This will be the 20th meeting on the gridiron between @Duke_FB and @VT_Football, with the #Hokies leading 12-7. #DUKEvsVT

Saturday will be Homecoming for @VT_Football, where the Hokies are 61-19-4 all-time, including 38-7-2 at Lane Stadium.

Three of the last four games between @VT_Football and @Duke_FB have been decided by 11 points or less.

The #Hokies last Homecoming loss came in 1998 to Temple and Frank Beamer is 21-4 at Tech in Homecoming contests.

Tech is 6-0 against @Duke_FB in Blacksburg.

The #Hokies enter Saturday's game against Duke needing one win for 200 victories at Lane Stadium.

BLUE DEVILS

THE SERIES

- This will be the 20th football meeting between Virginia Tech and Duke University. Tech has won the last 11 meetings to take a 12-7 lead in the series, including a 14-10 win on the road last season.

- The two schools met six times on the gridiron between 1937 and 1951 as members of the Southern Conference with Duke winning all six of those games.

- Tech's first win in the series came in 1969, a 48-12 victory at Norfolk.

- Tech is 5-2 against Duke at Durham, 6-0 at Lane Stadium and 1-5 at neutral sites.

- Three of the last four games between Tech and Duke have been decided by 11 points or less, but the last time the Blue Devils visited Blacksburg, the Hokies walked away with a 44-7 win in 2010. In 2008, Tech won 14-3 in Blacksburg, won 34-26 at Duke in 2009 and held on for a 14-10 win on the road last year.

HOKIES

HOMECOMING

- Homecoming football games have been an official function at Virginia Tech since the beginning of the 1952 season, although there were designated games for many years, starting in 1926. Virginia Tech's overall record on Homecoming is 61-19-4.

- Tech has a 38-7-2 mark in Homecoming games played at Lane Stadium, including a 30-14 win over Boston College last season.

- Tech's last loss in a Homecoming game was during the 1998 season when Temple handed Tech a 28-24 loss. Tech has a 21-4 record in Homecoming games during Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach.

UNCHARTERED WATERS

- The last time the Hokies (3-3) sat at .500 or below six games into the season was in 1992 when they were 2-3-1 after six contests en route to a 2-8-1 mark.

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Virginia Tech's 10 touchdown passes have gone to seven different players.
- 9 Demetri Knowles scored the **ninth** touchdown on a kickoff return during Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach.
- 8 Virginia Tech has allowed **eight** rushing touchdowns and **eight** passing touchdowns through six games.
- 7 Frank Beamer needs one more win to tie Tom Osborne for **seventh** place in all-time victories among NCAA FBS football coaches.
- 6 Just **six** of the 19 games in the Tech-Duke series have been played in Blacksburg.
- 5 Cody Journell has connected on **five** field goals of 40 yards or more during his Tech career.
- 4 Logan Thomas has taken over sole possession of **fourth** place in career rushing TDs by a Tech quarterback with 15.
- 3 **Three** of the last four Tech-Duke games have been decided by 11 points or less.
- 2 The Hokies have had **two** kick/punt returns of more than 92 yards in the same season for the first time since 1965.
- 1 Corey Fuller turned in his **first** 100-yard receiving game at UNC with 5 catches for 143 yards.



COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 188-62 record over the past 19+ seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 26th year as the head football coach at Tech and 32nd overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 212-101-2 record and sits with an overall record of 254-124-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 19 consecutive bowl appearances, four ACC titles, five ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories, six BCS appearances and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999, and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors. Beamer returned to his alma mater in December of 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. The 65-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Virginia Tech and now the associate head coach/running backs coach at Virginia Tech; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He has two grandchildren, Sutton and Olivia, daughters of Shane and his wife, Emily.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

Beamer, who is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 254 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is eighth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all-time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

• **Frank Beamer**, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.

• Not one of the 124 active Division I-A (FBS) head football coaches has been at his current school **consecutively** longer than Beamer (Nevada's Chris Ault is in his 28th season, but not consecutively).

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

HOUSE OF HORRORS

- Lane Stadium has always been a difficult place for opponents to play and has been dubbed one of the best game-day environments in college football. Tech has a 54-9-1 record versus non-conference teams at home since the start of the 1991 season.
- Virginia Tech has posted a 199-69-6 overall record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.
- Tech is 125-32-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.
- Tech football teams are 359-100-13 all time in Blacksburg, including a 55-8 record since the start of the 2003 season.
- A large part of that impressive record is the home-field environment created by the fans as Lane Stadium has been sold out for 90 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.

BLACKSBURG, Va. – Cody Journell booted a 17-yard field goal in overtime to give No. 16 Virginia Tech a heart-pounding 20-17 victory over ACC rival Georgia Tech before a sold out Monday night crowd at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

It was also Journell who got the Hokies to the extra period by hitting a 41-yard game-tying field goal as time expired in regulation play. That kick capped a frantic six-play, 51-yard drive that started with just 44 seconds remaining.

The two teams saved most of their offensive fireworks for the end of the game, combining for 292 yards of offense in the fourth quarter and overtime after putting up a combined total of 322 yards during the first three periods of the contest. The Yellow Jackets took a 10-7 lead just three minutes into the fourth quarter with a field goal. The teams then traded touchdowns before Journell's decisive field goals.

Quarterback Logan Thomas passed for two touchdowns and 230 yards for the Hokies during the win. He also added 40 yards on the ground. On the defensive side, mike linebacker Jack Tyler led three Virginia Tech defenders with double-digit tackles. Tyler finished with 17, while whip linebacker Jeron Gouveia-Winslow and tackle Derrick Hopkins had 11 apiece.

Game Notes

- Six Hokie players made their first collegiate starts on offense or defense in the game. Nick Becton (OT), Vinston Painter (OT), David Wang (OG), Michael Holmes (TB) and Ryan Malleck (TE) were the first-timers on offense, while Kyshoen Jarrett (ROV) was the lone defensive player.

- The game was the first overtime game in Lane Stadium history. The Hokies ended their 2011 season with an overtime loss to Michigan in the Sugar Bowl and have played in a total of five overtime contests, posting a 3-2 record.

- Georgia Tech won the time of possession battle, but Virginia Tech won the game. It's the first time in the last six meetings that the team that didn't win the TOP battle didn't win the game.

- The Hokies went with the same five offensive lineman for every offensive snap.

BLACKSBURG, Va. – Virginia Tech overcame another slow start before getting its offense on track and piling up 419 yards on the way to a 42-7 non-conference victory over Austin Peay at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Tech managed just seven points during the first 24:25 of the game and had only 32 yards on the ground when Tony Gregory blocked an Austin Peay punt. The play provided a spark for the Hokies who went on to score touchdowns on five of their next seven possessions. Tech ended up amassing 419 yards of total offense, including 187 yards on the ground.

Quarterback Logan Thomas ran for one touchdown and passed for two more in the win. He connected on 15 of 23 passes for 212 yards. Number two quarterback Mark Leal completed all three of his passes for 20 yards. Senior Dyrrell Roberts caught five balls for 50 yards in the contest, while fellow seniors Randall Dunn and Corey Fuller grabbed touchdown passes.

Defensively, the Hokies limited Austin Peay to 221 yards overall and posted 10 tackles behind the line. Junior Kyle Fuller and freshman Donaldven Manning picked off passes as Tech held the Governors to just 62 yards through the air.

Game Notes

- Kyshoen Jarrett returned a punt 46 yards to set up Virginia Tech's first touchdown of the game. The sophomore rover also chipped in six tackles, including 1.5 for loss.

- Six players dressed for the first time in their collegiate careers: David Mellstrom, Griffin Hite, Dadi Nicolas, Justin Taylor, Greg Gadell and E.L. Smiling.

- Michael Holmes scored his first collegiate touchdown on a 2-yard run in the first quarter, then added his second in the third period with a 9-yard burst.

- Tight end Randall Dunn had three catches against the Governors. His 39 yards receiving were a personal best. One of his catches went for a 13-yard touchdown.

- Junior tailback Tony Gregory blocked his second career punt and scored his first career rushing touchdown.

PITTSBURGH, Pa. – The University of Pittsburgh drove 75 yards for a touchdown on its opening possession and never looked back on the way to a thorough 35-17 victory over nationally ranked Virginia Tech at Heinz Field.

The Panthers scored on three of their first four possessions, mixing strong running performances by tailbacks Rushel Snell and Ray Graham with an effective passing attack. Pitt posted 202 yards of offense in the first quarter in building a 14-0 lead and held a 21-3 advantage at the half.

Tech aided Pittsburgh's cause by committing four first-half turnovers, three in Pitt territory and the other at the Hokies' 20. A fourth-quarter interception by cornerback Antone Exum at the Pitt 36 gave Tech an opportunity to get back in the game, but the Hokies stalled and the Panthers marched 88 yards on 15 plays for a clinching touchdown.

The Hokies compiled 324 yards of offense on the day but allowed 537 yards, including 254 on the ground.

Game Notes

- Tech quarterback Logan Thomas suffered the first three-interception game of his collegiate career. All three of the picks came in the first half, but none led to Pittsburgh points.

- Sophomore Kyshoen Jarrett, who hails from Pennsylvania, returned a punt 94 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter. It was the second-longest punt return in school history behind Frank Loria's 95-yard return against Miami in 1967.

- Quarterback Logan Thomas and receiver Marcus Davis teamed up on an 85-yard touchdown pass. The play ranks as the fourth-longest TD pass in school history and ties for the fifth longest pass play at Tech.

- The loss stopped Tech's school- and ACC-record string of consecutive wins in true road games at 13. The streak was also the longest in the nation.

BLACKSBURG, Va. – Virginia Tech rebounded from a disappointing performance at Pittsburgh a week earlier with a solid 37-0 victory over Bowling Green at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Quarterback Logan Thomas passed for two touchdowns and ran for another as the Hokies overcame a scoreless first quarter to put up 21 points in the second period. Thomas hit TD passes of 10 and 42 yards in less than a three minute span, then added a 1-yard plunge just before the half to put Tech in control. Overall, Tech controlled the football for 11:17 of the quarter.

The Hokies added two more rushing touchdowns in the second half on the way to 246 yards on the ground for the afternoon.

Overall, Tech piled up 396 yards of offense, while scoring on all five of its red zone chances, including four touchdowns.

Defensively, Tech handed the Falcons their first shutout loss since 1998. Bowling Green converted on just four of 16 third downs and failed to score on its two trips into the red zone. The visitors connected on just 14 of 42 passing attempts on the way to 266 yards of offense.

Game Notes

- The shutout snapped a string of 169 consecutive games scoring for Bowling Green, dating back to the 1998 season. Ironically, the Falcons' last shutout was also by a score of 37-0, coming at the hands of Missouri on Sept. 5, 1998.

- Redshirt sophomore Matt Arkema made his first collegiate start for the Hokies, opening the game at left guard in place of injured David Wang.

- True freshman Brooks Abbott saw his first action for the Hokies, handling all seven kickoffs against the Falcons. He became the eighth true freshman to see playing time for Tech this season.

- Of the 69 Tech players who dressed for the game, all but three played. Two of the players that did not play are scheduled to redshirt.

LANDOVER, Md. – University of Cincinnati quarterback Munchie Legaux connected with Damon Julian on a 39-yard touchdown pass with 13 seconds remaining as the Bearcats drove 85 yards to grab a 27-24 victory over Virginia Tech at FedExField.

Cincinnati's stunning drive came on the heels of a 56-yard scoring pass from Tech's Logan Thomas to Corey Fuller that had given the Hokies a 24-20 lead with 1:49 showing on the clock.

Game 6: Big Plays Doom Hokies at North Carolina

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. – Virginia Tech dropped to 3-3 on the season after coming up on the short end of a 48-34 shootout with the North Carolina Tar Heels in Chapel Hill. The last time the Hokies started .500 or less through its first six games was 1992 when it opened with a 2-3-1 record en route to a 2-8-1 season.

Both teams returned kickoffs for touchdowns and enjoyed success passing, but UNC's running game proved to be the difference with tailback Giovani Bernard rushing for 262 yards, an all-time high against the Hokies. Bernard's 62-yard touchdown burst on a 4th-and-1 play on the first play of the second quarter broke a 14-14 tie and gave the Tar Heels the lead for good.

Tech QB Logan Thomas had career highs of 49 passes, 26 completions and 354 passing yards. He also tossed a pair of scoring passes and ran for a score but it was not enough to overcome a 339-40 yard deficit in rushing.

Game Notes

- Sean Tapley's 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown marked the first kickoff return for a TD against Tech since 1993 when Syracuse's Jeyson Wilson returned one 86 yards for a score against the Hokies. Tech had gone 237 consecutive games without allowing a touchdown on a kickoff, the longest active streak in the FBS.

- North Carolina's 48 points marked the most points allowed by Virginia Tech during an ACC game. The last time Tech gave up that many points in any game was at LSU in 2007, a 48-7 loss.

- Redshirt freshman Demetri Knowles returned a kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown, the third-longest KO return during the Frank Beamer era.

**THOMAS THE TANK**

• Quarterback **Logan Thomas** may be the tallest starting signal caller in school history, but he certainly had some shoes to fill in replacing four-year starter and 2010 ACC Player of the Year Tyrod Taylor last season. All Taylor did in four years was lead Tech to three ACC titles, set a school record for wins by a quarterback (34), as well as marks in total offense, passing yards and many more.

• Thomas showed last year he was more than up for the task, breaking Taylor's school record for total offense in a season with 3,482 yards. He also became just the second quarterback in school history to pass for over 3,000 yards in a season and tied the school mark for rushing touchdowns in a season by a quarterback with 11.

• After a breakout 2011 in which he earned second-team All-ACC honors, the 6-6, 254-pounder who wears a size 16 or 17 shoe depending on the make (17 cleat; 16 regular

shoe), is poised to pick up where he left off last season.

• The redshirt junior was recruited as a tight end, but was moved to quarterback just before his first preseason camp and began the process of being groomed for this season.

• Thomas was a standout basketball player at Brookville High and received scholarship offers to play basketball at JMU, Duquesne, Liberty, Akron, Richmond and Tulane but he decided to focus on football. He's also an avid golfer who likes to hit the links whenever he has free time.

• Thomas already has two fourth-quarter, game-winning touchdown drives (East Carolina, Miami). He completed 23 of 25 passes for 310 yards and three scores along with two rushing scores to lead the Hokies back to the win over Miami last year. His completion percentage of 92 percent in that game is a single-game record under head coach Frank Beamer (min. 20 attempts). For his career, he

has thrown for 4,567 yards and 28 touchdowns, completing 57.0 percent of his passes, and has rushed for 15 more touchdowns.

NEW FACES IN THE BACKFIELD

• While the Tech offense lost Ryan Williams and Darren Evans (2010) and David Wilson (2011) to the NFL over the past two years, the Hokies will still boast a talented arsenal under running backs coach **Shane Beamer**.

• **Michael Holmes** appears to be one of several who have a bright future for the Hokies. After redshirting last year, the Harrisonburg, Va., product put together a good spring session and preseason to earn the starting nod. True freshman **J.C. Coleman**, at only 5-8, entered Tech in January after graduating early and reaped the benefits of a spring practice. **Martin Scales**, a converted fullback, brings a bruising running style to the position and could see action in short-yardage situations.

• **Tony Gregory** is perhaps the fastest of

all the backs when healthy, but he is returning after having a second surgery to repair an ACL injury. True freshman **Trey Edmunds**, son of former NFL Pro Bowler Farrell Edmonds, will begin his career at tailback and will redshirt this season, but could eventually also play linebacker for the Hokies.

A REWARD FOR GOOD GRADES

- The Tech football team eats its meals in order of grade-point average range. Those players who have graduated, as well as those players who maintain the highest grade-point average, eat all team meals first. Coach Beamer invites each player to eat, calling out his name and his GPA range, starting with the highest.

THE LEADER OF THE D-LINE

- Junior defensive end **James Gayle** had a breakout season at his defensive end position, earning All-ACC honors. He had 38 tackles, including 12.5 tackles for loss and seven sacks, along with 20 quarterback hurries last year.
- A physical monster, the 260-pound Hampton, Va., product posted a position-record 39.5-inch vertical and a 4.44 40-time this past offseason.
- Gayle didn't seriously take up the sport of football until his sophomore year at Bethel High in Hampton. And he didn't play that season because of a hamstring injury.
- But his late start hasn't hurt because of the good genes passed down to him. Gayle's dad, Jimmy, played running back at Ohio State from 1979-82, and was named the 1981 Liberty Bowl most outstanding player.
- His uncle, Shaun Gayle, played 12 seasons in the NFL (1984-95) and was a member of the Chicago Bears squad that won Super Bowl XX in 1985. He also owns the distinction of returning the shortest punt for a touchdown in NFL history, when he returned a punt 5 yards for a touchdown against the New York Giants in a 1985 divisional playoff victory.

RUSHING = OUTCOME?

- Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (315 games), the Hokies are 185-35-2 when outrushing their opponents, 26-66 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In Tech's current 19-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 165-20 when outrushing its opponents, 22-41 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In its current 19-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 109-7 when rushing for 200 yards or more.
- Since the start of the 1999 season, Tech is 120-13 when outrushing its opponent and 15-29 when being outrushed.

THE BIG MAN IN THE MIDDLE

- Junior **Andrew Miller** took over as the center last season and is the lone returning starter on this year's line. The Bassett, Va., native was a standout wrestler in high school and has competed for the Hokies' nationally ranked wrestling squad. Miller was a two-time Virginia Group AA state champion and was the No. 3-ranked heavyweight by *W.I.N. Magazine* following his senior year. He was also a first-team all-state selection in football.
- The Rimington Award candidate started all 14 games for the Hokies last year, playing over 900 offensive snaps.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

- Defensive tackles **Antoine** and **Derrick Hopkins** are just two of numerous Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program.
- Redshirt seniors **Vinston Painter** and **Randall Dunn** are cousins as are redshirt junior **Logan Thomas** and redshirt sophomore **Zack McCray**.
- Linebacker **Tariq Edwards** is the son of former Hokie football player Bo Campbell, who lettered from 1989-92. **George George III** is a walk-on whose father, George, was on the Tech team in the 1970s.
- Freshman **Alston Smith** is the son of former Hokie and NFL Hall of Famer Bruce Smith, while **Martin Scales** is the cousin of former Hokies Orion and Cam Martin.
- There are seven players on the team with brothers who either are playing or did play at Virginia Tech. The **Hopkins Brothers (Antoine and Derrick)** started up front along the defensive line the first five games last year until Antoine was hurt. **David Wang** is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang and redshirt sophomore lineman **Mark Shuman** is the younger brother of former starting center and current weight room assistant director Ryan Shuman. Additionally, redshirt freshman **Ronny Vandyke** is joined on the team this year by his brother, **Devin Vandyke**.

- Kyle Fuller** is a junior defensive back who started last year for the Hokies. He is joined on the team by his brother, **Corey Fuller**, who ran track at Kansas for two seasons before transferring to Tech in 2010. Both are younger brothers of former Hokie Vincent Fuller, who played six seasons with the Tennessee Titans.
- True freshman **Zach Snell** is the son of former Hokie wide receiver Donald Wayne Snell (1984-86) and the nephew of former Hokie receiver Sidney Snell (1977-80). He is also the cousin of Tech freshman quarterback **Brendan Motley**. Freshman punter **Hunter Windmuller** is the nephew of the late Denny Windmuller, a defensive back for the Hokies who lettered in 1978 and 1979.

TECH'S KICKING TRADITION

- Junior **Cody Journell** is back after a solid 2011 campaign, one in which he bucked the recent Tech tradition of relying on senior walk-on kickers. Last season was the first time in five seasons, Tech didn't rely on a senior walk-on for the kicking duties. In 2006, Brandon Pace went 18-for-19 on field goals en route to second-team All-ACC honors. In 2007, it was Jud Dunlevy, who went 21-for-26 on the season. In 2008, Dustin Keys set a school record with 23 made field goals. In 2009, it was Matt Waldron's turn and he responded by making 20-of-23 field goals and scoring 108 points en route to first-team All-ACC honors.

- And in 2010, Chris Hazley picked up where the others left off, hitting 21-of-22 field goals, including a school-record (for a single season) 21 in a row.

- The last four were one-year wonders, each winning the job in their final season, and each going on to score over 100 points.

- Over the last six+ seasons, Tech's starting field goal kickers have combined to make 124 of 144 field-goal attempts (86 percent) and produce 639 points with three earning All-ACC honors.

- This year, **Cody Journell** holds down the job once again. He took a different route as he was a scholarship signee in February of 2009 and redshirted before serving as a backup in 2010.

- He is a local product who hails from Ripplemead, about 30 minutes from campus. He came in with impressive credentials after earning prep All-America honors coming out of nearby Giles High School.

- After redshirting as a freshman in 2009, Journell was slowed by a hip flexor in the 2010 spring drills and never could make a serious run for the job. But after a strong spring, he earned the job last year and didn't look back en route to honorable mention All-ACC honors. He started this season with a bang, hitting a 41-yard field goal as time expired in regulation against Georgia Tech and then hit the game-winner in overtime.

- Journell is the first Tech principal place-kicker to sign an NLI and come in on scholarship since Shayne Graham signed with the Hokies in 1996 and went on to earn first-team All-Big East Conference honors in all four seasons as Tech's kicker before going on to a standout NFL career.

- Journell was 14-for-17 last season on field goals (making his last 10 attempts) and 43-for-44 on extra points.

TAKING CARE OF WALK-ONS

- Former walk-on John Engelberger was a starter for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, and John Burke played in the Super Bowl with the New England Patriots in 1987.

Cody Grimm went from a walk-on, to a starter, to an All-American, and finally to an NFL Draft pick of Tampa Bay in 2009.

- Current Tech walk-ons who have earned scholarships include **Michael Branthover**, **Jack Tyler**, **Joey Phillips**, **Martin Scales**, **Trey Gresh** and **Corey Fuller**.

- Grimm and Will Montgomery (C, Washington Redskins) are both former Hokie walk-ons *who started* in the NFL last year.

GETTIN' IT DONE IN THE CLASSROOM

- Of the 17 seniors on the 2012 roster, there are 13 Hokie graduates, with three others slated to graduate in December and one scheduled to graduate in May.

- Here's how the current seniors, listed alphabetically, stand: **Nick Becton** (graduated); **Marcus Davis** (graduated); **Randall Dunn** (graduated); **George George** (graduated); **Jeron Gouveia-Winslow** (graduated); **Antoine Hopkins** (graduated); **Eric Martin** (graduated); **Vincent Painter** (graduated); **Joey Phillips** (graduated); **Dyrell Roberts** (graduated); **Bruce Taylor** (graduated); **Alonzo Tweedy** (graduated); **Michael Via** (graduated).

- **D.J. Coles**, **Corey Fuller** and **Martin Scales** should graduate this fall and **Scott Demler** is on track to graduate in the spring.

- Additionally, juniors **Antone Exum** and **David Wang** have graduated (business degrees in three years) to bring the total number of graduates on the roster to 15, the most in the FBS this year (Pitt is second with 12).

- In nine of the past 11 years, Tech has graduated at least 70 percent of its football class.

HOP AND SKIP

- Defensive tackles **Antoine Hopkins** and **Derrick Hopkins** started beside each other on the defensive line last year for the first five games before Antoine tore his ACL in the loss to Clemson. He's back and the two are reunited on the line.

- Antoine, known as "Hop," switched from No. 98 to No. 56 in 2010, a number he wore in high school. Derrick, the sophomore known as "Skip," will again be wearing Antoine's old No. 98. The two have a younger brother nicknamed "Jump" to complete the trio.

- Derrick started all 14 games for the Hokies last season, registering 51 tackles, including five for loss and three sacks.

- The last brothers to play side-by-side for the Hokies were Blake and Brett Warren at linebacker in the mid 2000s.

- Other notable brother combinations starting together on the same side of the ball were Orion and Cam Martin (defensive end and whip linebacker, respectively) in the late 2000s; Kevin and Jonathan Lewis, starting defensive tackles side-by-side in 2002, and

- During Beamer's time in Blacksburg, the other 11 ACC programs have employed a combined 52 head coaches.

- Stanford has had eight head coaches over the past 26 years, the most among the 67 programs (six major conferences plus Notre Dame) with automatic BCS qualifying privileges.

- Five of his nine assistant coaches, plus three of the four GAs, played for him either at Murray State (Bud Foster, Charley Wiles) or Virginia Tech (Shane Beamer, Cornell Brown, Torrian Gray, plus GAs John Candelas, Jimmy Martin and James Hopper).



BY THE NUMBERS

5,207 ... career yards of total offense rank quarterback Logan Thomas sixth all-time at Virginia Tech behind Will Furrer (1988-91) who has 5,782 career yards.

1992 ... was the last season Tech failed to block at least one punt in a season. The Hokies have blocked at least one kick in every season (26) under Coach Frank Beamer.

224 ... all-purpose yards for redshirt freshman Demetri Knowles in the game against North Carolina. Knowles had 141 yards on kickoff returns and 83 yards receiving. Knowles' 93-yard kickoff return at North Carolina tied for the ninth-longest kickoff return in Virginia Tech history.

94 ... yard punt return by sophomore Kyshoen Jarrett against Pitt ranks as the longest scoring punt return by an ACC player since 1970 and the fourth longest scoring punt return in ACC history. Dick Harris of South Carolina had a 97-yard return against UNC in 1970.

73.7 ... average penalty yards by Tech foes is the highest in the league.

48.9 ... pass completion percentage by Tech opponents is the lowest in the league.

29.56 ... average yards on kickoff returns by Demetri Knowles rank him first in the ACC and tied for 14th nationally.

17 ... defensive linemen have contributed pass interceptions during Coach Frank Beamer's tenure as the head coach. Redshirt tackle Kris Harley became the most recent in the Cincinnati game.

10 ... tackles per game by Tech linebacker Jack Tyler puts him fourth among leading tacklers in the ACC.

7 ... consecutive field goals made by the Hokies' Cody Journell.

6 ... pass receptions by J.C. Coleman at UNC were the most by a Tech running back since fullback Marcus Parker had seven catches in a 1997 game at Pittsburgh. The last Tech tailback to catch six or more passes was Phil Rogers who had seven receptions in a 1973 game versus Alabama. The school mark of seven catches for a running back was established by James Barber in 1972 against Florida State and is currently shared by four players. Freshman Danny Ludd, who had seven catches against Houston in '73, is the fourth player.

2 ... Kyshoen Jarrett's current national ranking in punt returns with an average of 22 yards per return.

THE FREAK

• Senior wide receiver **Marcus Davis** is poised to have a major impact on the offense this year after finally settling in at the position.

• At 6-foot-4 and 230 pounds, the freakishly athletic Davis runs a 4.37-second 40-yard dash and set a Tech program record with a 44-inch vertical jump in the spring, making him a big target for **Logan Thomas** to find anywhere, but particularly on jump ball situations in the end zone.

• In the summer of 2010, Davis worked on his catching skills by catching 100 balls a day. Many of those balls were caught with tennis balls taped to the palms of his hands to make him catch the ball with his fingertips.

• Davis came to Tech as a quarterback, but quickly switched to wide receiver. He hurt his right shoulder just four practices into the 2008 preseason camp and underwent surgery.

• After taking a redshirt year, he was moved back to quarterback the next spring, but was moved back out wide with just a week left in the spring and has been a permanent resident of the receiving corps since.

• His first college reception was an 80-yard touchdown catch in 2009 against Boston College. He took a short pass at Pittsburgh, broke a tackle and raced for an 85-yard score, finishing his day with 129 yards receiving.

• For his career, he has caught 76 passes for 1,315 yards and 10 touchdowns.

ONE MORE GO AT IT

• Senior wide receiver **Dyrell Roberts** is looking to return to form this fall after having season-ending injuries each of the past two seasons.

• Roberts, a speedster who was one of the top kickoff return men in 2009, was hit on the thigh on a return in the Georgia Tech game in 2010. After the game, it was bruised, but nothing out of the ordinary. As the night went on and the pain increased, he was finally rushed to Montgomery Regional Hospital and had a series of surgeries over the next week to relieve pressure in his thigh from compartment syndrome. Without the surgeries, he could've suffered permanent muscle damage.

• Roberts missed the rest of the season and practiced sparingly in the spring, but returned last fall and broke the school record for career kickoff return yards with a 25-yarder against Appalachian State.

• But against Arkansas State last year, he suffered another tough injury on a kickoff return when he broke his left arm on the opening return. He missed the rest of the season, but because he hadn't redshirted yet, he was eligible for a medical hardship waiver and returns this season.

• For his career, he has caught 78 passes for 1,168 yards and six touchdowns. His biggest is

a sliding catch in the back of the end zone in 2009 against Nebraska with 21 seconds left to help clinch a big comeback victory.

BACK FROM LISFRANC SPRAINS

• Virginia Tech lost two starting linebackers last year to the rare Lisfranc foot sprains, but both are back this fall after recovering from surgeries. Outside linebacker **Jeron Gouveia-Winslow** hurt his foot against Miami and starting inside linebacker **Bruce Taylor** hurt his foot two weeks later against Boston College. This is the same injury that ended Houston Texans' quarterback Matt Leinert's season a year ago.

• Taylor, a senior, was thrust into the starting lineup last year after 2009's starter, Barquell Rivers, tore a quad tendon while lifting in spring of 2010. In 2010, Taylor led the team with 91 tackles, including 15.5 for loss, and was leading the team again last year before suffering the injury.

• While productive on the field, Taylor also helps out with the Special Olympics of Southwest Virginia off the field.

• After a tough season in 2010 in his first year as a starter, Gouveia-Winslow seemed to turn the corner last year before his injury. The senior had nine tackles, including one for a loss and five quarterback hurries early on and recorded an interception. In two games this season, he has 15 tackles, third on the team.

• The biological son of former Redskin great Kurt Gouveia, Gouveia-Winslow had two interceptions in 2010, including one that he returned for the opening score in the ACC Championship Game win over Florida State.

MAKING THE MOVE

• Junior **Antone Exum** moved back and forth between rover and free safety last season, two positions similar enough that a move could be made seamlessly.

• But this past spring, Exum made a move to cornerback in an experiment to try and get the best players in the secondary and he flourished. He played so well in his first ever action at corner that defensive secondary coach Torrian Gray plans on making the move permanent.

• Exum is a big proponent of hot yoga and takes classes either in Blacksburg or back home in the Richmond area. He credits the classes with helping with his cardio, flexibility, loosening his hips and his core strength – all things vital to a successful cornerback.

PLAYING THROUGH THE PAIN

• Junior linebacker **Tariq Edwards** played through immense pain most of the second half of last season. The Cheraw, S.C., native underwent surgery after the season to put a rod in his left tibia to relieve pain from a stress fracture in his shin and missed spring practice.

• Even in pain, Edwards made a career-best 71 tackles last season, including 11.5 tackles for a loss and 3.5 sacks, along with

two interceptions as he started all 14 games at linebacker to help hold together a front seven riddled by injuries. He suffered the stress fracture late in the season and played through it in the Sugar Bowl. He had another procedure done in the preseason, which set him back, but he made his first appearance in the fourth game of the season.

• Edwards is the son of former Hokie receiver and punt returner Bo Campbell, who played for the Hokies from 1989-92. Campbell received the Long Distance AT&T Award for leading the nation in average punt return yards (18.2 yds) in 1991, the fall after Tariq was born.

READY FOR ACTION

• Redshirt sophomore **Brent Benedict** is seeing plenty of action at offensive guard this year and the Jacksonville, Fla., native is ready to roll after two long seasons.

• A highly ranked offensive line product at The Bolles School, Benedict was a *SuperPrep* All-American and was rated as the No. 76 player in the country and the No. 12 offensive

suffered in high school, but was still a recipient of the Walter C. Troutman Football Scholarship Endowment that year. He decided to transfer to Virginia Tech last summer and sat out last year due to NCAA transfer rules.

- Now three years removed from high school and a tough road to recovery from a knee injury, Benedict will see his first game action since 2009.

- Every time he takes the field, Benedict says he is playing for his brother, Heath, who died unexpectedly of an enlarged heart in March of 2008, just weeks before the NFL Draft. The older Benedict, also an offensive lineman, originally signed with the University of Tennessee, but transferred to Newberry (S.C.) College, where he was a two-time Little All-American. He was projected as a mid-rounder in the NFL Draft and was the first Division II player since 2004 to take part in the Senior Bowl.

A UNIQUE SUMMER SCHOOL EXPERIENCE

- Defensive tackle **Derrick Hopkins** and defensive end **Zack McCray** took part in a unique summer school experience this past summer, joining a group of Virginia Tech student-athletes in spending a portion of the summer in the Dominican Republic as part of a university-designed study abroad course about leadership and putting leadership initiatives into practice.

- For 10 days, the group visited poorer parts of the country to work with underprivileged children and helped kids within different communities. The student athletes also coordinated sports camps to expose kids there to different sports.

- Along with Hopkins and McCray, the group included volleyball players Liz Trinchere

and Cara Baarendse, women's tennis player Carol Kahoun, women's track and field runner Madalyn Nuckols, women's swimmer Meaghan Holloway, women's soccer player Katie DeTuro, men's soccer player Nick Smirniotopolous and wrestling All-American Devin Carter.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

- Offensive guard **David Wang** comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.

- David had surgery on his shoulder during preseason and redshirted in 2009 before seeing the field in five games in 2010 as the top backup at left guard. He was the top backup at right guard last year before fracturing his right foot against East Carolina, causing him to miss the rest of the season. While laid up with the foot injury, the avid video gamer ascended to No. 35 in the world rankings for Call of Duty on the Xbox 360 console, playing 6-8 hours a day. He would only take breaks for schoolwork and "because I was hungry."

- After working hard in the offseason, the junior now takes over at left guard on an inexperienced offensive line.

- He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history in April of 2010 by becoming the first Chinese American to be drafted by an NFL team when Buffalo took him in the fourth round. Ed and David were featured on NFL China in 2010 as a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football.

- Tech also holds the distinction of having the first Korean American drafted by an NFL team as Eugene Chung was taken by New England in the first round of the 1992 Draft.

THE COMPUTER GUY

- At 6-1, 300 pounds, senior defensive tackle **Antoine Hopkins** may be the biggest, yet athletic, computer guy out there. He's also proud of the fact and recently even started his own computer business, taking infected computers and cleaning off viruses, as well as performing other routine maintenance items on computers. Hopkins suffered a torn ACL last year early on and missed the rest of the season, but spent part of the fall working with the I.T. staff in the athletics department in his spare time, learning more about the industry.
- With his return to full speed this fall, he provides yet another big body in a deep defensive line that is expected to be a major force this season.

THE VERSATILE FULLER

- Junior cornerback **Kyle Fuller** leads a young, but talented secondary, one that features two sophomores and two juniors.
- At 6-0, 181 pounds, Fuller moved between corner and Tech's nickel back last season, which essentially replaces the outside linebacker, in certain situations. As a true freshman, he started six games - mostly in the nickel spot - and recorded 32 tackles, including 4.0 for loss, with six pass break ups and a forced fumble.
- Last year, he flourished in the role as he led the team in tackles for loss last season with

14.5. He had 65 tackles, including 4.5 sacks, two interceptions, seven pass break ups, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He also pounced on a blocked punt in the end zone for a touchdown against Appalachian State.

- The Baltimore, Md., native is a strong open-field tackler with great closing speed. He made a game-saving tackle against Duke last year by stopping Blue Devils quarterback Sean Renfree for a loss on fourth down late in the fourth quarter when Duke was driving for a potential game-winning score.
- He was a second-team All-ACC selection at corner last season and has started the 2012 season strong. Against Georgia Tech, he intercepted a pass in overtime to set up the Hokies' winning points and chipped in a tackle for loss, as well.
- He is also a nominee for the Lott Trophy, given to the top defensive player who also embodies the integrity, character, academic accomplishments and community involvement associated with the Hall of Fame linebacker whose name is on the award.
- This year, he is the veteran in a strong, but young secondary as he tries to become the next great Virginia Tech cornerback. Virginia Tech has produced five All-America cornerbacks over the last nine seasons: DeAngelo Hall (2003), Jimmy Williams (2005), Brandon Flowers (2006 and 2007), Victor "Macho" Harris (2008) and Jayron

- Tech also has had at least one defensive back selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last 13 years after Hosley was taken in the third round of April's Draft by the New York Giants. He joins 16 other defensive backs taken since 1999. Eight have gone in the first three rounds: Ike Charlton in 2000, Cory Bird in 2001, DeAngelo Hall in 2004, Eric Green in 2005, Jimmy Williams in 2006, Aaron Rouse in 2007, Brandon Flowers in 2008 and Hosley in 2011.

VIRGINIA TECH IS "DBU"

They like to call themselves "D-Block" or "DBU" and there's no denying the recent success (1993-present) of Virginia Tech's defensive backs.

JACK IN THE BOX

- Linebacker **Jack Tyler** has proven to be quite the find for defensive coordinator Bud Foster, who had a heavy hand in recruiting Tyler as a recruited walk-on. Tyler has been invaluable for the Hokies, coming up big in several key games. In the 2010 ACC Championship game, he filled in for an injured Bruce Taylor in the second half against Florida game and contributed seven tackles - three of which went for losses. Last year, he racked up 12 tackles in the win at Georgia Tech and topped that this season with a career-high 17 tackles against the Yellow Jackets in the Hokies' overtime win to earn ACC Linebacker of the Week honors. The 17 total stops are the most by a Tech defender since Michael Crawford had 18 against Texas A&M in 2003.
- Through six games, the sophomore has a team-high 60 tackles, including 4.5 for loss.

REPLACING BOYKIN AND COALE

- Virginia Tech is replacing wide receivers Jarrett Boykin and Danny Coale, the most productive duo in terms of receptions in ACC history. Boykin left Tech with a school-record 184 catches for a record 2,844 yards, while Coale was second in both categories with 165 catches for 2,658 yards. Together, they caught 349 passes for 5,502 yards and 26 touchdowns.



• After suffering a loss in game one, replacing them is a trio of seniors in **Dyrell Roberts**, **Marcus Davis** and **Corey Fuller**, along with a gaggle of freshmen and sophomores.

• Roberts has had two season-ending injuries the past two seasons, both coming on kickoff returns, but is best remembered for his sliding, 11-yard touchdown catch in the back of the end zone with 21 seconds left to help Tech rally and beat Nebraska 16-15 in 2009.

• Fuller ran track at the University of Kansas, competing in the triple jump, before transferring to Tech to play football. After sitting out a year due to transfer rules, he earned a scholarship after last season. That decision proved to be the right one after in the season-opening win against Georgia Tech as he caught five passes for a career-high 82 yards, including a big 4th-down grab on the final drive that sent the game to overtime.

• Davis, who came to Tech as a quarterback, averaged a team-best 17 yards per catch last year. He is a big threat who leads the team with 299 all-purpose yards through three games.

• Senior **D.J. Coles** had a personal-best 36 catches for 480 yards and three touchdowns in 2011, but had offseason knee surgery which slowed him down. He tried to come back, but re-injured the knee in the first game against Georgia Tech and will apply for a medical hardship waiver to return next year.

DOING GOOD DEEDS

• Head coach **Frank Beamer** is a strong believer in giving back to the community. He founded Herma's Readers in 2008 and this year, the team will help raise money for the Wounded Warrior Project. Additionally, the team has raised money in the past to help support Breast Cancer Awareness and Ewing's sarcoma cancer.

• Herma's Readers is a non-profit organization that promotes the power of reading and literacy to youngsters during their formative years, grades K-3. The organization was formed as a tribute to Tech head football coach Frank Beamer's late mother, Herma, a teacher for over 30 years in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Herma's Readers has delivered over 21,000 new and used books collected at Virginia Tech football games to youngsters throughout the Commonwealth. Currently, Coach Beamer's program has also dispersed more than \$80,000 for new book purchases for children. That is a total of more than 53,000 new and used books.

• The Virginia Tech football team also raised money to support Wounded Warrior Project through the sale of camouflage Virginia Tech hats and wristbands. Wounded Warrior Project was created to raise awareness and enlist the public's aid as well as provide direct programs for the needs of injured service members.

• Coach Beamer invited Ben Kiernan, through the Wounded Warrior Project, to join the Virginia Tech Football team at spring football practice March 30, showing the team a mock-up of the camo helmet to be worn for the Sept. 22 game against Bowling Green. Kiernan was a 1371 Combat Engineer for the Marines when he was injured on Sept. 16, 2010 in Afghanistan as part of an ambush during Operation Enduring Freedom. Kiernan is a graduate of Virginia Tech, receiving a B.A. in Urban Affairs in 2008.

MORE IMPORTANT THINGS THAN FOOTBALL

• Sophomore **Kyshoen Jarrett** may have the starting rover position locked down with his impressive play early on, but he knows there are way more important things in life than football.

• Jarrett's older brother, Daishawn Capers, has cerebral palsy and is legally blind. He is wheelchair-bound and needs help doing almost everything, relying on his brother and mother, Vinise Capers. In high school, Jarrett would often take care of Daishawn, either getting him ready for school in the morning or by watching him during the evenings or part of a weekend when their mother was away.

• Though from Tannersville, Pa., Jarrett's mother and brother now live in North Carolina and come to almost every home

game. Daishawn sits there waiting to hear his brother's name over the public address system, ready to cheer for his brother every time he makes a play.

• Jarrett is a converted cornerback who moved to the rover position in the spring and now starts there while also seeing time as a punt returner. At Pittsburgh, he broke off a 94-yard punt return for a touchdown, the second-longest return in school history and the longest under head coach Frank Beamer.

• Long-time equipment manager **Lester Karlin** and Assistant to the Head Coach **Billy Hite** are both in their 34th seasons on the Tech staff and have been on the sideline for 418 consecutive Tech games ... Offensive lineman **Michael Via**, who has seen game action at tackle, guard and center in his career, has already graduated with a degree in fisheries science and has aspirations to be a game warden ... Receiver **Joshua Stanford** is listed as from Lithonia, Ga., but the true freshman was born and raised in Canada. He is from Mississauga, Ontario and attended St. Marcellinus Secondary School through 10th grade before moving to Georgia ... Wide receiver **E.L. Smiling**'s sister, Sheena Tosta, won a silver medal at the Beijing Olympics in the 400m hurdles ... Holder **Trey Gresh** started his own lawn cutting business when he was 15 ... HISTORY OF VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

- Virginia Tech is in its 119th football season and has compiled a 693-437-46 all-time record in 1,176 games.
- Tech won its 650th game on Sept. 3, 2008, with a 20-17 win over Georgia Tech.
- The Hokies played their first football game on Oct. 21, 1892, with a 14-10 win over St. Albans in a game played on Tech's campus.
- Virginia Tech is 15th among Division I schools in terms of all-time wins.
- The Hokies have compiled 14 10-win seasons, including eight in a row and 11 in the last 13 seasons.
- Tech has won conference football titles in the Southern Conference, the Big East Conference and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

HISTORY OF LANE STADIUM/WORSHAM FIELD

- Virginia Tech's on-campus home since 1965, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (65,632) is one of college football's most hostile venues.
- The Hokies have compiled an all-time record of 199-69-6 in 274 games at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Hokies are 125-32-1 at home under Frank Beamer and 107-18 at home since the start of the 1996 season.
- The stadium is named for the late Edward H. Lane, a graduate of the university and a former member of the Board of Visitors. Lane headed an educational foundation project which raised more than \$3 million for the original construction. Lane's personal donation was the first received by the fund.
- The field was officially dedicated on Sept. 5, 1992 in honor of Wes and Janet Worsham, longtime Hokie supporters from Kilmarnock, Va. The Worshams pledged \$1 million to the university's Second Century Campaign. The Campaign raised over \$18.6 million, almost \$1.7 million more than the original goal.
- Lane Stadium has been sold out for 90 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- The original cost of the stadium was \$3.5 million with an original capacity of 40,000.
- The first game played in the new stadium was a freshman game on Sept. 24, 1965, an 8-8 tie between Tech and Maryland. The first varsity game was played a week later, on Oct. 2 with the Hokies beating William & Mary 9-7.

ALL-TIME BLACKSBURG RECORD

- In addition to its impressive record at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field (1965-present), Virginia Tech has made Blacksburg a very difficult place to play for opposing football teams.
- Tech has compiled a 359-100-13 record in 472 games in Blacksburg.
- Virginia Tech's first game on campus was its first game ever played, a 14-10 win over St. Albans on Oct. 21, 1892. The game was played on an open field behind the Barracks No. 1 (Lane Hall) on the northeast side of campus.
- A small, ungraded area near the present Memorial Chapel was assigned for both athletic and military drill use in 1894 and was known as Sheib Field, where Tech went 13-1. The area was enlarged in 1902 and became known as Gibboney Field, where the Hokies posted a 19-2 record.
- In 1909 the area was graded and leveled, the grandstand enlarged, and the name changed to Miles Field, where the Hokies went 60-3-3. Miles Field was used for football, baseball, and track until Miles Stadium was completed in 1926. Tech called Miles Stadium home from 1926-64, posting a 67-25-4 record.
- Miles Stadium was razed following the 1964 football season and was superseded by the present Lane Stadium.

BEAMERBALL

• During the **Frank Beamer** era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offense, the defense and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

• During Beamer's time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 37 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams.

• Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 132 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 115 in Tech's past 238 games.

• Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 82 TDs, with 54 coming on pass interceptions, 26 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 50 TDs, including 17 on blocked punts, 19 on punt returns, nine on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

• Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was the first of many scored by the special teams.

• Under Beamer, 83 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Twenty-three of those players scored twice while Eddie Royal,

Xavier Adibi, Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall had seven.

• Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 75-15 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams. Tech is 79-25 under Beamer when scoring a non-offensive touchdown.

BEAMERBALL II

• Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama.

• Tech now has 129 blocks in **Frank Beamer's** 315 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 64 punts (17 returned or recovered for TDs), 38 field goals and 27 extra points.

• The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham (7 kicks) and safety Keion Carpenter (6 kicks). Basham blocked three field goals and four PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

• During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 22 times, winning 16 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.

Virginia Tech's current 223-game scoring streak from 1995 to present stands as the 15th-longest in Division I-A college history. In the 223-game run, Tech scored on its first offensive possession 74 times, plus another three occasions where it scored on returns on its first touch of the game. The Hokies have scored in the first quarter 160 times during the streak, and have had it extended by halftime in 214 of the 223 games. Virginia Tech has a **171-52** record during the scoring streak, averaging **34.7** points in the wins and **20.1** points in the losses. The Hokies had only three occasions where they were delayed extending the streak until the fourth quarter. The last time came in 2005 in a 27-7 loss to No. 5 Miami at home. The latest Tech scored its first points in a game was with 6:58 left in the 2005 Sugar Bowl against Auburn, a game in which the Hokies went on to score another touchdown in the loss. The only other time came in a 2000 game at Miami where Tech didn't score until 12:23 left in the game and went on to score two more touchdowns in the loss. Here's a look at those occasions.
