SCOUTING NC STATE

- The Wolfpack head into the tournament coming off of a 2-1 overtime loss at home to Virginia. After jumping out to a 1-0 lead 35 minutes into the game, NC State gave up a surrendered a penalty kick in the 69th minute which Will Bates converted for the Cavaliers. Darius Madison tallied the game-winner just over three minutes into the second overtime.
- The loss was NC State's third straight ACC defeat.
- The Wolfpack's offense is led by High Point transfer Alex Martinez. The junior is tied for third in the ACC in goals with 10, while his nine assists tops the league. His 29 points one back of the conference lead. Martinez has taken 55 shots on the year, 37 more than Nazmi Albadawi who is second on the team in the category.
- Albadawi is second on the team in points with 11 (3 G, 5 A) in 11 games. Monbo Bokar is third in points with 10 while his five goals is second on the team.
- Goalkeeper Fabian Otte has been in goal for 16 of NC States matches, allowing 21 goals and posting a 1.31 goals against average. His 50 saves is tied for fifth in the conference.

SERIES HISTORY

- NC State leads the all-time series with a 13-5-1 record..
- The Hokies and Wolfpack have met three of the last four years in the first round of the ACC Tournament with NC State coming out on top in each of the contests. The Wolfpack came away with a 1-0 win in Chapel Hill, N.C. in last season's matchup.
- The Wolfpack won the regular season match between the two sides in a 1-0 affair in Blacksburg, Va., on Oct. 12. Danny DiPrima headed in a cross from Alex Martinez with just over 13 minutes remaining in regulation to give NC State the win.

JUST GIVE THEM THE LEAD

- In all six Hokies wins this season, they've scored first.
- Four of the six games resulted in shutouts.
- The earliest that the Hokies have scored this season is the 14:46 mark when Hunter Jecius connected on a header from a Ben Strong corner kick against NJIT.

HOKIE STOPPER

- Goalkeeper Kyle Renfro is right where he left off last year. After leading the ACC with 100 saves in 2011, the junior currently leads the conference in saves (85) and saves per game (4.72). He also ranks third in the league in save percentage (.759)
- His nine saves in a 1-1 draw versus Boston College on Sept. 14 tied his career high which was set on Sept. 10, 2011 in a 1-0 double-overtime win over No. 1 North Carolina.
- He again tied his career high of nine saves in a 1-0 victory over Radford on Oct. 23.
- The nine saves is a game-high amongst ACC keepers this season.
- At No. 1 Maryland on Sept. 21, Renfro was one save shy of his high, recording eight stops against a relentless Terrapin attack.
- His nine career shutouts is one away from cracking the school's top five.

GOAL SCORING FRESHMEN

- Freshmen have accounted for eight of the team's 17 goals with Daniel Lauretano, Kai Marshall and Connor Pompilio each recording two goals.
- Pompilio found the back of the net on his first two shots of

the season. His second goal was a game-winner against NJIT.

- Hunter Jecius recorded his first goal as a Hokie on his second shot attempt.
- Kai Marshall recorded the first goal of his career in his first career start in his hometown of Charlottesville against Virginia.

OFFENSIVE HOKIES

- Eight Hokies have combined to score the teams 17 goals.
- David Clemens leads the team with seven goals which is tied for fifth in the ACC, while his 15 points sixth most in the league.
- Freshmen Daniel Lauretano, Kai Marshall and Connor Pompilio have each tallied a pair of goals with each recording a game-winner.
- Lauretano tallied his first collegiate goal in the season opener against SIU-Edwardsville.
- Jed Prater notched his first goal of the season, and third of his career, after converting a penalty kick in a 1-0 game versus Temple.
- Drew Hartell and Connor Pompilio tallied their first goals of the season and first of their careers on Sept. 2 versus St. Bonaventure as Clemens and Lauretano scored their second goals of the year in the 4-0 victory.
- The last time Tech defeated a team by four goals or more was nearly two years ago in a 7-2 win over Howard on Sept. 14, 2010.
- After coming in as a substitute in the first game, Lauretano recorded his first goal as a Hokie against SIU-Edwardsville. Three starts later, the freshman tallied his second goal on the year, the game-winner against St. Bonaventure.
- Six games into his final season, midfielder David Fiorello tallied the first goal of his career in dramatic fashion with a 35-yard high-arching shot that looped over the BC keeper Justin Luthy for a game-tying goal in the 83rd minute while playing his team was playing a man down.
- On Sept. 25 against VMI, Clemens had a breakout game, notching his first-career hat trick in a 3-1 win. He is only the third ACC player to record a hat trick this season.
- His seven shots versus VMI and St. Bonaventure tied his career high for a single game. It is the third time in his career that he has recorded seven shots and it the most shots in a game for any ACC player this season.
- Marshall recorded his first two career goals in the first two starts of his Hokie career. The first goal was in his hometown of Charlottesville, Va., against Virginia.

HOLDING OPPONENTS IN CHECK

- Opponents have tallied 10 or more shots against Tech in 14 of the team's 18 matches. The Hokies defense has seen a total 264 shots this season.



Hokie Notes

- Tech has held nine opponents to a goal or less.
- Against one of the country's most potent attacks, the Hokies held No. 1 Maryland to two goals on Sept. 21. To that point, it marked only the second time that Maryland had been held to less than three goals.

MULTIPLE #1'S

- For the second-straight season, Tech faced multiple top-ranked opponents.
- Last year, the Hokies upset North Carolina 1-0 in double overtime before falling to Maryland two weeks later, 2-0. Both matches were played at Thompson Field.
- This season, Tech hit the road for both matches as the squad fell 2-0 to North Carolina and Maryland.

WHO NEEDS TO PLAY AT FULL STRENGTH

- The Hokies had a gutsy performance in a 1-1 draw against Boston College on Sept. 14. After going down a goal in the 46th minute, Tech was forced to play down a man after a red card was issued to DeVante DuBose. The Hokies fought back to tie the game on an 83rd minute goal by captain David Fiorello.
- After going down a man, Tech equaled its first half shot total of three during the final 40 minutes of regulation before adding another three during the 20 minutes of extra time.
- During the final 60 minutes of play, Boston College took 10 shots, two less than the first 50 minutes.

MINUTE MEN

- Jed Prater, Kyle Renfro and Ben Strong have each eclipsed the 1,600-minute mark this season for the Hokies through 18 games. David Fiorello is two minutes shy of 1,600 minutes. Fiorello, David Clemens and Drew Ranahan have each logged over 1,500 minutes.
- Renfro currently leads the team with 1,677 minutes played.
- Prater, Ranahan, Renfro and Strong led Tech in minutes logged a season ago. The four amassed 6,969 minutes in 19 games.

LEARNING ON THE FLY

- Tech has 16 players this season who have been in the program for less than two years. With David Fiorello being the lone senior on the 2012 squad, and only seven upperclassmen in all.
- Five underclassmen have logged more than 900 minutes this season with Drew Ranahan and Ben Strong each totaling more than 1,500 minutes while Daniel Lauretano has eclipsed the 1,100-minute mark.
- Strong leads all underclassmen with 1,630 minutes played while Daniel Lauretano leads all freshmen with 1,117 minutes.

ACC TEST

- The Hokies finished off a grueling conference test from Sept. 8-28 in which the team took on four of the top teams in the ACC according to the NSCAA rankings.
- Tech opened the ACC season with 2-0 defeat at No. 1 North Carolina on Sept. 8. The Hokies followed that up with a 1-1 double overtime draw against Boston College at Thompson Field on Sept. 14. The Eagles were receiving votes at the time after opening the season ranked No. 14.
- On Sept. 21, the Hokies fell 2-0 to No. 1 Maryland. A week later, Tech was defeated 4-0 at home by No. 16 Wake Forest.

AMONG THE BEST

- The Atlantic Coast Conference has traditionally been one of the nation's top conferences in men's soccer and this year is no different. Currently three schools (North Carolina, Maryland and Wake Forest) are ranked in the NSCAA's top 20, which is the second-most of any conference behind the BIG EAST.
- The league began the season with three teams ranked in the NSCAA's top 25 preseason poll which was second behind the BIG EAST's four.

CAPTAINS

- Senior David Fiorello will finish out his Tech career as a three-time team captain for the Hokies, while junior Jed Prater will join him for his first time in the role.

DON'T I KNOW YOU

- The center back pairing of DeVante DuBose and Drew Ranahan played high school soccer at Bishop O'Dowd High School in Oakland, Calif.
- Redshirt freshmen Hunter Byrnes and Drew Hartell were high school teammates at F.W. Cox High School in Virginia Beach. They also both played club soccer for Beach FC.
- Freshmen Kai Marshall and Shane Rose played for Albemarle High School in Charlottesville, Va., while also playing club soccer for SOCA Lightning.
- Despite going to high schools more than 300 miles apart, freshmen Hunter Jecius and Deven Mason played club soccer together for New Mexico Rush Nike Argonauts '94 which is located in Albuquerque, N.M.
- Freshmen Daniel Lauretano and Carter Brown played club soccer together for Richmond Kickers Academy.

Mike Brizendine enters his fourth year as Virginia Tech's head coach after spending five years as the Hokies' top assistant.

Brizendine's 2011 squad played five top-25 nationally ranked opponents, including a 1-0 double-overtime win over 2011 NCAA champion North Carolina. The victory was the program's first over a No. 1 ranked opponent since 2004. Academically, his teams in 2009-10 and 2010-11 earned the NSCAA Team Academic Award, which honors teams with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher. Tech was one of three men's soccer programs in the Atlantic Coast Conference to earn the honor in both years.



An experienced coach on all levels, Brizendine helped guide the Hokies to their first NCAA College Cup appearance in school history in 2007. He has worked with all aspects of the Hokie program. For his contributions, Brizendine was recognized as the NSCAA's Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint with Bridgewater (Va.) College, a Division III program that participates in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). After assisting both the men's and women's programs at Bridgewater in 2000, he became the head men's coach from 2001 to 2003, guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program. Brizendine led Bridgewater to its two best single-season records, 12-6 in 2003 and 11-7 in 2002, for a 23-13 mark over two seasons and a .639 winning percentage. For this significant turn-around, his peers named him ODAC Coach of the Year in 2003.

Prior to his time at Bridgewater College, he was an assistant coach at Ferrum College for the men's soccer team in 1999. He has also been active guiding and encouraging kids in youth soccer programs throughout his coaching career.

Brizendine graduated from James Madison University in 1999 and earned his Master of Education from Virginia Tech in 2005.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at James Madison University from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned All-Conference and All-Region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

Brizendine, his wife Lucy, and daughter Sloane reside in Blacksburg, Va.

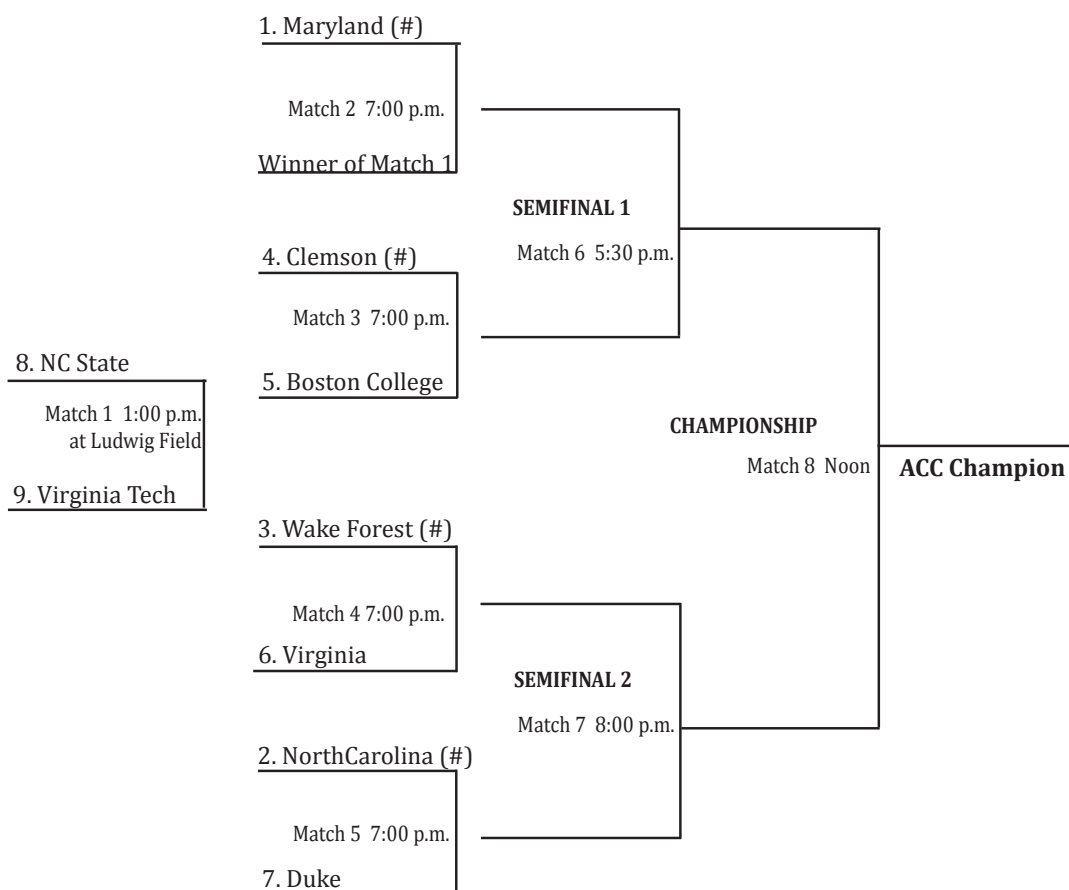

BLACKSBURG – The Virginia Tech men's soccer team earned its first win of the young season this afternoon, earning a shutout in a 1-0 win over Richmond at Thompson Field in the final game of the Hilton Garden Inn Hokie Invitational.

Looking to rebound after Friday night's loss to SIU-Edwardsville, the Hokies came out quick as senior David Fiorello nearly found the back of the net in the fourth minute as he one-timed a shot from a Jed Prater corner.

The 16th minute saw Richmond nearly brake open the match as well, as a corner from Oliver Murphy found the head of Houston Oldhman that was blocked. Timmy Albright took a rip at the rebound, but Kyle Renfro was there to make the first of his six saves of the day.

Just over four minutes later, Tech found the goal it was looking for as Ben Strong found space down the right side of the Spider penalty box. The sophomore moved toward the endline and sent a low pass into the six-yard box that found David Clemens wide open. The junior calmly stepped toward the ball with his left foot before cleverly slotting it into the left side of the net with his right foot.

Strong again found space on the right side in the 33rd minute, but with a defender closing in his shot was just to the right of the post.

The Hokies took a 1-0 lead into the break, but Richmond came out looking for the equalizer, earning a pair of corners early in the second half. In the 57th minute, Tech nearly caught the Spiders on a counter attack as Prater sent a lobbed pass over the Richmond defense that Daniel Lauretano got onto the end of. The freshman's one-timer sailed just over the crossbar to leave Tech's advantage still at one.

Just over three minutes later, Albright thought he had the equalizer for the Spiders on a header from the left side. With his back post wide open Renfro was forced to react quickly to and reach back to get his left hand on the ball to deny the striker's attempt.

With Richmond furiously pushing to tie the game, the Hokies nearly put the game away in the final 10 minutes as Clemens beat two defenders and chipped a shot just over bar, and Drew Hartell placed a header just wide of the left post.

With a flurry at the end by the Spiders, the Tech defense was up to the challenge, stifling Richmond's final opportunities to seal the win.

Despite being outshot 15-10 overall, Tech nabbed the one it needed as Renfro came up with several key saves on the day to earn his first clean sheet of the season. Clemens led the Hokies with three shots, while Strong and Lauretano each had a pair.

Game-by-Game Recap

Game #16 vs. Radford | Oct. 19 | W, 1-0

BLACKSBURG - Behind freshman Kai Marshall's 60th-minute header, the Virginia Tech men's soccer team topped in-state rival Radford tonight, 1-0, at Thompson Field.

Radford (8-3-4) came out with a pair of early opportunities by leading scorer Bernardo Ulmo as he ripped back-to-back shots but Hokie keeper Kyle Renfro was there to block both attempts. Marshall looked to put Tech on top in the 16th minute as he went upper 90 with an attempt, but Highlander keeper Ryan Taylor stretched out to make the save.

In the 37th minute, Renfro was forced to lay out for a shot from Dario Redondo. The Highlander midfielder was looking toward the low left corner, but Renfro was able to deny the shot while at full stretch.

Virginia Tech (6-7-3) took the lead in the 60th minute when Jed Prater sent a ball from 40 yards out into the box where Marshall was waiting. The freshman was able to get under the ball and pop it toward the far post with his head. It was his second straight game with a goal after netting his first of the season on Friday at Virginia.

Down a goal, the Highlanders picked up their pressure, forcing Renfro to come up with several big saves over the final 25 minutes. The 69th minute saw the Hokie keeper make a diving save to his left to deny Jaime Summers' shot from the top of the box. Less than two minutes later, Jannik Eckenrode slipped past the Hokie defense and was one-on-one with Renfro. The keeper slid out at the Highlander to cut off his angle and the shot went wide. In the 81st, Renfro again had to deny back-to-back attempts from Radford, knocking away a shot from Lucas Diniz before getting in front of a header attempt from Michael Hutcheon just outside the top of the six-yard box.

In all, Renfro came away with a career-record tying nine saves on the night. It is the third time he has performed the feat in the past two seasons. Earlier this year, he recorded nine stops in a 1-1 draw against Boston College. Last season, he did it in a 1-0 win over then-No. 1 North Carolina.

The Highlanders held a 9-5 edge in shots on goal, but it was Marshall's goal that gave Hokies their sixth straight win over their rivals in Blacksburg dating back to 2001. Marshall and Ben Strong led Tech with three shots apiece while the freshman put a team-high two shots on target.

Game #17 vs. Duke | Oct. 27 | L, 2-0

BLACKSBURG - The Virginia Tech men's soccer dropped a 2-0 result to Duke tonight at Thompson Field as Zach Mathers and Riley Wolfe recorded goals for the Blue Devils.

David Fiorello had the first chance of the night for the Hokies (6-8-3, 0-6-1) as he went up for header in the 12th minute, but Duke keeper James Belshaw was there to corral the attempt.

The Blue Devils (7-7-1, 3-4-1) looked to get on the board seven minutes later with a header from Wolfe, but Renfro was there for the denial. The Hokies came right back to the other end where Drew Ranahan went in high for a header, but Belshaw was again there for the stop.

In the 29th minute, Ben Strong cracked a shot, but it sailed wide of the left post.

Duke got on the board two minutes later as Mathers got loose on a break after a through ball came out of midfield. The freshman's initial shot was blocked by Renfro, but he buried the rebound inside the left post to give the Blue Devils a 1-0 lead. Duke's Luis Rendon looked to extend their lead in the 40th minute with a high rocket shot, but Renfro went up and knocked it away.

Duke continued to pressure in the second half as Rendon ripped one toward the upper 90, but again, Renfro was able to react quickly and knock the ball out of harms way.

With Tech pushing numbers forward late, a foul was called against Duke in the 83rd minute to set up a Hokie free kick from 25 yards out. Strong was looking left, but his shot was just off the mark and wide of the post.

Duke doubled their lead in the 88th minute after catching Tech on a counterattack. Jonathan Aguirre sent in a cross to Wolfe who hit a hard shot to the far post past Renfro.

Despite Renfro's seven saves, the third highest total of the season for him, Tech was unable to find the back of the net. Strong had the Hokies' best opportunities on the night as he led the team with three shots. Overall, the Blue Devils outshot the Hokies 14-7.

Game #18 vs. Clemson | Nov. 1 | L, 3-0

CLEMSON, S.C. - The Virginia Tech men's soccer fell 3-0 to Clemson tonight at Historic Riggs Field.

The Tigers (6-8-4, 3-2-3) came out firing in the early going recording four shots and a pair of corners in the first 18 minutes before Tech had its first shot of the game, a quality attempt from Ben Strong. Four minutes later though, Clemson's leading goal scorer, Austin Savage, found the back of the net. Dribbling at Drew Ranahan, the senior hit a low shot from the top of the box that found the inside of the right post.

Tech (6-9-3, 0-7-1) nearly tied the game up two minutes later as Strong sent a cross into the box off a corner kick. Ranahan got his head on the ball and sent it toward the underside of the crossbar, but Clemson keeper Cody Mizell got his hands up quickly and was able to make the save.

With just under a minute remaining in the half, David Clemens hit a low strike on frame from 25 yards that forced Mizell to make a diving stop to his right.

Clemson took a 1-0 lead into the half, along with a 9-5 advantage in shots, but it was the Hokies that held a 4-3 edge in shots on goal as they had several quality opportunities that forced saves out of Mizell.

After few chances from Tech in the early going of the second half, the Tigers picked up their pressure. Clemson made it 2-0 in 64th minute as Savage made run into the box. Kyle Renfro came out to make a sliding grab at ball, but it bounced back to Alex Stockinger at the top of the box. The junior hit his shot to the right side past Renfro.

Stockinger got his second of the game seven minutes later. With players running back on defense, Ara Amirkhani slotted a pass across the 18-yard box to Stockinger at the top of the box. The midfielder again made his opportunity from just outside count as he gave the Tigers a 3-0 lead.

The Tigers held an 8-6 edge in shots goal and a 9-4 advantage in corner kicks. Savage led all shot takers with six, putting four on target, while Clemens led the Hokies with three shots, all on frame. Mizell had six saves for the Tigers while Renfro recorded five for Tech.
