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2006 PREVIEW

Hokies Return Eleven Starters for Second ACC Season

With one year in the Atlantic Coast Conference under their belts and eleven of twelve starters returning from the 2005 campaign, the Virginia Tech women's lacrosse team looks to use that experience to improve on its overall record in 2006.

Although the team had several bumps in the road last year, it nearly upset North Carolina, which was ranked sixth at the time, and was involved in the third-highest scoring game of the season in the NCAA with a 21-4 win against Howard.

One of the keys of the game this year for the Hokies is chemistry. This season, Riley will be implementing a line play system on the field that focuses on teamwork.

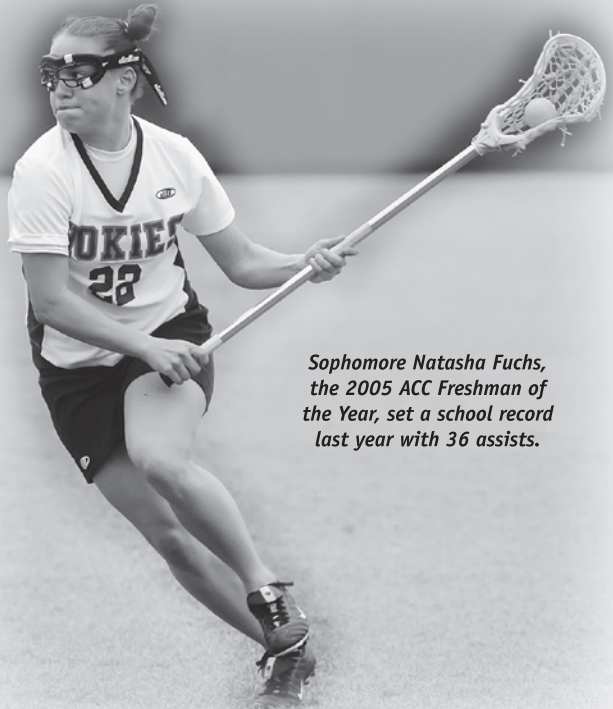
"What we're looking for is not necessarily the best 12 players, but the best combination of the 12 players," said Riley. "The expectations of each player are going to vary, and with those expectations is a strong concept of teamwork. What I've seen so far have been several different combinations of starting lineups and several different combinations within the line, and that's been interesting and exciting."

Although nineteen of the players on the Hokie squad have less than two years of collegiate experience, Tech returns a solid core of senior leaders on the field, including attacker Stephanie Jones, defenders Katie Boyle and Casey Goodman, and goalkeeper Carrie Hill.

"This is the most experienced team I've had so far. Many of the juniors have started for three straight years, and the seniors for four. I don't see this as being a young team, I see this as an experienced team that happens to be young in age," said Riley.

Several players stepped up as freshmen last year, led by ACC Freshman of the Year Natasha Fuchs.

"With the freshman class and the combination of players that greatly contributed last year, it has become more competitive on the practice field, which will transfer to the game field," said Riley. "They are constantly pushing one another. I'm excited to see what this team can do."

ATTACK

A three-year starter, Jones is the most experienced of the Tech attackers. She was second on the team last year in points (41), assists (15) and goals (26), ranking in the top ten in the conference in several offensive categories, including points per game (2.73). Jones is in the top 10 at Tech in goals (8th - 69) and draw controls (3rd - 88). She will be counted on to lead a young attack corps.

Sophomore Kady McBrearty started all 15 games as a freshman, scoring 11 goals with seven assists. She also scooped 25 ground balls. Her first collegiate goal was the game-winner against George Mason.

Sophomores Jenna Reich and Katie Russo each saw time as substitutes last year. Reich scored two goals in seven games, with three draw controls. Russo played in seven games, netting six goals and one assist.

Five freshmen have the opportunity to have a significant impact on the offense, and will vie for playing time, led by high school All-Americans Rachel Culp and Terri Coover. Taylor Radevic and Casey Warner also have solid high school credentials, while Kristy Zeigler will also contribute to the offense.

MIDFIELD

Junior Britt Faulkner enters her third year as a starter, after leading Tech with 36 goals last season. She was fourth in the ACC in scoring, averaging 2.40 goals per game. Faulkner also had four assists and 16 ground balls last season. She will be looking to add to her career total of 68, which ranks her ninth all-time at Tech.

Junior Lindsay Pieper ranked third on the team with 28 goals last year, and led the Hokies in draw controls with 36. She was eighth in the conference in scoring with 1.87 goals per game. Pieper also caused 14 turnovers. Junior Kate Schilling is the final returning starter in the midfield. She had 20 draw controls, 21 ground balls, five goals and six assists last year.

Fuchs, as a sophomore, will look to pick up where she finished last year after setting a Tech record with 36 assists. She was first in the conference with 2.40 assists per game, and ranked third in the nation in the category. Fuchs scored 21 goals, and was second on the team with 32 draw controls. She had a team-high 57 points, ranking her third in the ACC with 3.80 points per game. Fuchs, also a solid defender, caused 17 turnovers.

Junior Jackie Gray played in seven games last season and started a game before an ACL injury slowed her the remainder of the year. She scored two goals in the win over Howard, totaling four for the year. She also had 10 draw controls and eight ground balls.

Sophomores Kristen Burtch, Christen Fratter and Rosemary Patterson will be looking to step into bigger roles this season. All three saw time in several games last season in reserve action. Fratter scored a goal against Lafayette, and had two draw controls.

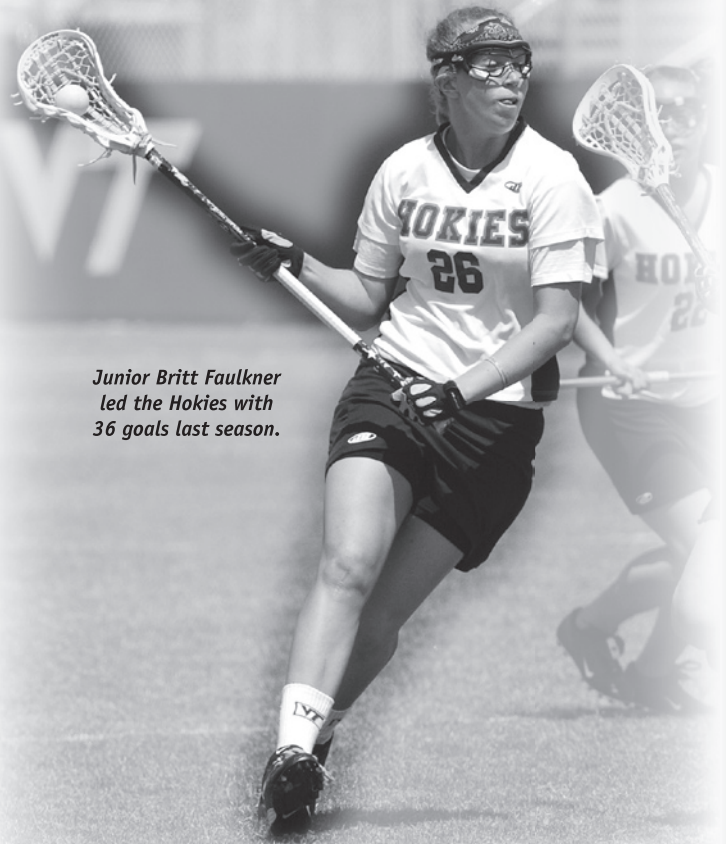
DEFENSE

The Hokie defense is the most experienced area of the field, returning five starters from the 2005 season. Boyle, a senior, leads the defense and tied for the team lead with 17 caused turnovers last season. She also had 34 ground balls and 30 draw controls, and scored seven goals for the Hokies, including two against both Howard and Bucknell.

Junior Bryana Keenan has been a consistent player for Tech in her first two seasons. She was third on the team in caused turnovers with 15. She also had 23 ground balls and five draw controls. Keenan scored two goals, both against Ohio State.

Senior Casey Goodman has improved each year for the Hokies. She had 11 draw controls and 20 ground balls last season. Junior Jamie Webster is an aggressive defender, with 10 caused turnovers and 23 ground balls. Sophomore Jessica Galindo had a strong freshman season with 18 ground balls, nine caused turnovers and a goal against Bucknell.

Sophomore Noëlle Grant will also look to see playing time. She played in three games last year. Redshirt sophomore Nicholle Depaz is a transfer from Old Dominion. She played in three games for the Monarchs last year. Freshman Lauren Swenson will look to play in her first year.

GOALKEEPER

Three players will battle for the starting position in the cage. The frontrunner is Hill, who played in six games last season. She saw significant time as a freshman in 2003, when she started six games and made 54 saves.

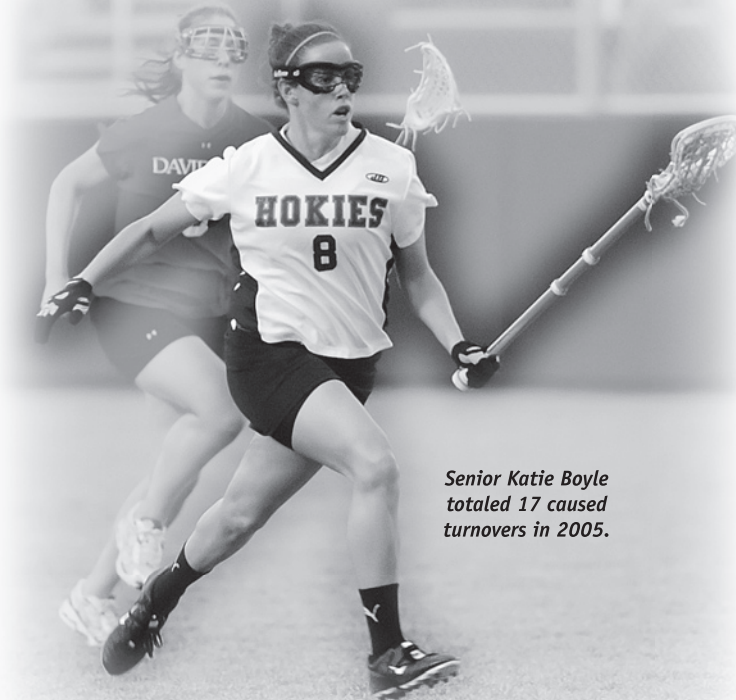
Two newcomers could also see action between the pipes. Freshmen Caitlin Thomas and Megan Waters both have strong credentials coming out of high school and will challenge for playing time.

SCHEDULE

The 2006 schedule features four teams that played in the NCAA Tournament last year and five teams ranked in the top-25 of the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA) preseason poll. Tech will play 11 non-conference games, highlighted by 17th-ranked James Madison. Other schools that have strong lacrosse traditions include George Mason, Ohio State and Bucknell. UMBC, La Salle, Longwood, and Tech's most-played rival Davidson are also featured on this year's schedule.

The Hokies will face Delaware for the first time in school history. The Blue Hens received votes in the IWLCA preseason poll.

Tech faces its toughest competition in ACC play, with four of the six teams ranked in the preseason top-20. The ACC is traditionally recognized as the most competitive women's lacrosse conference in the nation. The Hokies will face No. 2 Duke, No. 5 Virginia, No. 6 North Carolina, No. 9 Maryland, and former BIG EAST rival Boston College each once this season, possibly meeting them again in the ACC Tournament, to be held April 27-30 in Baltimore, Md., at M&T Bank Stadium.

HEAD COACH TAMI RILEY



Tami Riley enters her fifth year as the head coach at Virginia Tech. With 19 players on the 2006 roster with less than two years of collegiate experience, Riley is building the future of Virginia Tech lacrosse. Last year, Natasha Fuchs was named ACC Freshman of the Year.

In her first four seasons at the helm of the Hokies, Riley produced five All-BIG EAST Conference team selections and six Virginia Tech Athletes of the Week.

In 2004, Riley led the team to a five-game turnaround, finishing the season 8-8. Two of the victories came over ranked opponents, defeating No. 17 Ohio State 10-6 and getting a season-ending win at No. 18 George Mason, 5-4.

During 2004 and 2005, the Hokies received votes in the IWLCAs top 25.

Under Riley, the coaching staff has brought six high school All-America lacrosse players to Blacksburg.

Riley joined the Hokies after serving four years as an assistant coach at James Madison University. During her time at JMU, the Dukes won two Colonial Athletic Association Championships, went to the NCAA Tournament every year, and appeared in the 2000 Final Four.

The University of Maryland won three NCAA titles during her career there as a player. Riley co-captained the first team to successfully defend an NCAA women's lacrosse championship, with titles in 1995 and 1996. Riley was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team those years. In her final two seasons at Maryland, the Terrapins were 36-0. Riley was not only a four-year letterwinner in lacrosse, but also played soccer for the Terrapins her first two years at the university.

Riley graduated from Maryland in 1996 with a degree in kinesiology. A Maryland native, she graduated from Severna Park High School with her twin sister, Tina, and an older sister, Bethany. She adores her nephews, Patrick and Zachary, as well as her nieces, Riley and Maggie. Her parents live in Northern Kentucky.

Richards comes to Tech from Caterham, Surrey, England, where she was an assistant and goalie coach with the England Women's National Lacrosse Team. She worked closely with the team in preparation for the World Cup, in which England took the bronze medal.

She also worked at Caterham School as a coach and teacher. In addition, Richards taught the physical education curriculum.

Richards graduated from Bucknell University in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in elementary education. She was a four-year letterwinner as a goalie for the Bison, netting 412 career stops in the cage. As a senior, Richards received the Bison Club Award, which is presented to the two senior athletes 'who best exemplify the winning spirit of the University's athletic program.'

Kim Corcoran begins her first season at Virginia Tech as an assistant coach.

Corcoran is a 2005 graduate of Northwestern University with a bachelor's degree in psychology and political science, where she was a member of the 2005 NCAA national championship lacrosse team.

In two years at Northwestern, she scored five goals with one assist for the Wildcats. She was named to the Academic All-Big Ten team and the American Lacrosse Conference academic honor roll.

Corcoran also played two years at Colgate University, where she was a first-team All-Patriot League selection as a sophomore. She scored 34 goals and had 15 assists while with the Raiders.

Corcoran's coaching experiences include Camp Wa-klo in Jaffrey, N.H., and the Kelly Amonte Summer Camps.

A native of Cold Spring Harbor, N.Y., Corcoran currently resides in Blacksburg, Va.

WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question at Virginia Tech.

The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body.

Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any meaning to it, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was only used as an attention-getter for his yell.

It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those loyal to Tech athletics.

VIRGINIA TECH LACROSSE STADIUM



The Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's campus in Blacksburg.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground Cambridge irrigation system and is the only field in the ACC with this system. If rainy weather should occur, the field can be drained and ready for play. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features 2,028 seats where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. A fully-heated 18 by 8-foot area, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

"The stadium is absolutely beautiful," lacrosse head coach Tami Riley said. "When you watch a game under the lights, you can just sense so much energy from the players, coaches and the fans."

The lacrosse team also has two practice fields — a natural grass field and an artificial turf field. The availability of both fields allows the team to adequately prepare for any surface they may play on in games away from home.



THIS IS VIRGINIA TECH



From a meager beginning in October of 1872, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With more than 100 research centers, the university also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and near the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's faculty and students are involved in more than 3,700 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

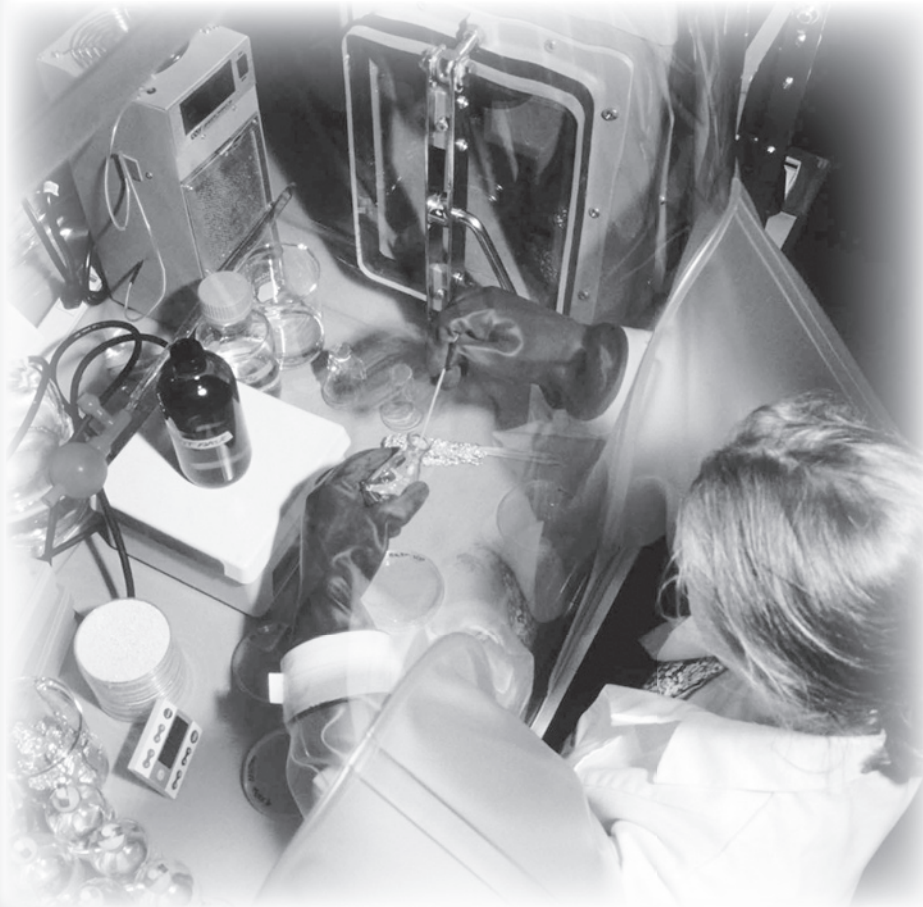
Outreach efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge in the global society in which we live.

One of America's best college towns, Blacksburg is a perfect setting for a great university like Virginia Tech.

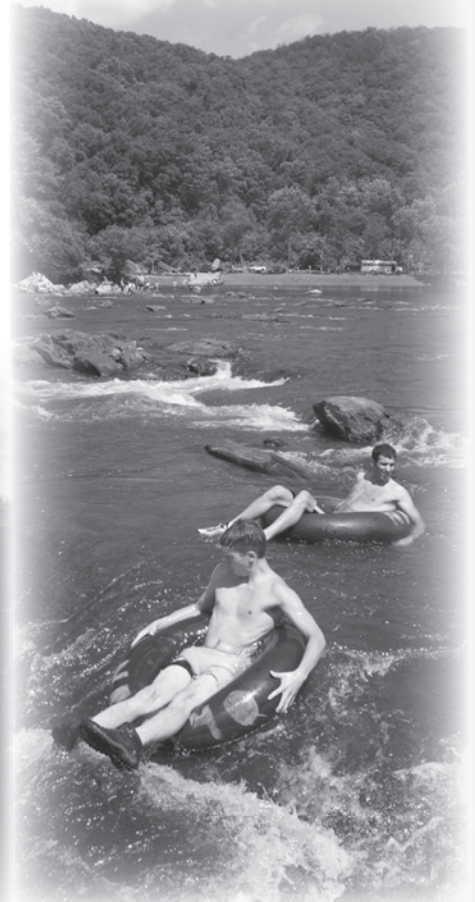
Located in Southwest Virginia on a plateau between the Blue Ridge and Alleghany Mountains, Blacksburg combines the laid-back lifestyle of a small town with the amenities one would expect to find around a major center of higher education. Together, the town and university have worked hard to create a progressive community that ranks among the nation's elite living environments.

Virginia Tech and the Town of Blacksburg gained national and international attention by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the potential of the quaint town.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that accentuate the area. Since its founding, Blacksburg has grown to become the largest town in Virginia.

The nearly 42,000 residents (including students) enjoy a close proximity to a variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Appalachian Trail, Claytor Lake and the New River. The region features a moderate climate and four distinct seasons.

Blacksburg's location (adjacent to major interstate highways) provides convenient access to most points in the southern and eastern parts of the country.





SUPPORT SERVICES

Student Athlete Academic Support Services

The success of Virginia Tech's lacrosse program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and is a school-best 74 percent for 2005. This marks the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, Virginia Tech's student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2004 calendar year, 425 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with University and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student-athlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student-athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

- University and NCAA information
- Orientation
- Academic assessment
- The development of an effective student life program
- Appropriate referrals
- Monitored study environments
- Tutorial programs
- State of the art technological learning assistance
- Student Athlete academic performance evaluations

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each student-athlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

Athletics Office of Student Life

The Athletics Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech is committed to developing the total student-athlete. Megan Armbruster and Jessica Hood are dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience through various programs.

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart". Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. In 2004, the student-athletes volunteered with the Montgomery County Public Schools System, the Montgomery County Christmas Store, Virginia Tech White Ribbon Campaign and Hokies United Tsunami Relief Campaign.

The lacrosse team has a partnership with Harding Avenue elementary school.

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resume design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and coops during their college careers. In 2005, both Cintas Corporation and NVR Inc. hosted workshops providing student-athletes the opportunity to hear job search strategies directly from employers.

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2004 calendar year listed 315 student-athletes with this honor.

Several athletes from the Virginia Tech lacrosse team have received various academic awards. Sixteen Hokies were named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2004. Lindsay Pieper was named to the 2004 Virginia Tech All-Academic Team for attaining the highest GPA in 2004 on the lacrosse team.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season. The lacrosse team representatives are Katie Boyle, Steph Jones, and Lindsay Pieper.

Armbruster says, "The goal of our office is to provide students with the total college experience. When athletes graduate, I want them to look back and believe they had full access to a variety of opportunities while at Virginia Tech."

Athletic Performance

Virginia Tech is committed to the physical and mental health of its athletes through strength, nutrition and psychology programs.

The Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping the lacrosse team physically prepare for the rigors of the season.

The lacrosse team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletic Department.

Tech also has the use of a 10-by-40-yard sand pit located outdoors and adjacent to the weight room. The pit is used for resistive running drills to improve speed.

The primary strength coach for the lacrosse team is Jamie Meyer.

Sport psychologist Dr. Gary Bennett offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement. An injury group is also offered to provide injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about recovery processes.

The sports nutrition program works with student-athletes to provide them with the information they need on their diets. Sports nutritionist Amy Freel provides individual players with

diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat and eating choices to improve performance.

She also designs individual meal plans for athletes, and provides recipe books and supplement bars to every athletic team.

Sports Medicine & Athletic Training

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of Tech athletes.

The Eddie Ferrell Training Room is utilized for physical therapy, chiropractic care and massage therapy. Virginia Tech has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing Tech in the top five percent nationally. In addition, the Merryman Center, a state-of-the-art facility that includes 2,400 square feet of medical space, supplements the training room. This treatment room has numerous treatment modalities, including portable X-ray, electric stimulation, ultrasound, hot and cold packs and a lumbar/cervical traction unit.

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department, in conjunction with the Via College of Osteopathic Medicine and other research departments at Tech, has also initiated several new research projects focusing on head injuries, ankle injuries and the treatment of low back conditions.

The range of benefits athletes have access to include custom orthotics, custom mouth guards, specialized DonJoy prophylactic bracing and many other options to help prevent or protect them from injuries.

The sports medicine staff also takes great pride in treating the athlete year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. During this time, the staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program consisting of strengthening, stretching and most importantly movement pattern analysis and training to help prevent the re-occurrence of injuries.

Most of the off-season activity is based on programs that are designed to detect movement patterns that might lead to injury or could be causing a drop in performance.

A vital part of student-athletes services is the access to the Schiffert Student Health Center in McComas Hall. A health center, counseling services, recreation sports and fitness programs are available to student-athletes.

"Our goal is to provide the same high level of health care that professional and Olympic athletes receive," said Mike Goforth, director of athletic training. "Our usage of specialist care is modeled after the NFL system and incorporates components of the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs."

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Over the past 10 years, Virginia Tech has developed the reputation for producing top-level certified athletic trainers. Graduates are now employed in positions across the country at various levels of the profession.

Working directly with the Hokies this year is Jacob Botts. He is a 2005 graduate of the University of Wyoming, and is pursuing a master's at Virginia Tech in health promotions. He is assisted by student trainers Jessica Pope and Kesandra Farmer.

THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

The Tradition

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 53rd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 94 national championships, including 49 in women's competition and 45 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 119 times in men's competition and 61 times in women's action.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2005-06 academic year — 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship competition being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

2005 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 2005 Virginia Tech lacrosse team showed great strides during its inaugural season in Atlantic Coast Conference play, including nearly knocking off then-No. 6 North Carolina.

With ACC Freshman of the Year Natasha Fuchs leading the way for the Hokies, head coach Tami Riley and her staff had several high points during the 2005 campaign.

"The offense, defense and midfield all played together as a unit," Riley said. "We will be able to build off our first ACC season for the 2006 season."

Fuchs finished the year as one of the most productive and fiercest players, not only in Virginia Tech history, but in the NCAA. Her 36 assists (2.40 per game) were tops in the ACC and were third best in the country. Her 3.86 scoring average also put her in the top 25 in the NCAA.

"Our staff expects every player to do great things," Riley stated. "We want everyone to do well after putting in maximum effort. We are very pleased with Natasha's season and are excited to see how she can build off that."

After weather forced the cancellation of the first two games, the third game was moved to George Mason. Tech started the season strong, posting an 11-8 victory over the home team. Freshman standout Kady McBrearty netted the game-winning goal for her first collegiate score.

The Hokies hit the road for five consecutive away contests, losing two games by a single goal, before returning home to the friendly confines of the Virginia Tech Lacrosse Stadium.

Playing Howard at home for the first time in school history, Tech jumped out to a 1-0 lead in less than a minute and never looked back, holding the Bison scoreless in the first half. Playing under the lights and fresh off a tough loss to La Salle, the Hokies looked dominant as 11 players tallied at least one goal and seven players had at least one assist, culminating in one of the most dominating performances the Tech faithful had ever witnessed.

Combining for 21 goals and 16 assists, Riley's squad tied the school record for the most points in a home game, with 37. Sophomore Lindsay Pieper led the way with five goals on six shots, while Fuchs dished out six assists in addition to netting two goals.

"It was exciting to see our team play so well together," Riley said. "They demonstrated the advances our program has made. From our starters to the entire team, everyone has made great strides."

Tech continued its momentum from the Howard game to its next outing against Bucknell. The Hokies raced out to a quick lead and won easily, 16-6. The defense stifled the Bison in the first half, holding the visitors without a score on a mere six shots. On the attack, Pieper thwarted the Bucknell defense with four goals while McBrearty and junior Stephanie Jones each accounted for three scores.

On Apr. 2, Maryland came to Blacksburg for the Hokies' first ACC contest. After falling behind 5-1 at the intermission, Tech proved it could play with the top teams in the country, netting six second-half goals before falling 14-7.

The Hokies hosted Davidson four days later, winning 20-2. For the third time in just over a week, Tech's defense held its opponent without a first half goal. In the game, Fuchs led the way with seven points on three goals and four assists while sophomore Britt Faulkner amassed four goals.

The Tar Heels came into town ranked sixth in the country and barely escaped an all-out Tech effort. After North Carolina jumped out to an 8-3 advantage, Faulkner and Jones each tallied two goals, helping the home team knot the score at 9-9 on a rain-filled afternoon before falling 12-10 at the end.

After a loss in Charlottesville to No. 5 Virginia, the Hokies polished off their home season with a 17-5 victory over Lafayette. Faulkner tallied five goals while Fuchs had six assists and five draw controls in the game.

Despite Tech's loss to end the regular season at No. 2 Duke and its elimination from the ACC Tournament by UNC, the Hokies put up some pretty impressive numbers in 2005.

As a team, the Hokies produced the third-highest scoring game in the NCAA with the victory over Howard. They also ranked in the top five for draw controls per game.

Defensively, Katie Boyle and Fuchs each caused a team-high 17 turnovers. Sophomore Bryana Keenan accounted for 15 while Pieper forced 14. Fellow sophomores Kate Schilling and Jamie Webster accounted for 11 and 10, respectively, while freshman Jessica Galindo tallied nine.

Six players tallied at least 10 draw controls for Tech, which won 203 draws, while opponents tallied 153.

Statistically, collectively and individually, Tech showed they belonged in the ACC. As a team, the Hokies finished first in the conference in draw controls per game (13.53). The Hokies also led the conference in saves per game (9.80) and were fourth in assists


per game (5.47).

The Tech offensive attack featured Faulkner (2.40 goals per game) and Pieper (1.87 goals per game), who finished fourth and eighth, respectively, in the league in goals scored. Fuchs led the conference in assists per game (2.40) while Jones tied for sixth (1.00).

Three players were among the leaders in points per game in the ACC. Fuchs finished third (3.80) while Jones (2.73) was seventh and Faulkner (2.67) was eighth. Pieper tallied the sixth-most game-winning goals in the league with two. The trio of Faulkner, Pieper and Jones were fifth, sixth and seventh, respectively, in shots per game. Pieper placed fourth in draw controls per contest (2.40) and Fuchs finished fifth (2.13). Goalkeeper Nikki Schiavone was third in saves per game (9.07).

Several players broke single season records, including Faulkner, whose 36 goals were seventh best in a season at Tech.

"It shows the advances the student-athletes have achieved," Riley stated. "It shows how strong and powerful the team can be. They will continue to improve and do better every single game. The team should be proud of what they accomplished individually and collectively."

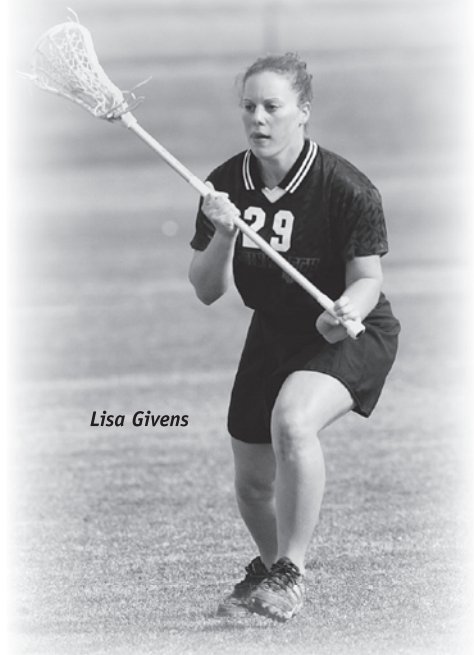
