
This will be the 10th meeting on the gridiron between @GTAthletics and @VT_Football. #VTGT

THE SERIES

• Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech will be meeting on the gridiron for the 10th time in a series that dates back to 1990. The Hokies lead the series 6-3 after beating the Yellow Jackets 37-26 last year in Atlanta. The Hokies have won four of the last five against Georgia Tech.

OF NOTE

• This is the first time since 2005 that the Hokies have opened the season with a conference game. Tech beat NC State 20-16 in Raleigh that year.

WINNER TAKE ALL?

- In each of the seven meetings between the two Techs since 2005, when the ACC began its league championship game, the winner went on to represent the Coastal Division in the ACC Championship Game.
 - In 2005, 2007, 2008, 2010 and 2011,



Virginia Tech beat Georgia Tech and went on to win the division, while in 2006 and 2009, Georgia Tech beat the Hokies and went on to win the division.

THE OPENING ACT

• The Hokies are 17-8 in season openers during Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach. Tech has won 17 of its past 23 opening-day games, including 12 of the past 16.

STRONG IN SEPTEMBER

• Tech has a 64-10 mark in September dating back to the start of its bowl streak in the 1993 season, including a 25-5 mark over the past six seasons (2005-2011).

BATTLE OF THE TECHS

• Virginia Tech and Georgia Tech are two of just four schools in the FBS that go with "Tech" in their school name (Louisiana Tech, Texas Tech).

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Virginia Tech is the only FBS team to win 10 or more games in each of the last eight seasons.
- 9 The Hokies have failed to score in the first quarter of six of their nine games against Georgia Tech, including the last four in a row.
- 8 Virginia Tech has averaged eight wins per season during its 25 years under Frank Beamer.
- 7 Virginia Tech returns seven players who intercepted passes last season.
- The Hokies have won six of their eight meetings with Georgia Tech since joining the ACC.
- 5 Quarterback Logan Thomas accounted for five touchdowns (3 passing, 2 rushing) in last year's win at Georgia Tech.
- 4 There are only four seniors on Virginia Tech's entire 2012 defensive roster.
- 3 The four backs on the Hokies' two-deep roster at tailback and fullback have a combined three total career carries between them.
- 2 Hokies Bruce Taylor, James Gayle and J.R. Collins are all tied for second among active ACC players in career sacks with 11 each.
- 1 Since joining the ACC, Virginia Tech is 1-0 in season openers against league opponents, beating NC State 20-16 in 2005.



COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 185-59 record over the past 19 seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 26th year as the head football coach at Tech and 32nd overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 209-98-2 record and sits with an overall record of 251-121-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 19 consecutive bowl appearances, four ACC titles, five ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories, six BCS appearances and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999, and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors. Beamer returned to his alma mater in December of 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. The 65-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Virginia Tech and now the associate head coach/running backs coach at Virginia Tech; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He has two grandchildren, Sutton and Olivia, daughters of Shane and his wife, Emily.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

Beamer, who is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 251 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is eighth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all-time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

- Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.
- Not one of the 124 active Division I-A (FBS) head football coaches has been at his current school *consecutively* longer than Beamer (Nevada's Chris Ault is in his 28th season, but not consecutively).

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy! Tech! Tech! V.P.I.! Sola-Rex Sola-Rah Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!! Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its named to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

House of Horrors

- Lane Stadium has always been a difficult place for opponents to play and has been dubbed one of the best game-day environments in college football. Tech has a 52-9-1 record versus non-conference teams at home since the start of the 1991 season.
- Virginia Tech has posted a 196-69-6 overall record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.
- Tech is 122-32-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.
- Tech football teams are 356-100-13 all time in Blacksburg, including a 52-8 record since the start of the 2003 season.
- A large part of that impressive record is the home-field environment created by the fans as Lane Stadium has been sold out for 87 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The Hokies went unbeaten and untied in 2008 (6-0), 2000 (6-0), 1999 (6-0), 1996 (7-0), 1993 (6-0) 1980 (6-0), 1975 (5-0) and 1965 (3-0) at Lane Stadium. They went 4-0-1 in 1972 and 2-0-1 in 1966.

DOING GOOD DEEDS

- Head coach Frank Beamer is a strong believer in giving back to the community. He founded Herma's Readers in 2008 and this year, the team will help raise money for the Wounded Warrior Project. Additionally, the team has raised money in the past to help support Breast Cancer Awareness and Ewing's sarcoma cancer.
- Herma's Readers is a non-profit organization that promotes the power of reading and literacy to youngsters during their formative years, grades K-3. The organization was formed as a tribute to Tech head football coach Frank Beamer's late mother, Herma, a teacher for over 30 years in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Herma's Readers has delivered over 21,000 new and used books collected at Virginia Tech football games to youngsters throughout the Commonwealth. Currently, Coach Beamer's program has also dispersed more than \$80,000 for new book purchases for children. That is a total of more than 53,000 new and used books.
- The Hokies will wear a special white uniform against Austin Peay. The white helmets will feature turkey tracks on the helmet for the first time in school history and the baseball team will collect books outside the stadium before the game.
- The Virginia Tech football team will also raise money to support the Wounded Warrior Project through the sale of camouflage Virginia Tech hats and wristbands. The Wounded Warrior Project was created to raise awareness and enlist the public's aid as well as provide direct programs for the needs of injured service members.
- Coach Beamer invited Ben Kiernan, through the Wounded Warrior Project, to join the Virginia Tech Football team at spring football practice March 30, showing the team a mock-up of the camo helmet to be worn for the Sept. 22 game against Bowling Green. Kiernan was a 1371 Combat Engineer for the Marines when he was injured on Sept. 16, 2010 in Afghanistan as part of an ambush during Operation Enduring Freedom. Kiernan is a graduate of Virginia Tech, receiving a B.A. in Urban Affairs in 2008.
- As part of Military Appreciation Day, a check will be presented to the Wounded Warrior Project.

VT/GT **Series Results**



THOMAS THE TANK

- Quarterback **Logan Thomas** may be the tallest starting signal caller in school history, but he certainly had some shoes to fill in replacing four-year starter and 2010 ACC Player of the Year Tyrod Taylor last season. All Taylor did in four years was lead Tech to three ACC titles, set a school record for wins by a quarterback (34), as well as marks in total offense, passing yards and many more.
- Thomas showed last year he was more than up for the task, breaking Taylor's school record for total offense in a season with 3,482 yards. He also became just the second quarterback in school history to pass for over 3,000 yards in a season and tied the school mark for rushing touchdowns in a season by a quarterback with 11.
- After a breakout 2011 in which he earned second-team All-ACC honors, the 6-6, 254-pounder who wears a size 16 or 17 shoe depending on the make (17 cleat; 16 regular

shoe), is poised to pick up where he left off last season.

- The redshirt junior was recruited as a tight end, but was moved to quarterback just before his first preseason camp and began the process of being groomed for this season.
- Thomas was a standout basketball player at Brookville High and received scholarship offers to play basketball at JMU, Duquesne, Liberty, Akron, Richmond and Tulane but he decided to focus on football. He's also an avid golfer who likes to hit the links whenever he has free time.
- Thomas already has two fourth-quarter, game-winning touchdown drives (East Carolina, Miami). He completed 23 of 25 passes for 310 yards and three scores along with two rushing scores to lead the Hokies back to the win over Miami last year. His completion percentage of 92 percent in that game is a single-game record under head coach Frank Beamer (min. 20 attempts). For his career, he

has thrown for 3,120 yards and 19 touchdowns, completing 59.0 percent of his passes, and has rushed for 11 more touchdowns.

NEW FACES IN THE BACKFIELD

- While the Tech offense lost Ryan Williams and Darren Evans (2010) and David Wilson (2011) to the NFL over the past two years, the Hokies will still boast a talented arsenal under running backs coach **Shane Beamer**.
- Michael Holmes appears to be one of several who have a bright future for the Hokies. After redshirting last year, the Harrisonburg, Va., product put together a good spring session and preseason to earn the starting nod. True freshman J.C. Coleman, at only 5-8, entered Tech in January after graduating early and reaped the benefits of a spring practice. Martin Scales, a converted fullback, brings a bruising running style to the position and could see action in short-yardage situations.
 - Tony Gregory is perhaps the fastest of

all the backs when heatlhy, but he is returning after having a second surgery to repair an ACL injury. True freshman **Trey Edmunds**, son of former NFL Pro Bowler Farrell Edmonds, will begin his career at tailback and may redshirt this season, but could eventually also play linebacker for the Hokies.

A REWARD FOR GOOD GRADES

• The Tech football team eats its meals in order of grade-point average range. Those players who have graduated, as well as those players who maintain the highest grade-point average, eat all team meals first. Coach Beamer invites each player to eat, calling out his name and his GPS range, starting with the highest.

THE LEADER OF THE D-LINE

- Junior defensive end **James Gayle** had a breakout season at his defensive end position, earning All-ACC honors. He had 38 tackles, including 12.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks, along with 20 quarterback hurries last year.
- A physical monster, the 260-pound Hampton, Va., product posted a position-record 39.5-inch vertical and a 4.44 40-time this past offseason.
- Gayle didn't seriously take up the sport of football until his sophomore year at Bethel High in Hampton. And he didn't play that season because of a hamstring injury.
- But his late start hasn't hurt because of the good genes passed down to him. Gayle's dad, Jimmy, played running back at Ohio State from 1979-82, and was named the 1981 Liberty Bowl most outstanding player.
- His uncle, Shaun Gayle, played 12 seasons in the NFL (1984-95) and was a member of the Chicago Bears squad that won Super Bowl XX in 1985. He also owns the distinction of returning the shortest punt for a touchdown in NFL history, when he returned a punt 5 yards for a touchdown against the New York Giants in a 1985 divisional playoff victory.

RUSHING = OUTCOME?

- Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (309 games), the Hokies are 183-34-2 when outrushing their opponents, 25-64 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In Tech's current 19-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 163-19 when outrushing its opponents, 21-39 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In its current 19-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 108-7 when rushing for 200 yards or more.
- Since the start of the 1999 season, Tech is 118-12 when outrushing its opponent and 14-27 when being outrushed.

THE BIG MAN IN THE MIDDLE

- Junior Andrew Miller took over as the center last season and is the lone returning starter on this year's line. The Bassett, Va., native was a standout wrestler in high school and has competed for the Hokies' nationally ranked wrestling squad. Miller was a two-time Virginia Group AA state champion and was the No. 3-ranked heavyweight by W.I.N. Magazine following his senior year. He was also a first-team all-state selection in football.
- The Rimington Award candidate started all 14 games for the Hokies last year, playing over 900 offensive snaps.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

- Defensive tackles **Antoine** and **Derrick Hopkins** are just two of numerous Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program.
- Redshirt seniors **Vinston Painter** and **Randall Dunn** are cousins as are redshirt junior **Logan Thomas** and redshirt sophomore **Zack McCray**.
- Linebacker **Tariq Edwards** is the son of former Hokie football player Bo Campbell, who lettered from 1989-92. **George George III** is a walk-on whose father, George, was on the Tech team in the 1970s.
- Freshman **Alston Smith** is the son of former Hokie and NFL Hall of Famer Bruce Smith, while **Martin Scales** is the cousin of former Hokies Orion and Cam Martin.
- There are seven players on the team with brothers who either are playing or did play at Virginia Tech. The Hopkins Brothers (Antoine and Derrick) started up front along the defensive line the first five games last year until Antoine was hurt. David Wang is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang and redshirt sophomore lineman Mark Shuman is the younger brother of former starting center and current weight room assistant director Ryan Shuman. Additionally, redshirt freshman Ronny Vandyke is joined on the team this year by his brother, Devin Vandyke.
- Kyle Fuller is a junior defensive back who played last year as a true freshman. He is joined on the team by his brother, Corey Fuller, who ran track at Kansas for two seasons before transferring to Tech in 2010. Both are younger brothers of former Hokie Vincent Fuller, who played six seasons with the Tennessee Titans.
- True freshman Zach Snell is the son of former Hokie wide receiver Donald Wayne Snell (1984-86) and the nephew of former Hokie receiver Sidney Snell (1977-80). He is also the cousin of Tech freshman quarterback Brendan Motley. Freshman punter Hunter Windmuller is the nephew of the late Denny Windmuller, a defensive back for the Hokies who lettered in 1978 and 1979.

TECH'S KICKING TRADITION

- Junior Cody Journell is back after a solid 2011 campaign, one in which he bucked the recent Tech tradition of relying on senior walk-on kickers. Last season was the first time in five seasons, Tech didn't rely on a senior walk-on for the kicking duties. In 2006, Brandon Pace went 18-for-19 on field goals en route to second-team All-ACC honors. In 2007, it was Jud Dunlevy, who went 21-for-26 on the season. In 2008, Dustin Keys set a school record with 23 made field goals. In 2009, it was Matt Waldron's turn and he responded by making 20-of-23 field goals and scoring 108 points en route to first-team All-ACC honors.
- And in 2010, Chris Hazley picked up where the others left off, hitting 21-of-22 field goals, including a school-record (for a single season) 21 in a row.
- The last four were one-year wonders, each winning the job in their final season, and each going on to score over 100 points.
- Over the last six seasons, Tech's starting field goal kickers have combined to make 117 of 136 field-goal attempts (86 percent) and produce 600 points with three earning All-ACC honors.
- This year, **Cody Journell** held down the job. He took a different route as he was a scholarship signee in February of 2009 and redshirted before serving as a backup in 2010.
- He is a local product who hails from Ripplemead, about 30 minutes from campus. He came in with impressive credentials after earning prep All-America honors coming out of nearby Giles High School.
- After redshirting as a freshman in 2009, Journell was slowed by a hip flexor in the 2010 spring drills and never could make a serious run for the job. But after a strong spring, he earned the job last year and didn't look back en route to honorable mention All-ACC honors.

- Journell is the first Tech principal place-kicker to sign an NLI and come in on scholarship since Shayne Graham signed with the Hokies in 1996 and went on to earn first-team All-Big East Conference honors in all four seasons as Tech's kicker before going on to a standout NFL career.
- Journell was 14-for-17 last season on field goals (making his last 10 attempts) and 43-for-44 on extra points.

TAKING CARE OF WALK-ONS

- Former walk-on John Engelberger was a starter for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, and John Burke played in the Super Bowl with the New England Patriots in 1987. Cody Grimm went from a walk-on, to a starter, to an All-American, and finally to an NFL Draft pick of Tampa Bay in 2009.
- Current Tech walk-ons who have earned scholarships include Michael Branthover, Jack Tyler, Joey Phillips, Martin Scales and Corey Fuller.
- Grimm and Will Montgomery (C, Washington Redskins) are both former Hokie walk-ons *who started* in the NFL last year.

GETTIN' IT DONE IN THE CLASSROOM

- Of the 17 seniors on the 2012 roster, there are 13 Hokie graduates, with three others slated to graduate in December and one scheduled to graduate in May.
- Here's how the current seniors, listed alphabetically, stand: Nick Becton (graduated); Marcus Davis (graduated); Randall Dunn (graduated); George George (graduated); Jeron Gouevia-Winslow (graduated); Antoine Hopkins (graduated); Eric Martin (graduated); Vincent Painter (graduated); Joey Phillips (graduated); Dyrell Roberts (graduated); Bruce Taylor (graduated); Alonzo Tweedy (graduated); Michael Via (graduated).

- D.J. Coles, Corey Fuller and Martin Scales are on track to graduate this fall and Scott Demler is on track to graduate in the spring.
- Additionally, juniors Antone Exum and David Wang have graduated (business degrees in three years) to bring the total number of graduates on the roster to 15.
- In nine of the past 11 years, Tech has graduated at least 70 percent of its football class.

HOP AND SKIP

- Defensive tackles **Antoine Hopkins** and **Derrick Hopkins** started beside each other on the defensive line last year for the first five games before Antoine tore his ACL in the loss to Clemson. He's back and the two are reunited on the line.
- Antoine, known as "Hop," switched from No. 98 to No. 56 in 2010, a number he wore in high school. Derrick, the sophomore known as "Skip," will again be wearing Antoine's old No. 98. The two have a younger brother nicknamed

• Other notable brother combinations starting together on the same side of the ball were Orion and Cam Martin (defensive end and whip linebacker, respectively) in the late 2000s; Kevin and Jonathan Lewis, starting defensive tackles side-by-side in 2002, and offensive linemen T.J. (RT) and Todd (LG) Washington in 1996.

• Virginia Tech football has always prided itself on taking care of its players before, during and after their times in Blacksburg. A testament to the family atmosphere created is the roster of former Hokie players serving in some sort of capacity with the football team in the athletic department.

- During Beamer's time in Blacksburg, the other 11 ACC programs have employed a combined 52 head coaches.
- Stanford has had eight head coaches over the past 26 years, the most among the 67 programs (six major conferences plus Notre Dame) with automatic BCS qualifying privileges.
- Five of his nine assistant coaches, plus three of the four GAs, played for him either at Murray State (Bud Foster, Charley Wiles) or Virginia Tech (Shane Beamer, Cornell Brown, Torrian Gray, plus GAs John Candelas, Jimmy Martin and James Hopper).

THE FREAK

• Senior wide receiver **Marcus Davis** is poised to have a major impact on the offense this year after finally settling in at the position.

 At 6-foot-4 and 230 pounds, the freakishly athletic Davis runs a 4.37-second 40-yard dash and set a Tech program record with a 44-inch vertical jump in the spring, making him a big target for **Logan Thomas** to find anywhere, but particularly on jump ball situations in the end zone.

• In the summer of 2010, Davis worked on his catching skills by catching 100 balls a day. Many of those balls were caught with tennis balls taped to the palms of his hands to make him catch the ball with his fingertips.

• Davis came to Tech as a quarterback, but quickly switched to wide receiver. He hurt his right shoulder just four practices into the 2008 preseason camp and underwent surgery.

• After taking a redshirt year, he was moved back to quarterback the next spring, but was moved back out wide with just a week left in the spring and has been a permanent resident of the receiving corps since.

• His first college reception was an 80-yard touchdown catch in 2009 against Boston College. Against Virginia last season, he hauled in five passes for 119 yards and a touchdown as Tech clinched the ACC Coastal Division.

• For his career, he has caught 54 passes for 874 yards and eight touchdowns.

ONE MORE GO AT IT

• Senior wide receiver **Dyrell Roberts** is looking to return to form this fall after having season-ending injuries each of the past two seasons.

• Roberts, a speedster who was one of the top kickoff return men in 2009, was hit on the thigh on a return in the Georgia Tech game in 2010. After the game, it was bruised, but nothing out of the ordinary. As the night went on and the pain increased, he was finally rushed to Montgomery Regional Hospital and had a series of surgeries over the next week to relieve pressure in his thigh from compartment syndrome. Without the surgeries, he could've suffered permanent muscle damage.

 Roberts missed the rest of the season and practiced sparingly in the spring, but returned last fall and broke the school record for career kickoff return yards with a 25-yarder against Appalachian State.

- But against Arkansas State last year, he suffered another tough injury on a kickoff return when he broke his left arm on the opening return. He missed the rest of the season, but because he hadn't redshirted yet, he was eligible for a medical hardship waiver and returns this season.
- For his career, he has caught 63 passes for 965 yards and five touchdowns. His biggest is a sliding catch in the back of the end zone in 2009 against Nebraska with 21 seconds left to help clinch a big comeback victory.

BACK FROM LISTRANC SPRAINS

- Virginia Tech lost two starting linebackers last year to the rare Lisfranc foot sprains, but both are back this fall after recovering from surgeries. Outside linebacker Jeron Gouveia-Winslow hurt his foot against Miami and starting inside linebacker Bruce Taylor hurt his foot two weeks later against Boston College. This is the same injury that ended Houston Texans' quarterback Matt Leinert's season a year ago.
 - Taylor, a senior, was thrust into the

- starting lineup last year after 2009's starter, Barquell Rivers, tore a quad tendon while lifting in spring of 2010. In 2010, Taylor led the team with 91 tackles, including 15.5 for loss, and was leading the team again last year before suffering the injury.
- While productive on the field, Taylor also helps out with the Special Olympics of Southwest Virginia off the field.
- After a tough season in 2010 in his first year as a starter, Gouveia-Winslow seemed to turn the corner last year before his injury. The senior had nine tackles, including one for a loss and five quarterback hurries early on and recorded an interception.
- The biological son of former Redskin great Kurt Gouveia, Gouveia-Winslow had two interceptions in 2010, including one that he returned for the opening score in the ACC Championship Game win over Florida State.

• Exum is a big proponent of hot yoga and takes classes either in Blacksburg or back home in the Richmond area. He credits the classes with helping with his cardio, flexibility, loosening his hips and his core strength – all things vital to a successful cornerback.

PLAYING THROUGH THE PAIN

- Junior linebacker **Tariq Edwards** played through immense pain most of the second half of last season. The Cheraw, S.C., native underwent surgery after the season to put a rod in his left tibia to relieve pain from a stress fracture in his shin and missed spring practice.
- Even in pain, Edwards made a careerbest 71 tackles last season, including 11.5 tackles for a loss and 3.5 sacks, along with two interceptions as he started all 14 games at linebacker to help hold together a front seven riddled by injuries. He suffered the stress fracture late in the season and played through it in the Sugar Bowl.
- Edwards is the son of former Hokie receiver and punt returner Bo Campbell, who played for the Hokies from 1989-92. Campbell received the Long Distance AT&T Award for leading the country in average punt return yards (18.2 yds) in 1991, the fall after Tariq was born.

READY FOR ACTION

- Redshirt sophomore **Brent Benedict** is slated to take over at offensive guard this year and the Jacksonville, Fla., native is ready to roll after two long seasons.
- A highly ranked offensive line product at The Bolles School, Benedict was a *SuperPrep* All-American and was rated as the No. 76

- player in the country and the No. 12 offensive tackle in the country by Rivals. He missed some of his senior season with a knee injury, but still signed with the University of Georgia.
- He redshirted as a true freshman, while undergoing rehabilitation for a knee injury suffered in high school, but was still a recipient of the Walter C. Troutman Football Scholarship Endowment that year. He decided to transfer to Virginia Tech last summer and sat out last year due to NCAA transfer rules.
- Now three years removed from high school and a tough road to recovery from a knee injury, Benedict will see his first game action since 2009.
- Every time he takes the field, Benedict says he is playing for his brother, Heath, who died unexpectedly of an enlarged heart in March of 2008, just weeks before the NFL Draft. The older Benedict, also an offensive lineman, originally signed with the University of Tennessee, but transferred to Newberry (S.C.) College, where he was a two-time Little All-American. He was projected as a midrounder in the NFL Draft and was the first Division II player since 2004 to take part in the Senior Bowl.

A UNIQUE SUMMER SCHOOL EXPERIENCE

- Defensive tackle **Derrick Hopkins** and defensive end **Zack McCray** took part in a unique summer school experience this past summer, joining a group of Virginia Tech student-athletes in spending a portion of the summer in the Dominican Republic as part of a university-designed study abroad course about leadership and putting leadership initiatives into practice.
- For 10 days, the group visited poorer parts of the country to work with underprivileged

children and helped kids within different communities. The student-athletes also coordinated sports camps to expose kids there to different sports.

• Along with Hopkins and McCray, the group included volleyball players Liz Trinchere and Cara Baarendse, women's tennis player Carol Kahoun, women's track and field runner Madalyn Nuckols, women's swimmer Meaghan Holloway, women's soccer player Katie DeTuro, men's soccer player Nick Smirniotopolous and wrestling All-American Devin Carter.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

- Offensive guard David Wang comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.
- David had surgery on his shoulder during preseason and redshirted in 2009 before seeing the field in five games in 2010 as the top backup at left guard. He was the top backup at right guard last year before fracturing his right foot against East Carolina, causing him to miss the rest of the season. While laid up with the foot injury, the avid video gamer ascended to No. 35 in the world rankings for Call of Duty on the Xbox 360 console, playing 6-8 hours a day. He would only take breaks for schoolwork and "because I was hungry."
- After working hard in the offseason, the junior now takes over at left guard on an

inexperienced offensive line.

- He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history in April of 2010 by becoming the first Chinese American to be drafted by an NFL team when Buffalo took him in the fourth round. Ed signed with Oakland this past offseason. Ed and David were featured on NFL China in 2010 as a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football.
- Tech also holds the distinction of having the first Korean American drafted by an NFL team as Eugene Chung was taken by New England in the first round of the 1992 Draft.

THE COMPUTER GUY

- At 6-1, 300 pounds, senior defensive tackle **Antoine Hopkins** may be the biggest, yet athletic, computer guy out there. But he's proud of the fact and recently even started his own computer business, taking infected computers and cleaning off viruses, as well as performing other routine maintenance items on computers. Hopkins suffered a torn ACL last year early on and missed the rest of the season, but spent part of the fall working with the I.T. staff in the athletics department in his spare time, learning more about the industry.
- With his return to full speed this fall, he provides yet another big body in a deep defensive line that is expected to be a major force this season.

THE VERSATILE FULLER

- Junior cornerback **Kyle Fuller** may be one of the best corners in the country, but might also be one of the smallest outside linebackers in the country, as well.
- At 6-0, 181 pounds, Fuller can move between corner and Tech's nickel back, which essentially replaces the outside linebacker, in certain situations. As a true freshman, he started six games mostly in the nickel spot and recorded 32 tackles, including 4.0 for loss, with six pass break ups and a forced fumble. Last year, he flourished in the role as he led the team in tackles for loss last season with 14.5.He had 65 tackles, including 4.5 sacks, two interceptions, seven pass break ups, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He also pounced on a blocked punt in the end zone for a touchdown against Appalachian State.
- The Baltimore, Md., native is a strong open-field tackler with great closing speed. He made a game-saving tackle against Duke last year by stopping Blue Devils quarterback Sean Renfree for a loss on fourth down late in the fourth quarter when Duke was driving for a potential game-winning score.
- He was a second-team All-ACC selection at corner and had an interception of Michigan's Denard Robinson in the Sugar Rowl
- He is also a nominee for the Lott Trophy, given to the top defensive player who also embodies the integrity, character, academic accomplishments and community involvement associated with the Hall of Fame linebacker whose name is on the award.
- •This year, he will be the veteran in a strong, but young secondary as he tries to become the next great Virginia Tech cornerback. Virginia Tech has produced five All-America cornerbacks over the last nine seasons: DeAngelo Hall (2003), Jimmy Williams (2005), Brandon Flowers (2006 and 2007), Victor "Macho" Harris (2008) and Jayron Hosley (2010). Tech also has had at

They like to call themselves "D-Block" or "DBU" and there's no denying the recent success (1993-present) of Virginia Tech's defensive backs.

He joins 16 other defensive backs taken since 1999. Eight have gone in the first three rounds: Ike Charlton in 2000, Cory Bird in 2001, DeAngelo Hall in 2004, Eric Green in 2005, Jimmy Williams in 2006, Aaron Rouse in 2007, Brandon Flowers in 2008 and Hosley this past spring.

REPLACING BOYKIN AND COALE

- Virginia Tech is replacing wide receivers Jarrett Boykin and Danny Coale, the most productive duo in terms of receptions in ACC history. Boykin left Tech with a school-record 184 catches for a record 2,844 yards, while Coale was second in both categories with 165 catches for 2,658 yards. Together, they caught 349 passes for 5,502 yards and 26 touchdowns.
- Replacing them is a quartet of seniors in Dyrell Roberts, D.J. Coles, Marcus Davis and Corey Fuller, along with a gaggle of freshmen and sophomores.
- Roberts has had two season-ending injuries the past two seasons, both coming on kickoff returns, but is best remembered for his sliding, 11-yard touchdown catch in the back of the end zone with 21 seconds left to help

He is from Mississauga, Ontario and attended St. Marcellinus Secondary School through 10th grade before moving to Georgia ... Freshman punter A.J. Hughes played at the same high school as starting New York Giants punter Steve Weatherford, who was part of the Super Bowl Championship squad. Hughes was also a multiple-time state qualifier in the pole vault on the indoor and outdoor track & field squads ... Wide receiver E.L. Smiling's sister, Sheena Tosta, won a silver medal at the Beijing Olympics in the 400m hurdles ... Holder Trey Gresh started his own lawn cutting business when he was 15 ... Receiver Demitri Knowles was born and raised in the Bahamas.

HISTORY OF VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

- Virginia Tech is in its 119th football season and has compiled a 690-434-46 all-time record in 1,170 games.
- Tech won its 650th game on Sept. 3, 2008, with a 20-17 win over Georgia Tech.
- The Hokies played their first football game on Oct. 21, 1892, with a 14-10 win over St. Albans in a game played on Tech's campus.
- Virginia Tech is 16th among Division I schools in terms of all-time wins.
- The Hokies have compiled 14 10-win seasons, including eight in a row and 11 in the last 13 seasons.
- Tech has won conference football titles in the Southern Conference, the Big East Conference and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

HISTORY OF LANE STADIUM/WORSHAM FIELD

- Virginia Tech's on-campus home since 1965, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (65,632) is one of college football's most hostile venues.
- The Hokies have compiled an all-time record of 196-69-6 in 270 games at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Hokies are 122-32-1 at home under Frank Beamer and 104-18 at home since the start of the 1996 season.
- The stadium is named for the late Edward H. Lane, a graduate of the university and a former member of the Board of Visitors. Lane headed an educational foundation project which raised more than \$3 million for the original construction. Lane's personal donation was the first received by the fund.
- The field was officially dedicated on Sept. 5, 1992 in honor of Wes and Janet Worsham, longtime Hokie supporters from Kilmarnock, Va. The Worshams pledged \$1 million to the university's Second Century Campaign. The Campaign raised over \$18.6 million, almost \$1.7 million more than the original goal.
- \bullet Lane Stadium has been sold out for 87 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The original cost of the stadium was \$3.5 million with an original capacity of 40,000.
- The first game played in the new stadium was a freshman game on Sept. 24, 1965, an 8-8 tie between Tech and Maryland. The first varsity game was played a week later, on Oct. 2 with the Hokies beating William & Mary 9-7.

ALL-TIME BLACKSBURG RECORD

- In addition to its impressive record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (1965-present), Virginia Tech has made Blacksburg a very difficult place to play for opposing football teams.
- Tech has compiled a 356-100-13 record in 469 games in Blacksburg.
- Virginia Tech's first game on campus was its first game ever played, a 14-10 win over St. Albans on Oct. 21, 1892. The game was played on an open field behind the Barracks No. 1(Lane Hall) on the northeast side of campus.
- A small, ungraded area near the present Memorial Chapel was assigned for both athletic and military drill use in 1894 and was known as Sheib Field, where Tech went 13-1. The area was enlarged in 1902 and became known as Gibboney Field, where the Hokies posted a 19-2 record.
- In 1909 the area was graded and leveled, the grandstand enlarged, and the name changed to Miles Field, where the Hokies went 60-3-3. Miles Field was used for football, baseball, and track until Miles Stadium was completed in 1926. Tech called Miles Stadium home from 1926-64, posting a 67-25-4 record.
- \bullet Miles Stadium was razed following the 1964 football season and was superseded by the present Lane Stadium.

BEAMERBALL

- During the **Frank Beamer** era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort the offense, the defense and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.
- During Beamer's time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 35 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams.
- Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 130 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 113 in Tech's past 232 games.
- Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 82 TDs, with 54 coming on pass interceptions, 26 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 48 TDs, including 17 on blocked punts, 18 on punt returns, eight on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.
- Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was the first of many scored by the special teams.
- Under Beamer, 81 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Twenty-three of those players scored twice while Eddie Royal,

Xavier Adibi, Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall had seven.

• Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 75-13 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams. Tech is 79-23 under Beamer when scoring a non-offensive touchdown.

BEAMERBALL II

- Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall.
 It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama.
- Tech now has 128 blocks in **Frank Beamer**'s 309 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 63 punts (17 returned or recovered for TDs), 38 field goals and 27 extra points.
- The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham (7 kicks) and safety Keion Carpenter (6 kicks).
 Basham blocked three field goals and four PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.
- During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 22 times, winning 16 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.
