VIRGINIA TECH SOCCER STADIUM

Completed in the fall of 2003, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is located in the heart of the athletic complex on the school's beautiful campus in Blacksburg. The stadium is the home to the men's soccer team, and provides an excellent venue for matches and should be filled to capacity this fall.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system that can be drained and ready for play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard enables fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games. Hokie fans came out in record numbers throughout last season, drawing a total of 11,752 fans. Tech averaged 1,469 fans per game, the 14th-highest average in the country. On Friday, Oct. 6, 2006, the No. 19 Virginia Tech men's soccer team hosted the No. 2-ranked Virginia Cavaliers before a record-breaking crowd of 2,711 spectators.

Across from the fans and between each team's bench area is the Sandy Thompson Press Box. Fully-heated, the press box contains a state-of-the-art sound system and ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck, which is accessible to all media.

With a new restroom facility completed in 2005, and the completion of additional seating, the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is one of the best venues to watch the sport.

Press Box: The Sandy D. Thompson press box is located on the opposite side of the field from the grandstand between the team benches. Additional space, including a film area, is located on top of the grandstand. Media do not need a pass to enter the press box.




Match Services: Media members covering a Virginia Tech men's soccer match are encouraged to contact the Athletics Communications Office at least 24 hours in advance. Space is externely limited in the press box. Also, radio stations broadcasting for the visiting team need to contact the AC office at least three days prior to playing at Virginia Tech to ensure that phone lines and ethernet lines are secured.

Statistics: Media members will be provided with box scores immediately after a match. The press box has an ethernet line for Internet use should any media need to send stories or photos.

Interviews: Media members MUST contact the AC contact to arrange interviews with players and coaches. No interviews will be allowed without at least 24 hours advance notice. At no time will a student-athlete's home phone number be given out.

Hokies online: The AC office compiles weekly notes for men's soccer. They can be accessed through the athletic department's official Web site, hokiesports.com. Also, media and fans can access the latest news and stats on the Hokies at that site.




2007 OUTLOOK

In order to understand what the 2007 Virginia Tech men's soccer team is trying to accomplish this fall, you must first look back at the impressive season they put together in 2006.

The Hokies finished with an 11-8-1 record to earn an NCAA Tournament bid in back-to-back years for the first time in program history. It was their third appearance in the past four seasons, and they reached double digits in the win column for the fourth time in head coach Oliver Weiss' five-year tenure. They also broke the school record for assists in a season, while tying the mark

for total points.




On a national scale, Tech reached an all-time high of No. 8 in the Soccer America poll early in the fall. The Hokies finished the season as the fourth-highest scoring team in the country, having averaged 2.35 goals per game. Fan excitement was at an all-time high thanks to a recently completed 1,028-seat expansion to the soccer stadium and an ultra-competitive schedule, as Virginia Tech finished 14th in the nation in average home attendance.

The Hokies capped it all off by being presented with the 2006 ACC Sportsmanship Award, an honor voted upon by their peers. All in all, it was quite a successful season, but Weiss and his staff are far from satisfied.

"I think we have

begun to understand our role within the ACC and the NCAA after the last few seasons," Weiss said.

"We need to become one of the top teams in the ACC and advance in the NCAA Tournament. To do that, we have to become a much more determined and cohesive team of talented individuals. I believe we have a great core of players that want to achieve this new milestone. It is up to us to push and



make us go farther than any Virginia Tech soccer team has gone before."

The Hokies return to the pitch in 2007 with plenty of tools to make a postseason run once again. Although they lose 10 players from last year's roster, only five of them were regular contributors. A whopping 12 newcomers will join a group of 15 returnees that got a chance to bond during a two-week trip of Germany in the spring, a tour that saw the Hokies play four matches against some of the best club teams in Coach Weiss' native country.

"We're very excited about getting things rolling," Weiss said. "We know we have experienced players coming back, and we know we have great incoming players. We also know that our Tulsa match will be on TV, which will be the program's first-ever telecast. All indicators point toward another banner year, and I think we'll see one of the better teams we've had at Virginia Tech."



FORWARDS

One position where the influx of new talent should mesh with the returning experience is at forward. A pair of juniors from England and Germany will combine with Ghanaian striker Patrick Nyarko to form a United Nations of sorts.

Leading the way will be Nyarko, a two-time All-ACC first-teamer who was named to the preseason MAC Hermann Trophy Watch List. The junior set single-season school records a year ago in goals (16) and points (40), and returns as one of the most talented forwards in the nation. He should continue to work his way up the Tech scoring charts, as he already ranks 10th in both goals (24) and points (62). If he were to match last year's performance, he would move into the No. 2 slot on both lists.

"Patrick obviously had a tremendous second year," Weiss said. "But we still think he has a lot of room left to improve in all categories. He should have a great start to his junior season."

Joining Nyarko will be first-year Hokies Stefan Hock, a quick winger from Germany, and Robert Edmans, a 6-6 target from England. Both should make an immediate impact.

MIDFIELDERS

While the forwards will look to provide the scoring punch that made Tech so competitive a year ago, the midfield will be the backbone of the team in that it offers such a wide range of experience.

"We will have what is probably the deepest midfield we've had over the years," Weiss said. "We have a lot of returners, including a pair of fifth-year players in Ben Nason and Scott Spangler, and we're looking forward to them wearing the captain's armband and bringing all of that experience to the pitch."

Nason returns after tallying six goals and 11 assists in 2006, and he currently sits second on Tech's all-time career assist list with 23, and eighth on the shots list with 166. In addition to Nason and Spangler, Tech returns a third playmaker to the field in Charlie Campbell, a sophomore who was named to the ACC All-Freshman Team last season after recording seven assists and taking nearly all the corner kicks.

The second trio of returners – Scott Dillie, James Gilson and Jonathan Collier – were all defenders at one point but have made their presence felt

elsewhere. Gilson was one of the more pleasant surprises of the spring, and Dillie can play anywhere on the field.

"James is a guy who probably did the most in games this spring," Weiss said. "He moonlit as a forward, but will probably see his time at the outside midfield position. Scott will play in the midfield or up front where he's been in the past, and Jonathan moved to the left midfield position from defender and had a solid performance there."

Four freshmen – Clarke Bentley, Craig Burnell, Brent Hooper and Chris Kaufman - round out the midfield contingent after very solid youth careers.

DEFENDERS

The Hokies went from a top defensive team in 2005 to one of the better offensive teams in the country in 2006. The goal for the

upcoming season is to meet somewhere in the middle.

"Certainly, our focus this fall will be to improve on our defensive effort," Weiss said. "Our defensive success will be tied to the goalkeeper situation, and vice versa. There were a lot of questions last year because of injuries, but both Alexander Baden and Bryan Collier will be back healthy from long-term injuries."

Baden only played the second half of last year, while Collier was only available for the first half. Additionally, Marcus Reed takes over as the left back after moving from offense where he was the team's third-leading scorer a year ago.

"I think we'll have an excellent back line with those three guys," Weiss said. "Then we've got to plug in one more player who is either new or who wants to step up and prove he belongs there."

That fourth guy could either be Craig Brutus, a sophomore who played forward as a freshman but impressed as a defender in the spring, or James Shupp, an incoming freshman who has shown he can play. Other players including Taylor Walsh, Max Allen and Georg Zehender can also fill in.

"We have a lot of flexibility so in case we're stretched again by injuries, we'll be able to come up with a solid back line, unlike last year when we had to shuffle around a lot. We're looking forward to having all of these great players available."



GOALKEEPERS

One of the biggest advantages that Tech will have this season is experience at the goalkeeper position. The Hokies entered 2006 with a handful of net-minders that had a combined 30 minutes of collegiate playing time, but senior Drew Czekanski and sophomore Brendan Dunn split duties during the course of the season and return a year older and better. A third keeper, incoming junior Markus Aigner, will be in the mix for the starting job after playing recently in the German fourth division.

"I feel good knowing that we have two keepers coming back who got a lot of time last year," Weiss said. "We still need to figure out who the starter is going to be, and it's going to be the most competitive position. All the guys have great mentalities, and they will respect whatever decision is made in the end."


Sophomore Stefan Caulfield redshirted a year ago and should be in the mix as well, while Robert Meinert will help push the veterans as he adjusts to the collegiate training process.

Finding the right keeper will be the final piece to a puzzle that has been five years in the making for Weiss.

"We know we can score goals and entertain our fans with attacking soccer, but we will have to improve our defensive awareness," he said. "We need to get that improved defensive performance that we know we have to have in order to keep our tough competition at bay.

"It should be fun and competitive to see our team unfold at the start of our fall season, because in every department, we have both experience and newcomers that will give us the ability to be 16-18 players deep as opposed to just 10-12."

OLIVER WEISS

HEAD COACH



Since his arrival at Virginia Tech in 2002, head coach Oliver Weiss has elevated the men's soccer program into the national spotlight by achieving unprecedented postseason success, recruiting outstanding student-athletes and creating a soccer environment that demands excellence in every aspect of collegiate athletics.

Weiss' five-year career record of 54-35-11, resulting in a .595 winning percentage, reflects not only a strong winning tradition, but also a character and confidencebuilding experience because of Virginia Tech's extraordinarily

strong schedules in the past. The result has been 12 wins over nationally-ranked opponents so far, a mid-season national RPI of No. 14 a year ago and the team's highest-ever ranking at No. 8 in the *Soccer America* poll in early 2006.

Weiss' drive for excellence has led the program to its first-ever appearance

in the NCAA Tournament. The Hokies' first bid came in 2003, while their first-ever NCAA Tournament seed (No. 12) and first-round bye came in 2005. History was made again in 2006, when Tech made its first back-to-back appearance after being invited for a third time. His teams have set or tied the school record in most categories, including wins (14), goals (52) and longest unbeaten streak (10 matches).

Weiss believes strongly in playing nationally-ranked teams outside the always-difficult Atlantic Coast Conference, which is dubbed the best soccer conference in the U.S. by many experts.

Weiss has proven himself as one of the most productive young coaches in collegiate soccer. Last season, he led a team that was not only the fourth-most explosive in the nation by averaging 2.35 goals per game, but one that also exhibited character and poise in being honored with the ACC Sportsmanship Award as voted upon by its peers. In 2005, Weiss' team held opponents at bay, limiting their shots, which produced the lowest amount of saves for any team in school history. His defense proved to be the most staggering in the program's history in 2005, setting a school record for consecutive minutes not scored upon. In 2004, the team defeated No. 1 Duke and No. 2 Virginia during Tech's inaugural ACC season. In 2003, Tech set records for goals, points, shots and corner kicks while the team finished as the regular-season runner-up in the BIG EAST Conference. In his first year, 2002, Weiss guided the Hokies to a 10-7-1 record, tying for seventh place in the BIG EAST with a 5-5-0 mark.

Before coming to Tech, Weiss served as the top assistant at the University



of North Carolina from 1999 to 2001. During his three years in Chapel Hill, the team went 54-14-1 and earned a trip to the NCAA Tournament each season. In 2000, UNC captured the ACC championship and was seeded No. 1 in postseason play. In 2001, the Tar Heels won the national championship.

Weiss also served as an assistant at the College of William & Mary from 1996 to 1998, where he helped the Tribe to a 49-19-3 record and three trips to the national tournament. Before going to William & Mary, Weiss spent a year as an assistant at the University of New Hampshire.

Weiss began his coaching with a Richmond Under-10 team in 1988. A youth coaching career of eight years followed, producing eight consecutive Virginia State Cup championships, along with a Region 1 championship and a trip to the 1995 Snickers USYSA National Championships.

Weiss was selected as the 1990 and 1995 Virginia Youth Soccer Association Coach of the Year. In 1995, he was honored as the NSCAA East Region and the USYSA Region 1 Coach of the Year.

As a standout player at the University of Richmond, Weiss captained the team three out of his four years. He also earned All-Colonial Athletic Association honors twice and South Atlantic Region honors once during his career with the Spiders. Weiss received a B.A. in history in 1988.

Weiss graduated from Central High School in High Point, N.C., in 1984. He was named North Carolina High School Player of the Year and earned All-America honors.

Weiss holds a USSF 'A' coaching license and a German Soccer Federation 'B' license. He is also the director of the Hokie Soccer Academy for Boys, a soccer camp held throughout the summer at Virginia Tech.

A native of Burgdorf (a suburb of Hannover), Germany, Weiss became a United States citizen in 2000. He and his wife, Peggy, have a daughter, Samantha, and a son, Max.

MICHAEL BRIZENDINE

ASSISTANT COACH

Michael Brizendine begins his fourth year with the men's soccer program. An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine works with all aspects of the Hokie program. In addition to his coaching duties, he is the recruiting coordinator.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint at Bridgewater College, a Division III program in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. He was also an assistant men's coach at Ferrum College in 1999.

He was the head men's coach at Bridgewater from 2001 to 2003 and

assisted with the men's and women's teams in 2000. Guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program, Brizendine led Bridgewater to a 25-10 mark over two seasons and earned the ODAC Coach of the Year award in 2003.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in religion and a minor in business. In 2005, he earned his M.Ed. at Virginia Tech. Recently, he earned his USSF "B" license. Brizendine also holds an Advanced National Coaching License

from the NSCAA.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at JMU from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in alltime scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine and his wife, Lucy, reside in Christiansburg, Va.

CHASE HARRISON

ASSISTANT COACH

Chase Harrison rewrote a lot of Virginia Tech's goalkeeping records in head coach Oliver Weiss' first four seasons at Tech from 2002 through 2005. He was drafted by Real Salt Lake in the third round (26th overall) in the 2006 Major League Soccer Supplemental Draft. He also played for the Virginia Beach Mariners and is currently with the the Rochester Raging Rhinos of the USL Division One. He returns to Blacksburg to join the Tech coaching staff in 2007 as the goalkeeper instructor.

In 79 appearances in net at Tech, Harrison established three new school records: goals against average (1.12 gpg), shutouts (24) and minutes (7,181). He also holds a pair of single-season records with eight shutouts apiece in 2004 and 2005 as well as a total of 2,062 minutes logged in 2003. Harrison stands fifth on the school's all-time saves list with 289 over his career.

Harrison led the Hokies to a level of success unparalleled in school history. In his first season as full-time starter in 2003, the Hokies qualified for their first-ever NCAA Tournament. In 2004, Tech upset No. 1 Duke 1-0 in Durham, N.C., in its first matchup against a topranked program in school history and followed with a 2-1 defeat of No. 2 Virginia in Blacksburg. Tech qualified for the NCAA Tournament again in 2005 and received a first-round bye before hosting UNC Greensboro.

A native of Huntington, W. Va., Harrison graduated from Tech with a degree in consumer studies in May of 2005.





LASSE MERTINS

VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH

Lasse Mertins, a former standout collegiate player with the Hokies, begins his third year with the Virginia Tech staff as a volunteer coach in 2007.


A native of Rotenburg, Germany, Mertins played two seasons with the Hokies under head coach Oliver Weiss (2002-03). He led Virginia Tech to a 24-12-1 record over his two years, tallying seven goals and two assists from his defensive position.

Mertins was a co-captain his senior year and was the program's first Academic All-America honoree, garnering a spot on the third team. He was a two-time all-region selection in addition to earning a second-team All-BIG EAST nod in 2003.

After completing his eligibility with Tech, Mertins worked with Campbell Soup in Germany for a year and a half before joining the Tech coaching staff.

He will assist Weiss in all areas of the program as he works toward his Ph.D., in accounting and information systems.








PROFESSIONAL CLUBS CONTRIBUTE TO HOKIE SPIRIT MEMORIAL FUND



BLACKSBURG, VA COLLEGE TOWN, U.S.A.





Located in Southwest Virginia on a plateau between the Blue Ridge and Allegheny Mountains, Blacksburg combines the laid-back lifestyle of a small town with the amenities one would expect to find around a major center of higher education. Together, the town and university have worked hard to create a progressive community that ranks among the nation's elite living environments.

Virginia Tech and the town of Blacksburg gained national and international attention by creating the world's first "electronic village." Businesses and industries have been drawn by the potential of the quaint town.

Blacksburg's location (adjacent to major interstate highways) provides convenient access to most points in the southern and eastern parts of the country.

VIRGINIA TECH ADVANCED PAST CLEMSON IN ITS FIRST-EVER NCAA PLAYOFF GAME IN BLACKSBURG IN 2003



The Hokies played host to Clemson in a first-round NCAA Tournament game in front of 2,263 fans at the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium in 2003. Tech celebrated the go-ahead goal of Bobby O'Brien (above), his third of the night, before caging the Tigers in a shoot-out, 6-5.

Under the tutelage of Oliver Weiss, the Virginia Tech men's soccer program has reached new heights. During three of the five seasons since his arrival in Blacksburg, Weiss has taken his team to the NCAA Tournament.

The Hokies lost at UNC Greensboro 2-1 in the first round of last season's NCAA Tournament. Patrick Nyarko gave Tech the lead in the 58th minute with his school-record 16th goal of the season.

During the 2005 campaign, Weiss helped Tech reach its then-highest-ever ranking at No. 10 while guiding the team to the program's first-ever first-round bye. The Hokies were seeded 12th in the NCAA Tournament and hosted UNC Greensboro on Nov. 22, 2005 in Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium. With both teams playing tremendous defense, the match went into overtime at 0-0. After neither team scored in either overtime session, the teams went to penalty kicks to see who would advance to the third round. Tech came up short, as the Spartans advanced after netting four penalty kicks to three for the Hokies.

In 2003, Tech entered the NCAA Tournament with a 14-4-2 record, earning an at-large bid. The Hokies hosted the Clemson Tigers in a first-round match and the teams played to a 3-3 draw on Nov. 21, 2003. After the first five penalty kicks, the teams were tied 5-5. Tech advanced to the second round after Chase Harrison corralled the Tigers' sixth penalty kick and Dustin Dyer connected on his.



ATHLETIC SUCCESS



Virginia Tech has a long and proud athletic tradition, but the Hokies have really seen their success and visibility grow immensely over the past few years. For the ever-growing legion of Tech fans, the most exciting part is that the future looks even brighter.

On July 1, 2004, Virginia Tech officially became a member of the prestigious Atlantic Coast Conference – a move that has already helped the Hokie athletics program grow even stronger.

Tech competes at the Division I level of the NCAA, and with a total of 21 varsity sports, 11 for men and 10 for women, Virginia Tech provides generous opportunities for athletes (and fans) to get in the Hokie huddle.

The success of Oliver Weiss' soccer program is only part of the story.

Tech's nationally known football team has had unprecedented success over the past decade. The Hokies have played in 14 consecutive bowl games. Last year, the Hokies won 10 games and went to the Chick-fil-A Bowl after finishing second in ACC Coastal Division. The Tech football team appeared in the inaugural ACC Championship game in 2005 after winning the title in 2004 in its first season in the conference. The Hokies won BIG EAST Conference Championships in 1995, 1996 and 1999, and played for the National Championship in the 2000 Nokia Sugar Bowl.

Golfer Drew Weaver won the British Amateur last June and participated in the British Open. Weaver became the first American to win the Amateur since 1979 and earned a chance to play at the Masters Tournament this spring. In 2005, Spyridon Jullien won NCAA titles in the indoor weight throw and the outdoor hammer throw, bringing the school its first-ever NCAA Championship in any sport. During Jullien's senior year, he again won the weight throw during the indoor season and captured the hammer throw title at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The men's basketball team advanced to the second round of last season's NCAA Tournament, while the women's team received a bid to the NIT.



Weiss' team earned its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance after receiving a first-round bye in the 2005 NCAA Championships. The softball team won the ACC regular-season and tournament titles and has earned NCAA berths the last three seasons, and the 2006 season featured the program's first All-American. The women's soccer team reached the postseason for the first time in its history during 2004 and earned the ACC sportsmanship award in 2005.

The women's track and field team won both the ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championships in 2007. Tech's baseball team and men's tennis teams have also participated in NCAA postseason competition in recent years, as have individuals from wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and track & field.

Prior to joining the ACC, Virginia Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference since 1991, and a member of the BIG EAST in all other sports except wrestling since 2001.



A RESEARCH UNIVERSITY IN ACTION

Beginning in 1872 with 132 students and two programs of study, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, popularly known as Virginia Tech, has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence. With about 25,800 full-time students in Blacksburg and more than 2,000 other students statewide, the university produces world-class scholarship in a challenging academic environment. University tradition is firmly rooted in our motto, *Ut Prosim* (That I May Serve), and our historic land-grant mission is brought to life through learning, discovery, and engagement.

LEARNING

Virginia Tech's challenging academic standards attract high-achieving students. Our eight colleges (Agriculture & Life Sciences, Architecture & Urban Studies, Engineering, Liberal Arts & Human Sciences, Natural Resources, Pamplin Business, Science, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine) and Graduate School offer more degree programs than any other university in the state with 60 undergraduate and 140 graduate offerings. Virginia Tech is one of the nation's leaders in developing and using instructional technologies. Some 85 percent of our departments offer e-learning courses, which have attracted more than 60,000 enrollments since 1998.

DISCOVERY

The university's groundbreaking research transforms lives and communities. With annual research expenditures of about \$290 million, Virginia Tech is ranked 55th among research universities in the United States. The university, which has more than 100 research centers, also consistently ranks among the top institutions in industry-supported research and near the top 10 in the number of patents issued each year.

The university's nationally and internationally recognized faculty and motivated students are involved in more than 3,500 research projects in fields ranging from biotechnology to materials, from the environment and energy to food and health, and from transportation to computing information.

ENGAGEMENT

As part of our outreach mission and in adherence to our motto, we serve and engage the citizens of the commonwealth, the nation, and the world. Virginia Tech is involved in a multitude of economic and community development projects. These efforts focus on education and the dissemination of knowledge to the global society in which we live.

Professionals, organizations, and communities tap Virginia Tech's vast resources, expertise, and research results through hundreds of continuing and professional education programs and five campus centers. Virginia Tech has a long history of providing innovative distance-learning techniques, such as satellite videoconferencing, multimedia, interactive video, interactive computer conferencing, and Web-based courses, to meet the various needs of working adults and other nontraditional students.

The Inn at Virginia Tech & Skelton Conference Center on campus and The Hotel Roanoke & Conference Center in Roanoke, both owned by Virginia Tech, support the university's outreach mission by working with faculty to plan and host conferences and continuing education and professional programs.

Virginia Tech manages more than \$30 million in funded economic development projects in 27 countries and encourages faculty members to develop global course content and study abroad opportunities for students. In 2005-06, about 1,870 students from 117 foreign countries studied at Tech, while more than 800 Virginia Tech students studied abroad.

Virginia Cooperative Extension, operated jointly in the commonwealth by Virginia Tech and Virginia State University, has been helping people improve their economic, cultural, and social well being for more than 90 years. With 107 city/county offices, tens of thousands of volunteers, and programs across the state, Extension reaches and teaches millions of Virginians annually.

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's men's soccer program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and will be a school-best 76 percent for 2007. This marks the fourth time in the last six years that Virginia Tech's student-athlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, current Virginia Tech student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2006 calendar year, 449 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic abilities and achievements are the primary focus for national media attention. Athletic events bring back not only faithful alumni,


but are a welcome mat for potential new students.


The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with university and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student-athlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student-athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs:

The expectations of the Virginia Tech community are that each studentathlete achieves their maximum academic and athletic potential. With the proper assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality.

SAASS provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

During the summer of 2006, the SAASS office moved to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms, and direct access to the SAASS staff.

This complex is the focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provides a centralized place for student-athlete services.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athletes with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

Chris Helms, in his ninth year at Tech, is the director and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student Athlete Academic Support Services office.

Helms oversees an office comprised of an associate director, four assistant directors, two learning specialists, a systems analyst, three interns and a secretary, forming a group of professionals serving the needs of all student-athletes.

In addition to his duties directing SAASS, Helms serves as a liaison between the academic and athletic communities and is an ad hoc member of the University Athletic Committee.

Helms came to Tech from Michigan State University, where he served as the assistant director of the Student Athlete Support Services office.

Prior to MSU, Helms served as the coordinator of academic affairs for the Florida State University football program. Some of his other experience includes academic advisement for student-athletes at Central Connecticut State University.

COMPUTER SERVICES DEPARTMENT



Another example of Virginia Tech's commitment to providing its student-athletes with the best academic resources possible is the presence of the Computer Services department, under the direction of Tommy Regan and Chris Mayer.

Because all Tech students are required to own computers, the Virginia Tech athletics department helps its scholarship athletes fulfill that requirement by providing them with computers.

In addition to ordering computers for the athletes, the office also addresses computer service needs for the student-athletes and the entire Virginia Tech athletics staff.

ATHLETICS OFFICE OF STUDENT LIFE

Led by the Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee, Hokie student-athletes volunteered over 1,400 hours in the local community in the past year. In addition, over 400 Virginia Tech student-athletes earned a 3.00 grade point average during one or both semesters in 2006. The accomplishments are even more amazing in the context of the 2006-2007 athletic seasons being some of the most successful in Virginia Tech history.

Patricia Lovett, who came to Tech from Murray State, is the Coordinator of Student Life. The programs and services implemented by the Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life are inspired by the NCAA/CHAMPS Life Skills Program. The program was honored for its commitment to serving the good of the student-athletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association as a Program of Excellence.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Virginia Tech student-athletes welcomed Michael Franzese to campus in November. Franzese, the son of a kingpin in New York's Columbo crime family, talked to student-athletes about the downfalls of gambling and the importance of integrity in themselves, their athletics and their community. As in past years, the Virginia Tech men's soccer team invited numerous speakers to present on a variety of topics during the fall two-a-day practices and meetings. Topics covered in these presentations include appropriate campus and community conduct, media relations, sport psychology, drug and alcohol education, sports agent relations, gambling and healthy relationships.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Student-athletes are offered workshops on topics such as resumé design, career fair etiquette, interview skills, interview attire and mini-career fairs. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and co-ops during their college careers.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-

athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded each semester by being honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The 2006 calendar year listed 449 student-athletes with this honor, a 20 percent increase from the 2005 calendar year.

Andrew Montgomery (men's cross country) and Jessica Botzum (women's swimming and diving) received the Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Athletics. The recipients of the award receive a \$5,000 scholarship donated by Dr. Bill and Peggy Skelton.

ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The student-athletes encourage their teammates to get involved both on campus and in the community. Each year SAAC sponsors a canned food drive during the basketball season.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Athletics Office of Student Life community outreach program is "Hokies with Heart." Student-athletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. In collaboration with the Virginia Tech Corp of Cadets and student leadership, the "Hokies with Heart" program works together with the Montgomery County Public Schools System to visit with local school kids about the importance of education and character development. In 2006, men's soccer also volunteered with the Special Olympics and the Pilot Street Project in Roanoke, Va.

Each athletic team at Virginia Tech is encouraged to select one local charity on which to focus their philanthropic efforts throughout the year. The men's soccer team works with the Adopt-a-Highway program, picking up trash four times per year on 460 West.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. Under the leadership of Mike Goforth, assistant director of athletics for athletic training, the department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidenced by their participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection, high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies.

As part of the evolution, Tech recently completed its sixth full year in the 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room. This area consolidated the training rooms that existed in the Merryman Center and Cassell Coliseum. The facility gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of

all Virginia Tech student-athletes. Virginia Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The \$10 million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physician's suite. The suite is equipped with a new state-of-the-art X-ray system, fluoroscopy unit and minor procedure room, while the training room has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities.

The sports medicine staff takes great pride in treating the athletes year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. During this time, the staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program.

A vital part of student-athlete medical services is access to the Montgomery Regional Hospital's SWVA Center for Orthopaedics and Schiffert Student Health Center. Both facilities are staffed with qualified physicians and staff, and have a wide variety of technologies designed to increase the level of care available to athletes.

"Our goal is to provide the same high level of health care that professional and Olympic athletes receive," Goforth said.



Over the past 10 years, Virginia Tech has developed the reputation for producing top-level certified athletic trainers. Graduates are now employed in positions across the country at various levels of the profession. This year, the staff will consist of three graduate assistant athletic trainers: Chase Troescher, Dan Preusser and Zach Wimmer.

If physical therapy is needed, student-athletes can be seen by therapist Mark Piechoski in the Ferrell Training Room. Piechoski, a certified athletic trainer, physical therapist, and strength and conditioning specialist, plays a large role in the overall program developed to return the injured athlete back to 100 percent. In addition, staff sport psychologist Gary Bennett is available to all student-athletes for personal and performance issues. Virginia Tech also has the services of Dr. Greg Tilley, team chiropractor. Tilley provides Tech athletes with specialized treatment for spine-related conditions and also plays a huge role in performance enhancement through various chiropractic techniques.

Tech also maintains a special relationship with Montgomery Regional Hospital. Montgomery Regional Hospital is the choice for state-of-the-art equipment to perform surgeries, diagnostic imaging and processing of laboratory requests.

Jimmy Lawrence, a 29-year veteran in the athletic department, begins his fourth season as the men's soccer trainer, after taking over those duties midseason three years ago. He has been the baseball athletic trainer for 28 years. He will be assisted by several graduate assistants and student trainers.

Athletic trainer Jimmy Lawrence has earned respect and popularity through his outstanding work with Virginia Tech student-athletes over the past 28 years.

Lawrence, who is certified by the National Trainers Association, began working at Tech in 1979 as a graduate assistant trainer for football, basketball, baseball and wrestling. He was promoted to assistant trainer in 1981 and coordinated the training duties for all men's sports except football for 19 seasons. Lawrence is beginning his fourth fulltime season with the men's soccer program. During his time at Tech, he has supervised a graduate assistant or student trainer with the soccer team for 23 seasons.

While working with the team, Lawrence provides daily practice coverage. He also assists the team with injury prevention and helps the student-athletes with injuries.

A native of Elliston, Va., Lawrence received his bachelor's in health and physical education from Emory & Henry in 1979 and a Master's in physical education from Tech in 1981. As an undergraduate, he worked for four years as a student trainer. Lawrence is married to Peg Morse and resides in Prices Fork.



ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. Always striving to stay on the cutting edge, Virginia Tech has combined strength and conditioning with nutrition and sport psychology to the benefit of its student-athletes. At Tech, these areas are part of the student-athletes' preparation — not just for game day, but also for life. Virginia Tech tries to provide the best services, facilities and support staff for all of its student-athletes, to make them better athletes and better people.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

One of the most important aspects of a successful college soccer program is its strength and conditioning program. Before the lights ever come on, before the players run onto the field for the first game and before the first goal is ever scored, college soccer players work on getting themselves physically prepared for the rigors of a five-month season.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation, helping to make the soccer program one of the best as well.

Tech soccer players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department. With the two facilities, the Hokies have more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are four full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches. Terry Mitchell is the assistant director of strength and conditioning.

Terry Mitchell, the assistant director for strength and conditioning, is in his sixth year working with the Virginia Tech men's soccer team. A graduate of Lee University, Mitchell earned his master's in community health promotions from Virginia Tech in 2004. He is an NSCA certified strength and conditioning specialist and holds various certifications from

U.S. Weightlifting and the Cooper Institute.

In the offseason, the team will have three strength sessions per week and on alternate days, will condition or practice. Each strength workout consists of dynamic flexibility, speed, agility, strength training and mobility work. Mitchell uses an integrated approach in-season, where each training session involves some aspect of the components so players will not lose the benefits of off-season training. Mitchell's experience with professional baseball and personal training allow him to implement functional training that meets the demands of soccer.

Mitchell is a national level powerlifter and frequently competes in competitions along the East coast. He currently holds the drug free, Master's national and world record in the bench press event, which he set at the American Powerlifting Federation nationals in April 2006 with a lift of 529 pounds. He also placed second in the Master's division 220-pound weight class for the combined powerlifting competition that consists of the squat, bench and deadlift totals combined.

Mitchell is married to the former Terri Thompson, who serves as assistant vice president and controller for the Virginia Tech Foundation, Inc.



SPORTS NUTRITION

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director.

Freel provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and eating choices to improve performance. She also designs preseason menus, snacks and training table menus for the soccer team.

"It is extremely beneficial for our student-athletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows the athletes and me to get very

specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

Also in July 2002, the Virginia Tech Athletics Department purchased the BOD POD body composition system. Tech is one of a handful of college athletic departments using this type of technology. The Bod Pod is found in many professional training facilities, such as the NFL and Major League Baseball. It accurately measures body composition (percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass) through air displacement within five minutes. Research has shown that an increase in lean muscle mass will increase athletic performance. The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.





AMY FREEL Sports Nutritionist

Amy Freel begins her fifth year as the sports nutritionist for the men's soccer program. As the director of sports nutrition, Freel provides sport-specific nutrition education to the men's soccer team. She also provides each individual with nutrition counseling, which includes learning how to gain muscle weight, lose fat weight, eat well on campus and how to shop for the correct

foods at the grocery store.


Freel educates the team on supplements and gives a recipe book for all off-campus soccer players.

Four times a year, she provides a body composition test on the athletes with the Bod Pod. The Bod Pod accurately measures the percent of body fat, lean muscle mass and fat mass through air displacement within five minutes. She has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance.

Before coming to Virginia Tech, Freel worked at the Lewis Gale Center in Salem, Va., as a clinical dietitian. From 1999 until 2002, she worked in the student life office.

Freel earned a bachelors in dietetics from Ball State in 1996. In 1998, she earned her Masters in dietetics from her alma mater.

Freel has two sons – Ben (6), Matt (5) and a daughter Ashley (1). She and her husband Mike, reside in Blacksburg.



SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes — sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett also works closely with the Cook Counseling Center.

Bennett meets with student-athletes on an individual basis for personal counseling and to discuss the mental aspects of the game. He also works on team building, communication and performance enhancement. The sport psychology department also offers injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process.

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett said. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

"We try to address all the various factors that affect student-athletes' performance on and off the field," Bennett says. "We believe we can help athletes perform better by addressing those concerns."

The sport psychology department also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with other injured athletes and talk about their recovery process. Injured athletes may also meet individually with the sport psychologists if they do not feel comfortable in the group or cannot make the sessions. On average, the psychologists conduct 20 individual sessions per week and also meet weekly with teams as the need arises.

The response to the sport psychology program has been very positive. The student-athletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

"It's a great resource for our coaches and our athletes," assistant AD for athletic performance says. "We've improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and sport psychology. It's all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping student-athletes. We want to give them all the resources we can, to put them in a position to be successful."

VIRGINIA TECH



DR. GARY BENNETT Sport Psychologist

Dr. Gary Bennett begins his seventh year at Virginia Tech as the Athletic Department's sport psychologist. Dr. Bennett coordinates the Sport Psychology department, which offers psychological and performance-enhancement services for all student-athletes. He works with student-

athletes on a one-on-one basis dealing with performance-related concerns in addition to off-the-field issues, and also offers various support groups, including injury-recovery groups.

On average, he will conduct 20 individual sessions per week in addition to meeting with teams as the need arises.

Dr. Bennett's work with teams includes implementing strategies designed to improve concentration and focus, goal-setting, and team cohesiveness.

Dr. Bennett received a B.A. in English from Centre College in 1981 where he was a varsity baseball student-athlete. He earned his PhD in Counseling Psychology from the University of Kentucky in 1995. Before coming to Tech, he completed his residency at the University of Cincinnati and worked in a psychiatric hospital while in graduate school.

Dr. Bennett currently resides in Blacksburg.

BY THE WAY, WHAT IS A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning,

Stull explained the word was solely the product of his imagination and was used only as an attention-getter for his yell. It soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. The official school colors — Chicago maroon and burnt orange — also were introduced in 1896. They were chosen because they made a "unique combination" not worn elsewhere at the time.







HOKIES CONCLUDE MEMORABLE SEASON

TECH SET SEVERAL RECORDS, RECEIVED MANY HONORS ON AND
OFF THE FIELD IN 2006

Heading into the 2006 season, the Virginia Tech men's soccer team had high expectations not only of itself, but also from many soccer types around the country. Coming off a 2005 season that saw them earn a first-round bye in the NCAA Tournament, the Hokies were ranked or receiving votes in three of the four major national polls. In addition, sophomore Patrick Nyarko was named a preseason All-American by two publications.

The Hokies would end up playing one of the toughest schedules in school history, a slate that included games against six teams ranked No. 7 or higher at the time. When it was all said and done, Tech and head coach Oliver Weiss had put together their fourth 10-win season in the last five years and earned their third NCAA Tournament berth in the last four.

The season began on an uptick as the No. 19 Hokies got off to a 4-0 start versus non-conference opponents. It all got started with a two-game sweep of the UMBC adidas Kick-Off Classic as Tech knocked off Navy and the host Retrievers. The opening game on Aug. 25 was a 3-0 sweep of the Midshipmen with goalkeeper Drew Czekanski earning his first-career win and Marcus Reed scoring the first goal and assisting on each of the others. The Hokies then held off UMBC 3-2 to win the tournament two days later. Nyarko netted two goals and assisted on the game-winner to earn Tournament MVP honors.

The wins bumped Tech up to a No. 12 national ranking just in time for its showdown with No. 13 and former BIG EAST Conference rival St. John's. The Hokies went up to Queens and came away with a huge road win as Reed and Nyarko each scored again and freshman goalkeeper Brendan Dunn allowed just a penalty-kick goal in his first collegiate start.

The win over the Red Storm vaulted the Hokies to their highest national ranking in the history of the program – No. 8 in the Soccer America poll – prior to a matchup with in-state rival William & Mary. The result was the second shutout of the young season, a 1-0 victory thanks to a Scott Dillie header off a Nyarko cross.

Tech entered Atlantic Coast Conference play against Boston College at 4-0, a record that tied the best start to a season in team annals and a feat that had been accomplished just twice before. Nyarko continued his hot start with another goal but the Hokies faltered in overtime by a score of 2-1, when the Eagles converted a corner kick to capture their first conference win as an ACC member.

Things didn't get any easier for the Hokies, as they faced back-to-back matches with No. 3 Duke and No. 7 Wake Forest. They managed a 0-0 tie against the Blue Devils as Dunn made a career-high six saves but Tech dropped a 4-2 decision to the Demon Deacons.

An extra session was needed for the third time in four games on Sept. 19, when the Hokies lost a 3-2 thriller to Richmond to fall to 4-3-1. The outcome seemed to be decided as the Spiders led 2-1 in the final minute but Eric Vickers put in his career-best fourth goal of the season with 40 seconds remaining to send the match to overtime. Richmond answered back just over two minutes in, and the Hokies dropped out of the national rankings for the first time since Oct. 8, 2005.

In what proved to be a turning point for the Hokies following their minor bump in the schedule, Tech ended its four-game slide with a 7-1 thrashing of VMI at home in which season highs were set in every offensive category. Nyarko registered his first career hat trick while Brad Collins turned in his first two-goal effort as a Hokie. Defender Bryan Collier scored his first collegiate goal but it would be his last game of the year as he would soon have season-ending foot surgery.

Although they would lose their Sept. 29 matchup, 2-1, with No. 5 North Carolina, the Hokies continued to dominate the tempo but the Tar Heels' managed the game-winner on a penalty kick late in the game. Weiss called it the best match a team of his played since he came to Virginia Tech and the performance would go on to propel the team to a five-game winning streak.

On Oct. 3, Tech stole a 1-0 decision at Radford with less than two minutes remaining on Craig Brutus' first-career goal. The Hokies then traveled to Raleigh, N.C., and came back with their first ACC win - a 3-2 victory over the Wolfpack - despite playing a man down for nearly 65 minutes after drawing a red card.

The Hokies added another non-conference win – a 5-1 victory over Elon – before capturing the biggest win of the season on Oct. 14 against No. 3 Clemson. The authoritative 5-2 decision included two more goals by Nyarko, a pair by Brent Dillie – who earned College Soccer News National Team of the Week honors – and a career-high eight saves for Czekanski. The win got Tech back into the national rankings at No. 19 and provided the momentum for a fifth-straight win – a 4-2 triumph over Davidson.

The Hokies entered their Oct. 20 showdown with No. 2 Virginia owning a 10-5-1 record and drew a Tech Soccer Stadium record crowd of 2,711 fans but the Cavaliers prevailed 3-1 to give Tech its first loss in nearly a month. The Hokies rebounded to claim a 1-0 win over Appalachian State before falling to No. 6 Maryland, 2-1, in the regular-season finale.


With its 2-5-1 ACC record, Tech earned the No. 8 seed in the ACC Tournament and were forced to play ninth-seeded N.C. State in an opening-round match. Dillie made the score 3-2 at 86:09 and the outcome looked to be a repeat of the Tech win three weeks prior. In heartbreaking fashion, N.C. State's Ronnie Bouemboue scored twice within the next two minutes to

complete a hat trick and advance the Wolfpack to the quarterfinals.

Now at 11-7-1, Tech awaited its NCAA Tournament fate. They were awarded a first- round contest at UNC Greensboro, whom they also played in the second round of the 2005 tournament following a first-round bye. It was Tech's first-ever consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and its third berth in the last four years.

Up 1-0 with less than 13 minutes to play, the Hokies – much like they did against N.C. State in the ACC Tournament – gave up two scores as time wound down. Nyarko tallied the Hokies' lone goal to record his 16th of the season – a new single-season school record. The deciding goal came with just 34 seconds remaining but not without a bit of confusion. A Tech foul was called about 22 yards from the goal and the Hokies were waiting for a whistle to restart the game. The whistle never blew and the Spartans' Scott Jones sent the gamewinner past an unprepared defense and into the net.

Although the season ended with a pair of tough postseason losses, the Hokies turned in yet another stellar season under Weiss. Tech showcased one of the most explosive offensive attacks in the nation all season, and finished the year ranked fourth in NCAA Division I with an average of 2.35 goals per game. They set a new school record for assists in a season with 51 while tying the mark for points with 145.

Attendance was also at an all-time high at Tech Soccer Stadium. The Hokies drew a total attendance figure of 11,752 to its eight home games in 2006. The average of 1,469 fans per game ranked as the 14th-highest in all of NCAA Division I men's soccer. The season was capped off when the team's peers around the league voted them as the ACC Fall Sportsmanship Award winner.

Individually, a few Hokies climbed their way up the season and career record lists. Nyarko broke the single season goals and points marks with 16 and 40,

respectively, and also fired a fifth-best 72 shots. He also sits in tenth-place on the career lists for both categories, with 24 goals and 62 points. Ben Nason distributed 11 assists, the third-best single-season total in Tech history, and now ranks second all-time with 26. He currently ranks eighth on the school's all-time shots list with 166. Fellow midfielder Reed tallied nine assists to place in a tie for fourth on the single season list with Nason's 2003 mark. A pair of longevity marks were also set by two seniors. Chad

Steuck tied the record for most matches played in a career, 82, while Dillie set a new total for most matches started in a career with 81.

"I've got to give the guys credit," Weiss said following the loss to UNC Greensboro. "These seniors have been in the NCAA Tournament three of the last four years, and the program had never been in the tournament before that. We've made a lot of strides, but we don't want to be a perennial first or second-round exit team. We want to go on to bigger and better things, and that will be the mission from this point forward. We've always been an underdog but now we have to learn how to defend our right to be a top team year-in and year-out."

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



THE TRADITION

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest

and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

Since 1953, when the league adopted men's soccer and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2006 season marked the third consecutive time that the conference sent three teams to the NCAA Quarterfinals. It also marked the sixth year in a row that the ACC played for a berth to the College Cup as Virginia and Wake Forest reached the 2006 Semifinals. Over league history, the ACC has advanced two teams to the same College Cup six times, while seven of the nine men's soccer programs currently have active NCAA Tournament appearance streaks.

In addition, the ACC and Big East were the only two leagues represented by at least seven teams in the 2006 NCAA postseason field of 48. In 2005, the ACC set a conference record with eight teams selected to the NCAA Men's Soccer Championship field; the previous high was six set in 2002.

Six of the seven teams which participated in postseason play in 2007 earned a top 16 national seed and a first-round bye, while four league teams were named among the top five men's seeds. Since seeding began in 1994, the ACC has been awarded the top seed eight of the possible 13 years.

The league's programs continue to rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 144 appearances that included 186 victories in the last 48 years, earning 11 national crowns and making 17 appearances in the title contest.

The ACC has placed 106 players on All-America lists, totaling 204 All-America accolades and has garnered 17 National Player of the Year honors. In 2005, Jason Garey of Maryland, who led the Terps to a 19-4 finish and the program's second national title, collected national recognition being named the Soccer America National Player of the Year, NSCAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year and the highly touted Hermann Trophy award. The ACC also showcases five National Rookie of the Year honors.

In 2006, the ACC averaged nearly 2,000 fans at home contests and drew approximately 17,000 people to the 2006 ACC Men's Soccer Tournament, which was held in Germantown, Md. In addition, four of the top 10 single-game home attendances records were set last year.

2006-07 IN REVIEW

The 2006-07 academic year concluded with league teams capturing five national team titles and 24 individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 39 national team titles over the last 11 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 25 of the past 27 years.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 24 sports during the 2007-08 academic year - 12 for men and 12 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

FLORIDA STATE - Charter member of the Dixie Conference in 1948; joined the Metro Conference in July, 1976; joined the ACC July, 1991.
