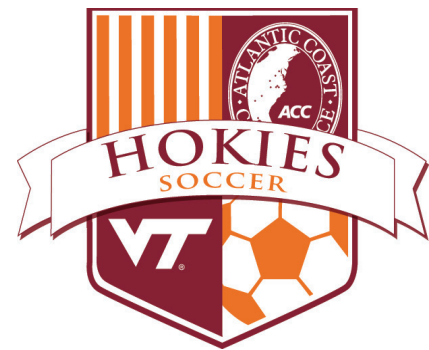

LAST TIME OUT ...

The Hokies lost to Clemson, 2-1, on Senior Night at Thompson Field on Thursday. Seniors James Daly, Tyler McCartney and James Shupp were honored before the match. The Tigers struck first at the 6:45 mark when Bastien Bacro-Duverger scored off assists from Brynjar Benediktsson and Austin Savage. Tech was reduced to 10 men in the 68th minute when Devante Dubose was given a red card for a handball in the box. Clemson missed the ensuing penalty, but Savage gave the Tigers a 2-0 lead in the 85th minute with a strike from 30 yards out. Kevin Reitzel scored his first career goal for Tech just two minutes later, but it wasn't enough and Clemson held on for the conference win.

NEXT UP ...

The winner of the first round game between Virginia Tech and NC State will play top-seeded and No. 3-ranked North Carolina on Tuesday at 7 p.m. in a quarterfinal match at Fetzer Field. The other three quarterfinal matches are all on Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the campus sites of the higher seed.

ACC TOURNAMENT...

• Virginia Tech has earned the ninth seed in the 25th Annual ACC Men's Soccer Championship and will play eighth-seeded North Carolina State at top-seeded North Carolina in a first round match at Fetzer Field in Chapel Hill, N.C., on Monday, Nov. 7. The winner of this match will play the Tar Heels on Tuesday night in the quarterfinal round. This is the second straight year that the Hokies and Wolfpack have met in the first round of the ACC Tournament as last year, NC State won, 6-3, in Cary, N.C. Tech is 1-7-0 all-time in the ACC Tournament in seven appearances, earning its lone win in 2007 over Maryland, 3-0, in the quarterfinal round.

SCOUTING NC STATE...

• North Carolina State enters the game with a record of 6-10-2 overall and finished the season 2-6-0 in Atlantic Coast Conference play. The Wolfpack earned ACC wins over Virginia Tech (2-1 in overtime) and then-No. 13 Boston College (2-1), but have lost four straight entering postseason play.

• In its last game on Thursday, NC State lost to Virginia, 4-1, in its regular season finale in Charlottesville, Va. The Cavaliers opened up the contest with four unanswered goals in the first 26 minutes of the game and cruised to the win. Jorge Risquez scored for the Pack off an assist from Zane Tharakan. Fabian Otte had seven saves in the Pack goal.

• As a team, NC State is being outscored its opponents, 28-21. Nazmi Albadawi leads the team in goals (eight) and points (19). Zabarle Kollie adds two goals and four assists for eight points. Ollie Kelly has two goals and two assists. In goal, Otte has 65 saves and a 1.58 goals against average in 17 games played.

SERIES HISTORY...

• This is the 18th all-time meeting between Virginia Tech and North Carolina State in men's soccer. The Wolfpack hold a 11-5-1 series lead, including a 2-1 overtime win earlier this year in Raleigh. The two teams have met three times in the ACC Tournament, including last year. NC State has won all three meetings between the two teams in the ACC Tournament, which have all occurred on neutral sites. The series began in 1978.

• Earlier this year, NC State defeated Tech, 2-1 in overtime, on Oct. 14 in Raleigh. James Shupp scored for the Hokies in the 30th minute, but the Wolfpack rallied for the conference victory as Albadawi scored the golden goal in the 97th minute.

• In last year's ACC Tournament first round match on Nov. 9, 2010 in Cary, N.C., the No. 8-seeded Wolfpack defeated the ninth-seeded Hokies, 6-3. The nine total goals made it the highest scoring match in the ACC Tournament since the tournament began in 1987.

Hokie Notes

MARATHON MEN...

• Three Hokies, freshman Ben Strong, sophomore Mikey Minutillo and sophomore Kyle Renfro have started all 18 regular games for Tech. Renfro has played all 1,708 minutes in goal. Strong leads the field players with 1,680 minutes played, while Minutillo has racked up 1,038 minutes of time on the pitch.

YOUTH MOVEMENT...

• This year's Tech side is getting strong contributions from numerous first and second year players. Of the 19 players who have started at least once this season, 14 are freshmen or sophomores.

• Here is the breakdown by class for minutes played:
 -Seniors: 1,017 (5.8% of total minutes)
 -Juniors: 4,320 (23.0%)
 -Sophomores: 6,557 (38.6%)
 -Freshmen: 5,895 (32.6%)

RENFRO AMONG CONFERENCE LEADERS...

• Sophomore goalkeeper Kyle Renfro ranks among the ACC leaders in several statistical categories. Renfro leads the league in total saves (97), saves per game (5.39) and save percentage (.802).
 • In ACC matches, Renfro also leads the league with 53 saves in eight matches, for a league-best 6.62 saves per game.

GAME-WINNERS...

• Junior Robert Alberti, redshirt senior James Shupp and redshirt freshman Drew Ranahan each scored their first game-winner as a Hokie during Tech's first three wins this season. Alberti scored on a penalty kick against Cincinnati on Sept. 4, while Shupp tallied the game-winner against then-No.1 ranked North Carolina on Sept. 10 in the second overtime period. Ranahan's 47th minute header on Sept. 13 against Longwood was his first collegiate goal.

TEAMMATES...

• Freshmen Hunter Byrnes and Drew Hartell were high school teammates at F.W. Cox High School in Virginia Beach. They also both played club soccer for Beach FC, the same club that redshirt junior Jeremy Williams played for in his prep days.
 • Freshmen Zach Hoover and Kevin Reitzel and sophomore Nick Smirniotopoulos all played club soccer for McLean Academy in Northern Virginia.
 • Drew Ranahan, sophomore Devante Dubose and junior Michael Garrick all played high school soccer at Bishop O'Dowd High School in Oakland, Calif. Dubose and Garrick were also members of the Mustang Soccer Academy for club soccer.

HOKIES BY STATE...

• The Hokies represent nine states and one country outside the United States. Virginia leads the way with 11 players, followed by California (5), Pennsylvania (3), New Jersey (2), New York (2), Florida (1), Kansas (1), Iowa (1), Texas (1) and Australia (1).

ACC AMONG NATION'S BEST...

• The Atlantic Coast Conference has traditionally been one of the nation's strongest conferences in men's soccer. 2011 is no different as three teams are currently ranked in the top-10 by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), *College Soccer News* and *Soccer Times*. COACHING FIRSTS AT TECH

Mike Brizendine enters his third year as Virginia Tech's head coach after spending five years as the Hokies' top assistant.

Brizendine's 2010 squad played five top-20 nationally ranked opponents, including taking sixth-ranked Virginia to overtime on the road. His 2009-10 team was one of only three Atlantic Coast Conference men's soccer programs to receive the NSCAA Team Academic Award, which honors teams with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher. It marked the second time in program history and first since 2003, that the Hokies earned academic recognition from the NSCAA.

An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine helped guide the Hokies to their first NCAA College Cup appearance in school history in 2007. He has worked with all aspects of the Hokie program. For his contributions, Brizendine was recognized as the NSCAA's Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint with Bridgewater College, a Division III program that participates in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). After assisting both the men's and women's programs at Bridgewater in 2000, he became the head men's coach from 2001 to 2003, guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program. Brizendine led Bridgewater to its two best single-season records, 12-6 in 2003 and 11-7 in 2002, for a 23-13 mark over two seasons and a .639 winning percentage. For this significant turn-around, his peers named him ODAC Coach of the Year in 2003.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 and earned his Master of Education from Virginia Tech in 2005.

Prior to his time at Bridgewater College, he was an assistant coach at Ferrum College for the men's soccer team in 1999. He has also been active guiding and encouraging kids in youth soccer programs throughout his coaching career.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at James Madison University from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine and his wife, Lucy, reside in Blacksburg, Va.

For the game, Tech out-shot Howard, 18-4, and out-cornered the Bison, 14-0. Clemens led the Hokie offense with seven shots and his goal marked the second year in a row that he has scored Tech's first goal of the year. Kyle Renfro played all 90 minutes between the pipes for Tech.
