THOMPSON FIELD HOME OF THE HOKIES

Thompson Field is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg. It was completed in the fall of 2003, and dedicated as Thompson Field in 2008. The stadium is home to the men's soccer team and provides an excellent venue for matches and should be filled to capacity this fall.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system that can be drained and ready for play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, Thompson Field features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games. In 2007, Tech averaged 1,661 fans per game, the 15th-highest average in the country. On Oct. 6, 2006, the No. 19 Virginia Tech men's soccer team hosted the No. 2-ranked Virginia Cavaliers before a school-record crowd of 2,711 spectators. The Hokies also brought in large crowds during the 2008 season for home games, including 1,791 people against Duke on Sept. 12 and a crowd of 1,711 against Virginia on Sept. 26.

During the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium above the fans. The approximately 900-square foot facility includes two dedicated broadcast booths, two covered areas available to broadcast and videographers' cameras and a large working area for media covering the Hokies. The climate-controlled facility contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandy D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a half-time room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations. With a new restroom facility completed in 2005, and the completion of additional seating, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is one of the best venues to watch the sport.







MEDIA INFORMATION

This media guide is intended to provide members of the media with an in-depth view of Virginia Tech men's soccer. Inside you will find coaches' bios, player bios, schedules and updated records for the 2010 season. Should you need any assistance in covering the Virginia Tech men's soccer team, please contact the Athletics Communications Office.

Media Services: Media members are encouraged to contact the Athletics Communications Office for any story ideas, stats, records or help in accurately covering the Hokies.

Press Box: The game operation center is located atop the grandstand seating. Additional space, including a film area, is located on top of the grandstand. Media do not need a pass to enter the press area.

Match Services: Media members covering a Virginia Tech men's soccer match are encouraged to contact the Athletics Communications Office at least 24 hours in advance. Space is extremely limited in the press area. Also, radio stations broadcasting for the visiting team need to contact the AC office at least three days prior to playing at Virginia Tech to ensure that phone lines and ethernet lines are secured.

Statistics: Media members will be provided with box scores immediately after a match. The press box has an ethernet line for Internet use should any media need to send stories or photos.

Interviews: Media members MUST contact the AC contact to arrange interviews with players and coaches. No interviews will be allowed without at least 24 hours advance notice. At no time will a student-athlete's home phone number be given out.

Hokies online: The AC office compiles weekly notes for men's soccer. They can be accessed through the athletic department's official Web site, hokiesports.com. Also, media and fans can access the latest news and stats on the Hokies at that site.

In 2007, the Hokies drew a total attendance figure of 13,286 to their eight home games. The average of 1,661 fans per game ranked as the 15th-highest in all of NCAA Division I men's soccer.



2010 OUTLOOK



This season brings many new faces to the Virginia Tech men's soccer team, though a select group of talented returners will provide leadership and give this squad a sense of identity. Head Coach Mike Brizendine (JMU, 1999) enters his second year at the helm and with one year under his belt he will look to build a competitive team in the always- challenging ACC. The team also welcomes back assistant coaches Kevin Doyle (Bowling Green, 1996) and Patrick McSorley (James Madison, 1996) for their second seasons. Jeff Kinney (American University, 2003) enters his first season as an assistant coach.

THE SCHEDULE

"In the preseason poll we're playing eight out of the top 20 teams," said Brizendine. "It's a schedule that I know all of our players are excited about. I think our players are more than willing to accept the challenge."

For the third year in a row, the Hokies will open the regular season with a weekend tournament, this year at the UVa Tournament, hosted by the University of Virginia. Tech will play two games over three days, starting with St. John's on Friday, Sept. 3. On Sunday, Sept. 5, Tech will take the pitch against the University of Alabama-Birmingham Blazers.

The Hokies will be on the road for the next two games, first taking on South Florida on Sept. 10. This game is the NSCAA College Game of the Week and will be broadcast live on Fox Soccer Network. Virginia Tech then travels to Washington D.C. to face Howard on Sept. 14.

The Hokies will play their first home game on Friday, Sept. 17, taking on conference foe Clemson. The squad will hit the road for two more games, facing Davidson on Sept. 21 and NC State on Sept. 25, before returning home to take on American on Sept. 28.

Tech begins October with a tough road trip to Wake Forest on Oct. 1. After a road contest against Longwood on the fifth, Tech will face Maryland at Thompson Field on October 8, followed by Alabama

A&M at home on Oct. 11.

Brizendine's squad will then take on it's highest preseason ranked opponent (2nd), traveling to Charlottesville, Va., to play defending national champion Virginia on Oct. 14. After a home match against the University of Central Florida on the 19th, Tech faces another preseason top-five team on the road, taking on fourth-ranked North Carolina on Oct. 22.

The final three games of the season truly are the "home" stretch, as Tech closes out the regular season with three games at Thompson Field. First, the Hokies welcome Radford on Oct. 27, followed by two ACC opponents: Duke on the 30th and Boston College on Nov. 5.

FORWARDS

The front line will be counting on quite a few new faces to help earn points for the Hokies in 2010. Three returners should provide experience and stability up front and help lead this young group.

Sophomore Robert Alberti played in 18 games in 2009, netting two goals on five shots. Alberti is one of three returners from 2009 to net at least two goals last season. Senior Albert Alwang started 17 games last season, with one shot and one assist. Austin Stewart also returns and will likely figure into the mix at the front end.

MIDFIELDERS

Faces in the midfield unit will look more familiar than other areas, as Brizendine believes they are the center of the team's leadership and stability.

Senior Clarke Bentley is one key returner who will bring a lot of experience to this group. Bentley's preparation for the 2010 season has gained him the respect of his teammates and coaches, earning him a role as co-captain for the 2010 squad. Bentley played in all 19 games in 2009, making 14 starts and tallying three goals and two assists on 16 shots. Evan Slusser, a junior out of Prince George, Va., earned 11 starts in 16 appearances as a midfielder and recorded six shots.

Sophomore Greg Cochrane played a number of minutes for the Hokies in 2009 and will look to play a key role in 2010 as well. In 16 starts over 19 games, the Holland, Pa., native earned one assist and took 20 shots.

The team will also have John Snyder back in the mix, after redshirting last season due to medical hardship. Patrick Huang will likely compete for playing time as well, after redshirting in 2009.

DEFENDERS

The back line will be highlighted by two key returners, senior Koen Oost and sophomore cocaptain David Fiorello.


Oost came to the program in 2009 from the Netherlands and immediately made an impact, scoring Tech's first goal of the season at the Middleton Sports & Fitness Invitational against Wisconsin-Milwaukee, a game Tech won, 2-1. Tech won the tournament and Oost was named to the weekend's All-Tournament Team. Oost played in 17 games, earning 10 starts and registered 15 shots on the season.

Fiorello, despite only being a sophomore, endeared himself to teammates and coaches during his time at Tech and was named co-captain of the 2010 squad.

"David showed our staff during the spring that he could lead this team," said Brizendine. "His maturity and steady resolve are obvious in everything that he does."

Fiorello and the defense helped Tech record shutouts over then-ranked NC State and Davidson and, along with Oost, was named to the Middleton Sports & Fitness Invitational All-Tournament team, after helping Tech hold Wisconsin scoreless. Fiorello started in 17 of the games he played in, earning his first career assist at Duke off a free kick.

Senior James Shupp and junior Jeremy Williams also add to an already experienced defense. Listed as a defender, Shupp managed to put away two goals in 2009, his first career goal coming against Clemson as part of a 4-2 victory. Williams did not play in 2009, but netted two goals and assisted three more, playing in 18 games in 2008.



GOALKEEPERS

Between the posts, the Hokies will have three keepers that the coaches have confidence in. In the mix is Thomas St. Germain, a junior out of Los Alamitos, Calif. Along with him will be fellow junior James Daly out of Long Valley N.J., who has shown potential in offseason workouts and preseason action. The third keeper is freshman Kyle Renfro, who has been battling injuries in the offseason, but he has the talent to be a very good goalkeeper.

"Between having Daly, St. Germain, and getting a healthy Kyle Renfro back, our coaching staff feels very pleased with our situation at goalkeeper," said Brizendine.

NEWCOMERS

If the Hokies are to succeed in 2010, they will be counting on one of their 13 freshmen to step up and make contributions immediately. This year's freshman class is a diverse group, coming from as close as Forest, Va., and as far as Somersby, Australia.

David Clemens out of Ballston Lake, N.Y., will be looked at as a key player on the front line. Clemens had a stellar senior season at Shenendehowa, including All-Capital Region Class AA, first-team suburban, first-team all-state and first-team NSCAA All-Region honors. He was the Section II leading scorer and MVP and he helped his club team, Blackwatch, to the State Cup quarterfinals, a Super-Y National fifth-place performance and the State Cup semifinals.

Another talent up front is Jose "Beto" Velazguez, who comes to Tech from the Los Angeles area. Playing at El Camino Real, Velazquez helped the team to become city and state champions all four years in high school and was named first team allcity and all-league.

Taylor Lemmon out of Lawrence, Kan., was a three-time first-team all-state selection for Marantha Academy. Lemmon scored 87 career goals and was the state leader in goals his junior and senior seasons.

Cody Thayer out of Omaha, Neb., looks to contribute immediately. One highlight of his four years playing at Millard West High School was scoring the game-winning goal to win the state championship with less than three seconds remaining in the match.

Along with Thayer, Vaughn Bandy will be a presence in the backfield. Bandy, who played three years of soccer at David W. Butler High School, was also the kicker for the football team, helping it to a state championship his senior year. In soccer, Bandy was a two-time, first team all-conference honoree, scoring 20 goals throughout his career.


Adama Wakai earned national prominence as a freshman with the US Soccer Academy U-18 North Meck Team; he was selected to the ODP National Select Team, the Super Y National Select Team and National Pool and the Regional II National Pool. Wakai comes to Tech from Charlotte, N.C., and played at Hopewell High School.

Ethan Ashong, out of Pleasant Valley, N.Y., and Arlington High School, was a finalist for ESPN Rise Player of the Week award. Ashong tied for the team lead with 17 goals, earning a No. 3 individual ranking his senior season.

Devante Dubose, out of Oakland, Calif., was named first-team all-league his junior season at Bishop O'Dowd High School and captained a team that was ranked 15th in the nation his senior year. He was named the U.S. Soccer Player to be watched and ranked as the 15th best defender in

Mikey Minutillo comes to Tech from San Jose, Calif., where he played for Bellarmine College Preparatory and the US Soccer Academy. He combined for 19 goals and 20 assists in his first two seasons at Bellarmine before joining the US Soccer Academy, where he led his team in goals and assists.

Jed Prater joines Koen Oost as Tech's only international players, with Prater hailing from Somersby, Australia. There at Narabeen Sports he



lettered three years and won 2006 MVP in Puma

Drew Ranahan, another of Tech's four players from California, played at Bishop O'Dowd High School in Oakland, Calif., was named first team all-HAAL, second team all-East Bay and was named to the All-California team by ESPN Rise.

Another native Virginian joining the squad is Nicholas Smirniotopoulos, from Alexandria. Smirniotopoulos played at George Mason High School and was First Team All-State, helping his team to state championships in 2009 and '10.

The Hokies will welcome two transfer students to the program, with juniors Brian Cunningham and Alberto Van Gurp coming from Howard University and South Florida, respectively. Cunningham tied for second on the team in leading goals and was named to the Wyndham Classic All-Tournament Team in 2008, also earning ASC Conference Rookie of the Week. Van Gurp played two years as a midfielder with the South Florida Bulls.

MIKE BRIZENDINE

HEAD COACH

Mike Brizendine enters his second year as Virginia Tech's head coach after spending five years as the Hokies' top assistant. Though he inherited a young team with 17 newcomers, Brizendine's squad did not shy away from a highly competitive schedule in 2009, competing against nine top-25 ranked teams, including the No. 1 team in the country.

To open up the season, Brizendine coached the Hokies to the tournament title at the Middleton Sports & Fitness Invitational. He earned his first win as a head coach against a ranked opponent when the Hokies stunned and shut out No. 16 NC State, 2-0. Despite a 5-12-2 overall record, Brizendine's young squad recorded 10 losses by a margin of two goals or less.

An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine helped guide the Hokies to their first NCAA College Cup appearance in school history in 2007. He has worked with all aspects of the Hokie program. For his contributions, Brizendine was recognized as the NSCAA's Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint with Bridgewater College, a Division III program that participates in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). After assisting both the men's and women's programs at Bridgewater in 2000, he became the head men's coach from 2001 to 2003, guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program. Brizendine led Bridgewater to its two best single-season records, 12-6 in 2003 and 11-7 in 2002, for a 23-13 mark over two seasons and a .639 winning percentage. For this significant turn-around, his peers named him ODAC Coach of the Year in 2003.

Prior to his time at Bridgewater College, he was an assistant coach at Ferrum College for the men's soccer team in 1999. He has also been active

guiding and encouraging kids in youth soccer programs throughout his coaching career.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in religion and a minor in business. In 2005, he earned his master of education from Virginia Tech. He has his USSF "B" license and an Advanced National Coaching License from the NSCAA.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at James Madison University from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine and his wife, Lucy, reside in Blacksburg, Va.









KEVIN DOYLE

ASSISTANT COACH

Kevin Doyle enters his second year with the Hokies' coaching staff as an instructor for the goalkeepers.

Prior to Tech, Doyle spent time at Creighton University, Penn State, William and Mary and Mercer.

Doyle was a top assistant coach at Creighton University from 2001-2006, actively involved in the recruiting process and training goalkeepers. The Creighton

goalkeeping corps and defense ranked in the national top-25 in goals against average in two of his final three years with the program. During his stint with the Blue Jays, the team made six NCAA appearances, competed in two quarterfinals and registered a College Cup showing in 2002.

Prior to his stint with Creighton, Doyle spent time at Penn State as a top assistant from 1999-2000. He helped guide the Nittany Lions to a 13-6-2 mark and a second-place finish in the Big Ten Conference Tournament in 2000. He also was an assistant coach at William and Mary (1997-1998) and Mercer (1995-1996).

Doyle received his NSCAA Advanced Diploma in June 1998 and also holds the USSF "A" license. He has served as the goalkeeper coach for Olympic Development Program teams in Georgia, Nebraska and Ohio.

As a college player at Creighton, Doyle started three years in net for the Blue Jays before his career was cut short by a knee injury. In 1992, he was named the MVC Defensive Player of the Year and also garnered first-team MVC and All-Midwest honors. He led the 1992 Blue Jays to a 16-2-1 mark and a No. 1 national ranking as a junior. He ranks among school record leaders in 12 categories.

Originally from Katy, Texas, Doyle received his degree in interpersonal communications from Bowling Green State University in 1996.

Doyle is married to the former Katie Tarsney and has a daughter, Lucy, who was born on May 28, 2009.

PATRICK McSORLEY

ASSISTANT COACH

Patrick McSorley rejoins the Hokies for his second season as an assistant coach.

Prior to coming to Virginia Tech, McSorley spent six years at his alma mater, James Madison, where he was an assistant coach and associate head coach, and four years as the top assistant coach at Virginia Military Institute.

While at JMU, McSorley coached three players who

were later drafted by the MLS, two who are currently playing. He also helped lead the Dukes to a NCAA Tournament appearance in 2005.

As a player at JMU, McSorley was a third team All-American as a senior in 1995 and played on four NCAA Tournament teams (quarter-finalist in 1994 and 1995; first round in 1992 and 1993) and three Colonial Athletic Association champion teams (1992, 1993, 1994). In the 1994 NCAA Tournament, McSorley scored the game-winning goal against North Carolina in a 3-0 first-round victory and assisted on the game-winner in a 2-1 second-round victory over Duke.

McSorley's 42 goals and 103 points still stand as all-time JMU records, and he is tied for 13th place on the Dukes' career assist list with 19. He earned All-South Atlantic Region first-team, all-state first team, All-CAA second-team honors and was named to the Nike College Challenge Senior All-Star Team in 1995 in addition to being voted JMU's offensive MVP. That year, he was also named one of the Top-10 midfielders in the nation by Soccer News and earned Soccer News All-America honorable mention, making him one of only five players in JMU history to earn All-American recognition. In 2000, he was named one of the school's Top-50 athletes of all time by the JMU student newspaper, The Breeze.

McSorley played professional soccer for four years, most recently with the USL Roanoke Wrath (1998-2000).

A native of Springfield, Va., McSorley earned a bachelor's degree in business management from JMU in 1996 and a master's degree in sports recreation and leadership from JMU in 2007. He is married to the former Bridget Brugger, assistant director of sports medicine at JMU. They have two children, Morgan (3) and Addison (2).







2009 SEASON REVIEW

Under direction of new head coach Mike Brizendine, who was Tech's top assistant for five seasons prior, the Hokies men's soccer program underwent a rebuilding season in 2009, as the program welcomed 17 newcomers, complimenting 12 returners.

The young team didn't shy away from any challenges throughout the course of the year, playing against nine top-25 nationally ranked teams throughout the season and many other top-10 teams, including the top-ranked team in the country, Akron. The Hokies finished their season with a 5-12-2 overall record, concluding ACC play with a 2-6 mark, but recording 10 losses by a margin of two goals or less.

After dropping their season-opener at UMBC, a program that later moved up to a No. 20 national ranking, Tech traveled to Wisconsin to compete in the Middleton Sports & Fitness Invitational, coming home as the tournament winner. In the opening game, the Hokies battled Wisconsin to a scoreless tie through double-overtime. The Hokies' offense then came alive in the following game of the weekend tournament, defeating UW-Milwaukee 2-1 behind goals from Charlie Campbell and Koen Oost. Campbell was named the tournament's offensive MVP, while Oost, Alexander Baden, David Fiorello and Gregory Cochrane garnered All-Tournament team honors.

The Hokies then returned home to Thompson Field for the first time in the 2009 season to host the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational, where they competed against then-No. 11 South Florida and East Tennessee State. The Hokies held the defending Big East Champion Bulls scoreless through the first half of play, but one second-half goal would be enough for South Florida to squeak by Tech 1-0. The Hokies came close to scoring opportunities several times, finishing the game with a season-high 19 corner kicks. Tech then took on East Tennessee State for the first time in program history, earning a 1-1 tie in double-overtime as Baden scored the game-tying goal with a minute and 13 seconds left in the game.


Tech would then earn its first conference win at Clemson, avenging last year's 3-2 double-overtime loss to the Tigers. The Hokies used four goals from four different players to earn a 4-2 victory over the Tigers. They then returned to Blacksburg to earn a victory over then-No. 16 NC State, 2-0, marking the first time that the Hokies' began with a 2-0 record in ACC play since joining the conference in 2004. It also marked the Hokies' first win over a ranked opponent under Brizendine.

The Hokies would then go on a season-high five-game losing streak, with losses to four top-ranked teams. Ranked third in the country at the time, the Wake Forest Demon Deacons took a 5-1 victory over Tech. Clarke Bentley scored the Hokies' only goal. Tech then fell to Radford, 3-1, and Maryland, 2-1, as both teams earned come-frombehind victories to diminish Tech's early leads. The Hokies held a 1-0 lead through 87 minutes of play against the Terrapins, but Maryland scored two goals in the final three minutes of play to hand the Hokies their most heartbreaking loss of the season.

Tech returned home for a five-game home slate, including three non-conference games and two ACC matches. No. 1 Akron, who finished the regular season undefeated, took a hard-fought 2-0 victory over Tech, before in-state conference foe and eventual NCAA champion, Virginia, handed the Hokies their third ACC loss of the season, 3-1. Brendan Dunn, playing his third-straight game on the field after Stefan Caulfield took over the goalkeeping duties midway through the season, tallied the Hokies' only goal against the Cavaliers. Tech held an early 1-0 advantage until the 43rd minute of play in that game.

The Hokies would then end their losing skid as they defeated previously-ranked Davidson 1-0 in their eighth non-conference showdown of the season. Caulfield earned his first shutout of the season, marking Tech's second shutout overall.

Tech then closed out its season home slate against North Carolina and Longwood. Tech hosted then-No. 4 North Carolina on Senior Night, as the Hokies honored four seniors: Alexander Baden, Brendan Dunn, Stefan Caulfield and James Gilson. The Tar Heels squeaked past the Hokies, 1-0, in front of a season-high crowd of 1,853. Caulfield earned six saves in the match. The Hokies then scored a season-high five goals en route to a 5-1 victory in their final home game over the Longwood Lancers. Freshman Robert Alberti tallied his first two goals

of the season, while Gilson, Akogyeram and Dunn also added scores; Cochrane and Gilson collected assists.

To close out the regular season, Tech hit the road for conference matches at No. 16 Duke and Boston College. The Blue Devils earned a 4-1 victory, as Campbell scored Tech's only goal off an assist from Fiorello. The Eagles then registered a 2-0 victory over the Hokies, scoring two second-half goals for the win.

Tech finished the season as the eighth seed in the ACC and challenged the ninth-seed Clemson Tigers in the opening round of the ACC Tournament on Nov. 10. However, the Hokies were unable to produce the same result as earlier in the season, as the Tigers earned revenge and pulled out a 2-0 victory thanks to two goals from forward Nathan Thornton.

Seven different players finished the season with multiple goals for the Hokies, while two players each added one. Sophomore Emmanuel Akogyeram led the team with four goals and also notched two assists for a total of 10 points. Clarke Bentley and Charlie Campbell each tallied three goals, and Campbell led the team with four assists. Brendan Dunn, James Shupp, James Gilson and Robert Alberti all netted two scores, while Alexander Baden and Koen Oost each added one goal. Tech's newcomers combined to play in 138 games with 81 starts.

Only Campbell, Dunn and Gilson started all 19 games for Tech, while Akogyeram, Cochrane and Burnell earned playing time in each match. Dunn earned 10 starts in net, recording 42 saves in 921 minutes, posting a 3-5-2 record. Caulfield then took over in net, earning nine starts, and collecting 36 saves in 838 minutes.

Burnell, who was a vital contributor on defense, garnered the team's only academic award, as he was named to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District III Second Team, and was one of 10 ACC players to be recognized. James Gilson earned the same award last season.



One of America's best college towns, Blacksburg is a perfect setting for a great university like Virginia Tech.



variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Appalachian Trail, Claytor Lake and the New River. The region features a moderate climate and four distinct seasons. Blacksburg's location (adjacent to major interstate highways) provides convenient access to most points in the southern and eastern parts of the country.

WE ARE VIRGINIA TECH

A Proud University Inventing the Future

From its humble beginning in 1872 with 132 students and two programs of study, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With nearly 28,450 students in Blacksburg and about 2,500 other students statewide, the university produces world-class scholarship in a challenging academic environment. University tradition is firmly rooted in its motto, Ut Prosim (That I May Serve), and its historic land-grant mission is brought to life through learning, discovery and engagement.

More degree programs - approximately 210 graduate and undergraduate - are available through the university's nine colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, The Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School than at any other university in the commonwealth. Some 93 percent of all departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 130,000 enrollments since 1999.

With expenditures annual research exceeding \$396 million, Virginia Tech ranks in the top 50 research universities in the United States.

STUDENT-ATHLETE **ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES**

Providing the Tools Needed for Success in the Classroom

Expectations placed on Virginia Tech studentathletes are high both in the classroom and on the field. Working together with the Tech Athletics Department, Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) acts as the backbone for Hokie student-athletes in order to help them achieve their full potential, both inside and outside of athletics. Tutors, study assistance, computer and technology aid and individual skill development programs are just some of the services available.

In addition, SAASS assists students in arranging appointments with various University departments, such as their academic advisors, the Registrar, the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, deans offices, Career Services and the Cook Counseling Center for Academic Enrichment and

SAASS is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program with counseling and advising for student-athletes, offering academic counseling to ensure students receive a complete system of support.

Student-athletes have access to the department's spacious facilities, located in the West Side of Lane Stadium. Opened during the 2006-07 academic year, the SAASS suite, located

in the Quillen Family Academic Center, features 18 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 36-station computer lab with printer access, a conference room, three quiet areas for reading and studying and a reference library. The office is available between classes, after practice and

in the evenings. Hours of operation are flexible and may be tailored to maximize the studentathlete's limited time. The collection of SAASS programs housed in Lane Stadium quarantees that all student-athletes achieve success during their time at Virginia Tech.



STUDENT LIFE

Assisting in the Development of the Total Person

At Virginia Tech, student-athletes don't just play sports. With help from the Athletics Office of Student Life, Hokie student-athletes work outside the athletic venue to develop into community assets and responsible adults.

Led by the Virginia Tech Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Hokie student-athletes volunteered countless hours in the local community last year. In addition, over 300 Virginia Tech student-athletes earned a 3.00 grade point average during one or both semesters, while achieving great success within athletics as well.

Inspired by the NCAA/CHAMPS (Changing Athletes' Minds for Personal Success) Life Skills Program, the Athletics Office of Student Life creates programs designed to enhance studentathletes in five areas of commitment: athletic excellence, academic excellence, personal and leadership development, community service and career development. The program has been previously honored for its commitment to serving the good of the student-athletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association as a program of excellence.

STUDENT-ATHLETE **ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is a committee made up of studentathletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. They also offer input on the rules, regulations and policies that affect student-athletes' lives on NCAA member institution campuses. Two members of each sports team serve on SAAC each academic

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Life aims to help student-athletes lead balanced lifestyles, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills. Each team attends two personal development workshops during the year to educate members in healthy living, service learning, career development, diversity and life skills.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Virginia Tech student-athletes savor their collegiate athletic experiences with the understanding that they will need to secure a job upon graduation. The Office of Student Life works to enhance student-athlete career development by collaborating with the Virginia Tech Career Services Office. Student-athletes also receive assistance in learning about majors and minors, preparing for career fairs, and obtaining scholarships and internships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Office of Student Life is also responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded and honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. In 2009-10, 370 studentathletes were named to this prestigious list, an increase of nearly 30 from 2008-09.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Virginia Tech student-athletes are now involved more than ever in the local community. In conjunction with the mission of the Office of Student Life and the Ut Prosim motto, studentathletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. Each team partners with a local community organization and volunteers time at community-wide events. Along with large volunteer efforts, student-athletes engage in community support with visits to local hospitals and elementary and middle schools. Community organizations can also request Tech student-athletes to attend local outreach events. Involvement in this program helps maintain and improve the positive relationship between student-athletes and the surrounding community.

SPORTS MEDICINE

Providing the Hokies with Experienced, Professional Care

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Training Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidenced by its participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection (MRSA), high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies. Research is considered instrumental to the sports medicine department. The department has participated in several projects with the engineering department and school of education, respectively.

The 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech studentathletes. There is top-of-the-line equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer. In 2010, Reynolds again helped Tech spearhead another 3,000-square-foot expansion of the training room to encompass the weight room.

The Ferrell Training Room nearly doubled the size of the former Merryman Center facility. Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The \$10 million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physician's suite. The suite is equipped with a new state-of-the-art X-ray system, a fluoroscopy unit and a minor procedure room. The training room also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities.

Athletes have many options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff takes great pride in treating athletes yearround. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. The staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program that is followed over a nine-week period between the end of the season and the beginning of spring practice. This same procedure is followed during the summer.



ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

Keeping the Student-Athlete Ready to Play

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation. One of the main supporters of Tech soccer is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies continue to improve in the

Tech soccer players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in the Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight was offically dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department.

SPORT NUTRITION

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech studentathlete's life and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director. Freel, who is one of 16 full-time college dietitians in the country, also serves on the nutrition and performance committee with Dr. Gary Bennett.

"It is extremely beneficial for our studentathletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows the athletes and me to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sportspecific goals."


The sports nutrition program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance. Freel will be aided by Jennie Schafer, who is a graduate assistant.

SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes - sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for studentathletes. Bennett and counselor Kellie Moran-Miller, Ph.D., work together to serve the needs of Tech student-athletes. Both are also employed at the Cook Counseling Center on campus.

The sport psychology department offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with a sport psychologist and other injured athletes and talk about the recovery process. On average, Bennett conducts 30 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.







By the Way, What is a Hokie?

That's a frequently asked question in Virginia Tech athletics, and the answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer, and a contest for that purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which is still used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Virginia Tech teams and those people loval to Tech athletics. The official school colors - Chicago maroon and burnt orange - also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 58th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since its inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 120 national championships, including 64 in women's competition and 56 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 91 times in women's action.

Since 1953, when the league adopted men's soccer and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2009 season saw the ACC collect its 14th Men's Soccer National Championship as the Virginia Cavaliers won the national crown, their sixth NCAA title and first since 1994. The squad won following a 3-2 penalty kick shootout to defeat top-ranked Akron following a 0-0 draw in the championship final at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C. The Cavaliers (19-3-3) ended the season on a 16-game unbeaten streak. In addition, ACC teams finished 76-20-7 against non-conference opposition during the 2009 season, a winning percentage of .772, and six of the league nine men's soccer programs were ranked in the RPI Top 30, topping all other conferences in the country.

The league's programs continue to rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 163 appearances that include 224 victories in the last 51 years, earning 14 national crowns and making 21 appearances in the title contest. The 2009 season also marked the ninth-consecutive year at least one team from the ACC was represented in the College Cup and sixth-consecutive that the ACC sent at least two teams to the NCAA Semifinals.

The ACC led all conferences with seven teams selected to the 2009 NCAA Tournament Field of 48, while four of the seven ACC teams receiving a bid earned a top-16 national seed, including three of the top five spots. The league eventually owned 75 percent (three-of-four) College Cup teams (North Carolina, Virginia and Wake Forest), and finished with an impressive 15-2-1 record against non-conference opponents in this year's NCAA Tournament. Virginia (2), Wake Forest (3), North Carolina (5) and NC State (15) earned byes, while Boston College, Duke and Maryland received at-large invites. ACC Tournament Champion and

eventual NCAA Tournament Champion Virginia made its 31st NCAA appearance and 29th straight, the nation's longest active streak and an ACC record that dates back to 1981. Since seeding began in 1994, the ACC has been awarded the top seed 10 of the possible 16 years. In 2005, the ACC set a conference record with eight teams selected to the NCAA Men's Soccer Championship field, while 2006 and 2009 saw seven selected.

Wake Forest and North Carolina shared the 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season crown, while Wake Forest earned the top seed in the ACC Tournament after following ACC tie-breaker procedures. The Demon Deacons also picked up a league-high four first-team selections, just one shy of the school's 2008 first-team total and led the league with three of the four 2009 ACC postseason individual awards. Yet the ACC crown went to Virginia as the Cavs recorded their eighthconsecutive shutout, blanking NC State, 1-0, to win the 2009 ACC Men's Soccer Championship at WakeMed Soccer Park.

Overall, the ACC has placed 136 players on All-America lists, totaling 260 All-America accolades, 18 National Player of the Year and six National Rookie of the Year honors.

2009-10 IN REVIEW

The 2009-10 academic year saw league teams capturing an all-time high eight national team titles and nine individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has now won 50 national team titles over the last 13 years and two or more NCAA titles in 28 of the past 30 years.

The ACC was the only conference in America to place four of its teams in the final Top 10 rankings of the 2009-10 Learfield Director's Cup Standings - symbolic of the nation's top overall programs - as Virginia (3rd), Florida State (5th), North Carolina (7th), and Duke (10th) were ranked nationally in the Top 10.

A total of 123 league teams earned a berth in NCAA postseason competition, compiling a 116-64-3 (.637) mark in NCAA championships. The ACC had 96 teams ranked in the final Top 25 polls, including 42 teams ranked in the Top 10, while six teams finished No. 1 in at least one poll in their respective sport. In addition, the ACC had 253 league student-athletes named to All-America teams in 2009-10, 127 men and 126 women, and 108 ACC athletes earned Academic All-America honors. The league produced six national Player of the Year, four national Freshman of the Year, and four national Coach of the Year honorees.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2010-11 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first vear.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, while volleyball determines its champion in regular season play.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.
