### **VIRGINIA TECH at CREIGHTON FIRST LOOK**

#### **BACK ON THE PITCH**

- Virginia Tech steps onto the field for the first time since their Elite Eight appearance in 2016 **GOOD TO BE BACK**
- This is the first time in eight seasons that Tech has been featured in the preseason Top 25.

#### INTERNATIONAL FLAIR

• Freshmen Jon Ingason, Emil Koho and Justus Kauppinen bring youth level international experience to the Hokies.

#### UNFAMILIAR OPPOSITION

• Tech's schedule features three games against teams the program has never faced before; Creighton, Omaha and Pacific.

#### FOR THE FIRST TIME

- Virginia Tech kicks off the 2017 season playing in Omaha, Neb. for the first time in program history.
- The 2016 Hokies advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament and earned the program's second-highest final ranking at No. 8. Along the way, Tech defeated ETSU, Charlotte and Indiana.

#### **POLL POSITION**

Tech is ranked 17th in the United Soccer Coaches poll to start the season.

#### **BACK AGAIN**

- Head coach Mike Brizendine returns nine starters and 17 letter winners from last season's breakout squad.
   BREAKOUT SEASON
- In 2016, the Hokies exploded for 38 goals, 11 of which came from Marcelo Acuna. The Costa Rica native tallied 25 points en route to a Second Team All-ACC selection.

#### **ALL ABOUT THE BLUEJAYS**

- Creighton makes its 2017 season debut following a 13-7-3 season that saw the Blue Jays make it to the round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament.
- In three preseason matches, the Blue Jays went 3-0 defeating SIU-Edwardsville, Wisconsin and Ohio State. MAC Harmann award nominee Ricky Lopez-Espin scored twice, while Marios Lomis, Anthony Macchione and Luke Haakenson each provided one goal.
- Head coach Elmar Bolowich leads the program for the seventh consecutive season, and must replace eight starters from a year ago.
- Creighton welcomes the Hokies to Morrison Field, the program's home since 2003. A Field Turf Revolution, soccer-specific stadium, Morrison has 2,000 covered chairback seats and a total seating capacity of 7,500.

 Marcelo Acuna has been named to the 2017 MAC Hermann Award Watch List, presented to the nation's best collegiate soccer player.

#### **BIG BEN'S SHUTOUTS**

 Ben Lundgaard tied the program record for shutouts in a season with eight during 2016. With another eight in 2017, he would become the program's all-time shut out leader.

#### **CAPTAINS**

 Lundgaard, Acuna and Collin Verfurth will wear the captains armband on the pitch for the Hokies in 2017. Lundgaard and Verfurth have each been capped 50-plus times for the Hokies.

#### ON THE ROAD AGAIN

• The Hokies play the first five games of the 2017 season away from Blacksburg and Thompson Field. Two of those matches will be played in Harrisonburg, Va. as part of the JMU Invitational.

#### HAVE WE BEEN HERE BEFORE?

Virginia Tech has never played a game in Omaha, Neb. The match against Creighton will be the first one in program history and the Aug. 27th contest against Omaha will be the second one.

### **HEAD COACH: MIKE BRIZENDINE**



In his nine years at the helm of the Virginia Tech program, head coach Mike Brizendine has worked to return the Hokies to the top of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Last season, Brizendine's squad made a triumphant return to the NCAA tournament, winning three games on the way to the Elite Eight.

In his eight years at the helm of the Virginia Tech program, head coach Mike Brizendine has worked to return the Hokies to the top of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Last season, Brizendine's squad made a triumphant return to the NCAA tournament, winning three games on the way to the Elite Eight.

The 2016 season marked a resurgence of the Tech soccer program, winning six straight games to open the season en route to a No. 15 ranking. After opening the non-conference portion of the season by upsetting No. 18 Ohio State and No. 24 Georgetown, the Hokies would end the season 10-1-3 against non-league opponents. Rising to a No. 15 ranking during the regular season, the Hokies compiled their best ACC record in Brizendine's tenure, finishing 3-4-1 to earn a nine seed in the ACC Tournament. Tech's four losses all came against programs ranked in the top-10: tenth-ranked Syracuse, seventh-ranked Clemson, third-ranked UNC and top-ranked Notre Dame. The team picked up an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, the program's first in a decade, opening with a 1-0 victory over East Tennessee State. The Hokies downed powerhouse programs No. 10 Charlotte and No. 7 Indiana on the road to advance to the Elite Eight, earning the team a final ranking of

Brizendine was named the 2016 Virginia SID Coach of the Year with junior Marcelo Acuna earning third-team All-America honors. Senior Juan Pablo Saavedra joined an elite group of former Hokies when he was drafted by FC Toronto in the 2016 MLS Draft.

Brizendine has coached 21 players that have gone on to play professional soccer, as well as six MLS draftees. After taking over a team facing significant recruiting restrictions and coming off a four-win season, his leadership has returned Virginia Tech to prominence, well on the way to the upper echelons of collegiate soccer.

After serving 10 years as a collegiate assistant coach, including five at Virginia Tech, Brizendine finally got his opportunity lead his own program when former AD Jim Weaver promoted him to the head coach on June 11, 2009.

During the 2015 season, Brizendine and his young squad won five games, including an upset against then-No. 10 Xavier. At the conclusion of the season, forward Ricardo John signed with the professional team Central F.C. in his native country of Trinidad and Tobago.

In 2014, Brizendine's young squad produced seven wins, including victories over Wake Forest, NC State, SIUE and UNCG. Freshman Ricardo John, who tallied 11 points, was named all-conference and all-region. Underclassmen scored all 19 goals and freshman keeper Ben Lundgaard recorded six shutouts in seeing nearly 75 percent of the minutes in

The 2013 season saw a school-record three players either drafted into the MLS or sign professional contracts following the season. The Hokies also earned eight points in ACC play,

the most since 2007, behind five ties and an upset victory over No. 17 Syracuse. Under Brizendine's direction, the Hokie defense only allowed 23 goals all season, the lowest total allowed since 2005, as well as the second first-team All-ACC selection in school history.

Brizendine's 2012 team earned the most wins in a season (seven) for the program since 2007. On Nov. 5, 2012, in College Park, Md., the Hokies scored three unanswered goals to top NC State in the first round of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament, capturing only the second victory for the team in the tournament since the school ioined the conference in 2004.

The 2011 side played five top-25 opponents during the season, and the year was highlighted by a 1-0 double-overtime win over 2011 NCAA champion North Carolina. The victory was the program's first over a No. 1 ranked opponent since 2004.

Under Brizendine's guidance, the Hokies have also had a great deal of success in the classroom. His teams earned the NSCAA Team Academic Award five times (2010-14, 16). The award honors teams with a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 or higher.

As an assistant under former coach Oliver Weiss, Brizendine played an integral role in helping the Hokies make it to the College Cup for the first time in the program's history. For his contributions, he was recognized as the NSCAA's Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year in 2007.

Brizendine joined the Hokie staff after a successful stint with Bridgewater (Va.) College, a Division III program that participates in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). After assisting both the men's and women's programs at Bridgewater in 2000, he became the head men's coach from 2001 to 2003, guiding the team from non-competitive status to a full-fledged Division III program. Brizendine led Bridgewater to its two best single-season records - 12-6 in 2003 and 11-7 in 2002 - for a 23-13 mark over two seasons and a .639 winning percentage. For this significant turn-around, his peers named him ODAC

Coach of the Year in 2003.

Prior to his time at Bridgewater College, he was an assistant coach at Ferrum College for the men's soccer team in 1999. He has also been active guiding and encouraging kids in youth soccer programs throughout his coaching career.

As a player, he lettered four seasons at James Madison University from 1995-98 and ended his career sixth in all-time scoring for the Dukes. He earned all-conference and all-region recognition during his four-year career. He also played professionally with the Roanoke Wrath (1999) and the Northern Virginia Royals (2000 and 2001) of the Division 3 league.

#### THE HOME OF THE HOKIES: THOMPSON FIELD



Thompson Field serves as the home of the Virginia Tech men's and women's soccer teams as well as the lacrosse team. Located in the Seasons in Use center of the Virginia Tech athletics complex, the facility ranks as one of the finest for both soccer and lacrosse in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Located across from Lane Stadium, the Hokies' football home, and adjacent to Tech Softball Park, Thompson Field was completed in the fall of 2003 and dedicated in 2008 in the name of Sandra D. Thompson, a longtime supporter of women's athletics at Virginia Tech.

The field is a bluegrass playing surface and measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. It is equipped with an underground irrigation system and a drainage system that allows for it to be ready for play quickly following rainstorms. The complex also features a wireless scoreboard, and a permanent Hubbell lighting system allows for night games.

The athletics department has made improvements gradually since

the venue opened in 2003. In 2005, workers completed a new restroom facility for the field, and during the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium above the fans. The approximately 900-square foot facility includes two broadcast booths for both home team and visiting team radio broadcasts. The center also has two covered areas devoted to broadcasting and/or videographers' cameras, and there is a large working area for media members covering the Hokies.

The climate-controlled facility also contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletics website, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box. Above the grandstand is a wired camera deck.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandy D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a halftime room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations.

Thompson Field, which has been expanded since it was opened, now features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 more fans to watch games.
