THE SERIES

- Saturday's game will be the 63rd football meeting between Virginia Tech and the College of William & Mary, with the Hokies leading the series, 40-18-4.
- The two schools met every year for 40 straight seasons between 1945 and 1985 and each year for 14 consecutive years between 1929 and 1942.
- Tech and William & Mary were members of the Southern Conference together from 1936-64. In that span, the Hokies posted just a 10-15-2 mark against the Tribe in conference play.
- The last nine contests have been held in Blacksburg with the Hokies winning all nine. Tech has won the last 10 in a row and 12 of the last 13 - against the Tribe.
- Thirteen straight games (1929-41) were played in Richmond. The two also played in Richmond in 1945, 1947, 1972 and 1977. The series has also been played in Roanoke (1906, 1959, 1961 and 1969) and in Norfolk (1975).

HOME OPENERS

• Virginia Tech has won its home opener in 24 of Frank Beamer's 27 previous tries as the head coach. The only teams to have beaten the Hokies in their first home game of the year during Beamer's tenure are James Madison (21-16; 2010), Boston College (20-14; 1995) and Clemson (22-10; 1987). The Clemson game was Beamer's first at the Tech helm.



- The Hokies did not lose their first home opener until the 1948 season. Tech went 54-0 in its first home games of the year before dropping a 13-0 decision to George Washington University to start the '48 season.
- The Hokies did not have a home game in 1893 and did not field teams in 1943 and 1944.

STRONG IN SEPTEMBER

• Tech has a 71-12 mark in September dating back to the start of its bowl streak in the 1993 season, including a 32-7 mark over the past eight seasons (2005-2013).

THE OPENING ACT

• The Hokies are 18-9 in season openers during Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach, winning 13 of their past 18.

50 YEARS AT LANE

- William & Mary has a special tie with Blacksburg as the Tribe played the Hokies in the first varsity football game at Lane Stadium on Oct. 2, 1965 with the Hokies winning 9-7 despite only the west stands and the center section of the east bleachers being completed for the game.
- The first game played in Lane Stadium was a freshman game contested on Sept. 24 that featured Frank Beamer on the roster. Saturday marks the start of the 50th season of play in

COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 200-69 record over the past 21 seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 28th year as the head football coach at Tech and 34th overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 224-109-2 record and sits with an overall record of 266-132-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 21 consecutive bowl appearances, four ACC titles, five ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories, six BCS appearances and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999, and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame, becoming the first active coach at the university to be honored in that fashion. Following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 67-year-old Hillsville, Virginia, native began as an assistant at Radford High School from 1969 through 1971. Then, after one season as a graduate assistant at the University of Maryland, he went to The Citadel where he worked five seasons under Bobby Ross and one year under Art Baker. His last two years at The Citadel, Beamer was the defensive coordinator. In 1979, he went to Murray State as the defensive coordinator under Mike Gottfried. He was named head coach at MSU in 1981 and went on to compile a six-year record of 42-23-2.

In 1990, Beamer received a new contract and a substantial pay raise. He refused the raise, however, until a time that all classified and faculty employees of the university could have the same opportunity for pay raises. Most state salaries had been frozen at the time. When offered a pay increase in 2006, he did not sign the agreement until his assistant coaches were taken care of.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Virginia. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Virginia Tech and now the associate head coach/running backs coach at Virginia Tech; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He has three grandchildren, Sutton, Olivia and Hunter, children of Shane and his wife, Emily. Casey was married in 2012 to former Virginia Tech wrestler Canaan Prater.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, North Carolina, and grew up in Hillsville, Virginia. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

An avid NASCAR fan, Beamer has been the official starter for races at Bristol Motor Speedway, Martinsville Speedway and Richmond International Raceway.

Beamer, who is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 266 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is sixth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all-time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

- Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.
- Not one of the 125 active FBS head football coaches has been at his current school longer than Beamer.



50 YEARS OF LANE

On Oct. 2, 1965, Virginia Tech played the first varsity football game in Lane Stadium, a 9-7 win over William & Mary. While it doesn't look quite the same as it did half a century ago, Lane Stadium will play host to the Hokies and William & Mary on Aug. 30 of this year as Tech opens its 50th season in the legendary stadium.

Ironically, the first game ever in Lane Stadium was a freshman game against Maryland on Sept. 24 that included then-freshman Frank Beamer on the roster. He'll



lead the Hokies out of that famous tunnel again this year as the Hokies open up the 50th season of play inside Lane Stadium.

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy! Tech! Tech! V.P.I.! Sola-Rex Sola-Rah Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!! Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its named to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

During Bud Foster's 245-game tenure as defensive/co-defensive coordinator, Tech has ...

- had 46 different defensive players score touchdowns.
- scored 72 touchdowns (49 on pass interceptions, 22 on fumble returns and one on a fumble recovery).
- held opponents to an average of 108.6 yards rushing and 17.0 points per game.
- been nationally ranked in the top five of a major defensive category 37 times. The Hokies finished No. 1 in total defense in 2005 and 2006, second in 2001 and third in 1999.
 - pitched 28 shutouts.
- had at least one defensive player earn All-America honors from some publication in 17 of 19 seasons. Four players gained A-A recognition in 1999 and three were honored in 2001.
- produced six first-team All-Americans and 12 others who have earned second- or third-team All-America honors from one of the recognized groups.
 - had 37 players drafted by NFL teams.
- produced its first Lombardi Award winner and its first Nagurski Trophy winner in Corey Moore.
- produced two BIG EAST defensive players of the year
 Corey Moore, who earned the honor in both 1998 and

- In Tech's current 21-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 173-25 when outrushing its opponents, 26-44 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In its current 21-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 112-8 when rushing for 200 yards or more.
- Since the start of the 1999 season, Tech is 128-18 when outrushing its opponent and 19-32 when being outrushed.

• With its trip to the Hyundai Sun Bowl last year, Tech is now one of only two teams to go to 21 bowls in the past 21 seasons. The only other one is Florida State.

New Face Under Center

- Since Nov. 22, 2008, Virginia Tech has had exactly two quarterbacks combine to start those 71 games: Tyrod Taylor (31) and Logan Thomas (40). Both were recordsetters while in Blacksburg and both are now in the NFL. That will change this year as **Michael Brewer** takes the helm at quarterback for the Hokies. The transfer from Texas Tech University was named the starter on Aug. 23 after a tough preseason battle.
- Brewer has the bloodlines to be successful in college football as several members of his family played. His father, Robert, played quarterback at Texas; his grandfather, Charlie, played quarterback at Texas; his uncle, Rob Moerschell, played quarterback at Texas; his great uncle, Robert, played quarterback at Texas Tech; and his great uncle, George, played running back at Oklahoma.
- Brewer graduated from Texas Tech this past spring with a degree in personal financial planning, thus making him immediately eligible at Virginia Tech. He is getting a Master's in curriculum and instruction at Virginia Tech.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

- Defensive players **Ronny** and **Devin Vandyke** are just two of numerous Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program. There are two sets of brothers on the team and two other players on the team with brothers who played at Virginia Tech. **David Wang** is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang.
- **Kendall Fuller** is a sophomore defensive back who is following in the footsteps of his older brothers. He is the youngest brother of former Hokie players Vincent Fuller, who played six seasons with the Tennessee Titans, Corey

Fuller, now with the Detroit Lions, and Kyle, who was a first-round draft pick of Chicago in May.

- Sophomore running back **Trey Edmunds** is joined by his younger brother, **Terrell Edmunds**, on the roster this year. Redshirt sophomore **Alston Smith** is the son of former Hokie and NFL Hall of Famer Bruce Smith.
- Redshirt sophomore Zach Snell is the son of former Hokie wide receiver Donald Wayne Snell (1984-86) and the nephew of former Hokie receiver Sidney Snell (1977-80). He is also the cousin of Tech redshirt sophomore quarterback Brenden Motley.
- Redshirt freshman **Deon Newsome** is the son of Myron Newsome, who lettered in 1995 and 1996 and redshirt freshman **Kyle Chung** is the son of former Hokie lineman and current NFL assistant coach Eugene Chung while sophomore **Woody Baron** is the nephew of former Tech player Jim Baron (1994-95).
- Over 25 sets of brothers have played for head coach Frank Beamer in his 28 seasons at Virginia Tech.

EXPERIENCE AT TAILBACK

- Virginia Tech returns a pair of talented tailbacks in Trey Edmunds and J.C. Coleman, but it's the youngsters who have made a lot of noise early on.
- Edmunds, the son of NFL Pro Bowler Ferrell Edmunds, was the starter last year, rushing for 675 yards and 10 touchdowns, but broke his leg in the regular season finale against Virginia and is just now getting back to full speed.
- Coleman, at only 5-7, took over as Tech's starting tailback midway through his freshman year two seasons ago and led the tailbacks with 492 yards rushing that year.
- Three freshmen Marshawn Williams, Shai McKenzie and Travon McMillian - along with sophomore Joel Caleb could see action this year. Williams and McKenzie enrolled in January and McMillian started camp as a quarterback, but all three have impressed.

TAKING CARE OF WALK-ONS

- Virginia Tech has had a lot of success with walk-on players. John Engelberger was a starter for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, while John Burke played in the Super Bowl with the New England Patriots in 1987. Cody Grimm went from a walk-on, to an All-American, to an NFL Draft pick of Tampa Bay in 2009.
- Current Tech walk-ons who earned scholarships at some point during their career include Sam Rogers, Mitchell Ludwig, Michael Branthover, Charley Meyer, Josh Trimble, Griffin Hite, A.J. Hughes, Derek Di Nardo and Willie Byrn.
- Will Montgomery (C, Denver Broncos) and Grimm are former Hokie walk-ons who have seen starting action in the NFL recently.

- Of the 13 seniors on the 2014 roster, there are eight Hokie graduates, with four others slated to graduate in December.

Williams (Fall 2013). The five other seniors are all on track to graduate by the end of the 2015 school year: Michael Branthover (Spring 2015), Derek Di Nardo (Fall 2014), Caleb Farris (Fall 2014), Kyshoen Jarrett (Fall 2014) and Luther Maddy (Fall 2014).

- Wang has earned a pair of bachelor's degree and is on track to earn his master's degree in Fall 2014 in addition to the two bachelor's degrees. Williams and Gibson are on track to earn their second undergraduate degrees this fall.
- With four Fall 2014 graduates on track (Di Nardo, Farris, Jarrett, Maddy), Tech should have 12 of its 13 seniors with degrees at the end of the semester. Junior Dadi Nicolas is on track to graduate in Fall, 2014. Junior quarterback Michael Brewer graduated from Texas Tech this past spring and is in graduate school at Virginia Tech.
- In 11 of the past 13 years, Tech has graduated at least 70 percent of its class.
- From 2001-2013, there were 229 senior Tech football players on the roster with 213 earning their degree, 93 percent. By the time this year is over, 78 of 80 seniors since 2010 will have graduated from Tech.
- The Tech football program scored 977 for its multiyear APR – its highest score ever. Tech eclipsed its previous best score for the seventh straight year, and the Hokies' 977 score ranked fifth in the ACC behind Duke (992), Clemson (983), Georgia Tech (983) and BC (981).

THE FABULOUS FULLERS

- Virginia Tech has had plenty of success recruiting the household of Vincent and Nina Fuller up in Baltimore.
 There was Vincent, who went on to be drafted in the fourth round of the NFL Draft by Tennessee and spent eight years in the league. He played at Tech from 2001-04, recording eight career interceptions.
- In 2010, Kyle signed with the Hokies and had a big impact on the program, earning second-team All-America honors as a senior. He was a first-round pick of the Chicago Bears in the 2014 NFL Draft.
- The second-oldest Fuller, Corey, took a different route to Blacksburg. He signed to run track at Kansas and competed for two years in Lawrence. He decided to give football a try and transferred to Tech in 2010, sitting out a year as required by the NCAA. He had a break-out year as a receiver in his final season at Tech and ended up being drafted in the sixth round by the Detroit Lions in 2013.
- The youngest and final Fuller Kendall signed with the Hokies in 2013 and had an immediate impact as a true freshman last year, earning ACC Defensive Rookie of the

Year honors after intercepting six passes.

• If Corey, Kyle and Kendall go on to have careers that afford them playing time in the NFL, the four of them will become just the second group of four brothers to play in the NFL and the first group of four brothers to be drafted to the NFL out of the same college. Jim (Notre Dame), Joey (USC), Keith (USC) and Ross (Notre Dame) Browner are four brothers who played in the NFL in the late 1970s and 1980s, but went to different schools.

TRIMBLE PART OF IMPRESSIVE FAMILY

- Josh Trimble is the fourth brother in his family to play football at the FBS level, but the first to take a different path. Older brothers Jeremy, Jordan and Justin all played for Army. Jeremy recently returned from a tour in South Korea while Jordan returned last year from a tour in Afghanistan. Justin graduated from West Point in 2013 and is stationed in Oklahoma. The four brothers are the son of former Bishop O'Connell football coach Steve Trimble, a Maryland defensive back who played four years in the NFL, who died of a heart attack in his school office in 2011. The elder Trimble was a member of the NFL's Broncos and Bears in the early '80s.
- Josh Trimble has gone from a walk-on to a starting outside linebacker in 2013 for the Hokies and earned a scholarship last preseason. Last year, he had 20 tackles and a sack, starting five games.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

- David Wang comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.
 Wang has already graduated with a pair of degrees from Tech, one in 2011 in management and another in 2013 in marketing. He is working on a master's degree this fall.
- He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history in April of 2010 by becoming the first Chinese American to be drafted by an NFL team when Buffalo took him in the fourth round. Ed and David were featured on NFL China in 2010 as a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football.
- Wang made the move to center last year and was a stalwart inside, making all the calls for the line and earning All-ACC honors.
- Tech also holds the distinction of having the first Korean American drafted by an NFL team as Eugene Chung was taken by New England in the first round of the 1992 Draft. His son, Kyle, is a redshirt freshman offensive lineman for the Hokies this season.

HOKIE PRIDE

 Virginia Tech football has always prided itself on taking care of its players before, during and after their time in Blacksburg. A testament to the family atmosphere created is the roster of former Hokie players serving in some capacity with the football team in the athletic department.

AFRICAN CONNECTIONS

- Ken Ekanem has maintained a long-distance relationship with his father, who lives in Nigeria, since he was 11 years old. Ime Ekanem has seen Ken play football only a few times but will be in the stands for Tech's first three games this year, temporarily halting a campaign to become governor of the southern Nigerian state of Akwa Ibom.
- Freshman **Melvin Keihn** (pronounced CANE) was born in Monrovia, Liberia, but left the West African nation when he was 8 years old and hasn't been back. His father, Bainda, lives in the States, but his mother, Satta, still lives in Liberia. Keihn gets to talk to her every 2-3 weeks to keep her abreast of how he's doing at school.

Doing Good DEEDS

- Head coach Frank Beamer is a strong believer in giving back to the community. He founded Herma's Readers in 2008, and in 2012, the team helped raise money for Wounded Warrior Project.
- The team has also raised money to help support Breast Cancer Awareness and Ewing's sarcoma cancer.

OFFENSIVE LINE PLAY BREAKDOWN

THIS IS VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

- Head coach Frank Beamer is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) with 266 victories and is sixth all-time among FBS coaches in terms of career victories ahead of such legends as Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler, Tom Osborne, LaVell Edwards, Hayden Fry and Lou Holtz.
- No coach among the 125 active Division I-A head football coaches has been at his current school longer for more consecutive years than Coach Beamer, as he is in his 28th season at the helm of the Hokies' program.
- Coach Beamer is one of 10 all-time coaches in Division I/FBS to win 200 or more games at one college. Currently, only 36 coaches at all levels are in this group.
- In 11 of the past 13 years, Virginia Tech has graduated at least 70 percent of its football class and had two Academic All-Americans in 2011. From 2001-2013, there have been 229 senior Tech football players on the roster with 213 earning their degree, 93 percent. By the time this year is over, 74 of 77 seniors since 2010 will have graduated from Tech.
- Virginia Tech won 10 or more games in every year from 2004-2011, tied for the third-longest streak in the modern era. Tech has won 10 or more games 11 times over the past 15 seasons, and 13 of the past 18 seasons.
- With its trip to the Hyundai Sun Bowl last year, Virginia Tech is now one of only two teams to go to at least 21 bowls in a row. The other one is Florida State (32) after Florida had its 22-year streak broken last season.
- Tech is one of only six programs in college football history to go to a bowl in at least 21 straight years, Nebraska (35), Michigan (33), Florida State (32; active), Alabama (25), Florida (22) and Tech (21; active).
- Head coach Frank Beamer (21) is one of only four coaches all-time to lead a program to 21 or more straight bowl games, joining Bobby Bowden (Florida State, 28), Tom Osborne (Nebraska, 25) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (Alabama, 24).
- Virginia Tech has been a consistent winner since the mid-90s, winning an average of 9.2 games per year during the current streak of 21 straight seasons capped by bowl appearances.
- Since joining the ACC prior to the 2004 season, Virginia Tech has compiled an 99-34 overall record, the best mark of any school in the conference. Tech's 62-18 league record (65-20 if you count the title game outcomes) and four league crowns are also the best among league teams during that span.
- Since 1980, Tech is one of just nine schools to produce a No. 1 overall pick in the NFL at least twice. The other schools are Auburn (3), Miami (2), Ohio State (2), Southern Cal (2), Penn State (2), Stanford (2), South Carolina (2) and Oklahoma (2).
- Herma's Readers is a non-profit organization that promotes the power of reading and literacy to youngsters during their formative years, grades K-3. The organization was formed as a tribute to Tech head football coach Frank Beamer's late mother, Herma, a teacher for over 30 years in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Herma's Readers has delivered thousands of new and used books collected at Virginia Tech football games to youngsters throughout the Commonwealth.

MORE IMPORTANT THINGS THAN FOOTBALL

- Senior Kyshoen Jarrett may be thriving at his rover position, but he knows there are way more important things in life than football.
- Jarrett's older brother, Daishawn Capers, has cerebral palsy and is legally blind. He is wheelchair-bound and needs help doing almost everything, relying on his brother and mother, Vinise Capers. In high school, Jarrett would often take care of Daishawn, either getting him ready for school in the morning or by watching him during the evenings when their mother was away.
- Though from Tannersville, Pennsylvania, Jarrett's mother and brother now live in North Carolina and come

- to almost every home game. Daishawn sits there waiting to hear his brother's name over the public address system, ready to cheer for his brother every time he makes a play.
- Jarrett is a converted cornerback who moved to the rover position in the spring of 2012 and now starts there while also seeing time as a punt returner.
- At Pittsburgh in 2012, he broke off a 94-yard punt return for a touchdown, the second-longest return in school history and the longest under head coach Frank Beamer. He averaged 13.9 yards per punt return that year, ninth-best in the FBS, and was third on the team last year with 71 tackles as he earned All-ACC honors as a defensive back.

INTERNATIONAL RECEIVERS

- Two of Tech's main threats in its receiving corps aren't even from the United States. Junior **Demitri Knowles** hails from Freeport, Grand Bahamas in The Bahamas and redshirt sophomore **Joshua Stanford** is from Mississauga, Ontario in Canada.
- Knowles was born and raised in The Bahamas and grew up competing in swimming and track before moving to Lynchburg, Virginia, to try his hand at football. After

- spending just two seasons at Liberty Christian Academy playing a sport he really knew nothing about before he was 14 years old, Knowles is making strides in the game.
- Knowles' only exposure to the game before his high school years — other than watching Miami Dolphins and Miami Hurricanes games on television — was playing it in his backyard.
- But then, Devard Darling, a native of The Bahamas and a former Florida State and Washington State receiver who was on NFL rosters for seven seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, Kansas City Chiefs and Houston Texans, brought a football camp to Freeport. Knowles attended the camp, and won Most Valuable Player honors. He was hooked and moved to Virginia for his final two years of high school, where his speed caught the eye of Virginia Tech coaches.
- Knowles caught a 42-yard touchdown midway through the fourth quarter of Virginia Tech's 20-17 overtime win against Georgia Tech in the 2012 season-opener. Last year, he had 45 receptions for 641 yards and three touchdowns.
- Stanford, a Canadian born and bred, eschewed his first love, hockey, because it was too expensive, so he migrated toward football. Because of a situation back home in Canada, his parents decided it'd be best for him to move south to live with family friends in Georgia when he was 15. There is where his game really took off. Stanford's recruiting heated up late and Virginia Tech got a verbal from him late, right before the 2012 signing day.
- The Canadian also has a blossoming musical career as he has recorded several tracks under his stage name of Yoshi, which can be found on YouTube.
- Stanford had 171 yards receiving tied for the fifth-most in Tech history for a single game - at Boston
 College last year and followed that up with a seven-catch, 107-yard, one touchdown game at No. 14 Miami.
- Last season, he had 40 catches for 640 yards and a touchdown.

McLaughlin Makes History

- Jonathan McLaughlin made history at Virginia Tech last year, becoming the first true freshman to start any game at left tackle under head coach Frank Beamer when he got the nod against top-ranked Alabama.
- The South Carolina native enrolled at Tech in January after a semester at Fork Union and quickly moved up the depth chart. He continued his impressive play in the fall and earned the starting spot at left tackle. He started all 13 games last year, playing 852 offensive snaps with 39 knockdown blocks en route to second-team freshman All-America honors from College Football News.

D-BLOCK IN GOOD, BUT YOUNG, HANDS

- No true freshman had ever started the opening game at cornerback under Coach Frank Beamer until **Brandon Facyson** got the nod against Alabama at field corner.

 Antonio Banks was the last true freshman to start a season opener in the secondary and that came at free safety in the 1993 season opener. Facyson, who has aspirations of being a heart surgeon, tallied 27 tackles last year.
- Tech opened the Alabama game in a nickel package, meaning two true freshmen started in the secondary: **Kendall Fuller** as the nickel back and Facyson at



the field corner spot. Last season, Fuller started 12 games, recording 56 tackles, a Tech freshman-record six interceptions (including three against Duke) and 10 break ups, while Facyson had five interceptions. Both earned All-ACC honors as well Freshman All-America honors and will start at corner this season.

WALK-ON TO STARTER FOR ROGERS

- Sam Rogers entered the 2013 camp as a walk-on fullback in the No. 4 position on the depth chart, but was the starter by the first game and is back in that role this year. He chose to walk-on at Tech over scholarship offers at Bucknell and St. Francis, as well as walk-on opportunities at Virginia, Richmond and William & Mary.
- At 5-foot-10, 222 pounds, Rogers did it all for Hanover High in Mechanicsville (outside Richmond), playing quarterback, receiver, running back and multiple positions on defense, earning first-team all-state honors as a utility player. His brother, Ben, was an All-America center on the Division III level for Hampden-Sydney College.
- Rogers earned the President's Award (player who demonstrates the most outstanding leadership during the offseason program and spring workouts) for the offense at the end of the spring session.

THE LEADER OF THE D ... AND HIS FAMILY

- Senior free safety **Detrick Bonner** is the quiet quarterback of the Hokie defense as the leader in the secondary. He's also the leader of his family. The Georgia native has six siblings and was often in charge of the children while his mother worked long hours. One of his younger brothers, Alvin Hill plays, defensive back for the University of Maryland.
- Bonner picked off two passes against Western
 Carolina last year, returning one for a touchdown against the Catamounts.

THE PAPERBOY KEEPS DELIVERING

- Heading into last season, **Willie Byrn** had one career reception. Last season alone, he led the team with 51 catches, compiling 660 yards and two touchdowns. Nicknamed "The Paperboy" by offensive coordinator **Scot Loeffler** because "he always delivers," Byrn was a steadying veteran on a young offense last year.
- The former walk-on earned a scholarship last preseason and his 51 catches last year were the fifth-most in a single season at Tech.

TIGHT ENDS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

- It's no secret that offensive coordinator Scot Loeffler likes to utilize the tight ends in his offense. Last year, he lost projected starter **Ryan Malleck** for the year in the preseason and had to scramble to rework his schemes. This year, Malleck is back, along with several other big bodies who will factor in this season.
- Malleck, a 6-5, 242-pound redshirt junior, sustained a left rotator cuff tear/labral tear during the preseason and missed the 2013 season. In 2012, he caught 17 passes for 174 yards and is expected to do big things this year.
- **Bucky Hodges** is the biggest of the bunch, checking in at 6-6, 244 pounds. The redshirt freshman came to Tech as a quarterback, but spent last year on the scout team terrorizing the defense at tight end and made the permanent move in the spring.
- **Darius Redman** has never caught a pass at Tech, but is one of the better blockers among the Tech tight ends. At 6-4, 271 pounds, Redman brings size and strength to the position.
- Sophomore Kalvin Cline (6-4, 240) didn't sign with the Hokies on Signing Day and didn't accept a scholarship offer until May of his senior year. The Florida native played just one year of high school after starring in basketball, but caught on to the sport quickly. Last year as a true freshman, he caught 26 passes for 321 yards and two TDs.

receptions in 1971 for 558 yards and two scores, coming in just 11 games.

MADDY AND DADI: THE HAITIAN SENSATIONS

• Virginia Tech features a pair of Delray Beach, Florida, products on its defensive line in tackle **Luther Maddy** and end **Dadi Nicolas**. Both of Haitian descent, the lightly recruited players from Atlantic High are both making a big impact for the Hokies. Maddy had 55 tackles last season, including 13.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks, while Nicolas had 32 tackles, including seven tackles for loss and four sacks.

 Both are on track to graduate from Virginia Tech this fall, Maddy with a degree in apparel, housing and resources management and Nicolas (a junior) with a degree in sociology.

EXCALIBUR **W**ORTHY

- Tech offensive linemen **Augie Conte**, **Wyatt Teller** and **Laurence Gibson** earned Excalibur Awards this summer, the top honor in Dr. Mike Gentry's strength and conditioning program. The Excalibur Award is more comprehensive than the program's other honors (e.g. Super Iron Hokie, Iron Hokie, etc.), looking at all areas of football strength and conditioning from strength and power to acceleration, speed, flexibility and agility.
- The trio became the first Tech football players to earn the award since former standouts Marcus Davis and Joey Phillips received the honor in 2012. They became the first offensive linemen to earn the honor since Brandon Frye won it back in 2006.
- Conte led all Tech players in the bench press (440 pounds), front squat (460) and push jerk (385). Teller finished second behind Conte in the front squat (450) and push jerk (375), and he actually tied Conte in the bench press, but Conte is considered the leader because he weighs less than Teller (weight is the tiebreaker). Gibson led all Tech players in the power clean (385) and finished fourth in the bench press (430) and fifth in the push jerk (340). Gibson's 385-pound power clean broke the position record for an offensive tackle. Conte held the previous record of 375 pounds, which he set last year.

SCORING IN DIFFERENT WAYS

- During Frank Beamer's time at Tech, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 39 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams.
- Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 134 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987.
- Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 83 TDs (55 on interceptions, 26 on fumble returns, two on fumble recoveries). The special teams have added 51 TDs (18 on blocked punts, 19 on punt returns, nine on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals, one on a fumble recovery).
- Under Beamer, 85 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall led the way with seven.



Virginia Tech has a **183-60** record during the scoring streak, averaging **34.1** points in the wins and **20.3** points in the losses. The Hokies had only four occasions where they were delayed extending the streak until the fourth quarter. The last time came in the 2012 Russell Athletic Bowl in a 13-10 overtime win against Rutgers. The latest Tech scored its first points in a game was with 6:58 left in the 2005 Sugar Bowl against Auburn, a game in which the Hokies went on to score another touchdown in the loss. There have been **seven** occasions where Virginia Tech scored just once to continue the streak, by seven different players. Only once did Tech's lone score come in the fourth quarter of a game and that came in 2005 when Marcus Vick scored on a 5-yard run with 8:06 left in a 27-7 loss.
