The Hokies have drawn No. 11 Boston College as their first-round opponent in this year's ACC Tournament after a three-way tie for fourth place was broken. This marks the first time the two teams have ever faced off in the postseason, despite being conference foes in two different conferences.

The fourth-place tie is Tech's best ACC finish to date and the five-spot ties the program's highest seeding in the tournament. The Hokies were also the No. 5 team in 2009.

**Scouting Report: Boston College**

The Eagles wrapped up their regular season with a 10-5 record, 1-4 in conference play as their only ACC victory was a 12-6 win over then-No. 7 Virginia. BC began the season on a six-game win streak that was halted at the start of conference play by the Hokies. They are coming off of two straight wins, including a 20-8 defeat of Vermont.

Kristin Igoe has led the Eagles' offense with 36 goals on the year, while Jill Amo has tallied a team-best 16 assists. In cage for BC has been Sheila Serafino, who boasts the team's record along with a 9.41 GAA and a .429 save percentage after tallying 102 saves this season.

**Series Info: Boston College**

Tech is 4-6 all-time against Boston College, 2-4 since both teams joined the Atlantic Coast Conference (Tech joined in 2004-05 and BC joined in 2005-06). As former conference foes in the BIG EAST, Tech was 2-2 against the Eagles through those four seasons.

The two teams have never matched up outside of conference play and meet in the postseason for the first time ever this week. Boston College is the only ACC team the Hokies have ever defeated.

Tech topped the Eagles in this season's match up, 12-11, in Blacksburg. Boston College clawed it's way out of a 9-3 halftime deficit to make it a game again but Tech pulled out the win.

All of the games at this year's ACC Tournament will be played at WakeMed Park in Cary, N.C. A live video broadcast will be available for all four games in the first two rounds of the tournament and Sunday's championship game will air on RSN.

## Last Time Out

Tech wrapped up the regular season with two home games last week. The team went 1-1 in the week of play for the sixth time this season as it topped Longwood 12-9 on a rainy day in Blacksburg, and later fell to No. 1 Maryland, 16-8, despite an impressive second half.

The game against Maryland was moved indoors to Rector Fieldhouse, the indoor track and turf practice facility on the Virginia Tech campus, due to the weather conditions. The Hokies allowed the Terps to pull away early and dominate the first half, taking an 11-2 lead into the halftime break but they bounced back in the second half. Though the difference was too large to conquer, Tech outshot Maryland 19-9 in the second half and put together an impressive late rally.

## Record Watch

While numerous underclassmen are on the verge of breaking into the Tech record books, three Hokies have already made their mark amongst the program's best. Seniors Allie Emala and Caitlyn Wier, along with junior Jessica Nonn have seen their hard work pay off as they will write their names in the all-time record books.

Emala holds the all-time draws record (246), while ranking second in scoring and points. Wier holds the No. 4 spot in career assists, while Nonn is the top seven in goals, ground balls, draw controls and caused turnovers.

As a team, the Hokies have already surpassed the single-season assists mark that was set in 1999 with 91 assists so far this year. They are also closing in on the single-season points record. The 2000 squad tallied 303 that year and Tech has 299 to date in 2011.

## Routing Ranked Opponents

Tech's win over then-No. 16 Boston College marked the first time the Hokies topped a ranked opponent since defeating then-No. 18 George Mason, 5-4, on the road in 2004.

The victory was an even bigger feat than just upsetting a ranked opponent and earning the team's second-ever ACC victory, as it was also the first time Tech has topped a ranked conference opponent since 2001, when the team beat then-No. 20 Rutgers, 11-8, as a member of the BIG EAST.

## Chasing Greatness

For much of the season the Hokies have chased the outcome of the 1999 season as it was the best finish in program history. Though the 2011 Tech team will not match that same outcome, an 11-6 record, it was on pace all season. Tech's 10-7 regular season record is the team's best since 1999 and will be its first winning season since 2000.

A win over Boston College this week would match a program-best 11-win season.

## Player Spotlight



**Allie Emala**  
Senior Attack

Senior captain Allie Emala has led the Hokies in scoring in eight games this season, including the last regular season game of her career last Saturday against No. 1 Maryland. Emala is in the midst of a 22-game scoring streak that dates all the way back to last season and she currently leads the team in goals (40), points (56), shots (92) and draw controls (58).

The Baltimore, Md., native is having the best year of her career offensively and for her efforts, has been named to this year's All-ACC team.

## Heaps Helps Offense

Sophomore Julia Heaps has been a staple in the Hokies' offense this season. She moved into a starting role coming into the year, after starting just seven games last season. Heaps' well-rounded game has helped the Hokies succeed this season, and though she is fifth on the team in scoring (20) and tied for second on the assists list (16), the combination ties her for fourth on the squad in points (36).

## Determined Defense

Due to injuries, the Hokies have been forced to switch things up on defense this year, and sophomores Kristin Semones and Libby Rosebro have risen to the occasion. Both players have moved into starting roles this season, and Rosebro has transitioned to defense after starting her Tech career as a midfielder last year. The pair has combined for 56 ground balls and 32 caused turnovers, posting nearly even numbers.

### Dominant Debut

Many members of the freshman class made their collegiate debuts at Liberty, as each active player on the roster got into the game. Three members of the class also earned the first points of their career. It was all freshmen in the final 12 minutes of the game as the newcomers earned all five of Tech's points during that span. Lindsay Roche and Becca Niles each scored the first goals of their young careers, while Sydney Taylor earned her first point assisting one of Kelly Naslonski's two goals. This was the second time this season Naslonski had put away two goals in one game.

### Scoring A Nonn-Issue

Junior Jessica Nonn was Tech's scoring specialist last season and has picked up this season right where she left off. The Catonsville, Md., native became the first player in recent years to score in every game of the season last year. She recently snapped a 13-game streak but has been a major part of Tech's offensive production this season.

### Draw Domination

Senior Allie Emala set a new draw controls record last season and continued her dominance this year, tallying a team-leading 58 so far this season. Emala entered the year with 185 after winning 88 draws in 2010.

### Golden Gale Shines Again

Sophomore goalie Alex Gale returned to her starting role against Boston College after missing the start at American. Gale tallied a then-season high 12 saves against the No. 16 Eagles. Three of Tech's 12 goals against BC came off of fast breaks following a Gale save. The Cicero, N.Y., native also kept the Eagles scoreless on free position attempts in eight tries. For her efforts against the Eagles she was named Virginia Tech Athlete of the Week.

Gale tallied a new season high in saves at Duke after making 10 in the first half and tallying 13 by the game's end. She has made double digit saves on six different occasions this season.

### Widlake Wows Home Crowd

In Tech's home opener against George Mason, junior middie Morgan Widlake gave the home crowd something to cheer about as she went on a scoring spree to open the game, putting away Tech's first four goals of the game and eventually finishing the day with seven, a new career high.

### Conference Connections

Tech opened the season with three-straight games against National Lacrosse Conference members (High Point, Presbyterian College, Davidson) and after facing Liberty later in the season, the team wrapped up the slate in the final week of the season hosting Longwood. The team went 5-0 against NLC teams this year, as this five-member match up ties Tech's own ACC slate for the most games against a specific conference on this year's schedule.

The Hokies also faced four members of the Colonial Athletic Association (George Mason, James Madison, William & Mary, Old Dominion) and finished the season 2-2 against CAA opponents.

## **Virginia Tech 18, Presbyterian College 8 Feb. 19, 2011 • Clinton, S.C.**

The Hokies made it a 2-0 start to the season for the first time since 2006 when they topped PC, 18-8. They got out to a sluggish start, going up just 2-1 in the opening minutes of the game, but bounced back with just under 20 minutes to go in the first half, scoring 11 straight goals. ## **Virginia Tech 12, No. 16 Boston College 11 March 12, 2011 • Blacksburg, Va.**

Tech returned home to begin conference play and claimed one of its biggest victories in recent years. The Hokies upset the Eagles to claim just their second-ever ACC win and began conference play 1-0 for just the third time in school history.

Allie Emala got Tech on the board first and Ryan Rotanz made it 2-0 in the opening minutes. After BC put away its first goal of the day, the Hokies scored three-straight goals, and later closed out the first half with a 4-0 run to make it 9-3 at the intermission.

Tech came out ready to fight with the Blue Devils, but the third-ranked team eventually pulled away. The Hokies were on the board first and kept things close in the opening minutes, but Duke would score six-straight goals in a 10 minute span to open up a comfortable lead.

The Hokies attempted to get things going in the second half, but the offensive production for both teams slowed, despite the pace the game remaining at a high level.

Tech scored three goals to close out the game, but the deficit was too much to overcome at that point.

### **No. 16 William & Mary 21, Virginia Tech 8 March 23, 2011 • Williamsburg, Va.**

Tech struggled again in a midweek road game as it fell at No. 16 William & Mary. The Hokies let up the most goals they have all season, while they were also held to single-digit scoring for the fourth time this year.

In what looked like a quality start against its third ranked opponent in as many games, Tech was on the board first and kept things close in the opening minutes. Just over eight minutes into the game, the Tribe's Grace Golden tied things at three apiece and sparked a seven-goal run that would span over the next 11 minutes. The Hokies tacked on two more goals before the half, but William & Mary had an answer for both of them and took a 12-5 lead into the intermission.

Senior Caitlyn Wier led the way for Tech with a season-high six points (3g, 3a), and junior Jessica Nonn paced the scoring with four goals in the game.

### **Virginia Tech 18, Liberty 2 March 29, 2011 • Lynchburg, Va.**

Tech used a true team effort as every active player on the roster saw time in the big win over Liberty. No one player scored more than two goals as the Hokies rolled to their largest margin of victory so far this season.

Seven different players scored two goals, while three players earned their first career points.
