa in 2000, giving him six rushing TDs for the season — the most rushing TDs by a Tech fullback since **Phil Bryant** had six in 1991.

♦ Virginia's come-from-behind 36-32 win against the Hokies in 1998 marked the biggest comeback on record against a Tech football team. The Hokies led by 22 points, 29-7, at halftime. Tech lost a 21-point lead during a 50-49 loss at Rutgers in 1992. The Hokies were ahead 28-7 in that game after the first quarter.

♦ The 1998 game marked the 80th meeting between Virginia Tech and Virginia. That made the UVa series the longest-standing football series in Tech history, surpassing the

79-game VMI-Virginia Tech series, which ended in 1984.

♦ Tech had to come from behind for back-to-back wins in the series during the 1995 and 1996 seasons. During the 1996 season, the Hokies trailed 9-7 at halftime before scoring 19 unanswered points. In 1995, Tech scored 22 points in the final 13 minutes of the contest to erase a 14-point deficit and produce the biggest fourth-quarter comeback on record at Tech. At that time, the Hokies' 22 points in the fourth quarter of that game were the most in the final quarter of play for a Virginia Tech football team in more than 50 years.

♦ During the 1994 Virginia Tech-Virginia game, the Hokies ran the football just 17 times, an all-time low for the Hokies in a single football game.

♦ The Hokies' 573 yards of total offense against Virginia in 1992 represent the most yards ever for Tech against the Cavaliers. The Cavs still won the game, 41-38.

♦ Virginia Tech has outrushed Virginia in 30 of their last 38 meetings, while the Cavaliers have posted more passing yards than the Hokies in 13 of the last 26 games in the series.



ONE LAST GO

♦ **Tyrod Taylor** is the man under center one last season for the Hokies this year. The senior has started 39 games and has won 32 of them, the most wins for a starting quarterback in school history. That includes a loss at Florida State in 2008 when he was injured on the first play of the game and didn't return.

♦ Taylor is the latest in a growing line of standout signal callers from the Peninsula area of Virginia. The Hampton product joins Allen Iverson and Ronald Curry from the same city, Bryan Randall from Williamsburg and both Michael and Marcus Vick from Newport News to go on to success from that area.

♦ He led the nation last year in yards per passing attempt with 9.51 and has had six career 100-yard rushing games, tying him with

Bob Schweickert for the most 100-yard rushing games in a career by a quarterback. He also has 22 rushing touchdowns, a new school record for rushing scores by a quarterback.

♦ Taylor, who is the first senior starting quarterback under Beamer since Bryan Randall in 2004, engineered two of the biggest plays in recent history last season when he led Tech on an 88-yard touchdown drive in the last two minutes to lift the Hokies to a 16-15 win over No. 19 Nebraska.

♦ First, he hit **Danny Coale** for an 81-yard pass down the right sideline and then scrambled for close to 10 seconds and hit **Dyrell Roberts** in the back of the end zone for the game-winning touchdown.

♦ For his career, Taylor - who doesn't eat any red meat - has 6,356 yards passing, 2,126 yards rushing and has accumulated a school-record 8,482 yards of total offense.

♦ All three are among the best in school history. For a complete list of where Taylor ranks in the school annals in several categories, see page 5.

A STABLE OF STALLIONS

♦ Virginia Tech should boast one of the top backfields in the country this year as the Hokies will feature a stable of "Stallions" that runs four deep.

♦ **Ryan Williams** was a third-team *Sporting News* All-American last year after setting several school and conference records.

♦ **Darren Evans**, the starter in 2008, returns after suffering a season-ending knee injury last preseason. The 2009 Orange Bowl MVP rushed for over 1,200 yards that season.

♦ **David Wilson** saw plenty of action last year as a true freshman, and will be in the mix again this year. **Tony Gregory** is perhaps the fastest of all the backs and had an impressive spring, giving notice that he is ready to see the field somewhere this fall.

MR. ELECTRIC

♦ Williams, who played for former Tech star Loren Johnson at Stonewall Jackson High, is a self-described fashionisto, owning nearly 100 different pairs of Nike shoes, including old-school Air Jordans and Air Force Ones. He also has a tattoo on his right forearm that reads "#34 Lil' Sweetness" in honor of the late Walter

A FEW NOTES ON WILLIAMS

- ♦ Williams had a play of 40 yards or longer in seven games last year, with 19 rushes of 20 yards or more (see chart below).
- ♦ He ran for 1,655 yards last year, breaking the school's single-season rushing record of 1,647 yards set by Kevin Jones in 2003.
- ♦ He set new ACC single-season records for total touchdowns with 22 and for rushing touchdowns with 21 scores.
- ♦ His 1,655 rushing yards were the third-most in ACC single-season history.
- ♦ His 10 100-yard rushing games tied the ACC's single-season mark and set a new Virginia Tech single-season record (the career record is 16 times).
- ♦ He finished fifth in the country in rushing yards per game, fifth in total rushing yards and tied for third in rushing touchdowns.
- ♦ His rushing total of 1,655 yards was the sixth highest by a freshman in NCAA history, surpassing Tony Dorsett of Pittsburgh (1,586 in 1973) and Herschel Walker of Georgia (1,616 in 1980), among others, on that list.
- ♦ His 21 rushing touchdowns tied an NCAA record (Marshal Faulk, San Diego State, 1991) for most rushing touchdowns in a season by a freshman.

EVANS BACK ON THE FIELD

- ♦ After suffering a torn ACL in preseason camp last fall, junior tailback **Darren Evans** returns to the field hungry to return to the form of 2008.
- ♦ After redshirting in 2007, he made a quick impact on the Tech offense, rushing for 1,265 yards and 11 scores. He had a huge game when he rushed for a school-record 253 yards (with runs of 50 and 45 yards) on 32 carries with 12 broken tackles and a score in Tech's 23-13 win over No. 23 Maryland and earned second-team All-ACC honors.
- ♦ Evans is the first Tech player on record to score a touchdown in each of the first six games he played in. The previous high belonged to Cyrus Lawrence, who scored in his first four games played.
- ♦ The Indianapolis native was the 2006 EA SPORTS National Player of the Year and a PARADE All-American as a running back his senior season after rushing for 2,806 yards and a state-record 61 touchdowns, the No. 4 total in U.S. prep football history.
- ♦ He returned to action full time this past spring and in July, he broke the school's running back record for the bench press, putting up 405 pounds. He has a team-leading 678 yards rushing this year and nine touchdowns.
- ♦ Evans and his wife, Tanisha, are raising their son James in Blacksburg.

ROCK SOLID

- ♦ Senior cornerback **Rashad Carmichael** waited his time and stepped in and up last season. With blazing speed, he possesses the skills necessary to be another great corner in the Tech backfield. His 4.26 40-yard dash is the fifth fastest in program history.
- ♦ While his given name is Rashad, no one calls him that, not even his family, friends or even position coach **Torrian Gray**. He goes simply by "Rock," a nickname he's had since a child. When Carmichael was younger, people called him Ra or Ra-Ra. But his father Bernard heard those nicknames and thought they made his son sound soft. From that point on, his father said Carmichael would be known as Rock.

♦ Carmichael and former Tech defensive end Jason Worilds have been friends for years as Carmichael's father and Worilds' brother served in the Air Force together. Bernard Carmichael passed away in the summer of 2008 from a heart attack, just weeks before his son made his first career start, coming against East Carolina in the season opener.

♦ This past spring, while practicing and taking classes, Carmichael worked 35 hours per week as an intern at the Head Start Program in Christiansburg. He graduated with a degree in human services and is working on a second undergraduate degree.

♦ Carmichael, an honorable mention All-ACC selection last year, had 55 tackles in 2009, including four for loss and a sack, and six interceptions, including one that he returned 22 yards for a score against Boston College.

♦ He has four interceptions this season, giving him 10 for his career. His biggest came when he picked off a Georgia Tech pass in the end zone with 8 seconds left to preserve Tech's 28-21 win over the Yellow Jackets.

GIVING THEM HIS FINGER

♦ No one can accuse offensive guard **Greg Nosal** of being soft after his performance against CMU. The junior got his pinkie finger stuck in the facemask of a defender, ripping the fleshy tip of the finger off. After the trainers fished it out of his glove, they put the digit on ice and wrapped up Nosal so he could finish the game. Finally, he went into the training room late in the game after the pain medicine wore off to get the tip sewn back on, but he played two quarters with 9 1/2 fingers.

♦ Nosal's father was recently promoted to Admiral in the U.S. Navy and works at the Pentagon.

THE GRAVE DIGGER

♦ **John Graves** is being called upon to be the senior leader on an inexperienced defensive line this year. The senior is the lone returning

starter among the front four and anchors the defensive tackle spot for the Hokies this year.

- He made a big impact on special teams as a sophomore, blocking a PAT against ECU, a field goal against Furman and a PAT against Georgia Tech. He became the first Tech player to block a kick in three consecutive games under **Frank Beamer**.

- He had just 15 tackles last year as he was limited by an ankle injury he suffered in the Georgia Tech game. Graves showed what he's capable of when healthy when he dominated in the Chick-fil-A Bowl against Tennessee, recording three solo stops, including two for loss and a sack.

- Graves, who already graduated with a pair of degrees in psychology and sociology, has a future desire to be an FBI special agent if the NFL doesn't work out.

- He has 32 tackles, including four for loss, and a career-high 16 quarterback hurries this season.

- He's part of an elite group now, one that includes the likes of Darryl Tapp, Xavier Adibi, Orion Martin and most recently Kam Chancellor last year, to carry the lunch pail as the leader of the Hokies' defense.

ATHLETICS RUNS IN THE FAMILY

- Danny Coale** comes from quite the athletic family. His brother, Kevin, played midfield for the University of Virginia men's lacrosse team. Their father, Jimmy, is the head strength and conditioning coach at Virginia Military Institute (VMI).

- Danny, who was a first-team all-state lacrosse player in high school, led the team with 36 receptions for 408 yards as a freshman in 2008. He set the school's freshman reception record with 36 and has caught at least two passes in 28 of 38 career games played.

- He had his longest, and most important, catch in the final minutes of the Nebraska game, breaking free down the sideline for an

81-yard catch to set up the game-winning touchdown pass with 21 seconds left.

- He had a career day at Virginia last year, when he had six catches for 135 yards. The junior has 89 receptions for 1,502 yards and four touchdowns for his career.

BIG-PLAY BOYKIN

- Junior **Jarrett Boykin** became a big-play receiver for the Hokies last year and uses his big hands to help with snagging passes. Boykin's hands are so large that he has to wear size-3X receiver's gloves. His thick fingers bust the seams of the gloves, sending him back to equipment manager Lester Karlin often for a replacement pair.

- Last season, he had a team-leading 40 receptions for 835 yards and six total scores. He caught six passes for a career-high 164 yards and a score at Maryland and was credited with a rushing touchdown when he pounced on a fumble in the end zone against Virginia.

- He is climbing the charts for career receiving yards at Tech, sitting in fifth place with 1,932 yards and has 12 touchdowns. He is also sixth in career receptions with 109.

A REWARD FOR GOOD GRADES

- The Tech football team eats its meals in order of grade-point average. Those players who have graduated, as well as those players who maintain the highest grade-point average, eat all team meals first. Coach Beamer invites each player to eat, calling out his name and his grade-point average, starting with the highest.

ATHLETIC OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

- This year's offensive line is another athletic one as three players in the two-deep started their collegiate careers at tight end. Starters **Beau Warren** (center), **Greg Nosal** (left guard) and co-starter **Andrew Lanier** (left tackle) all came to Blacksburg as tight ends before making the move to the interior line.

- Duane Brown made the same move early in his career and was a first-round draft pick of the Houston Texans in 2008 and is in his third year as a starter. Brandon Frye did the same and has started at tackle for the Seattle Seahawks before getting injured last year. Ed Wang also came in as a tight end and moved to tackle early on in his career. He was drafted by Buffalo last April.

WHERE'S WHITLEY?

- True junior **Eddie Whitley** is the master of all trades in the defensive backfield for the Hokies, as he's spent time at cornerback, outside linebacker, rover and now takes over the starting job at free safety. He takes the reigns from three-year starter Kam Chancellor, who was drafted by the Seattle Seahawks last April.

- Against East Carolina, he played most of the game at the whip linebacker spot as the Hokies played a nickel package most of the game.

- The North Carolina native is an avid chess player, who's been playing since he was 4 years old. He plays online, in the locker room, on his computer and even on his iPhone.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

♦ Starting center **Beau Warren** is just one of several Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program. Warren is following two brothers who played for the Hokies. Blake played linebacker for Tech and Brett was a starting linebacker in 2008.

♦ Redshirt sophomore **Antoine Hopkins** and true freshman **Derrick Hopkins** are brothers.

♦ Redshirt sophomores **Vinston Painter** and **Randall Dunn** are cousins.

♦ So are redshirt freshman **Logan Thomas** and freshman **Zack McCray**, as are redshirt junior **Jaymes Brooks** and redshirt freshman **Telvin Clark**.

♦ Linebacker **Tariq Edwards** is the son of former Hokie football player Bo Campbell, who lettered from 1989-92.

♦ **George George III** is a walk-on whose father, George, was on the Tech team in the 1970s.

♦ Back-up center **Bo Gentry** is the son of Tech's Assistant A.D. for Athletic Performance, Dr. Mike Gentry.

♦ **Wiley Brown** is the younger brother of former defensive end Nekos Brown and **David Wang** is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang.

♦ Freshman lineman **Mark Shuman** is the younger brother of former starting center Ryan Shuman.

♦ **Martin Scales** is the cousin of former Hokies Orion and Cam Martin.

♦ **Kyle Fuller** is a freshman defensive back who signed with the Hokies last February. He is joined on the team by his brother, **Corey Fuller**, who ran track at Kansas the past two seasons before transferring for this year. Both are younger brothers of former Hokie Vincent Fuller, who is in his sixth season with the Tennessee Titans.

ANOTHER ONE-YEAR KICKER

♦ For the fourth year in a row, Tech is relying on a senior walk-on for the kicking duties. In 2007, it was Jud Dunlevy, who went 21-for-26 on the season.

♦ In 2008, Dustin Keys set a school record with 23 field goals. Last year, it was Matt Waldron's turn and he responded by scoring 108 points en route to first-team All-ACC honors. All three were one-year wonders, combining to make 64 of 78 field-goal attempts (82 percent) and produce 317 points with several earning All-ACC honors.

♦ This year, it's **Chris Hazley's** time to shine. He came to Tech as a regular student and then to a tryout because "I was bored during my first semester here. I just wanted to find some things to do."

♦ He was rewarded with a scholarship this preseason.

♦ Hazley attended Henderson High in West Chester, Pa., playing football his senior year only after playing just soccer growing up. He kicked one field goal in his senior season and is 18-for-19 this year as the Hokies' kicker. He has made his last 18 field goal attempts, setting a new school record for consecutive field goals made in a season.

REPLACING BOWDEN

♦ Senior walk-on **Brian Saunders** steps into the role of starting punter this year after serving as Brent Bowden's back-up the past three years. While Bowden is now punting on Sunday's for Tampa Bay, Saunders is looking to make the most of his one year as a starter.

♦ Saunders graduated last spring with a degree in horticulture with a concentration in landscape contracting, and eventually wants to own his own landscaping company. He is averaging 44.8 yards per punt this season with nine punts downed inside the 20-yard line. He has 14 punts of 50 yards or longer, including a long of 66 yards at Boston College.

♦ Saunders was an invited walk-on back in 2006 and spent his first season as the scout team quarterback. Heading into this season, he had yet to appear in a game at Tech, but was rewarded with a scholarship this preseason.

HOSLEY TO THE HOUSE

♦ Sophomore **Jayron Hosley** was the last player to verbal to Tech before signing day in 2009 after getting a late offer from the Hokies. He quickly made a name for himself on the college level last year as a true freshman, mainly as a punt returner with an average of 11.2 yards per return. He had a 64-yard return for a score against Marshall, becoming the first freshman under head coach Frank Beamer to return a punt for a score.

♦ This year, he's making his impact on defense. He has a nation-leading eight

interceptions - including three at NC State. His effort at NC State earned him three different National Defensive Player of the Week honors.

♦ Against Central Michigan he broke free on a punt return, taking it back 80 yards for his second punt return touchdown.

♦ The speedy Hosley is from Delray Beach, Fla., where he attended Atlantic High School, the same high school as two former Hokies who play in the NFL - Brandon Flowers (Chiefs) and David Clowney (Panthers).

SMITH'S TIME TO STEP UP

♦ Tight end **Andre Smith** has bided his time behind Greg Boone for three years, but it's his time to step up now. The redshirt senior is the clear starter at the position and is having a big year. He has 16 catches for 153 yards and five touchdowns and is quickly becoming a favorite target of **Tyrod Taylor** in the red zone.

♦ Before he was born, Smith's mother, Julida Kilafwakun, had moved to America from Micronesia. She taught herself to read and how to drive, then put herself through college. Afterward, she worked as an administrative aide at Montgomery College, raising Smith by herself.

♦ She died of leukemia when Smith was 16 years old and he honors her with a tattoo stretched across his back that says "Momma's Boy."

♦ The Germantown, Md., native has 35 receptions for 396 yards and seven touchdowns for his career, including one last season at Maryland, less than 30 miles from his old home. He has five touchdowns this year, which the most by a Tech tight end since Jeff King - who still plays for the Carolina Panthers - caught six in 2005.

FROM THE BEACH TO THE MOUNTAINS

♦ Sophomore linebacker **Bruce Taylor** was thrust into the starting lineup after last year's starter, Barquell Rivers, tore a quad muscle while lifting this spring.

♦ The Myrtle Beach, S.C., native was the first commitment in the Hokies' 2008 class and has adjusted nicely in his time in the mountains. This season, he leads the team with 79 tackles, including 15.5 for loss, which is fourth in the ACC in total TFLs.

♦ For defensive end **Chris Drager**, he's finally comfortable at his semi-new position

season, he had 22 tackles, including 6.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks. He has 23 tackles this year.

FROM THE GOPHER STATE TO BLACKSBURG

♦ Long snapper **Collin Carroll** is the first player under **Frank Beamer** from Minnesota. His father, Jay, played tight end for the University of Minnesota in the early '80s and played in the NFL for the Minnesota Vikings and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

♦ Carroll sent out around 70 tapes to different colleges in hopes of catching someone's eye. Upon seeing the video, Tech coach Frank Beamer asked him to come down for a visit and eventually offered him a scholarship - a rarity for long snappers coming out of high school.

♦ Carroll, who has four younger brothers and two younger sisters, handles the field goal and extra-point snaps for the Hokies.

BUSTIN' LOOSE

♦ Walk-on rover **Wiley Brown** is the son of Chuck Brown, who is known as the godfather of Go-Go music, and is a famous songwriter and performer. The elder Brown had the No. 1 national R&B hit in "Bustin' Loose" in 1978. The hook from that song was used by Nelly in the 2002 No. 1 hit "Hot in Herre."

♦ The elder Brown turned 74 in August, and in 2009, to honor him, the city of Washington, D.C. designated the portion of Seventh Street NW from T Street to Florida Avenue as Chuck Brown Way.

♦ Wiley is the younger brother of Nekos, who started at defensive end last year. He played at Duquesne before transferring in and sitting out last year. He has 10 tackles on special teams this year.

CONSTANTS ON THE SIDELINES

♦ **Billy Hite**, who has helped develop 24 running backs who have gone on to sign with NFL teams, and equipment manager **Lester Karlin** are both in their 33rd season on the Tech staff.

♦ Hite came to Blacksburg as a member of Bill Dooley's football staff in 1978 and remained at Tech when **Frank Beamer** took over in 1987.

♦ He was elevated to the position of assistant head coach by Beamer the following year and was promoted to the new position of associate head coach in December 2000.

♦ In 1989, Hite filled in as the acting head coach when Beamer was sidelined following coronary angioplasty surgery and had to miss a home game versus Tulane. Hite didn't let the Tech faithful down as he led the Hokies to an emotional 30-13 victory.

♦ Both Hite and Karlin have been on the sideline for 395 consecutive Tech games.

guard, but the junior also is proud that he scored a touchdown on a run from the fullback position in his last high school game.

- The junior also excelled in another sport, winning the Virginia Group AAA state indoor track & field shot put title as a sophomore and finishing second in both the shot put and discus at the State Outdoor Track & Field Championship meet his senior year.

- Brooks was thrust into the limelight for the Orange Bowl two seasons ago when the starter was ruled ineligible. He responded with a solid game in the win and started all 13 games last year for the Hokies. He has started 25 straight games at guard for Tech.

OGLESBY MAKES THE MOVE

- Redshirt junior **Josh Oglesby** made the move to "fullback" this spring in order to get on the field more in a crowded backfield. While he's listed as a fullback and will put his hand in the dirt on occasion, he's quick to point out he's going to do more than block. The plan is for him to line up in numerous formations and in numerous places, utilizing his athleticism and strength.

- Oglesby and his family have a long time connection with running backs coach **Billy Hite** as Josh's father, Ike, was a running back for North Carolina in the early 1970s, when he was a teammate with Hite while at UNC. Ike Oglesby ranks 14th on UNC's all-time rushing list with 1,773 yards.

- The younger Oglesby had a great offseason in the weight room, earning Super Iron Hokie honors once again.

- He posted a 420-pound front squat in July max testing, along with a 316-pound power clean, both personal bests, and has improved his vertical jump three inches since coming to Virginia Tech, reaching 35 inches this summer.

- Playing in his home state against Duke last season, Oglesby scored two big touchdowns - the first two of his career - late to help seal the tight win. He had four carries for 44 yards this year against Wake Forest.

BOOK END TACKLES

- Tech offensive tackles **Nick Becton** and **Blake DeChristopher** have taken different paths to their spots on the offensive line. DeChristopher is entering his third year as the starting right tackle while Becton will be seeing his first significant action on the line at left tackle. He and **Andrew Lanier** take over for NFL Draftee Ed Wang, who was taken by the Buffalo Bills in the fifth round.

- DeChristopher (6-5, 320 pounds) bench pressed 450 pounds in July max testing to tie for the team high, while Becton (6-6, 311 pounds) is still learning lifting and the game of football, as the redshirt sophomore didn't take

up the sport until his junior year of high school. Becton was a powerful force on the basketball court - he shattered three backboards back in the Wilmington area with thunderous dunks - until he took to the gridiron and has improved steadily in his short time playing the game.

- Becton battled turf toe for much of the preseason camp and returned late.

- Lanier has started all 11 games, but the coaches are continuing to rotate Becton into the game on the offensive line and field goal/PATs so he can continue to progress.

GETTIN' IT DONE IN THE CLASSROOM

- There are eight Hokie graduates on the 2010 roster — seniors **Rashad Carmichael**, **Steven Friday**, **John Graves**, **Chris Hazley**, **Zach Luckett**, **Brian Saunders**, **Beau Warren** and junior **Chris Drager**.

- Drager graduated in three years and is already working on his Master's degree. Warren already has undergraduate degrees in both sociology and psychology and is enrolled in German, his third undergraduate program. Graves also has a pair of undergraduate degrees, in psychology and sociology.

- In seven of the past nine years, Tech has graduated 70 percent or higher of its class.

HOKIE PRIDE

- Virginia Tech football has always prided itself on taking care of its players before, during and after their time in Blacksburg. A testament to the family atmosphere created is the roster of former Hokie players serving in some sort of capacity with the football team in the athletic department.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

- Offensive guard **David Wang** comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.

- David had surgery on his shoulder during preseason and redshirted last year. He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history last April by becoming the first Chinese American to be drafted by an NFL team when Buffalo took him in the fourth round. Ed and David were featured on NFL China last fall as

a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football.

- He is widely considered the best video game player amongst the offensive linemen, taking over the crown from his brother.

- Virginia Tech also holds the distinction of having the first Korean American drafted by an NFL team as Eugene Chung was taken by the New England Patriots in the first round of the 1992 Draft.

NEW LOCKER ROOM FOR THE HOKIES

- A new, state-of-the-art building featuring a football locker room and lounge has been completed, allowing the team to have one of the nicest facilities in the county.

- The three-story building features a spacious locker room for players and coaches, as well as a lounge on the second floor and a wrestling facility on the third floor. The lockers on the first floor are among the largest in college football, measuring 42 inches across. Eventually, a new equipment room and loading dock will also be added.

- The second floor - which features six 65-inch flat-screen televisions - is a lounge, but can also be converted into a banquet room and will overlook the practice fields. A deck has an outdoor fire pit and a barbecue grill, giving it a first-class look.

HOP AND SKIP

- Defensive tackles **Antoine Hopkins** and **Derrick Hopkins** will line up beside each other on the defensive line this year.

- Antoine, known as "Hop", switched from No. 98 to No. 56 this year, a number he wore in high school. Derrick, the true freshman known as "Skip", has impressed the coaches in preseason camp and will play this year wearing Antoine's old No. 98.

- The two have a younger brother nicknamed "Jump" to complete the trio.

- Antoine has 37 tackles, including 5.5 for loss and two sacks while Derrick has eight tackles, including a sack, and a fumble recovery.

- The last brothers to play side-by-side for the Hokies were Blake and Brett Warren at linebacker in the mid 2000s. Other notable brother combinations playing together on the same side of the ball were Orion and Cam Martin (DE and OLB, respectively) in the late 2000s; Kevin and Jonathan Lewis, starting defensive tackles in the mid 2000s and offensive linemen T.J. and Todd Washington in the mid 1990s.

THE FREAK

- Sophomore wide receiver **Marcus Davis** is poised to have a major impact on the offense this year after finally settling in at the position.

- At 6-foot-4 and 230 pounds, the freakishly athletic Davis runs a 4.49-second 40-



yard dash and set a Tech position record with a 43-inch vertical jump last year, making him a big target for **Tyrod Taylor** to find anywhere, but particularly on jump ball situations in the end zone.

- This past summer, Davis worked on his catching skills by catching 100 balls a day. Many of those balls were caught with tennis balls taped to the palms of his hands to make him catch the ball with his fingertips.

- Davis came to Tech as a quarterback, but quickly switched to wide receiver. But he hurt his right shoulder just four practices into the 2008 preseason camp and underwent surgery. After taking a redshirt year, he was moved back to quarterback the next spring, but was moved back out wide with just a week left in the spring and has been a permanent resident of receiving corps since.

- His first college reception was an 80-yard touchdown catch last year against Boston College. Against North Carolina last week, he hauled in four passes for 81 yards and two touchdowns as the Hokies got a big road win.

WILSON ALSO IN THE MIX

- Electrifying sophomore **David Wilson**, from nearby Danville, Va., is seeing the field this year both in the backfield and on kickoff returns. Wilson was clocked at a blistering 4.29 in the 40-yard dash in this past spring in testing and on media day he did eight consecutive standing back flips in 2009.

- This year, he topped himself with 10 consecutive standing backflips. He told reporters he taught himself the flips when he was just 4 years old after watching gymnastics on television. Wilson wore a shirt and tie to school every day his senior year of high school and continues to do so for classes at Tech.

- This year, he opened up the second half with a 92-yard kickoff return for a score at NC State, had a 68-yard TD run against Central

Michigan and had a 65-yard touchdown catch and run against Duke. He gave Tech the lead for good against Georgia Tech with a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.

- He has rushed for 490 yards and four touchdowns this season and has caught a touchdown pass, as well.

HISTORY OF VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

- Virginia Tech is in its 117th football season and has compiled a 677-430-46 (.607) all-time record in 1,153 games.
- Tech won its 650th game on Sept. 3, 2008, with a 20-17 win over Georgia Tech.
- The Hokies played their first football game on Oct. 21, 1892, with a 14-10 win over St. Albans in a game played on Tech's campus.
- Virginia Tech is 17th among Division I schools in terms of all-time wins (*see page 6*).
- The Hokies have compiled 12 10-win seasons, including six in a row and nine in the last 11 seasons.
- Tech has won conference football titles in the Southern Conference, the Big East Conference and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

HISTORY OF LANE STADIUM/WORSHAM FIELD

- Virginia Tech's on-campus home since 1965, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (66,233) is one of college football's most hostile venues.
- The Hokies have compiled an all-time record of 190-68-6 (.731) in 264 games at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Hokies are 116-31-1 (.788) at home under Frank Beamer and 98-17 (.826) at home since the start of the 1996 season.
- The stadium is named for the late Edward H. Lane, a graduate of the university and a former member of the Board of Visitors. Lane headed an educational foundation project which raised more than \$3 million for the original construction. Lane's personal donation was the first received by the fund.
- The field was officially dedicated on Sept. 5, 1992 in honor of Wes and Janet Worsham, longtime Hokie supporters from Kilmarnock, Va. The Worshams pledged \$1 million to the university's Second Century Campaign. The Campaign raised over \$18.6 million, almost \$1.7 million more than the original goal.
- Lane Stadium has been sold out for 80 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The original cost of the stadium was \$3.5 million with an original capacity of 40,000.
- The first game played in the new stadium was a freshman game on Sept. 24, 1965, an 8-8 tie between Tech and Maryland. The first varsity game was played a week later, on Oct. 2 with the Hokies beating William & Mary 9-7.

ALL-TIME BLACKSBURG RECORD

- In addition to its impressive record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (1965-present), Virginia Tech has made Blacksburg a very difficult place to play for opposing football teams.
- Tech has compiled a 350-99-13 (.772) record in 462 games in Blacksburg.
- Virginia Tech's first game on campus was its first game ever played, a 14-10 win over St. Albans on Oct. 21, 1892. The game was played on an open field behind the Barracks No. 1 (Lane Hall) on the northeast side of campus.
- A small, ungraded area near the present Memorial Chapel was assigned for both athletic and military drill use in 1894 and was known as Sheib Field, where Tech went 13-1 (.929). The area was enlarged in 1902 and became known as Gibboney Field, where the Hokies posted a 19-2 (.905) record.
- In 1909 the area was graded and leveled, the grandstand enlarged, and the name changed to Miles Field, where the Hokies went 60-3-3 (.932). Miles Field was used for football, baseball, and track until Miles Stadium was completed in 1926. Tech called Miles Stadium home from 1926-64, posting a 67-25-4 (.719) record.
- Miles Stadium was razed following the 1964 football season and was superseded by the present Lane Stadium.



THE GAME ON RADIO

• Tech's games can be heard throughout Virginia and much of the mid-Atlantic region on the Virginia Tech ISP Sports Network.

• Some of the region's most powerful radio stations combine to give Virginia Tech tremendous exposure throughout Virginia, Maryland, and Washington, D.C., and in parts of Tennessee, West Virginia, North Carolina, Kentucky, Delaware, and Pennsylvania.

• Eight-time Virginia SportsCaster of the Year Bill Roth (play-by-play), Hokies Hall of Famer Mike Burnop (analyst) and Adam Witten (scoreboard anchor) comprise Virginia Tech football's on-air broadcast crew.

• The 2010 season marks Roth and Burnop's 23rd season together in the Virginia Tech radio booth.

• Coverage begins 90 minutes prior to kickoff with the NTELOS Pre-Game Report. The Kroger Point After is a 90-minute post-game scoreboard and interview program. Every game will be broadcast live on XM Satellite with the home team radio feed.

BEAMERBALL

• During the **Frank Beamer** era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offense, the defense and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

• Seven of Tech's last 10 teams are ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 34 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 128 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 111 in Tech's past 215 games.

• Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 81 TDs, with 53 coming on pass interceptions, 26 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 47 TDs, including 16 on blocked punts, 18 on punt returns, eight on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

• Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was the first of many scored by the special teams.

• Under Beamer, 79 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Twenty-three of those players scored twice while Eddie Royal,

Xavier Adibi, Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall had seven.

• Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 73-13 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams. Tech is 77-23 under Beamer when scoring a non-offensive touchdown.

BEAMERBALL II

• Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama.

• Tech now has 126 blocks in **Frank Beamer's** 292 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 62 punts (16 returned or recovered for TDs), 38 field goals and 26 extra points.

• The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham (7 kicks) and safety Keion Carpenter (6 kicks). Basham blocked three field goals and four PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

• During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 22 times, winning 16 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.
