THE SERIES

- Saturday's football game between Virginia Tech and the University of Virginia will be the 93rd gridiron meeting between the two schools. Tech holds a 50-37-5 edge in the rivalry, which has seen the Hokies win the last seven games, 11 of the last 12 games and 14 of the past 18 contests.

- The series began in 1895 with Virginia winning 38-0. UVa went on to win the first eight meetings between the two schools and built a 20-13-4 advantage in the series by 1953.

- Beginning with the '53 season, Tech bounced back to win 10 of the next 11 meetings and take the lead in the series.

- During Frank Beamer's tenure as Tech's head coach, the Hokies lead 15-9 after winning 37-7 last year at home.

- From 1923-35, the two met 13 times as members of the Southern Conference with Tech holding a 7-3-3 advantage.

HOKIES

STRONG IN THE ACC, ON THE ROAD AND IN NOVEMBER

- Virginia Tech is an impressive 52-11 in ACC games (26-5 in ACC road games) since joining the league in 2004.

- The Hokies have won a school- and ACC-record 12 consecutive true road games, the longest active streak in the country, ahead of Oregon (11).

- Tech has posted a 26-2 record in November (24-2 in ACC games) since 2004.

FOR ALL THE MARBLES

- This year's game is arguably the biggest in series history as the winner clinches the ACC's Coastal Division and advances to face Clemson in the ACC title game next Saturday in Charlotte. In 2007, the same setup was in place as Tech came in at 9-2, 6-1 and ranked eighth while UVa was 9-2, 6-1 and ranked 16th.

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COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Senior wide receiver Jarrett Boykin caught a career-high 10 passes against North Carolina.
- 9 Nine Virginia Tech players have intercepted passes this season.
- 8 Tech is the only team among FBS teams to have won 10 games each of the last eight seasons (including 2011).
- 7 The Hokies have won their last seven football meetings against the University of Virginia.
- 6 Virginia Tech ranks sixth nationally in average time of possession at 34:11 per game.
- 5 Junior tailback David Wilson is fifth nationally in all-purpose yards with an average of 175 per game.
- 4 Quarterback Logan Thomas' 180 pass completions so far this season currently rank as the fourth-best single-season total in school history.
- 3 A Virginia Tech tight end has caught a touchdown pass in each of the Hokies' last three games.
- 2 Tech is trying to win 11 games during the regular season for just the second time in school football history.
- 1 Frank Beamer is currently the winningest active head coach in the FBS ranks.



COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 184-57 record over the past 18-plus seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 25th year as the head football coach at Tech and 31st overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 208-96-2 record and sits with an overall record of 250-119-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 18 consecutive bowl appearances, four ACC titles, four ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999, and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors. Beamer returned to his alma mater in December of 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 65-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Virginia Tech and now the associate head coach/running backs coach at Virginia Tech; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He has two grandchildren, Sutton and Olivia, daughters of Shane and his wife, Emily.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

Beamer, who is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 250 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is eighth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all-time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

• **Frank Beamer**, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.

• With the dismissal of Penn State's Joe Paterno, none of the 120 active Division I-A head football coaches has been at his current school consecutively longer than Beamer.

THE STORIED LUNCH PAIL

♦ Taken with the Hokies wherever they go is the storied lunch pail. The Pail served as the inspiration for Tech's record-setting 1995 defense, symbolizing Tech's blue collar approach to defensive football. Every year since, a member of the defense has been responsible for toting a new Pail.

♦ Coach Rod Sharpless, then the co-defensive coordinator along with Bud Foster, brought a lunch pail back from New Jersey and they decided that it would become the symbol of the 1995 defense. Sharpless' mother-in-law found the now famous original lunch pail in Mercerville, N.J., where it had belonged to a coal miner.

♦ The players put the unit goals, weekly goals, the keys to success for the week and a signed mission statement before the season in the Pail ... plus the turf from road wins.

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy!
Tech! Tech! V.P.I.!
Sola-Rex Sola-Rah
Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!!
Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech's trio of tailbacks combined for all five touchdowns as the Hokies beat in-state rival Virginia 37-7 at a packed Lane Stadium/Worsham Field to become the first ACC football team since 2000 to finish regular-season play with an unblemished league record.

After a scoreless first quarter, tailback Ryan Williams followed an Eddie Whitley interception with a 5-yard touchdown run to get Tech started. Running mate David Wilson followed with a 20-yard TD reception from Tyrod Taylor less than five minutes later as the Hokies built a 17-0 halftime advantage.

Williams and Darren Evans posted third-quarter touchdown runs and then Wilson ran 2 yards for a score in the fourth quarter as Tech put the finishing touches on an 8-0 record in ACC play.

Defensively, the Hokies held the Cavaliers on a first-and-one at the Tech 14, collected a sack on another fourth-down try at the Tech 30 and foiled a fake punt on a fourth-and-two play in Virginia territory. The Cavs finished with 70 yards on the ground and 291 overall, while converting just one of 12 third-down opportunities.

Game Notes

- The Hokies scored on all six of their trips into the red zone, including five touchdowns.

- Chris Hazley extended his season record streak of consecutive field goals made to 19 with a 40-yarder against Virginia.

- Tyrod Taylor became the school's all-time leader in passing yards on a 25-yard toss to Jarrett Boykin in the third quarter. Taylor also tossed his 20th touchdown pass of the season to become just the third quarterback in school history to throw 20 or more TD passes in a season, joining Maurice DeShazo (22 in 1993) and Bryan Randall (21 in 2004).

- Tech's 8-0 record in ACC play makes them the first team to finish undefeated in conference play since Florida State in 2000.

BLACKSBURG – Virginia Tech scored on its first offensive play to set the tone for an impressive 66-13 season-opening victory over Appalachian State before a sold out crowd at Lane Stadium-Worsham Field to start head coach Frank Beamer's 25th season off with a bang.

The Hokies scored 38 first-half points on the way to their most points in an opening game since scoring 86 points against Roanoke College in 1905. Tailback David Wilson rushed for 162 yards and three touchdowns, while receiver Marcus Davis hauled in three passes for 140 yards and two scores. Quarterbacks Logan Thomas and Mark Leal both tossed a pair of touchdown passes as Tech piled up 518 yards of offense.

Tech's defense picked off three passes, while the special teams blocked a punt for a touchdown and averaged over 30 yards a return on both kickoffs and punts.

Game Notes

- The win snapped a three-game Virginia Tech losing streak in season openers.

- Tech's 66 points were the most in a game for the Hokies since posting 77 points in a 1995 game against Akron and the most in a season opener since 1905.

- Seven players made their first career starts: Scott Demler (P), Tariq Edwards (LB), Derrick Hopkins (DT), Cody Journell (PK), Andrew Miller (C), Joey Phillips (FB) and Logan Thomas (QB).

- Kyle Fuller became the 81st different player under head coach Frank Beamer to score a touchdown on defense or special teams with his blocked punt recovery in the end zone.

GREENVILLE, N.C. - Virginia Tech engineered a 13-play, 89-yard touchdown drive in the final quarter to post a hard-earned 17-10 road win at East Carolina University. The win gave Coach Frank Beamer his 200th victory at Tech.

The gritty performance included a sterling outing by the Hokies' defensive unit, which held the offensive-minded Pirates to minus-15 yards rushing and just 127 yards through the air. Tech limited ECU to just 18 total yards during the decisive fourth quarter.

The Hokies had to weather 12 penalties during the contest, including two that erased Tech interceptions. ECU led 7-3 at the half before a 1-yard plunge by senior tailback Josh Oglesby put the Hokies up 10-7 in the third quarter. The Pirates knotted the score on Mike Barbour's 48-yard field goal at the 5:40 mark of the quarter.

Tech rode the legs of Oglesby and starting tailback David Wilson in the fourth quarter. Wilson, who finished with 138 yards on 26 carries, accounted for 53 yards on the final drive, while Oglesby provided 18 yards, including the last 10 for the deciding touchdown. The Hokies finished the game with 241 yards on the ground.

The Hokies registered nine tackles for loss in the win, including five sacks. ECU managed to convert just three of 12 third-down plays into first downs.

Game Notes

• The win was Tech's eighth in its last nine meetings with East Carolina. The victory also gave the Hokies their first 2-0 start since 2006.

• Sophomore cornerback Kyle Fuller posted his first collegiate pass interception in the game. Fuller also contributed four tackles, two of which were for losses, and broke up a pass in the win.

• Senior split end Jarrett Boykin caught four passes in the game, becoming the Hokies' all-time pass receptions leader in the process. The four grabs gave Boykin 129 career catches, surpassing former leader Ernest Wilford, who had 126.

• Senior cornerback Cris Hill led the Tech defense with a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss.

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech secured its first 3-0 start since 2006 with a hard-earned 26-7 victory over Arkansas State at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

The Red Wolves stunned the Hokies early with a 51-yard pass to the Tech 18 on their opening offensive snap. Two plays later, the visitors were sitting on a 7-0 lead barely four minutes into the game. Tech responded by marching from its 16 to the ASU 7 on three plays only to be stopped in its tracks on two snaps from the 1.

The Red Wolves' momentum disappeared in a flash, however, when cornerback Kyle Fuller sacked ASU quarterback Ryan Aplin in the end zone giving the Hokies a safety. After Arkansas State kicked the ball back to Tech, it took just five plays for the Hokies to take the lead on a 49-yard scoring pass from Logan Thomas to D.J. Coles.

Tech built a 23-7 halftime margin and held ASU to just 104 total yards over the final two quarters of play. The Hokies finished the game with 427 yards of offense with Thomas accounting for 320 yards, including 292 through the air. Receiver Danny Coale, who caught five passes for 112 yards during the first quarter, ended the day with a career-best seven receptions good for 128 yards and one touchdown.

Jayron Hosley contributed seven tackles, two interceptions and broke up two more passes, while linebacker Tariq Edwards led the team in tackles with 10, including 2.5 for losses.

Game Notes

• Senior receiver Dyrrell Roberts broke his left arm on the opening kickoff. Roberts would be eligible for a medical redshirt if he chooses to return.

• D.J. Coles recorded his first collegiate touchdown with a 49-yard TD catch in the game. Coles had a career-high 61 yards receiving in the game.

• Jayron Hosley picked up his 10th and 11th career interceptions against the Red Wolves, moving into a tie for ninth in all-time picks by a Tech player.

• Jarrett Boykin moved into second place in all-time receiving yards at Tech during the game. Boykin's 29 yards gave him 2,216, surpassing Antonio Freeman's 2,207 yards. Ricky Scales currently owns the top spot with 2,272 yards.

• Linebacker Tariq Edwards posted a career-high 10 tackles, including 2.5 for loss.

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. - A

balanced offensive attack combined with another solid defensive performance lifted Virginia Tech to a 30-10 road win at Marshall University as the Hokies improved to 4-0 on the season. The game marked Tech's first visit to Huntington since 1940.

Offensively, Tech posted 215 yards and four touchdowns on the ground, while accumulating 229 yards on a 22-for-33 day passing from quarterback Logan Thomas. Thomas also contributed the first rushing touchdown of the day, a 5-yarder that started the visitors to a 23-10 halftime advantage. Tailbacks David Wilson and Josh Oglesby played big roles in the win with Wilson contributing 132 yards and a TD and Oglesby chipping in 75 yards and TD runs of 4 and 5 yards.

Tech out-gained the Thundering Herd 444 yards to 251 and allowed the home team to capitalize on just 3 of 15 third-down conversion attempts. The Hokies' defense chalked up five sacks and nine total tackles behind the line resulting in 43 yards lost on the way to limiting Marshall to just 6 yards rushing. Ends James Gayle (7 tackles, 3 TFL) and J.R. Collins (5 tackles, 2.5 sacks) were among the leaders for Tech.

Game Notes

• Tech head coach Frank Beamer, making his first trip to Huntington as a player or coach, visited the Marshall University Memorial at Spring Hill Cemetery prior to the game to honor former Tech players Frank Loria and Rick Tolley and the 75 people who perished in the Marshall plane crash on Nov. 14 1970. Beamer started along side of Loria in the Virginia Tech secondary during the 1966 and 1967 seasons.

• D.J. Coles and Danny Coale combined for 15 of Tech's 22 pass receptions during the game. Coles had a career-high eight grabs, while Coale tied a personal-best with seven.

• Tailback David Wilson posted his third 100 yard-plus rushing game of the season, picking up 132 yards on 26 carries. Running mate Josh Oglesby had his second two-touchdown outing of the year.

BLACKSBURG - The 13th-ranked Clemson Tigers snapped Virginia Tech's 14-game winning streak in regular season games and handed the Hokies their worst home loss since 2005 with a 23-3 decision at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field on a cold and windy night in Blacksburg.

The Tigers took advantage of a 34-yard kickoff return by Jaron Brown coupled with a 15-yard personal foul penalty by the Hokies to break a 3-3 tie in the waning minutes of the first half. Starting their drive at the Tech 48, the Tigers drove for a touchdown that gave them the lead for good, converting two key third-down plays along the way.

Tech failed to capitalize on some early opportunities, and once Clemson built a lead the Tigers wouldn't let the Hokies back in the game. The visitors closed the game out with pair of second-half touchdowns.

The Hokies got 123 yards rushing from tailback David Wilson on the way to out-rushing Clemson 133-119, but Tech was out-gained in overall yards 323-258.

Tech's three points were the fewest in a game since 2006 when the Hokies lost at Boston College 22-3.

The last time Tech had lost by 20 points or more at home was in a 27-7 loss to No. 5 Miami in 2005.

Game Notes

• When Clemson scored a field goal after recovering a David Wilson fumble, it marked the first points given up this season by Tech's defense after a turnover. It came on the eighth turnover of the season by the Hokies' offense.

• The loss was the first in an ACC opener for the Hokies. Tech had won their opening league game in each of the previous seven seasons since joining the league in 2004.

• The game was the 300th game at Virginia Tech for head coach Frank Beamer.

• In Tech's 208-game scoring streak dating back to 1995, the Hokies' have failed to score 14 points or more points just nine times following the loss to CU.

• The last time Tech failed to score a touchdown at home was in 1995, a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati.

BLACKSBURG - Quarterback Logan Thomas passed for three touchdowns and ran for two more as Virginia Tech rallied in the final minutes to post a dramatic 38-35 victory over Miami at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Tech held the lead the majority of the game before the Hurricanes scored three fourth-quarter touchdowns to slip ahead 35-31 with just 2:51 left on the clock. Thomas answered by guiding the Hokies 77 yards in just under two minutes for what proved to be the winning touchdown. The redshirt sophomore did the honors with a 19-yard touchdown run on a fourth-and-one play. He finished the game by completing 23 of 25 passes for 310 yards.

Miami finished with 519 yards of offense but the Hokies were able to hold them off over the final 47 seconds. The Hokies, who compiled 482 yards, got 128 yards rushing from junior David Wilson, his fifth 100-yard game in six games.

Game Notes

- With seven catches for 120 yards, Jarrett Boykin became the Hokies' all-time leader in receiving yards with 2,356. He move past former record holder Ricky Scales (2,272). Boykin was already Tech's career record holder in receptions with 143.
- Logan Thomas hit 23 of 25 for a 92 percent completion percentage, the highest of any quarterback under head coach Frank Beamer (minimum 20 attempts).
- True freshman defensive tackle Corey Marshall made his first collegiate start in the game. He became the first true freshman to start at defensive tackle since Jonathan Lewis started the last three games of the 2002 season.
- Tech failed to intercept a pass, snapping its streak of 12 consecutive games with a pick.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Virginia Tech spotted Wake Forest a 10-0 first-quarter lead, then ran off 28 unanswered points on the way to a 38-17 ACC road win. The victory was Tech's fifth consecutive win in its series with the Demon Deacons.

Tech was out-gained 138 yards to 8 yards during the first quarter and did not manage a first down.

Quarterback Logan Thomas got the Hokies going in the second quarter, running for two touchdowns and passing for another. Thomas capped an 80-yard drive with a 20-yard pass to senior Jarrett Boykin to put Tech on top 14-10 with just under five minutes in the half.

The game turned on a Tariq Edwards interception at the Wake 26 with just 30 seconds showing in the half. Thomas moved the Hokies to the Wake Forest 3-yard line, where he scored on a keeper with just four seconds left. Tech then moved 80 yards for a score on the first possession of the second half and the Deacons could never get back in the game.

Thomas finished with 280 yards and two touchdowns passing to go with his two rushing scores, while the defense registered four sacks and held Wake to just one third-down conversion on 13 attempts.

Game Notes

- Tailback David Wilson rushed for 138 yards and a TD against the Deacons. It was his sixth 100-yard game in seven games this season.
- Tech is now 12-0 in ACC regular-season games played in the state of North Carolina. The Hokies also defeated Florida State in Charlotte in last season's ACC Championship game, which does not count as a league contest.
- The Hokies defense posted nine tackles for losses totaling 52 yards. That total included four quarterback sacks.
- Jarrett Boykin turned in his ninth career 100-yard receiving game with seven catches for 149 yards.

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech scored touchdowns on its first three possessions of the second half to shake off an unproductive first half and a determined Boston College team with a 30-14 conference victory on Homecoming.

A 9-yard Virginia Tech punt set Boston College up at the Hokies' 35-yard line during the first two minutes of the game and the Eagles needed just three plays to turn the opportunity into a 7-0 lead. The visitors forced Tech to punt on five of its seven first-half possessions and held a 7-6 advantage at the half after two Cody Journell field goals.

Quarterback Logan Thomas and the Hokies got rolling in the second half with touchdown drives of 60, 89 and 56 yards for a 27-7 lead early in the final quarter. Thomas accounted for two of the scores with a 20-yard pass to Marcus Davis and a 1-yard plunge. Tailback David Wilson ran 42-yards for a score while posting 134 yards on the ground.

A pass interception by Tech linebacker Tariq Edwards at the Hokies' 11 at the 7:51 mark of the third quarter proved to be a pivotal play in the game and set up a seven-play, 89-yard TD drive.

Game Notes

• Junior whip linebacker Alonzo Tweedy and freshman cornerback Detrick Bonner both made their first collegiate starts in the game with Boston College.

• Receiver Danny Coale turned in a career-high eight catches for 118 yards against the Eagles. His performance moved him into second place all-time at Tech in pass receiving yards with 2,319. He passed Antonio Freeman and Ricky Scales on the list and trails only teammate Jarrett Boykin (2,541 yds).

• Logan Thomas became the first quarterback under Frank Beamer to pass for 260 yards or more in three consecutive games. Thomas had 268 yards versus BC.

DURHAM, N.C. - Virginia Tech relied on some gritty defensive play to overcome a lack-luster offensive performance and a determined upset bid by Duke University to earn a 14-10 ACC road win at Wallace Wade Stadium.

Tech had to work hard for its points, mounting 85- and 90-yard touchdown drives in the first half for a 14-7 advantage at the intermission. The Hokies had to work even harder after the intermission to keep the Blue Devils out of the end zone. Duke ran 27 of its 35 second-half offensive snaps in Tech territory, including 20 plays inside the 30-yard line. The result was just three points.

The Hokies' Kyle Fuller stopped a fourth-and-two Blue Devil run at the Tech 18 with 4:37 left and then senior linebacker Barquell Rivers intercepted a pass at the host's 40 to ensure the win with 48 seconds remaining. Fuller finished the game with eight tackles — including a sack and another TFL — three pass breakups and a fumble recovery.

The Tech offense piled up 433 yards of offense with tailback David Wilson accounting for 148 yards on the ground. Wilson's running mate, Josh Oglesby, collected the Hokies' only rushing TD with a 1-yard run in the second quarter.

Game Notes

• The win was the Hokies' 11th-straight regular-season road win, setting school and ACC records. Tech won 10 consecutive regular-season road games starting with a victory at Wake Forest in 2004 and ending with a loss at Georgia Tech in 2006.

• Starting tight end Chris Drager caught a career-high four passes in the game, while his top backup, Eric Martin hauled in his first collegiate touchdown pass, a 2-yard toss from Logan Thomas.

• The victory gave Tech eight wins for the 14th straight season, the longest active streak in the nation among FBS teams.

• Cornerback Cris Hill and linebacker Barquell Rivers, two of only three seniors on Tech's defensive dress squad, posted their first collegiate pass interceptions during the win over the Blue Devils.

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech avoided a disastrous start and an even more disastrous finish on the way to its 10th victory of the season, a 24-21 Coastal Division decision over North Carolina in an ESPN Thursday night battle at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

North Carolina forced a fumble with a sack on Tech's first offensive play and needed just three plays to turn it into a 7-0 lead. The Tar Heels found themselves knocking on the door again a short time later with a first-and-goal at the Tech 5. This time, the Hokies held, forcing a fumble that proved to be the turning point in the game.

Tech proceeded to march 95 yards on 18 plays in a touchdown drive that lasted a second shy of eight minutes. The drive keyed a two-quarter spurt that produced 24 unanswered points and appeared to put the Hokies in control. The fourth quarter, however, proved otherwise. UNC quarterback Bryn Renner tossed two TD passes in less than five minutes to cut the Hokies' lead to three points with 2:32 remaining. A failed on-side kick gave Tech the opportunity to run the clock down to three seconds before surrendering the ball back to the Tar Heels.

Quarterback Logan Thomas accounted for all three Tech TDs, passing for two and running 23 yards up the middle for the other.

Game Notes

- The win gave Tech 10 victories for the eighth consecutive season, the longest active streak in the nation among FBS teams.

- Senior receiver Jarrett Boykin caught a personal-best 10 passes in the game for 103 yards. He is the first Tech receiver to catch 10 or more passes in a game since Nick Cullen grabbed 13 receptions against Southern Miss in 1990.

- With the win, Coach Frank Beamer moved past Lou Holtz for seventh place on the all-time FBS wins list with 250.

- Tailback David Wilson saw his streak of seven straight 100-yard rushing games snapped. Wilson was held to 82 yards on 21 carries.

♦ Just like this year, the 2007 game was played in Charlottesville. The Hokies won that game 33-21 and went on to beat Boston College in the ACC Championship Game one week later.

COMMONWEALTH CUP

♦ The winner of the annual gridiron clash between Virginia Tech and the University of Virginia earns more than bragging rights in the state. In recent years, the winning team has also taken home the Commonwealth Cup.

♦ The Cup, now residing in Blacksburg, was created in 1996 by the universities to remain in the possession of the winner of the in-state rivalry each year.

♦ The Commonwealth Cup, made of marble and cherry wood, is four feet high and weighs more than 100 pounds. The top of the Cup is silver-plated with the names of the two schools. The scores of all 92 games in the Tech-Virginia rivalry are engraved on the sides. A map of the Commonwealth of Virginia with Blacksburg and Charlottesville marked with stars has been etched on the front of the trophy, which was produced by Josten's.

♦ Virginia Tech gained possession of the Cup first by defeating arch-rival Virginia, 27-9, at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field in 1996.

TEN WINS ... ONCE AGAIN

♦ With the win over North Carolina last week, the Hokies picked up their 10th win of the season. It marked the eighth straight season Tech has won 10 games or more, the longest active streak in the FBS and ties for the third-longest in modern NCAA history.

♦ Virginia Tech has won 10 or more games 11 times over the past 13 seasons and 13 of the past 16 seasons.

ALL OF LYNCHBURG WILL BE WATCHING

♦ This year's Battle for the Commonwealth Cup will be a special one for the city of Lynchburg as both teams' starting quarterback hails from the Hill City. Tech's **Logan Thomas** (Brookville HS) and UVA's **Michael Rocco** (Liberty Christian Academy) will square off Saturday in a battle for bragging rights.

♦ The two are part of a group of six starting ACC quarterbacks who hail from Virginia: Florida State's E.J. Manuel, UNC's Bryn Renner, NC State's Mike Glennon and Clemson's Tajh Boyd.

DRAGER COMING UP BIG

♦ Tight end **Chris Drager** caught his second career touchdown pass in the second quarter against UNC, his second-straight game with a scoring grab. It marked the third-

straight game a Tech tight end has caught a touchdown pass (Eric Martin at Duke, Drager last week and this week).

♦ Drager has 11 catches this season and all 11 have gone for a first down or a touchdown.

BOYKIN AND COALE CHASING RECORDS

♦ **Jarrett Boykin** had career-high 10 catches last week, going for 106 yards. He is the first Tech player to catch 10 or more passes in a game since Nick Cullen had 13 against Southern Miss in 1990. It's only the second time under Beamer that a receiver had 10 or more receptions in a game. Boykin now has 629 yards receiving this year. With 171 more yards, he will become just the fourth player in ACC history to have three seasons with 800 receiving yards. The three who have done it are: Clarkston Hines, Peter Warrick and Calvin Johnson.

♦ Boykin now has 50 catches for the season, six away from breaking the school record for catches in a season (55 by Ernest Wilford; 2005).

♦ He also has 17 career touchdown receptions, the fourth-most in school history. He trails only Antonio Freeman (23), André Davis (20) and Ricky Scales (18).

♦ Senior receiver **Danny Coale** (48 catches for 761 yards) is on the cusp of breaking the school's single-season receptions and receiving yards records. He needs eight catches to break the record of 55 set by Ernest Wilford in 2005, and he needs 202 yards to break the record of 962 set by André Davis in 1999.

THOMAS THE TANK

♦ **Logan Thomas** scored on a 23-yard rush early in the third quarter of last week's game against North Carolina, his ninth of the year. It set a new record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback under head

coach Frank Beamer. Michael Vick had nine in both 1999 and 2000, but one came in the bowl game each year before the NCAA counted bowl stats, so he officially had eight scores.

♦ Thomas is now tied for second all-time at Tech with Bob Schweickert (9 in 1964) and sits behind Bruce Arians, who had 11 rushing touchdowns in 1974. Arians is now the offensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

♦ Thomas has been almost automatic in short-yardage sneak rushes, using his 6-6, 254-pound frame to his advantage, but he's also lowered his shoulder numerous times this season to run over and through a defender.

SENIORS GOING FOR THE RECORD

♦ This group of seniors has a chance to finish with the best record of any class in school history. That honor currently belongs to the Class of 2007, which went 42-11.

♦ The Class of 2008 went 42-12 and the Class of 2010 went 42-13. This senior class is currently 41-11 heading into this week's game at Virginia.

THOMAS ON QUITE A ROLL

♦ Since Tech lost to Clemson 23-3 on Oct. 1, quarterback **Logan Thomas** has accounted for 20 TDs (12 pass/8 run) and thrown just two interceptions as the Hokies have gone on a six-game winning streak.

MORE ON TECH-UVA

♦ This year's senior class is 3-0 against Virginia and with a win, the Hokies would have an eight-game winning streak against the Cavs, adding on to the longest winning streak all-time for the Hokies in the series. Virginia's longest winning streak in the series is eight games (1895-1904).

♦ The Hokies have actually fared better on the road than at home over the past nine



seasons against the Cavaliers. In the four games at Scott Stadium since 2003, the Hokies averaged 40.5 points per game, while in five games at Lane Stadium since 2003, Tech averaged just 23.8 points per game.

♦ The 1998 game marked the 80th meeting between Virginia Tech and Virginia. That made the UVa series the longest-standing football series in Tech history, surpassing the 79-game VMI-Virginia Tech series, which ended in 1984.

♦ Virginia Tech has outrushed Virginia in 31 of their last 39 meetings, while the Cavaliers have posted more passing yards than the Hokies in 14 of the last 27 games in the series.

♦ In the past five games, the score at halftime has usually been pretty close, but each of those games saw the Hokies pull away for the win.

♦ In 2009, Ryan Williams ran for 183 yards and four touchdowns in the win as the Hokies scores 28 points in the second half to pull away.

♦ In 2008, UVa actually led 14-7 at the half behind converted quarterback Vic Hall, who had two rushing touchdowns. But Tech scored on a Greg Boone rushing touchdown in the third quarter and Dustin Keys won it with a 28-yard field goal with 6:37 left. Tech quarterback Tyrod Taylor had 137 yards rushing (including a 73-yard run in the third quarter) and 137 yards passing.

♦ In the 2007 win by Tech, Branden Ore had 147 yards rushing, while Eddie Royal had 147 yards receiving.

♦ The 17-0 shutout of the Cavaliers in 2006 was the first in the series by either team since UVa blanked Tech 38-0 in 1991.

♦ Tech's 52 points scored in the 2005 game were the most scored by either team ever in the series. It marked the first time since 2002

that the Hokies had two 100-yard rushers in a game. Branden Ore ran for 115 yards on 15 carries against the Cavaliers, while senior starter Cedric Humes added 113 yards on 17 attempts. It marked the 28th time since 1962 that a pair of Tech backs had accomplished the feat and the fourth time it was done against Virginia.

♦ In 2004's game, the 0-0 halftime tie was the first game Virginia Tech had played where neither team scored in the first half since a 1990 game at Georgia Tech.

ODDS AND ENDS

♦ Tech has won 14 of the last 18 games, including the last seven.

♦ The two teams have played every year since 1970.

♦ From 1923-35, the two met 13 times as members of the Southern Conference with Virginia Tech holding a 7-3-3 advantage.

THE NEW GUY

♦ New quarterback **Logan Thomas** may be the tallest starting QB in school history, but he certainly has some shoes to fill in replacing four-year starter and 2010 ACC Player of the Year Tyrod Taylor. All Taylor did in four years was lead Tech to three ACC titles, set a school record for wins by a quarterback (34), as well as marks in total offense, passing yards and many more.

♦ But after a breakout spring, the 6-6, 254-pounder who wears a size 17 or 18 shoe depending on the make (17 cleat; 18 regular shoe), is poised to pick up where Taylor left off.

♦ Thomas saw sparse action on the field last year, but did haul in a 2-yard touchdown pass against Wake Forest and delivered a key 24-yard completion on a third-and-16 play to Danny Coale on a touchdown drive in the 31-17 win at Miami.

♦ The redshirt sophomore was recruited as a tight end, but quickly was moved to quarterback and began the process of being groomed for this season. He's had plenty of hype around him already, appearing as one of

the "10 Things We Learned This Spring" in Stewart Mandel's column on SI.com, saying Thomas is "a physical specimen with all the tools to be a big-time college quarterback."

♦ Thomas was a standout basketball player at Brookville High and received scholarship offers to play basketball at JMU, Duquesne, Liberty, Akron, Richmond and Tulane but he decided to focus on football. He's also an avid golfer who likes to hit the links whenever he has free time.

♦ Thomas already has two fourth-quarter, game-winning touchdown drives (East Carolina, Miami). He completed 23 of 25 passes for 310 yards and three scores along with two rushing scores to lead the Hokies back to the win over Miami. His completion percentage of 92 percent in that game is a single-game record under head coach Frank Beamer (min. 20 attempts).

♦ For the year, he has thrown for 2,338 yards and 16 touchdowns, completing 60.4 percent of his passes, and has rushed for nine more touchdowns.

the backs. He is back after tearing his ACL in the North Carolina game last year. **Dominique Patterson** was a star in high school and makes the move to the offense after working at linebacker, while freshman **Michael Holmes** is considered a bright star of the future for Tech.

WILSON TAKES OVER

♦ Electrifying junior **David Wilson**, from nearby Danville, Va., takes over as the No. 1 tailback, while also holding down the kickoff return duties. Wilson has been clocked at a blistering 4.29 in the 40-yard dash and his flair for the outrageous has made him a media favorite. He did eight consecutive standing back flips at the 2009 Media Day and topped himself in 2010 with 10 consecutive standing back flips. He told reporters he taught himself the flips when he was just 4 years old after watching gymnastics on television. Wilson wore a shirt and tie to school every day his senior year of high school and continues to dress up for classes at Tech.

♦ Last year, he opened up the second half with a 92-yard kickoff return for a score at NC State, had a 68-yard touchdown run against Central Michigan and had a 65-yard touchdown catch and run against Duke. He gave Tech the lead for good against Georgia Tech with a 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.

♦ He rushed for 619 yards and five touchdowns last season, returned two kickoffs for touchdowns and caught four touchdown passes, as well. He opened 2011 with 162 yards rushing and three touchdowns with 15 broken tackles against Appalachian State.

♦ Wilson says he wears No. 4 in honor of his mother, Shelia, who was born on April 4 (4/4) and because it's her favorite number.

♦ He also contributes on the Virginia Tech track & field team, finishing second at the ACC indoor meet in the triple jump this past February in contributing to Tech's team

RUSHING = OUTCOME?

♦ Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (306 games), the Hokies are 182-33-2 when outrushing their opponents, 25-63 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.

♦ In Tech's current 18-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 162-18 when outrushing its opponents, 21-38 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.

♦ In its current 18-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 108-7 when rushing for 200 yards or more, including 7-0 in 2005.

♦ Since the start of the 1999 season, Tech is 117-11 when outrushing its opponent and 14-26 when being outrushed.

♦ Wilson won the triple jump at the prestigious Penn Relays and earned All-America honors at the 2011 NCAA Outdoor National Championships in the triple jump by placing sixth. He became just the third Tech football player to earn All-America honors in track. Dennis Scott (lettered in football from 1976-78) finished fifth in the 60-yard dash at the 1978 NCAA indoor meet and Kenny Lewis (lettered in football from 1976-79) finished third in the 60-yard hurdles at the 1980 NCAA indoor meet.

♦ Wilson is the first Tech football player to qualify for NCAA Nationals with the Hokie track team since André Davis, who was a wide receiver, qualified in 1999 in the 100- and 200-meter dashes for the outdoor meet and in the 2000 indoor 60- and 200-meter dashes.

♦ Wilson's car matches his demeanor: flashy and stylish. While at home last winter, he spotted a 1978 Ford Thunderbird sitting in a backyard and decided to go knock on the stranger's front door. He left with the car after negotiating a deal to buy it for \$2,000. Wilson then proceeded to add around \$7,000 in enhancements, including ostrich skin vinyl interior, a new paint job to make it burnt orange, 24-inch rims, new tires and a customized stereo system.

♦ This season, he leads the team and is third nationally with 1,442 yards rushing, an average of 131.1 yards per game, which is fourth in the nation. He also has seven rushing scores.

ATHLETICS RUNS IN THE FAMILY

♦ **Danny Coale** comes from quite the athletic family. His brother, Kevin, played midfield for the University of Virginia men's

lacrosse team. Their father, Jimmy, is the head strength and conditioning coach at Virginia Military Institute (VMI).

♦ **Danny**, who was a first-team all-state lacrosse player in high school, set Tech's freshman reception record with 36 catches and has caught at least two passes in 42 of 52 career games played, and caught at least one pass in 48 of 52 contests.

♦ He had his longest, and most important, catch in the final minutes of the Nebraska game in 2009, breaking free down the sideline for an 81-yard catch to set up the game-winning touchdown pass with 21 seconds left.

♦ He had a career day against Florida State in the 2010 ACC Championship Game when he had six catches for a career-high 143 yards in the win.

♦ Coale averaged 18.8 yards per catch last season, 11th-best in the FBS, and has a career average of 16.4 yards per catch. The senior enters this week's game with 153 career receptions for 2,515 yards and seven

touchdowns. His 153 receptions and his 2,515 yards are both the second-best in school history, trailing Jarrett Boykin in both.

♦ This past spring, he surged unexpectedly to the top of the punter depth charge and could be called on this year as the backup. He punted in high school, but hadn't since then until he punted twice at Marshall and this year. So far, Coale has contributed as a receiver, punter and punt return man this season.

BIG-PLAY BOYKIN

♦ Senior **Jarrett Boykin** became a big-play receiver for the Hokies last year and uses his big hands to help with snagging passes. Boykin's hands are so large that he has to wear size-3X receiver's gloves.

♦ Last season, he had a team-leading 53 receptions for 847 yards and six touchdown receptions. He has 18 career total touchdowns, including a rushing touchdown when he pounced on a fumble in the end zone against Virginia in 2009. He is one of only five Tech players ever to register 2,000 yards or more receiving and has 17 touchdown receptions. He is the school's leader in career receptions with 173 and career receiving yards with 2,752.

♦ Boykin has caught at least two passes in 41 of 51 career games played, and caught at least one pass in 47 of 51 contests.

HOSLEY TO THE HOUSE

♦ Junior **Jayron Hosley** was the last player to verbal to Tech before signing day in 2009 after getting a late offer from the Hokies. He quickly made a name for himself on the college level as a true freshman, mainly as a punt returner with an average of 11.2 yards per return. He had a 64-yard return for a score against Marshall, becoming the first freshman under head coach Frank Beamer to return a punt for a score.

♦ Last year, he made his impact on defense and was named first-team All-ACC, as well as a first-team All-American by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and a second-teamer by the Associated Press. He had a nation-leading nine interceptions - including three at NC State - to tie the school record for picks in a season.

♦ Against Central Michigan, he broke free on a punt return, taking it back 80 yards for his second career punt return touchdown.

♦ Hosley was named a preseason All-American by *Playboy*, *SI.com* and *Sporting News* prior to this season and flew to California in July to film a segment for ESPN Sport Science. This year he has three interceptions and has 12 for his career, tied for seventh-most in school history.

♦ The speedy Hosley is from Delray Beach, Fla., where he attended Atlantic High School, the same high school as two former Hokies who play(ed) in the NFL - Brandon Flowers (Chiefs) and David Clowney (Jets/Panthers).

A REWARD FOR GOOD GRADES

♦ The Tech football team eats its meals in order of grade-point average range. Those players who have graduated, as well as those players who maintain the highest grade-point average, eat all team meals first. Coach Beamer invites each player to eat, calling out his name and his GPS range, starting with the highest.

ATHLETIC OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

♦ This year's offensive line is another athletic one as two starters began their collegiate careers at tight end. Starters **Greg Nosal** (left guard) and **Andrew Lanier** (left tackle) came to Blacksburg as tight ends before making the move to the interior line.

♦ Duane Brown made the same move early in his career and was a first-round draft pick of

the Houston Texans in 2008 and is in his third year as a starter. Brandon Frye did the same and started at tackle for the Seattle Seahawks before getting injured in 2009. Ed Wang also came in as a tight end and moved to tackle early on in his career. He was drafted by Buffalo in 2010 and played for the Bills last season.

♦ Sophomore **Andrew Miller** has taken over as the center and while he didn't start as a tight end, he's athletic in his own right. The Bassett, Va., native was a standout wrestler in high school and has competed for the Hokies' nationally ranked wrestling squad. Miller was a two-time Virginia Group AA state champion and was the No. 3-ranked heavyweight by *W.I.N. Magazine* following his senior year. He was also a first-team all-state selection in football.

THE DEFENSIVE QUARTERBACK

♦ Senior **Eddie Whitley** is the master of all trades in the defensive backfield for the Hokies, as he's spent time at cornerback, outside linebacker, rover and took over the starting job at free safety last year. He took the reigns from

three-year starter Kam Chancellor, who was drafted by Seattle in 2010 and is now starting for the Seahawks. In preseason, he switched up to the rover spot and **Antone Exum** moved to free safety, but both can play either position.

• Whitley, a North Carolina native, is an avid chess player, who's been playing since he was 4 years old. He plays online, in the locker room, on his computer and even on his iPhone.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

• Defensive tackles **Antoine** and **Derrick Hopkins** are just one of several Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program.

• Redshirt juniors **Vinston Painter** and **Randall Dunn** are cousins.

• So are redshirt sophomore **Logan Thomas** and redshirt freshman **Zack McCray**, as are redshirt senior **Jaymes Brooks** and redshirt sophomore **Telvion Clark**.

• Linebacker **Tariq Edwards** is the son of former Hokie football player Bo Campbell, who lettered from 1989-92. **George George III** is a walk-on whose father, George, was on the Tech team in the 1970s.

• Back-up center **Bo Gentry** is the son of Tech's Assistant A.D. for Athletic Performance, Dr. Mike Gentry. **Martin Scales** is the cousin of former Hokies Orion and Cam Martin.

• There are seven players on the team with brothers who either are playing or did play at Virginia Tech. The **Hopkins Brothers (Antoine and Derrick)** started up front along the defensive line the first five games until Antoine was hurt. **Wiley Brown** is the younger brother of former defensive end Nekos Brown and **David Wang** is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang. Redshirt freshman lineman **Mark Shuman** is the younger brother of former starting center and current weight room G.A. Ryan Shuman.

• **Kyle Fuller** is a sophomore defensive back who played last year as a true freshman. He is joined on the team by his brother, **Corey Fuller**, who ran track at Kansas for two seasons before transferring to Tech last year. Both are younger brothers of former Hokie Vincent Fuller, who played six seasons with the Tennessee Titans and is now with Detroit.

TECH'S KICKING TRADITION

• For the first time in five seasons, Tech will not be relying on a senior walk-on for the kicking duties. In 2006, Brandon Pace went 18-for-19 on field goals en route to second-team All-ACC honors. In 2007, it was Jud Dunlevy, who went 21-for-26 on the season.

• In 2008, Dustin Keys set a school record with 23 made field goals. In 2009, it was Matt Waldron's turn and he responded by making 20-of-23 field goals and scoring 108 points en route to first-team All-ACC honors.

• And last year, Chris Hazley picked up where the others left off, hitting 21-of-22 field goals, including a school-record (for a single season) 21 in a row.

• The last four were one-year wonders, each winning the job in their final season, and each going on to score over 100 points. The previous five seasons, the five kickers combined to make 103 of 119 field-goal attempts (86.6 percent) and produce 525 points with two earning All-ACC honors.

• This year, it's **Cody Journell**'s time to shine. He's taken a different route as he was a scholarship signee in February of 2009 and redshirted before serving as a backup last year.

• He is a local product who hails from Ripplemead, about 30 minutes from campus. He came in with impressive credentials after earning prep All-America honors coming out of nearby Giles High School.

• After redshirting as a freshman in 2009, Journell was slowed by a hip flexor in last year's spring drills and never could make a serious run for the job. But this year, he had a breakout spring to earn the top spot.

• Journell is the first Tech principal placekicker to sign an NLI and come in on scholarship since Shayne Graham signed with the Hokies in 1996 and went on to earn first-team All-Big East Conference honors in all four seasons as Tech's kicker before going on to a standout NFL career.

• Journell is also the first non-senior to be Tech's kicker since Pace was the starter as a junior in 2005.

• Journell is 12-for-15 on the season on field goals and 37-for-38 on extra points.

• Senior kickoff specialist **Justin Myer** has a cannon of a leg, but isn't as accurate or consistent as Journell, and could be called on for some attempts of 50 yards or longer.

FROM THE BEACH TO THE MOUNTAINS

♦ Junior linebacker **Bruce Taylor** was thrust into the starting lineup last year after 2009's starter, **Barquell Rivers**, tore a quad tendon while lifting in spring of 2010. Last season, he led the team with 91 tackles, including 15.5 for loss.

♦ While productive on the field, Taylor also helps out with the Special Olympics of Southwest Virginia off the field.

♦ Taylor, Tech's leading tackler this season, was lost for the season after suffering a Lisfranc sprain in his left foot against Boston College and having surgery the following week.

BACK AND FORTH AND BACK AGAIN

♦ For senior **Chris Drager**, it's been a nomad's journey at Virginia Tech. He arrived at Tech in 2007 and saw the field as a true freshman helping out on special teams and at tight end. He suffered a season-ending knee injury while making a 9-yard reception against William & Mary and received a medical hardship waiver.

♦ As a redshirt freshman in 2008, he again played a lot of special teams and contributed at tight end, catching three passes. After a breakout spring season in 2009, he was moved

to defensive end, a position he hadn't played since high school. He had to learn on the fly in preseason practices and ended up recording 22 tackles, including 6.5 for loss with 2.5 sacks in 2009. Last year, he started 11 games and collected 34 tackles, including six for loss and two sacks, as he started to flourish at the position.

♦ Now, the senior is back as the starting tight end, making the move selflessly to help the team. He has just 16 catches for 208 yards and two scores for his career, but was moved because of a lack of experience at the position.

♦ The Pennsylvania native got his bachelor's degree in human nutrition, foods and exercise in December of 2009, needing just three years to do so. He then started the research component of his master's degree last spring and began master's classes in the fall. He finished the class part of his master's program this past summer and now just has to write his thesis, which should take all of this school year and will hopefully graduate next spring.

♦ Drager had a 3.83 grade-point average as an undergraduate and has over a 3.9 GPA in grad school. He's doing his thesis on the effects of docosahexaenoic acid, an omega-3 fatty acid,

played in the NFL for the Minnesota Vikings and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

♦ Carroll sent out around 70 tapes to different colleges in hopes of catching someone's eye. Upon seeing the video, Tech coach Frank Beamer asked him to come down for a visit and eventually offered him a scholarship - a rarity for long snappers coming out of high school.

♦ The aspiring journalist, who cut several videos for Tech's website this preseason and is a regular contributor to the school newspaper, has handled punt, field goal and extra point snaps for the Hokies during his career. He's made 474 snaps in his career with just two unusable snaps (1 punt and 1 FG in the 2009 Miami game in the rain).

IT'S WILEY BROWN TIME

♦ Walk-on whip linebacker **Wiley Brown** is the son of Chuck Brown a famous songwriter and performer who is known as the "Godfather of Go-Go" music. The elder Brown had the No. 1 national R&B hit in "Bustin' Loose" in 1978. The hook from that song was used by Nelly in the 2002 No. 1 hit "Hot in Herre."

♦ The elder Brown turned 76 in August, and in 2009, to honor him, the city of Washington, D.C., designated the portion of Seventh Street NW from T Street to Florida Avenue as Chuck Brown Way.

♦ Wiley is the younger brother of Nekos, who started at defensive end in 2009. He played at Duquesne before transferring in and sitting out in 2009. He was a special teams demon, recording 13 special teams tackles for the year and a forced fumble in the Orange Bowl on kickoff coverage

CONSTANT ON THE SIDELINES

♦ Long-time equipment manager **Lester Karlin** and Assistant to the Head Coach **Billy Hite** are both in their 34th seasons on the Tech staff and have been on the sideline for 409 consecutive Tech games.

TAKING CARE OF WALK-ONS

♦ Former walk-on John Engelberger was a starter for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, and John Burke played in the Super Bowl with the New England Patriots in 1987. Cody Grimm went from a walk-on, to a starter, to an All-American, and finally to an NFL Draft pick of Tampa Bay in 2009.

♦ Current Tech walk-ons who have earned scholarships include **Jack Tyler**, **Justin Myer**, **Joey Phillips**, **Martin Scales** and **Corey Fuller**.

♦ Grimm and Will Montgomery (C, Washington Redskins) are both former Hokie walk-ons *who started* in the NFL this year.

GIVE IT TO BROOKS

♦ Offensive guard **Jaymes Brooks** is making his living as a third-year starter at offensive guard, but the senior also is proud that he scored a touchdown on a run from the fullback position in his last high school game.

♦ The Newport News, Va., native also excelled in another sport, winning the Virginia Group AAA state indoor track & field shot put title as a sophomore and finishing second in both the shot put and discus at the State Outdoor Track & Field Championship meet his senior year.

♦ Brooks, who was born in Zweibrucken, Germany, was thrust into the limelight for the Orange Bowl two seasons ago when the starter was ruled ineligible. He responded with a solid game in the win and has started every game since, a streak of 39 contests.

BOOK END TACKLE

♦ Senior offensive tackle **Blake DeChristopher** anchors a senior-laden offensive line, one that has combined to make 153 career starts, third-most in the ACC. The four seniors alone have combined to start 139 games for the Hokies up front.

♦ DeChristopher, who is in his fourth year as a starter, has started 48 games and has a chance to reach the rare 50-game mark this season.

♦ An intimidating presence at 6-5, 311 pounds, DeChristopher proudly carries around a full beard and shaggy hair, but is also a beast in the weight room. He has graded out at 91 percent for the season with a team-high 102 knockdown blocks.

GIVING THEM HIS FINGER

♦ No one can accuse offensive guard **Greg Nosal** of being soft after his performance against CMU last year. The senior got his pinkie finger stuck in the facemask of a defender, ripping the fleshy tip of the finger off. After the trainers fished it out of his glove, they put the digit on ice and wrapped up Nosal so he could finish the game.

♦ Finally, he went into the training room late in the game after the pain medicine wore off to get the tip sewn back on, but he played two quarters with 9 ¹/₂ fingers.

♦ Nosal's father, Greg, was promoted in 2009 to Rear Admiral in the U.S. Navy and works at the Pentagon. The younger Nosal has lived all over the country, taking residence in Virginia Beach twice, Jacksonville twice, Washington, D.C. twice and Honolulu once, moving six times total.

♦ The senior duo of **Jarrett Boykin** and **Danny Coale** have been a productive group for the Hokies over the past four seasons. Coale is best remembered for his 81-yard catch against Nebraska in the waning moments to set up **Dyrell Roberts'** 11-yard touchdown catch in the 16-15 win. Boykin's 39-yard catch-and-run for a score gave the Hokies the lead for good in the 40-31 win at NC State last year, the biggest comeback under head coach Frank Beamer. They are the top two at Tech in both all-time receptions and receiving yards.

♦ Roberts, a senior, broke his arm in the Arkansas State game and is eligible to come back next year.

HOP AND SKIP

♦ Defensive tackles **Antoine Hopkins** and **Derrick Hopkins** started beside each other on the defensive line this year for the first five games before Antoine tore his ACL in the loss to Clemson.

♦ Antoine, known as "Hop," switched from No. 98 to No. 56 last year, a number he wore in high school. Derrick, the sophomore known as "Skip," had a tremendous spring session and will again be wearing Antoine's old No. 98. The two have a younger brother nicknamed "Jump" to complete the trio.

♦ The last brothers to play side-by-side for the Hokies were Blake and Brett Warren at linebacker in the mid 2000s.

♦ Other notable brother combinations starting together on the same side of the ball were Orion and Cam Martin (defensive end and whip linebacker, respectively) in the late 2000s; Kevin and Jonathan Lewis, starting defensive tackles side-by-side in 2002, and offensive linemen T.J. (RT) and Todd (LG) Washington in 1996.

THE FREAK

♦ Junior wide receiver **Marcus Davis** is poised to have a major impact on the offense this year after finally settling in at the position.

♦ At 6-foot-4 and 230 pounds, the freakishly athletic Davis runs a 4.37-second 40-yard dash and set a Tech program record with a 44-inch vertical jump in the spring, making him a big target for **Logan Thomas** to find anywhere, but particularly on jump ball situations in the end zone.

♦ In the summer of 2010, Davis worked on his catching skills by catching 100 balls a day. Many of those balls were caught with tennis balls taped to the palms of his hands to make him catch the ball with his fingertips.

♦ Davis came to Tech as a quarterback, but quickly switched to wide receiver. But he hurt his right shoulder just four practices into the 2008 preseason camp and underwent surgery. After taking a redshirt year, he was moved back to quarterback the next spring, but was moved back out wide with just a week left in the spring and has been a permanent resident of the receiving corps since.

♦ His first college reception was an 80-yard touchdown catch in 2009 against Boston College. Against Appalachian State, he hauled in three passes for 140 yards and two touchdowns.

ONE LAST SHOT

♦ Senior linebacker **Barquell Rivers** has seen the highs and lows of college football and now is trying to go out on top.

♦ In his first college start, Rivers made a big late-game fourth-down stop at the goal line to help preserve the Hokies' 2009 Orange Bowl victory over Cincinnati. The next season, in his first year as the starting mike linebacker, Rivers was second on the team with 96 tackles. But in the first week of March, 2010, it all changed. While working out in the Merryman Center weight room tore the quadriceps tendon in his left leg while power cleaning 351 pounds.

♦ Following surgery, recovery and rehabilitation time was scheduled as five to six months. He returned to practice in early October, but developed patella tendinitis and was shut back down. He worked his way back to play on the kickoff team in the Orange Bowl against Stanford and is coming off a nice spring session.

♦ Rivers, who has already graduated, will see his role expand now that starter Bruce Taylor is out for the rest of the season following surgery to his foot. In his first start since 2009, Rivers posted five tackles and sealed the win with an interception on the final Duke drive to preserve a 14-10 victory.

During Bud Foster's 216-game tenure as defensive/co-defensive coordinator, Tech has ...

- ♦ had 45 different defensive players score touchdowns.
- ♦ held opponents to an average of 106.6 yards rushing and 16.4 points per game.
- ♦ been nationally ranked in the top five of a major defensive category 35 times.
- ♦ had at least one defensive player earn All-America honors from some publication in all 16 seasons. Four players gained A-A recognition in 1999 and three were honored in 2001.
- ♦ produced six first-team All-Americans and 11 others who have earned second- or third-team All-America honors from one of the recognized groups.
- ♦ had 34 players drafted by NFL teams.
- ♦ produced its first Lombardi Award winner and its first Nagurski Trophy winner in Corey Moore.
- ♦ produced two BIG EAST defensive players of the year – Corey Moore, who earned the honor in both 1998 and 1999, and Cornell Brown, who won it in 1995.
- ♦ featured 10 players who have recorded nine or more interceptions in their career.

During Bryan Stinespring's 132-game tenure as offensive coordinator, Tech has ...

- ♦ won 101 games and averaged 367.8 yards of total offense.
- ♦ averaged 30.3 points per game, finishing first or second in the ACC in scoring offense in five of seven seasons.
- ♦ finished with six of its top nine all-time teams in both total offense and total points.
- ♦ had 18 players drafted and 33 players total sign with NFL teams.
- ♦ had five players earn All-Big East honors, including one repeat performer, and 23 who won All-ACC honors, with five repeat picks.
- ♦ produced a Rimington Trophy winner and unanimous All-American in Jake Grove.
- ♦ produced the ACC Player of the Year and Offensive Player of the Year for 2004 (Bryan Randall) and 2010 (Tyrod Taylor), and the 2009 ACC Rookie of the Year (Ryan Williams).

♦ Head coach Frank Beamer, who wore No. 25 when he played at Tech in the 1960s, is in his 25th season at the helm of the Hokies.

♦ During Beamer's time in Blacksburg, the other 11 ACC programs have employed a combined 51 head coaches.

♦ Stanford has had eight head coaches over the past 25 years, the most among the 67 programs (six major conferences plus Notre Dame) with automatic BCS qualifying privileges.

♦ Five of his nine assistant coaches, plus three of the four GAs, played for him either at Murray State (Bud Foster, Charley Wiles) or Virginia Tech (Shane Beamer, Cornell Brown, Torrian Gray, plus GAs John Candelas, Jimmy Martin and Orion Martin).

ANOTHER TOUGH BREAK

♦ Senior wide receiver **Dyrell Roberts** was looking to return to form this fall after having emergency surgery last fall following a game. Roberts, a speedster who was one of the top kickoff return men in 2009, was hit on the thigh on a return in the Georgia Tech game last year.

♦ After the game, it was bruised, but nothing out of the ordinary. As the night went on and the pain increased, he was finally rushed to Montgomery Regional Hospital and had a series of surgeries over the next week to relieve pressure in his thigh from compartment syndrome. Without the surgeries, he could've suffered permanent muscle damage.

♦ Roberts missed the rest of the season and practiced sparingly in the spring, but returned this fall and broke the school record for career kickoff return yards with a 25-yarder against Appalachian State. But against Arkansas State, he suffered another tough injury on a kickoff return when he broke his left arm on the opening return. He had surgery the next day and is likely out for the rest of the year, but is eligible to return next year as he hasn't redshirted yet.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

♦ Offensive guard **David Wang** comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.

♦ David had surgery on his shoulder during preseason and redshirted in 2009 before seeing the field in five games last year as the top backup at left guard. He was the top backup at right guard before fracturing his right foot against East Carolina and will be out until at least November.

♦ He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history in April of 2010 by

HISTORY OF VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

- Virginia Tech is in its 118th football season and has compiled a 689-432-46 all-time record in 1,167 games.
- Tech won its 650th game on Sept. 3, 2008, with a 20-17 win over Georgia Tech.
- The Hokies played their first football game on Oct. 21, 1892, with a 14-10 win over St. Albans in a game played on Tech's campus.
- Virginia Tech is 16th among Division I schools in terms of all-time wins.
- The Hokies have compiled 14 10-win seasons, including eight in a row and 11 in the last 13 seasons.
- Tech has won conference football titles in the Southern Conference, the Big East Conference and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

HISTORY OF LANE STADIUM/WORSHAM FIELD

- Virginia Tech's on-campus home since 1965, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (66,233) is one of college football's most hostile venues.
- The Hokies have compiled an all-time record of 196-69-6 in 270 games at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Hokies are 122-32-1 at home under Frank Beamer and 104-18 at home since the start of the 1996 season.
- The stadium is named for the late Edward H. Lane, a graduate of the university and a former member of the Board of Visitors. Lane headed an educational foundation project which raised more than \$3 million for the original construction. Lane's personal donation was the first received by the fund.
- The field was officially dedicated on Sept. 5, 1992 in honor of Wes and Janet Worsham, longtime Hokie supporters from Kilmarnock, Va. The Worshams pledged \$1 million to the university's Second Century Campaign. The Campaign raised over \$18.6 million, almost \$1.7 million more than the original goal.
- Lane Stadium has been sold out for 87 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The original cost of the stadium was \$3.5 million with an original capacity of 40,000.
- The first game played in the new stadium was a freshman game on Sept. 24, 1965, an 8-8 tie between Tech and Maryland. The first varsity game was played a week later, on Oct. 2 with the Hokies beating William & Mary 9-7.

ALL-TIME BLACKSBURG RECORD

- In addition to its impressive record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (1965-present), Virginia Tech has made Blacksburg a very difficult place to play for opposing football teams.
- Tech has compiled a 356-100-13 record in 469 games in Blacksburg.
- Virginia Tech's first game on campus was its first game ever played, a 14-10 win over St. Albans on Oct. 21, 1892. The game was played on an open field behind the Barracks No. 1 (Lane Hall) on the northeast side of campus.
- A small, ungraded area near the present Memorial Chapel was assigned for both athletic and military drill use in 1894 and was known as Sheib Field, where Tech went 13-1. The area was enlarged in 1902 and became known as Gibboney Field, where the Hokies posted a 19-2 record.
- In 1909 the area was graded and leveled, the grandstand enlarged, and the name changed to Miles Field, where the Hokies went 60-3-3. Miles Field was used for football, baseball, and track until Miles Stadium was completed in 1926. Tech called Miles Stadium home from 1926-64, posting a 67-25-4 record.
- Miles Stadium was razed following the 1964 football season and was superseded by the present Lane Stadium.

BEAMERBALL

• During the **Frank Beamer** era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offense, the defense and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

• Seven of Tech's last 10 teams are ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 35 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 130 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 113 in Tech's past 229 games.

• Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 82 TDs, with 54 coming on pass interceptions, 26 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 48 TDs, including 17 on blocked punts, 18 on punt returns, eight on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

• Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was the first of many scored by the special teams.

• Under Beamer, 81 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Twenty-three of those players scored twice while Eddie Royal,

Xavier Adibi, Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall had seven.

• Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 75-13 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams. Tech is 79-23 under Beamer when scoring a non-offensive touchdown.

BEAMERBALL II

• Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama.

• Tech now has 128 blocks in **Frank Beamer's** 306 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 63 punts (17 returned or recovered for TDs), 38 field goals and 27 extra points.

• The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham (7 kicks) and safety Keion Carpenter (6 kicks). Basham blocked three field goals and four PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

• During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 22 times, winning 16 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.
