THE SERIES

• The Military Bowl will be the 11th football meeting between Virginia Tech and the University of Cincinnati in a series that dates back to 1947 and is tied 5-5.

• The Bearcats won the first three meetings between the two schools, including an 18-7 decision in the Sun Bowl following the 1946 season. UC also registered a 31-14 win at home in 1985 and downed the Hokies, 24-20, in Blacksburg in the 1986 season opener. Virginia Tech then won the next three games to tie the series. The Hokies edged UC, 21-20, in Blacksburg during the 1987 season, won at Cincinnati, 41-14, in 1988 and posted a 56-9 decision at Lane Stadium in 1991.

• In 1995, the Bearcats shut out the Hokies 16-0 at Lane Stadium. Virginia Tech has gone on to score in 255 straight games since then. In 2006, the Hokies beat the Bearcats 29-13 at home and Tech downed the Bearcats 20-7 in the Orange Bowl following the 2008 season at SunLife Stadium in Florida.

• The last meeting came in 2012 as the Bearcats rallied in the final minute to knock off Tech 27-24 at FedExField in Landover, Maryland.

• This will be the third meeting in a bowl game between the two as they split the earlier two meetings.

SOLD OUT!

• Virginia Tech sold its allotment of nearly 8,000 tickets for the Military Bowl presented by Northrup Grumman



in less than 30 hours after the bowl and matchup was announced. The Northern Capital Region is home to Virginia Tech's largest alumni base as nearly 55,000 Tech graduates live in the area.

TECH-CINCINNATI CONNECTIONS

 Virginia Tech Director of Athletics Whit Babcock is in his first full year with the department. He came to Tech after spending two years as Cincinnati's Director of Athletics. While at Cincinnati, Babcock hired current Bearcat head coach Tommy Tuberville from Texas Tech.

• Virginia Tech starting quarterback Michael Brewer signed with Texas Tech and played for Tommy Tuberville. Brewer played for Tuberville for two years at Texas Tech before Tuberville left for Cincinnati. A year later, Brewer transferred to Virginia Tech after graduating from Texas Tech in May 2014.

 Cincinnati associate head coach Robert Prunty was
 Virginia Tech offensive lineman Laurence Gibson's head coach at Hargrave Military Academy. Gibson is from Sierra, Arizona, but came to Virginia for a season of prep school under Prunty.

• Virginia Tech has strong ties to the military and is proud to have a chance to play in the Military Bowl. The

- 10 Virginia Tech's last four games have been decided by a combined total of **10** points.
- 9 Nine of the Hokies' last 11 touchdowns have been scored by freshmen.
- 8 True freshman Isaiah Ford is one of only eight Tech players all-time to catch 50 or more passes in a single season.
- 7 Redshirt freshman Bucky Hodges' seven touchdown receptions are a Tech season record for a tight end.
- 6 Tech has not finished a season with **six** or fewer wins since 1992.
- 5 **Five** of the Hokies' six losses have been by seven points or less.
- 4 Senior Willie Byrn needs just four catches to become the 12th member of the 100-catch club for his Tech career.
- 3 The Hokies' **three** blocked kicks this season bring Tech's total blocks under Coach Frank Beamer to 132.
- 2 Tech is one of just **two** schools Florida State is the other to be selected for a bowl game each of the last 22 seasons.

Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets (VTCC) is the military component of the student body at Virginia Tech. Cadets live together in dormitories, march to meals in formation, wear a distinctive uniform on campus, and receive an intensive military and leadership educational experience similar to that available at the United States service academies.

 Sophomore tight end Kalvin Cline is a proud member of the VTCC, balancing time on the football field with his duties to the Corps.

• Since 1872, the Corps of Cadets has produced outstanding leaders for the Commonwealth and the Nation. Seven of its alumni have earned the Medal of Honor and over 100 of its graduates have been promoted to General and Flag Officer rank.

A BRIGHT FUTURE

• Twenty-five of Virginia Tech's 33 touchdowns on the season have been scored by freshmen (27 of 33 by underclassmen). Freshmen have scored 230 of 280 points this year for Tech - 82.1 percent - the most of any FBS school.

• Freshman Bucky Hodges has 517 yards receiving for the season, breaking the record for receiving yards in a season by a tight end under head coach Frank Beamer (475, Steve Johnson,

1987). He also has seven receiving touchdowns, setting a new school record for touchdown catches in a season by a tight end. He had been tied with Jeff King, who had six in 2005.

• Freshman Isaiah Ford broke the Tech freshman record for receiving yards in a season, moving past Joshua Stanford (614, 2013) and now has 665 yards entering the bowl game. He also has set the Tech freshman record for catches in a season (53). Three freshman: Ford (53), Hodges (42) and Cam Phillips (40) have 40 or more catches on the season.

THE BOWL STREAK

 This will be Tech's 22nd-straight bowl game appearance, which is the second-longest active streak in the country.

• With its bowl trip this year, Tech is one of only six programs in college football history to go to a bowl in at least 22 straight years: Nebraska (35), Michigan (33), Florida State

(33; active), Alabama (25), Florida (22) and Tech (22; active). · Frank Beamer is one of only four coaches all time to lead a program to 22 or more straight bowl games, joining Bobby

Bowden (Florida State, 28), Tom Osborne (Nebraska, 25) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (Alabama, 24).

TECH AT NEUTRAL SITES

• Virginia Tech has a 149-130-19 record in football games played at neutral sites and is 13-21 in neutral site games during Coach Frank Beamer's 28 seasons.

IN MARYLAND

• The Hokies are 6-15 all-time in the state of Maryland, last playing in the Old Line State in 2012, a 27-24 loss to Cincinnati at FedExField in Landover.

• Tech is 2-7 all-time in Annapolis, but eight of those nine previous games against Navy came in 1915 or earlier.

• Virginia Tech is 1-0 at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium, blanking the Midshipmen 14-0 in 1995.

ONE LAST RIDE

 This will be the last football game for long-time Virginia Tech Associate Athletic Director for Athletics Communications Dave Smith as he will retire this June after 40 years within the department. Smith, a 1970 graduate of Tech, began working in the athletic department in 1975. He will remain in Blacksburg as his wife, Debbie, will continue to teach at Virginia Tech.

COACH FRANK BEAMER

Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 206-75 record over the past 21plus seasons and have appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 28th year as the head football coach at Tech and 34th overall. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 230-115-2 record and sits with an overall record of 272-138-4.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 22 consecutive bowl appearances, four ACC titles, five ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories, six BCS appearances and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999, and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame, becoming the first active coach at the university to be honored in that fashion. Following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 68-year-old Hillsville, Virginia, native began as an assistant at Radford High School from 1969 through 1971. Then, after one season as a graduate assistant at the University of Maryland, he went to The Citadel where he worked five seasons under Bobby Ross and one year under Art Baker. His last two years at The Citadel, Beamer was the defensive coordinator. In 1979, he went to Murray State as the defensive coordinator under Mike Gottfried. He was named head coach at MSU in 1981 and went on to compile a six-year record of 42-23-2.

In 1990, Beamer received a new contract and a substantial pay raise. He refused the raise, however, until a time that all classified and faculty employees of the university could have the same opportunity for pay raises. Most state salaries had been frozen at the time. When offered a pay increase in 2006, he did not sign the agreement until his assistant coaches were taken care of.

He is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Virginia. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Virginia Tech and now the associate head coach/running backs coach at Virginia Tech; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech. He has three grandchildren, Sutton, Olivia and Hunter, children of Shane and his wife, Emily. Casey was married in 2012 to former Virginia Tech wrestler Canaan Prater.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, North Carolina, and grew up in Hillsville, Virginia. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball.

An avid NASCAR fan, Beamer has been the official starter for races at Bristol Motor Speedway, Martinsville Speedway and Richmond International Raceway.

Beamer, who is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision with 272 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002. He is sixth all-time among FBS coaches (min. 10 seasons at FBS school) in terms of all-time victories.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

• Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.

 Not one of the 128 active FBS head football coaches has been at his current school longer than Beamer.
 During Beamer's 27 previous years at Virginia

Tech, 20 different power conference schools have had six or more head coaches, including five schools in the ACC: Pittsburgh (7), Boston College (7), Louisville (7), North Carolina (7) and Miami (6). Two schools - Stanford and Vanderbilt - have had eight different coaches during the time Beamer has been the head coach at Tech.

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most frequently asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

JUST VIRGINIA TECH, PLEASE

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech." Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural

and Mechanical College, the university changed its named to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896. Fans of the athletic department, as well as

media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

665 ... yards receiving by true freshman Isaiah Ford set a new Tech single season record for a freshman. Joshua Stanford set the record with 640 yards in 2013. Ford also holds the Tech freshman record for catches in a season with 53. The Tech overall record for catches in a season is 61, set by Jarrett Boykin in 2011.

248 ... pass completions by quarterback Michael Brewer is a new single-season Tech record, surpassing the old mark of 234 set by Logan Thomas in 2011.

Game 1: Hokies Pull Away From Tribe in Opener

BLACKSBURG - Virginia Tech used a healthy dose of freshmen in posting a 34-9 season-opening victory over William & Mary at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Newcomers accounted for Tech's first 27 points against the Tribe – and 28 points in all – as the Hokies posted their 11th consecutive win over W&M.

Texas Tech transfer Michael Brewer opened at guarterback for the Hokies and completed 23 of 30 passes for 251 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He engineered a 14-play, 84-yard touchdown drive on the Hokies' first possession, completing passes to five different receivers in the process.

Freshman tailback Shai Mckenzie contributed 106 yards rushing on just nine carries, including a 39-yard touchdown scamper that broke the game open in the third quarter. Meanwhile, true freshman wide receiver Isaiah Ford and redshirt freshman tight end Bucky Hodges posted Tech's first two TDs.

Defensively, the Hokies held W&M out of the end zone, forcing them to settle for three field goals. The Tribe managed just 76 yards on the ground and 193 overall.

COLUMBUS, Ohio – Virginia Tech stunned nationally eighth-ranked Ohio State University at Ohio Stadium, 35-21, before a record crowd of 107,517 fans. The win ended Buckeye streaks of 35 consecutive wins in home openers, which dated back to 1979, and 64 straight wins against unranked, non-conference foes that extended back to 1982.

Tech never trailed in the game, building a 21-7 advantage by halftime thanks to touchdowns from Shai McKenzie, Marshawn Williams and fullback Sam Rogers.

Ohio State capitalized on a pair of Hokie turnovers to pull even at 21-all with 11:40 left in the game, but he Hokies met the challenge with a pair of scores of their own over the last nine minutes, assuring their first victory away from home against a team ranked in the top eight. With the game tied, Tech marched down the field and scored on a Bucky Hodges touchdown catch to take the lead for good.

Tech scored two touchdowns on the ground and two through the air before junior cornerback Donovan Riley clinched the win with a 63-yard interception return for a score with just 46 seconds remaining. It was one of three interceptions for the defense, which also contributed seven guarterback sacks.

Game Notes

• The Hokies were the first unranked ACC team to beat a top-10 opponent on the road since Sept. 19, 2009 when Florida State defeated seventh-ranked BYU in Provo, 54-28.

 Cornerback Donovan Riley became the 86th different Tech player to score a touchdown on defense or special teams during Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach. Riley's interception and 63-yard return for a touchdown clinched the Tech win.

 Senior Kyshoen Jarrett picked off a career-best two passes in the game, giving him four interceptions for his career.

 Sophomore fullback Sam Rogers picked up his first collegiate touchdown, grabbing a 10-yard pass from Michael Brewer with 52 seconds remaining in the first half.

• The Buckeye crowd of 107,517 represented the most people a Tech football team had ever played in front of.

Game 3: Hokies Can't Overcome Slow Start Against Pirates

Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Blacksburg, Va. Sept. 13, 2014 • Attendance: 63,267

BLACKSBURG - East Carolina University quarterback Shane Carden slipped into the end zone from a yard out with 16 seconds on the clock to give the visiting Pirates a 28-21 victory over No. 17 ranked Virginia Tech at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Carden tossed three TD passes in the first quarter to stake ECU to a lead it held until late in the final guarter. The homestanding Hokies, meanwhile, struggled to get in gear both offensively and defensively, finally getting on the board with a 73-yard touchdown drive at the end of the first half.

Tech managed to tie the game at 21-all with a pair of TD passes late in the fourth quarter only to see its ensuing kickoff sail out of bounds. That, plus a pair of substitution penalties, aided the Pirates' three-play, 65yard drive for the winning score.

Hokie quarterback Michael Brewer completed 30 of 56 passing attempts for 298 yards and three touchdowns. It was the most passing attempts ever for a Tech guarterback, surpassing the old mark of 53 shared by Don Strock (1972 vs. Houston) and Sean Glennon (2006 vs. Georgia Tech).

East Carolina finished the game with 502 total yards of offense, with Carden accounting for 427 yards through the air, the third highest total for an opposing player against the Hokies. His 440 yards of total offense was also the third-highest total against Tech.

BLACKSBURG - For the second straight week, Virginia Tech suffered a last-minute loss at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. This time it came when Georgia Tech's Harrison Butker booted a 24-vard field goal as time expired to give the Yellow Jackets a 27-24 Atlantic Coast Conference road win in the league opener for both teams. Georgia Tech turned three pass

interceptions into 17 points with the final pick at the Hokies' 40-yard-line setting up the winning drive with 1:58 remaining. The Jackets' second pick of the game was returned for a touchdown, giving the visitors a 17-16 lead with 11:22 left in the game.

Virginia Tech put together a seven-play, 75-yard drive to take back the lead, 24-17, with 8:03 remaining. The Hokies halted Georgia Tech on its next possession but were unable to capitalize. The Yellow Jackets went on to tie the game with a nine play, 67-yard drive that was kept alive by a clutch 19-yard pass by guarterback Justin Thomas on a 4th-and-15 play.

Georgia Tech won despite converting on just four of 12 third-down situations. The Yellow Jackets rushed for 250 yards in the game and finished with 375 vards of total offense.

Despite the interceptions, the Hokies finished with 297 yards passing and 424 yards overall. Freshman wide receiver Isaiah Ford had career highs of eight catches and 114 yards receiving.

 Virginia Tech has lost home games on consecutive weeks for the first time since opening the 1995 season with back-to-back losses to Boston College and Cincinnati.

BLACKSBURG – Virginia Tech scored in the first eight seconds of the game and went on to a 35-17 victory over visiting Western Michigan at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Hokies snapped a two-game losing streak, piling up 308 yards on the ground and 486 yards of total offense along the wav.

Andrew Motuapuaka's 11-yard fumble return on the opening kickoff staked Tech to a lead it would never surrender as the Hokies scored four different ways while building an 18-7 first-quarter lead. Freshmen tailbacks Marshawn Williams and Shai McKenzie fueled much of the Tech attack with some tough running. Williams ran for a career-best 119 yards, while McKenzie contributed 87 yards and a touchdown on the ground.

Quarterback Michael Brewer suffered a pair of interceptions but countered with touchdown passes to redshirt freshman tight end Bucky Hodges and true freshman wide receiver Isaiah Ford. Freshmen or redshirt freshmen accounted for 33 of Tech's 35 points.

Tech's defense held WMU to 231 total yards of offense, including just 19 yards rushing. The Broncos were able to convert just 4 of 15 third down opportunities and suffered five quarterback sacks.

Game Notes

 Tech's touchdown eight seconds into the game marked the fastest that the Hokies have ever scored under head coach Frank Beamer, topping a touchdown 18 seconds into the Hokies' 1999 game at Rutgers when Michael Vick connected with André Davis on a 74-yard TD pass.

PITTSBURGH, Pa. - The University of Pittsburgh continued its mastery over Virginia Tech in games played at Heinz Field with a 21-16, Thursday night victory on ESPN. The win gave the Panthers a 4-0 record against the Hokies at the venue.

Turnovers and penalties plaqued Tech in an outing that it managed just 26 yards rushing and converted on only two of 14 third-down opportunities. The Hokies had just 22 rushing attempts, the secondfewest ever in the Frank Beamer era. Still, the Hokies had the ball with a chance to win in the final minutes, but stalled just short of midfield with 1:22 remaining.

Pitt gained the upper hand in the fourth quarter when it stopped Tech on a fourth-and-2 play at the Panthers' 38-yard line, then took just two plays to move 62 yards for a touchdown and a 21-9 advantage. The Hokies managed to keep their chances alive with a nine-play, 80-yard touchdown drive that ended with 4:52 left.

Tech, which was averaging 34:55 minutes of possession time per game (third best in the nation), controlled the ball for just 28:14 against the Panthers.

All of Tech's scoring came from true freshmen, with kicker Joey Slye kicking three field goals and an extra point and receiver Cam Phillips grabbing a 14-yard touchdown pass.

Game Notes

 Tech failed to score 21 points or more for the first time this season. The Hokies' six points at the half were also a season low.

 Defensive tackle Corey Marshall picked off a pass during the second quarter, the first interception of his Tech career.

 Defensive end Dadi Nicolas recorded the Hokies' first blocked kick of the season when he tipped a fourthquarter field goal. It was Nicolas' first career block and the 132nd blocked kick under Coach Frank Beamer (40th field goal).

 Freshman receiver Cam Phillips tied his career high with seven catches against the Panthers.

BLACKSBURG – Boston College built a 23-10 advantage during the first three quarters of play, then withstood a frantic fourth-quarter Virginia Tech rally to post a 33-31 win over the Hokies at Lane Stadium/ Worsham Field.

Tech quarterback Michael Brewer ran for one touchdown and passed for another as the Hokies took their first lead of the game, 24-23, with 7:12 remaining.

The Eagles answered quickly, however, marching for a go-ahead field goal less than three minutes later. Then, after Tech went three-and-out, quarterback Tyler Murphy broke the Hokies' back with a 57-yard touchdown sprint on a thirdand-10 play with less than three minutes remaining.

The Hokies would score late to cap a 21-point fourth quarter, but failed to recover the onsides kick with under a minute left as BC was able to run out the clock.

The loss was Virginia Tech's fourth of the season at home, marking just the second time in Lane Stadium's 50 seasons that the Hokies had suffered four home losses. The only other time was 1992, the year before Tech's bowl streak started.

DURHAM, N.C. – Virginia Tech snapped a three-game losing streak with a hardfought 17-16 road win at No. 19 ranked Duke. The Hokies overcame a 16-7 deficit during the final 16 minutes of play and then withstood a pair of late pushes by the Blue Devils.

A 51-yard pass interception return by Tech linebacker Derek Di Nardo set up a 35-yard field goal by Joey Slye as time expired in the third quarter. On the ensuing kickoff, the Hokies' Anthony Shegog caused a fumble that Dahman McKinnon pounced on at the Duke 31. From there, it took Tech just five plays to take the lead on a 15-yard pass from Michael Brewer to tight end Bucky Hodges with just over 12 minutes remaining.

Duke had a chance to regain the lead after moving to the Tech 22, but missed a 40-yard field goal with 2:26 remaining. The Blue Devils got another shot with two minutes on the clock but the pressure from the Hokies' defense proved to be too much, giving Tech the ball on downs with just 43 seconds left.

After losing its third starting tailback to injury, this time Marshawn Williams to a knee injury, junior J.C. Coleman stepped in and carried the ball 20 times for 95 yards to provide a spark for the Virginia Tech offense.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Wake Forest kicker Mike Weaver missed three field goals in regulation play before converting both of his opportunities during overtime to give the Demon Deacons a 6-3 doubleovertime victory over visiting Virginia Tech.

Tech opened the game by quickly moving to the Wake 36 yard-line where it was forced to punt. As it turned out, the drive would be one of just three total trips into Wake territory for the Hokies, with both of the other two drives ending with fumbles.

Wake fared only slightly better in the field position battle, entering Tech territory a total of five times. Three of those drives ended with missed field goals, while the others ended on an interception and a punt.

After four scoreless quarters, Weaver connected on a 49-yard field goal in the first extra period, with Tech's Joey Slye answering for Tech with a 28-yarder. Tech lost yardage in the second OT forcing Slye to attempt a 53-yard field goal that was wide left. Wake picked up just 4 yards on three plays but it was enough for Weaver, who delivered the game-winner from 39 yards out.

Tech had three turnovers and converted on only three of its 15 thirddown possessions helping the Deacons to a seven-minute edge in time of possession. Tech's defense had 16 tackles for loss, including seven guarterback sacks.

BLACKSBURG - Tight end Bucky Hodges snared a 9-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Michael Brewer with 1:48 remaining and the defense held late as Virginia Tech defeated in-state rival Virginia, 24-20, at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field in the regular-season finale for both teams. The victory assured Tech possession of the Commonwealth Cup for the 11th-consecutive year and cleared the way for the Hokies' 22ndstraight bowl bid, the second-longest active streak in the country.

Hodges played a major role in the win, recovering a blocked punt for a touchdown in the second guarter, and then making two clutch catches on the Hokies' final drive. The 6-foot-6 redshirt freshman hauled in a 50-yard toss from Brewer to set up his touchdown reception.

Tech's defense nailed down the win, posting three of its four quarterback sacks during the Cavaliers' final possession. Tech ends Dadi Nicolas and Ken Ekanem combined for a sack that sent Cavs' starting quarterback Greyson Lambert to the sidelines on the first play of the drive and teamed on another that ended the drive at the Hokies' 44 with four seconds remaining to clinch the victory.

J.C. Coleman rushed for 118 yards as the offense posted 433 yards, the most allowed by UVa in 2014.

Game Notes

• Freshman C.J. Reavis recorded the first blocked punt of his career, which was recovered by teammate Bucky Hodges for a touchdown. It was the 134th blocked kick and 66th punt blocked during Coach Frank Beamer's 28 seasons at Virginia Tech.

• With his 58 yards in the game, Isaiah Ford broke the Virginia Tech freshman record for receiving yards in a season, moving past Joshua Stanford who had 614 vards in 2013. Ford now has 665 yards. He has already set the freshman record for catches in a season with 53.

Last Meeting: Bearcats Stun Hokies In Final Seconds at FedExField

LANDOVER, Md. – University of Cincinnati guarterback Munchie Legaux connected with Damon Julian on a 39-yard touchdown pass with 13 seconds remaining as the Bearcats drove 85 yards to grab a 27-24 victory over Virginia Tech at FedExField.

Cincinnati's stunning drive came on the heels of a 56-yard scoring pass from Tech's Logan Thomas to Corey Fuller that had given the Hokies a 24-20 lead with 1:49 showing on the clock.

Tech struggled throughout the first half but still managed to hold a 7-6 advantage despite gaining just 72 yards of offense.

An interception by defensive tackle Kris Harley at the UC 13 set up a 5-yard TD run by Thomas with 2:41 left in the second quarter that gave the Hokies the lead.

The Bearcats regained the lead in the third quarter and held it until Fuller's touchdown catch. Legaux used nine plays to drive UC to victory. He passed for 376 yards and three TDs and added a key 13-yard run on third-and-10 to keep the final drive alive.

OF NOTE: Sixteen Tech players who played in the 2012 game are expected to be active against Cincinnati for the bowl game.

A WIN IN THE MILITARY BOWL WOULD MEAN ...

• The Hokies would pick up their seventh win of the season, giving them a winning record for the 22nd-straight season. Tech's last non-winning season came in 1992, when the Hokies went 2-8-1.

 A 22-season stretch of non-losing seasons would be the 19th-longest in NCAA history (Penn State has the record at 49 seasons from 1939-87), but still would be four shy of the school record. Tech had 26 non-losing seasons from 1894-1919.

BOWL BITS

• Fourteen players who started against UCLA last season in the Sun Bowl are on this year's roster with nine of them projected to, or who could, start against Cincinnati.

• Seven players who started against Rutgers two seasons ago in the Russell Athletic Bowl are on this year's roster, five of whom are projected to, or who could, start against the Bearcats.

• There are two players still on this year's team who started against Michigan three seasons ago in the Sugar Bowl - Detrick Bonner and Luther Maddy. Maddy will miss the game, but Bonner is slated to make his 40th straight start.

The Virginia Tech Athletics Department began construction on its muchanticipated new indoor practice facility project this past summer with the goal of having it completed by August, 2015.

HKS Architects, a global company with offices throughout the United States, won the bid to design the facility and W.M Jordan Company, based out of Newport News, Virginia, is the general contractor.

Tech's much-needed indoor facility will be 210 feet wide and 400 feet long, with an artificial surface similar to the surface at English Field, the Hokies' baseball home. It also will be 85 feet high, thus allowing plenty of room for punting and kicking. The facility's eight-foot padded walls, wide sidelines, full scoreboard and 40-second clocks on each end will allow the football team to hold a full-contact scrimmage – something it is unable to do at its current indoor home, Rector Field House.

The facility will feature doors that roll up, so that if the football team is



practicing outside and a thunderstorm approaches, it then can move quickly and easily inside. The facility also will consist of two observation decks, with the highest one for filming of practices and the lower one for head football coach Frank Beamer's observation of practices. Video photographers will be able to shoot video from six different positions.

The facility will possess stadium lighting both inside and outside. The outside lighting will allow the football team to practice on its outdoor fields late into the evening.

The facility will benefit an array of sports, as athletics department officials wanted an indoor facility for sports like baseball, softball, lacrosse and both soccer teams to use during inclement weather, particularly in early spring. The price tag for project figures to run around \$21.3 million.

New Face Under Center

• From Nov. 22, 2008 to Dec. 31, 2013, Virginia Tech had exactly two guarterbacks combine to start those 71 games: Tyrod Taylor (31) and Logan Thomas (40). Both were record-setters while in Blacksburg and both are now in the NFL. That has changed this year as Michael Brewer takes the helm at guarterback for the Hokies. The transfer from Texas Tech University was named the starter on Aug. 23 after a tough preseason battle.

 Brewer has the bloodlines to be successful in college football as several members of his family played. His father, Robert, played quarterback at Texas; his grandfather, Charlie, played quarterback at Texas; his uncle, Rob Moerschell, played quarterback at Texas; his great uncle, Robert, played quarterback at Texas Tech; and his great uncle, George, played running back at Oklahoma.

 Brewer graduated from Texas Tech this past spring with a degree in personal financial planning, thus making him immediately eligible at Virginia Tech. He is working on a Master's in curriculum and instruction at Virginia Tech.

• In the 2014 campaign, he's completed just under 60 percent of his passes, throwing for 2,598 yards and 17 scores on a school-record 248 completions.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

• Defensive players Ronny and Devin Vandyke are just two of numerous Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program. There are two sets of brothers on the team and two other players on the team with brothers who played at Virginia Tech. **David Wang** is the younger brother of former offensive tackle Ed Wang.

 Kendall Fuller is a sophomore defensive back who is following in the footsteps of his older brothers. He is the voungest brother of former Hokie players Vincent Fuller, who played six seasons with the Tennessee Titans, Corey

• From 2001-2013, there were 229 senior Tech football players on the roster with 214 earning their degree, 93.4 percent. By the time this year is over, 78 of 80 seniors since 2010 will have graduated from Tech.

• The Tech football program scored 977 for its multiyear APR – its highest score ever. Tech eclipsed its previous best score for the seventh straight year, and the Hokies' 977 score ranked fifth in the ACC behind Duke (992), Clemson (983), Georgia Tech (983) and BC (981).

THE FABULOUS FULLERS

• Virginia Tech has had plenty of success recruiting the household of Vincent and Nina Fuller up in Baltimore. There was Vincent, who went on to be drafted in the fourth round of the NFL Draft by Tennessee and spent eight years in the league. He played at Tech from 2001-04, recording eight career interceptions and is now in law school at Fordham University.

• In 2010, Kyle signed with the Hokies and had a big impact on the program, earning second-team All-America honors as a senior. He was a first-round pick of the Chicago Bears in the 2014 NFL Draft.

• The second-oldest Fuller, Corey, took a different route to Blacksburg. He signed to run track at Kansas and competed for two years in Lawrence. He decided to give football a try and transferred to Tech in 2010, sitting out a year as required by the NCAA. He had a break-out year as a receiver in his final season at Tech and ended up being drafted in the sixth round by the Detroit Lions in 2013. After spending last season on the practice squad, he made the 53-man squad this year.

• The youngest and final Fuller - Kendall - signed with the Hokies in 2013 and had an immediate impact on the program, earning All-ACC honors twice, including firstteam accolades this year.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

• David Wang comes from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team. Wang has already graduated with a pair of degrees from Tech, one in 2011 in management and another in 2013 in marketing. He is working on a master's degree this fall.

• He is the brother of former Hokie Ed Wang, who made history in April of 2010 by becoming the first Chinese American to be drafted by an NFL team when Buffalo took him in the fourth round. Ed and David were featured on NFL China in 2010 as a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football. Wang made the move to center last year and was a stalwart inside, making all the calls for the line and earning All-ACC honors.

• Tech also holds the distinction of having the first Korean American drafted by an NFL team as Eugene Chung was taken by New England in the first round of the 1992 Draft. His son, Kyle, is a redshirt freshman offensive lineman for the Hokies this season.

TRIMBLE PART OF IMPRESSIVE FAMILY

• Josh Trimble is the fourth brother in his family to play football at the FBS level, but the first to take a different path. Older brothers Jeremy, Jordan and Justin all played for Army. Jeremy recently returned from a tour in South Korea while Jordan returned last year from a tour in Afghanistan. Justin graduated from West Point in 2013 and is stationed in Oklahoma. The four brothers are the sons of former Bishop O'Connell football coach Steve Trimble, a Maryland defensive back who played four years in the NFL, who died of a heart attack in his school office in 2011. The elder Trimble was a member of the NFL's Broncos and Bears in the early '80s.

 Josh Trimble has gone from a walk-on to a starting outside linebacker in 2013 for the Hokies and earned a scholarship last preseason. Last year, he had 20 tackles and a sack, starting five games.

MORE IMPORTANT THINGS THAN FOOTBALL

 Senior Kyshoen Jarrett may be thriving at his rover position, but he knows there are way more important things in life than football.

 Jarrett's older brother, Daishawn Capers, has cerebral palsy and is legally blind. He is wheelchair-bound and needs help doing almost everything, relying on his brother and mother, Vinise Capers. In high school, Jarrett would often take care of Daishawn, either getting him ready for school in the morning or by watching him during the evenings when their mother was away.

 Though from Tannersville, Pennsylvania, Jarrett's mother and brother now live in North Carolina and come to almost every home game. Daishawn sits there waiting to hear his brother's name over the public address system, ready to cheer for his brother every time he makes a play.

- Jarrett is a converted cornerback who moved to the rover position in the spring of 2012 and now starts there while also seeing time as a punt returner.

• At Pitt in 2012, he broke off a 94-yard punt return for a touchdown, the second-longest return in school history

• Ken Ekanem (pronounced ee-CAN-um) has maintained a long-distance relationship with his father, who lives in Nigeria, since he was 11 years old. Ime Ekanem has seen Ken play football only a few times but will be in the stands for Tech's first three games this year, temporarily halting a campaign to become governor of the southern Nigerian state of Akwa Ibom.

• Freshman **Melvin Keihn** (pronounced CANE) was born in Monrovia, Liberia, but left the West African nation

MILITARY BOWL VS. CINCINNATI

THIS IS VIRGINIA TECH FOOTBALL

• Head coach Frank Beamer is the winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) with 272 victories and is sixth all-time among FBS coaches in terms of career victories – ahead of such legends as Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler, Tom Osborne, LaVell Edwards, Hayden Fry and Lou Holtz.

• No coach among the 128 active Division I-A head football coaches has been at his current school longer for more consecutive years than Coach Beamer, as he is in his 28th season at the helm of the Hokies' program.

• Coach Beamer is one of 10 all-time coaches in Division I/FBS to win 200 or more games at one college. Currently, only 36 coaches at all levels are in this group.

• In 11 of the past 13 years, Virginia Tech has graduated at least 70 percent of its football class and had two Academic All-Americans in 2011. From 2001-2013, there have been 229 senior Tech football players on the roster with 214 earning their degree, 93.4 percent. By the time this year is over, 77 of 79 seniors since 2010 will have graduated from Tech.

• Virginia Tech won 10 or more games in every year from 2004-2011, tied for the third-longest streak in the modern era. Tech has won 10 or more games 11 times over the past 16 seasons, and 13 of the past 19 seasons.

• With its trip to the Military Bowl this year, Virginia Tech is now one of only two teams to go to at least 22 bowls in a row. The other one is Florida State (33) after Florida had its 22-year streak broken last season.

• Tech is one of only six programs in college football history to go to a bowl in at least 22 straight years: Nebraska (35), Michigan (33), Florida State (33; active), Alabama (25), Florida (22) and Tech (22; active).

• Head coach Frank Beamer (22) is one of only four coaches all-time to lead a program to 22 or more straight bowl games, joining Bobby Bowden (Florida State, 28), Tom Osborne (Nebraska, 25) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (Alabama, 24).

• Virginia Tech has been a consistent winner since the mid-90s, winning an average of 9.1 games per year during the current streak of 22 straight seasons capped by bowl appearances.

• Since joining the ACC prior to the 2004 season, Virginia Tech has compiled an 105-41 overall record, tied for the best mark of any school in the conference (Florida State). Tech's 65-23 league record (68-24 if you count the title game outcomes) and four league crowns is the best among league teams during that span.

• Since 1980, Tech is one of just nine schools to produce a No. 1 overall pick in the NFL at least twice. The other schools are Auburn (3), Miami (2), Ohio State (2), Southern Cal (2), Penn State (2), Stanford (2), South Carolina (2) and Oklahoma (2).

when he was 8 years old and hasn't been back. His father, Bainda, lives in the States, but his mother, Satta, still lives in Liberia. Keihn gets to talk to her every 2-3 weeks to keep her abreast of how he's doing at school.

YOUNG WIDEOUTS

• A pair of true freshmen in **Isaiah Ford** and **Cam Phillips** have shot to the top of the depth chart and are among the leaders this year at the wide receiver spot. Ford, who hails from Jacksonville, is second on the team in touchdown catches (6) while Phillips is improving each week as evidenced by his seven-catch, one-touchdown performance against both East Carolina and Pitt.

• Ford, who became just the second true freshman wide receiver to start the opening game of the season, may join the basketball team at Tech in January when the season is over as a point guard. He averaged 30.1 points per game his senior season, including 59 points against Eagle View as a senior.

• Ford has already set a new school record for receptions by a freshman with 53, passing **Joshua Stanford**'s 40 in 2013, with Phillips tied for the old record with his 40 catches. • The freshman trio of Ford (6), Phillips (3) and **Bucky Hodges** (7) have combined to catch 16 of the 18 touchdown passes thrown by **Michael Brewer** and Mark Leal this season.

THE BAHAMA BREEZE

• One of Tech's speediest players in its receiving corps isn't even from the United States as junior **Demitri Knowles** hails from Freeport, Grand Bahamas.

 Knowles was born and raised in The Bahamas and grew up competing in swimming and track before moving to Lynchburg, Virginia, to try his hand at football. After spending just two seasons at Liberty Christian Academy playing a sport he really knew nothing about before he was 14 years old, Knowles is making strides in the game.

 Knowles' only exposure to the game before his high school years – other than watching Miami Dolphins and Miami Hurricanes games on television – was playing it in his backyard.

 But then, Devard Darling, a native of The Bahamas and a former Florida State and Washington State receiver who was on NFL rosters for seven seasons with the Baltimore Ravens, Kansas City Chiefs and Houston Texans, brought a football camp to Freeport. Knowles attended the camp, and won Most Valuable Player honors. He was hooked and moved to Virginia for his final two years of high school, where his speed caught the eye of Virginia Tech coaches.

 Virginia Tech football has always prided itself on taking care of its players before, during and after their time in Blacksburg. A testament to the family atmosphere created is the roster of former Hokie players serving in some capacity with the football team in the athletic department.

DOING GOOD DEEDS

 Head coach **Frank Beamer** is a strong believer in giving back to the community. He founded Herma's Readers in 2008, and in 2012, the team helped raise money for Wounded Warrior Project.

• The team has also raised money to help support Breast Cancer Awareness and Ewing's sarcoma cancer.

• Herma's Readers is a non-profit organization that promotes the power of reading and literacy to youngsters during their formative years, grades K-3. The organization was formed as a tribute to Tech head football coach Frank Beamer's late mother, Herma, a teacher for over 30 years in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Herma's Readers has delivered thousands of new and used books collected at Virginia Tech football games to youngsters throughout the Commonwealth.

WALK-ON TO STARTER FOR ROGERS

• Sam Rogers entered the 2013 camp as a walk-on fullback in the No. 4 position on the depth chart, but was the starter by the first game and is back in that role this year. He chose to walk-on at Tech over scholarship offers at Bucknell and St. Francis, as well as walk-on opportunities at Virginia, Richmond and William & Mary.

• At 5-foot-10, 222 pounds, Rogers did it all for Hanover High in Mechanicsville (outside Richmond), playing quarterback, receiver, running back and multiple positions on defense, earning first-team all-state honors as a utility player. His brother, Ben, was an All-America center on the Division III level for Hampden-Sydney College.

• Rogers earned the President's Award (player who demonstrates the most outstanding leadership during the offseason program and spring workouts) for the offense at the end of the spring session.

THE LEADER OF THE D ... AND HIS FAMILY

 Senior free safety **Detrick Bonner** is the guiet quarterback of the Hokie defense as the leader in the secondary. He's also the leader of his family. The Georgia native has six siblings and was often in charge of the children while his mother worked long hours. One of his younger brothers, Alvin Hill plays, defensive back for the University of Maryland.

TIGHT ENDS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

 It's no secret that offensive coordinator Scot Loeffler likes to utilize the tight ends in his offense. Last year, he lost projected starter Ryan Malleck for the year in the preseason and had to scramble to rework his schemes. This year, Malleck is back, along with several other big bodies who have factored in this season.

 Malleck, a 6-5, 242-pound redshirt junior, sustained a left rotator cuff tear/labral tear during the preseason and missed the 2013 season. In 2012, he caught 17 passes for 174 yards and rebounded to catch 22 passes and a touchdown this season.

• Bucky Hodges is the biggest of the bunch, checking in at 6-6, 244 pounds. The redshirt freshman came to Tech as a guarterback, but spent last year on the scout team terrorizing the defense at tight end and made the permanent move in the spring. He's already set several receiving records for tights end in just his first year.

Both of Haitian descent, the lightly recruited players from Atlantic High are both making a big impact for the Hokies. Maddy had 55 tackles last season, including 13.5 tackles for loss and 6.5 sacks, while Nicolas has 63 tackles, including 17.5 tackles for loss and 9.0 sacks this season, earning all-conference honors.

• Nicolas, a junior, graduated this month with a degree in sociology and Maddy, who will return next year, will graduate in the spring with a degree in apparel, housing and resources management.

THE PAPERBOY KEEPS DELIVERING

• Heading into last season, **Willie Byrn** had one career reception. Last season alone, he led the team with 51 catches, compiling 660 yards and two touchdowns. Nicknamed "The Paperboy" by offensive coordinator **Scot Loeffler** because "he always delivers," Byrn was a steadying veteran on a young offense last year.

• The former walk-on earned a scholarship last preseason and enters his last game at Tech with 96 career receptions, needing just four in the bowl game to become the 12th-member of the 100-catch club at Tech.

EXCALIBUR WORTHY

• Tech offensive linemen **Augie Conte**, **Wyatt Teller** and **Laurence Gibson** earned Excalibur Awards this summer, the top honor in Dr. Mike Gentry's strength and conditioning program. The Excalibur Award is more comprehensive than the program's other honors (e.g. Super Iron Hokie, Iron Hokie, etc.), looking at all areas of football strength and conditioning from strength and power to acceleration, speed, flexibility and agility.

• Conte led all Tech players in the bench press (440 pounds), front squat (460) and push jerk (385). Teller finished second behind Conte in the front squat (450) and push jerk (375), and he actually tied Conte in the bench press, but Conte is considered the leader because he weighs less than Teller (weight is the tiebreaker). Gibson led all Tech players in the power clean (385) and finished fourth in the bench press (430) and fifth in the push jerk (340). Gibson's 385-pound power clean broke the position record for an offensive tackle.

SCORING IN DIFFERENT WAYS

• During Frank Beamer's time at Tech, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 39 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams.

• Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 138 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987.

• Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 85 TDs (57 on interceptions, 26 on fumble returns, two on fumble recoveries). The special teams have added 53 TDs (19 on blocked punts, 19 on punt returns, nine on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals, one on a fumble recovery and one on a fumble return).

• Under Beamer, 89 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall led the way with seven. Four players scored three times while 24 players scored twice.

THE GAME ON RADIO

• All Virginia Tech football games can be heard throughout Virginia and much of the mid-Atlantic region on the Virginia Tech IMG Sports Network. Eleven-time Virginia Sportscaster of the Year Bill Roth (play-by-play), Hokies' Hall of Famer Mike Burnop (analyst) and Drew Banyon (scoreboard anchor) comprise Virginia Tech football's on-air broadcast crew.

• The 2014 season marks Roth and Burnop's 27th season together in the Virginia Tech radio booth, making them one of the longest-tenured active duos in the FBS.

VIRGINIA TECH'S 255-GAME SCORING STREAK

Virginia Tech's current 255-game scoring streak from 1995 to present stands as the 12th-longest in Division I-A college history, and the sixth-longest active streak in the FBS. In the 255-game run, Tech scored on its first offensive possession 82 times, plus another five occasions where it scored on returns on its first touch of the game. The Hokies have scored in the first quarter 184 times during the streak, and have had it extended by halftime in 242 of the 255 games. Here's that list: (* — includes a blocked punt recovery in the end zone prior to the first offensive possession against Akron in 1995; an interception return prior to the first offensive possession against Boston College in 2008; a blocked punt return prior to the first offensive possession against Marshall in 2013; and a fumble return on the opening kickoff of the 2014 Western Michigan game):

Virginia Tech has a **189-66** record during the scoring streak, averaging **33.8** points in the wins and **19.4** points in the losses. ABOUT VIRGINIA TECH

Dedicated to its motto, *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve), Virginia Tech takes a hands-on, minds-on approach to education, preparing scholars to be leaders in their fields and communities. Since its founding as a land-grant college in 1872, Virginia Tech has grown to an enrollment of about 31,000.

With approximately 240 undergraduate and graduate degree programs and \$494 million in research expenditures each year, Tech offers the widest range of degree choices in Virginia and is the state's leading research institution. Through new and interdisciplinary degrees – such as real estate; computational modeling and data analytics; nanoscience; and water resources policy and management – Tech scholars seek to address complex global challenges.

Timothy D. Sands joined Virginia Tech as its 16th president on June 1, 2014. His distinguished academic career includes faculty and leadership positions at several leading American universities.

When appointed by the board of visitors last year, Sands noted that, "Virginia Tech has so much momentum. It is an institution that is not happy with the status quo. I want to build on that and keep it moving forward."

In differentiating Virginia Tech, President Sands quickly observed one special Hokie attribute, "I remain impressed with the spirit of *Ut Prosim*. I find it everywhere – among students, faculty, and alumni. This commitment to service is unique among major universities. It truly sets us apart and I hope to find ways in which we can leverage even more this noble distinction."

Sands also finds that his new employer is ideally positioned to address modern society's needs, a model of the 21st century landgrant university. "If you look at what is needed in the community, what's needed in the commonwealth, what's needed in the nation, and also what the world needs, Virginia Tech is the kind of institution that you would create today for the 21st century," says Sands.

Before taking the helm at Tech, Sands, 56, served as Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. He served as Purdue's acting president during the Fall semester of 2012.

Throughout his administrative leadership positions, Sands remained connected to his profession and his students. While Purdue's Provost he continued to advise graduate students. "Based on Virginia Tech's high alumni satisfaction rankings, students are treated with respect here, and I want to be part of that. Plan to see Laura and me in the dining halls and actively engaged with students," he said. Look for tweets from @VTSandsman.

After gaining his doctorate, Sands began his professional career in 1984 at the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory and later became an industry fellow at the lab doing advanced materials research. He spent nine years as a member of technical staff and as a research group director with Bell Communications Research, Inc. (Bellcore), the research arm of the "Baby Bell" telecommunications companies, in Red Bank, N.J. He returned to his alma mater, the University of California, Berkeley, in 1993 as a professor on the faculty of the Department of Materials Science and Engineering. He later served Berkeley in leadership roles including executive committee chair of the Applied Science & Technology Graduate Group and the director of the Integrated Materials Laboratory.

Sands joined Purdue University in 2002 as the Basil S. Turner Professor of Engineering and later became director of the university's Birck Nanotechnology Center, an interdisciplinary center encompassing 12 academic disciplines. He became Purdue's chief academic officer in 2010.

Dr. Sands holds a B.S., in engineering physics (1980) and M.S., and Ph.D in materials science and engineering, all from the University of California, Berkeley. He has published more than 250 papers and has been granted 17 patents in the areas of metal/semiconductor contacts, heteroepitaxy, thermoelectric materials and devices, semiconductor nanostructures, laser processing and heterogeneous integration. He is a Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and

Electronics Engineers (IEEE), the Materials Research Society (MRS), and a charter fellow of the National Academy of Inventors (NAI).

President Sands is joined in Blacksburg by his wife, Laura, an accomplished academic herself, who will have a half-time appointment as a researcher in the Center for Gerontology with tenure in the Department of Human Development. The Sands have four adult children, three of whom have graduated from Purdue University and one who is a senior.

For clearing his mind, Sands plans to continue his regimen of early-morning pick-up basketball. Both Sands were raised around the northern California mountains and they plan to explore Virginia's mountain outdoor opportunities.

A native Virginian and someone who has been to Virginia Tech's campus numerous times over the years, Whit Babcock returned to his home state and landed his dream job when Virginia Tech named him its director of athletics. Babcock was officially announced as Tech's AD on Jan. 25, 2014.

Babcock, who went to high school in Harrisonburg, Va., and is a former college baseball player at James Madison University, joined the Hokies following two years at the University of Cincinnati, where he served as the director of athletics, and five years at the University of Missouri, where he served as the executive associate director of athletics. Prior to his time at Missouri, Babcock's 20-year career path included stops at West Virginia University, Auburn University and James Madison University.

Babcock's background in fundraising, marketing, promotions, ticket sales, licensing and multimedia partnerships were key attributes in support of his hiring. In his introductory press conference, he cited three guiding principles for his vision for the athletics department's future: commitment to comprehensive excellence, centering the department's focus on the student-athlete experience, and engaging the community.

Babcock hasn't wasted any time in putting his fingerprints on the Tech athletics department. He made a change in leadership of the men's basketball program, hiring successful Marquette coach Buzz Williams, who guided Marquette to five NCAA Tournament appearances in six years, as the head coach, and he continued previous plans to build a new indoor practice facility. Construction on that project started in May.

Babcock inherited a quality athletics department from predecessor Jim Weaver and has steered the department along that same path since taking over. The Hokies were on track to record their highest finish ever in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standing this past spring, which would surpass their 35th-place finish in 2012.

Academically, the Hokies are performing better than ever. Two teams – golf and women's soccer – recorded perfect 1,000 scores in the NCAA's

Academic Progress Rate report – and two other teams finished with scores higher than 990 (men's tennis and men's cross country). The football program recorded its highest score ever (977).

Fifty-five percent of Tech's student-athletes recorded a grade-point average of 3.0 or better during the 2014 spring semester, and the average GPA per team for the 2013-14 academic year was a 3.0.

As the leader at Cincinnati, Babcock focused on those same things – athletics success and academic excellence. He implemented numerous changes in the academic area aimed at enhancing the student-athlete experience, reinstated and enhanced scholarship funding to Olympic sports, added men's indoor track and field as the department's 19th sport and streamlined his executive team to ensure better lines of communications across the department and university community.

The Bearcats also accomplished a lot in the classroom in Babcock's tenure. During his last year there, 11 of 17 teams achieved a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Before embarking on a career in athletics administration, Babcock lettered four seasons in baseball at James Madison University and served as team captain his senior year. He earned his bachelor's degree from JMU in 1992. In 1996, he received his master's in sports management from West Virginia University.

He and his wife, Kelly, have three sons: Andrew, Brett and Eli.
