


BLACKSBURG, VA.

Established in 1798 by John and William Black, the town is surrounded by scenic mountain views that accentuate the area. Since its founding, Blacksburg has grown to become the largest town in Virginia.


The nearly 42,000 residents (including students) enjoy a close proximity to a variety of recreation areas such as the Blue Ridge Parkway, Appalachian Trail, Claytor Lake and the New River. The region features a moderate climate and four distinct seasons.

HOKIES EARN ITA ACADEMIC TEAM AWARD

The Virginia Tech men's tennis team was named as a 2005 Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) All-Academic Team. Additionally, Angel Diankov, Arvid Puranen and Ignaci Roci were selected as ITA Scholar Athletes.

The men's team received the honor after posting a 3.24 GPA for the academic year. The team award marks the second time the program has received the honor with the 2000-01 team being the first group in the program's history to achieve the award. The ITA All-Academic Team award is open to any ITA program that has a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 or above (on a 4.00 scale). All eligible student-athletes whose names appear on the NCAA eligibility form and have competed in one or more varsity matches must average into the GPA for the current academic year (including fall 2004 and spring 2005).

Diankov, a senior on last year's team from Yonkers, N.Y., earned a 3.52 GPA in management. He compiled a 12-10 singles record this past season for the 13-11 Hokies, and contributed nine victories in doubles competition.

Puranen, a sophomore from Lulea, Sweden, earned the honor with a 3.62 GPA in industrial and engineering systems. He had a 15-14 singles mark playing at the No. 1 and No. 2 positions and also contributed 20 doubles victories.

Roca, a freshman from San Jose, Costa Rica, had an outstanding 3.96 GPA while majoring in civil engineering. In limited action, he produced three singles and two doubles victories.

In order to earn ITA Scholar-Athletes status, a player must be a varsity letterwinner, have a grade point average of at least 3.50 (on a 4.00 scale) for the current academic year and have been enrolled at their present school for at least two semesters.

Tech concluded the 2005 season with a No. 52 national ranking and was No. 4 in the Northeast region.

2005-2006 OUTLOOK

There is a youth movement taking place this year at the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center as the 2005-2006 edition of the Virginia Tech men's team features four freshmen and four sophomores. This season will be the Hokies' second in the tough Atlantic Coast Conference, which had 10 of its 11 members ranked last year in the final Top 75, including two in the top ten and four in the top 20.

Tech finished last season 13-11, with a No. 52 national ranking and fourth in the Northeast region, while facing a schedule that featured 16 nationally-ranked teams. The Hokies had six players qualify for the ITA Northeast Regional in the fall, with two players advancing to the quarterfinals and one to the semifinals. A solid fall campaign has provided the youthful Hokies with valuable experience and confidence as they enter the spring dual match season. The Hokies begin the dual match season where they ended last year after receiving a No. 52 national ranking in the spring preseason poll.

"We have a lot of underclassmen on this year's team, but I thought the fall season went very well," said Tech head coach Jim Thompson. "We opened the fall facing some stiff competition at the Rice Invitational which included several top teams. That tournament allowed us to start the year a little earlier than normal, which gave our young guys some great experience and carried them throughout the fall. The early success allowed us to gualify six players for the regional with Arvid (Puranen) making the semifinals and Albert (Larregola) advancing to the quarters.

"All in all I thought it was a good, productive fall season," added Thompson. "With a young squad we have a lot of work to do but it was an important step to prepare us for the spring schedule."

Tech will be led by Arvid Puranen (Jr., Lulea, Sweden), ranked No. 98 nationally in the spring

preseason rankings. Puranen reached the final of the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational and had a great run at the ITA Northeast Regional where he advanced to the semifinals before dropping a tough 6-4, 3-6, 7-6 (5) loss. For his efforts, Puranen earned a No. 3 Northeast Regional fall ranking and will be counted on to lead Tech in the dual match season.

"Arvid has had great success in his first two years at Tech," said Thompson. "He has matured and improved his game. I look for him to have an outstanding junior season."

Albert Larregola (So., Lleida, Spain) advanced to the ITA Northeast Regional guarterfinals and received a No. 9 regional ranking. Larregola joined the Hokies just prior to the 2005 spring schedule and was 16-7 playing in the middle of the lineup.

"Albert joined us in the spring last year, which is always difficult, but he was a big contributor," said Thompson. "He had a really good fall and I believe as he becomes even more comfortable with his surroundings that he is going to be a great player for us."

Another player who joined the Tech program in the spring last season is Alexei Sergeev (So., Moscow, Russia) who finished the dual match season with a 14-9 singles record. Sergeev battled a late-season injury to his right wrist and did not play in the fall as he continued to recover.

"Alexei was injured during the latter part of the spring season last year and into the ACC Championships," said Thompson. "He started strong in the spring but struggled late as a result of the injury. He spent the summer in a cast and we held him out of the fall schedule. He has recovered and is playing great. I look for him to play a major role during the spring season."


Nicolas Delgado (Fr., Madrid, Spain) made an immediate impact as a rookie during the fall, advancing to the round of 16 at the ITA Northeast Regional. Delgado won the consolation of the Flight B singles at the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational and knocked off the No. 11 seed at the ITA Regional before being eliminated by the tournament's top seed.

"Nicolas comes to us as one of the most highly recruited players in the country and he was ranked in Spain in the juniors behind Rafael Nadal, one of the top players in the world," said Thompson. "He has a tremendous amount of potential and as his experience grows, he is going to have a great career at Virginia Tech."

Brent Wilkins (Richmond, Va.) returns for his senior season after posting nine wins last year. Wilkins teamed with Larregola to advance to the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational Flight B doubles final.

"Brent made some fundamental changes in his game at the beginning of the year and struggled in the fall with these adjustments, " said Thompson. "He is an experienced player who has contributed in the past and we expect more of the same this spring."

Akil Burgess (Jr., St. Michael, Barbados) continues to develop his game and was 3-5 in singles in the fall. Burgess saw limited action last season and was a ACC Academic Honor Roll selection. He was also a 2004 BIG EAST Academic All-Star.

"Akil continues to get better and better and he works hard on his game," said Thompson. "He has a great serve and it is very hard to play against his left-handed game. This may be Akil's year to break into the lineup and contribute more than he has in the past."

Reaves Robinette (Jr., Chattanooga, Tenn.) returns after seeing action in the fall at the Farnsworth/Princeton Invitational. Robinette was a member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll last year and also was named to the 2004 BIG EAST Academic All-Star team. "Reaves was injured the latter portion of the fall schedule which has slowed his progress," said Thompson. "He has had a shoulder injury which has prevented him from working on his serve but he is in great shape and has worked hard on his physical conditioning. I expect good things from him once he recovers from the injury."

Brandon Corace (Fr., West Lake Village, Calif.) is another freshman expected to contribute during the dual-match season. Corace advanced to the semifinals of the main draw at the Farnsworth/Princeton Invitational and also qualified for the ITA Northeast Regional.

"Brandon has been a great recruit for us as he is a big player with a big game," said Thompson. "Even though he comes from Florida and has limited experience indoors, his game is built for playing on indoor courts. Brandon has a huge serve and he is improving his volleys every day. His ground strokes are big and flat and I look forward to the next four years working with him and watching him perform."

Another talented freshman is David Rosenfeld (Coral Gables, Fla.) who was 4-3 in fall singles and 5-4 in doubles. Rosenfeld advanced to the open doubles semifinals at the Farnsworth/Princeton Invitational.

"David had a great fall and was a consistent performer for us, " said Thompson. "He has a steady game with a very good baseline game and he continues to work on and improve his serve and volleys every day. He works hard and does all the right things, which makes me look forward to seeing his progress in the coming years."

Ignaci Roca (So., San Jose, Costa Rica), a member of the 2005 ACC Academic Honor Roll, was 2-4 in the fall, seeing action at the Rice Crowne Plaza Invitational and the Liberty Alumni Invitational. Roca did not see action last year during the dual match schedule but is expected to add depth to the lineup.

"Ignaci had a good fall and worked really hard on his game," said Thompson. "He came back to school this fall after playing Davis Cup and started off real well but had a few nagging injuries which slowed his progress. He needs to continue to work on his court speed and agility because he can hit shots from all areas of the court."

Jonathan Leong Son (So., Bradenton, Fla.) joined the team this fall and saw action at the Liberty Alumni Invitational where he won both of his singles matches and two doubles contests.

"Jonathan has all of the skills in the world and has been groomed to be a top player," said Thompson. "He attended the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla., during his junior career and as he gets more disciplined with his game, he could be a factor with our team."

Preston Lemon (Fr., Roanoke, Va.) did not play in the fall due to a case of mononucleosis. Lemon was ranked fourth in the Mid-Atlantic region as a junior and was a member of the 2005 Junior Davis Cup team.

"Preston was set back about six to eight weeks this fall due to his illness," said

Thompson. "He has now gained weight and muscle mass and I look to see him improve as the season unfolds."

The dual-match season opens with the Hokies hosting the Larsen Bowker Shootout Jan. 28-29, featuring Austin Peay, Charlotte, Maryland-Baltimore County and St. Bonaventure. The February portion of the home schedule includes matches against American, James Madison and Middle Tennessee State with March dates versus Maryland, Penn State, Virginia, NC State and Wake Forest. The home schedule concludes in April with matches versus Florida State and Miami. Tech was 10-4 at the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center last year and has a 48-11 record at home the last five years. The Hokies will face road matches at Ohio State, Louisville, Boston College, Brown, The Citadel, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Virginia Commonwealth, Duke and North Carolina. Tech will have neutral site matches against Southern Methodist and Richmond.

"Our dual-match schedule may be the most competitive in the history of our program," said Thompson. "Early in the season, we open with the Larsen Bowker Shootout followed by home matches against American and James Madison in the middle of the week, before we face a string of nationally-ranked opponents. There are 18 ranked teams on this year's schedule, including four top-20 programs. We are excited about the challenges of this year's schedule which provides us with the opportunity to play the best competition in the nation, and will allow us to improve to reach a new level in the ACC."



COACHING STAFF

IIMI THOMIPSON Head Men's Tennis Coach

Virginia Tech head coach Jim Thompson has known nothing but success during his coaching career. Thompson,

entering his eighth year at Tech, led the Hokies to consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament in his first two years at the helm, then guided the 2002 squad back to the tournament. In his first season, Thompson's Hokies advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the first time in school history, and recorded a 22-7 record.

The 2005 season was Tech's first year in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the Hokies battled their way through a rugged national schedule and finished seventh in the ACC regular season. Thompson's success in his tenure in Blacksburg includes a record of 117-69 and three NCAA appearances.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Thompson is on the ITA Rules Committee and has been a member of the ITA Operating Committee since 2001.

Thompson joined the Hokies after spending four years as the director of tennis and head coach for both the men's and women's programs at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. He quided the UTC women's team to the Southern Conference Championship in 1997 and was named Coach of the Year. In 1998, he led the men's team to the conference championship.

During a four-year stint as the head women's coach at Anderson College in South Carolina, Thompson built a nationally recognized program which climbed as high as third in the nation. He was named Region X Coach of the Year in 1991, 1993 and 1994.

Prior to his time at Anderson, Thompson served as the assistant women's coach at the University of Alabama. Working under Karen Gaiser, Thompson gained his first experience with managing a nationally recognized tennis program.

Before entering coaching, Thompson competed successfully on the professional circuit throughout the United States, Europe, Australia and North Africa.

As a collegiate player, Thompson held the number one position on the Davidson College

men's tennis team from 1986-1988 and was captain in 1987 and 1988. In 1987, he won the Southern Conference Indoor Championships and was twice awarded the Southern Conference sportsmanship award. During the summer of 1987, Thompson won the USTA National Championships in Augusta, Ga., in both singles and doubles and finished runner-up in the National Championships in Virginia Beach, Va.

Thompson's success as a player continued after college, as he achieved a Southern Sectional ranking of No. 2 in 1993 in the 25-and-over age division. Thompson

Jimmy Borendame is in his third season as a collegiate coach and his first as men's tennis assistant coach at Virginia Tech. Borendame

previously worked at William & Mary, where he served one year as assistant coach. While at William & Mary, Borendame helped the Tribe achieve a No. 38 national ranking, including wins over nationally-ranked Virginia Commonwealth and Tennessee. He also served

as recruiting coordinator and worked closely with Tribe Aces, a community booster club. Borendame also served as the director of administration of the Peak Performance and Development Tennis Camp in Williamsburg, Va.

The 24-year-old Borendame played college tennis at Butler University in Indianapolis, Ind., where he was ranked 33rd nationally in doubles and set the school record with 98 career doubles victory.

After college, Borendame served as assistant coach at West Virgina for one season (2002-03) and later served as Assistant Tennis

Professional at Woodstock Country Club in Indianapolis, Ind.

"Jimmy Borendame is a great fit for our program here at Virginia Tech," said Virginia Tech men's tennis coach Jim Thompson. "He understands the commitment it takes to have a national-caliber program here at Virginia Tech, and I am certain that we could not have hired anyone more positive who is willing to put in the effort to take our program to the next level. I am thrilled to have Jimmy working with me and as part of the program."

HIPPENSTEEL Volunteer Assistant Coach

K.J. Hippensteel joins the Virginia Tech men's tennis program this season as a volunteer assistant coach. He was a four-time, first-team All-America selection

at Stanford as well as a two-time Academic All-America (2001, 2002).

Hippensteel was ranked No. 1 in the nation in the Fall 1999 and 2001 rankings. He teamed with Ryan Wolters to win the 1999 NCAA doubles championship as a freshman. He advanced to the NCAA Championship singles semifinal as a sophomore and to the quarterfinals during his junior season. He missed the last six weeks of his senior season in 2002 due to injury after compiling a 21-4 record. He finished the year ranked No. 2 in the nation.

The Roanoke, Va. native reached as high as No. 150 in the Nov. 2004 Association of Touring Professionals (ATP) world ranking.

"I am very excited to have K.J. become a part of our program," said Tech head coach Jim Thompson. "His success and experience at the collegiate level will be a tremendous asset to our program."





2004-2005 REVIEW


Virginia Tech entered the 2004-05 season with the full knowledge that the schedule would probably be the most challenging in the program's history. Last season was the Hokies' first in the Atlantic Coast Conference, widely regarded as one of the toughest leagues in the nation, and Tech faced 16 nationally-ranked opponents. With a lineup consisting of both young and old, the Hokies compiled a 13-11 record and ended the season ranked No. 52 in the final Intercollegiate Tennis Association poll.


Senior Stephane Rod, an All-ACC performer, concluded his career with 20 wins and 86 in his Virginia Tech career. Rod was selected for an at-large berth in the 2005 NCAA Championships in College Station, Texas, where he advanced to the second round. He concluded the year ranked No. 71 nationally in singles and third in the Northeast Region.

"Stephane had a great senior year and will certainly be missed this season," said Virginia Tech head coach Jim Thompson. "His lefty serve and his style of play were one of the toughest to play against in the nation. He had been plagued with injuries during his career, so it was very rewarding to see him qualify for NCAAs and win his first-round match."

Angel Diankov, another senior, picked up 12 singles wins in the middle of the lineup. Diankov concluded his three-year Tech career with 57 victories in singles and came from a set down and 2-5 in the second set to with the clinching match versus Miami during the regular season.

"Angel has been a key player for us the past three seasons, and has helped us get some of our program's best wins," said Thompson. "His







tenacity set a great example for those around him, and I think that we will miss this characteristic the most. He always worked hard and provided us maximum effort. Having Angel around in the fall, will certainly help with our new players."

The third senior on the team, Adel Abbas, played solidly at the Nos. 5-6 positions, recording 11 wins and winning the deciding point in the Hokies' upset of Georgia Tech.

"Adel was plagued with injuries throughout his career, but especially in his senior year," said Thompson. "He was a player who, when healthy, provided us some very key wins, like the victory last year over Georgia Tech. Adel provided us amazing depth, and he also will help out in the fall as we transition a new group of freshmen into the program."

Tech opened the year by sweeping four matches at its own Larsen Bowker Shootout before dropping two 4-3 decisions at nationallyranked opponents Penn State and Middle Tennessee State. The Hokies returned home to defeat Yale, but lost to No. 68 Brown.

Next up was the Hokies' ACC debut at archrival and second-ranked Virginia. After dropping the doubles point, Rod pulled out a tough three-set match but Tech lost two other threesetters and the bottom two contests to drop the dual match. Following the Virginia defeat, the Hokies stayed on the road and earned the first ACC match victory in the program's history with a 6-1 win at Maryland.

The Maryland victory propelled the Hokies to a successful trip to the "Sunshine State" with wins at nationally-ranked Miami and South Florida. Tech returned home for five straight matches and opened the stretch with a 4-3 upset of No. 50 Georgia Tech, which was followed by dominating victories over Richmond and Stonybrook. A convincing 4-1 win versus No. 26 Louisville and a 6-1 win against No. 37 NC State ran the winning streak to eight matches and improved the record to 13-4 overall and 4-1 in the ACC.

With spirits running at an all-time high, Tech took to the road for a key conference battle at No. 49 North Carolina. Despite a great effort, Tech fell 5-2 to end the streak, but returned home to face three straight nationally-ranked league opponents. The homestand proved to not be a good one, as the Hokies lost to No. 21 Florida State, No. 24 Clemson and No. 25 Wake Forest.

Tech, which concluded the regular season facing eight consecutive nationallyranked opponents, dropped a 4-0 match at No. 40 VCU and ended the regular season with a 6-1 defeat at No. 5 Duke.





VIRGINIA TECH A PROUD MEMBER OF THE ACC

Virginia Tech became a member of the prestigeous Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004, joining the 11-member league along with the University of Miami. The conference expanded to 12 members this year with the addition of Boston College. The ACC has championships in 24 sports, 13 for women and 11 for men, of which Tech conducts varsity programs in 20 ACC sports. At the conclusion of last season, ten of 11 ACC men's tennis teams were ranked in the top 75 including two, Virginia and Duke, ranked fifth and ninth respectively. Virginia Tech became an all-sports member of the BIG EAST Conference at the beginning of the 2000-2001 academic year. Tech was a charter member of the BIG EAST Football Conference which was formed in 1991. The conference affiliation marked the first time Tech had been a member of a single all-sports conference since leaving the Southern Conference to become an independent in 1965. Since then, the Hokies also competed in the Metro Conference in all sports except football from 1978 to 1995, and were in the Atlantic 10 Conference in all sports except football from 1995 until 2000.

In its five years as a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference, Tech enjoyed tremendous success. The men's and women's tennis teams each won the conference championship every year in the league, and other Hokie teams also fared well in A-10 play.

Tech really hit the jackpot in 1998-99, winning championships in eight of the 18 conference sports in which its teams participated, and winning the Commissioner's Cup as the league's outstanding athletics program.

SUPPORT SERVICES

STUDENT ATHELTE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's tennis program rests largely on the academic progress of each studentathlete. The academic performance of Tech studentathletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

The Virginia Tech graduation rate for studentathletes has risen significantly in recent years and is a school-best 74 percent for 2005. This marks the third time in the last four years that Virginia Tech's studentathlete graduation rate has been 70 percent or better.

In addition to posting impressive graduation figures, Virginia Tech's student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom. For the 2004 calendar year, 425 3.0 GPA's were earned by student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and HighTechs. These student-athletes and students from support areas were recognized at the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast last spring.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Academic Support Services office is committed to providing fundamental and supplemental programming, consistent with University and NCAA policy, aimed at enhancing each student athlete's educational experience.

Stakeholders of the office's mission include student-athletes and their families, the university community, coaches and athletics administrators. SAASS seeks to develop relationships with its stakeholders that are founded on trust and respect, and provides the following services to accommodate their needs: university and NCAA information, orientation, academic assessment, the development of an effective student life program, appropriate referrals, monitored study environments, tutorial programs, state-of-the-art technological learning assistance and student-athlete academic performance evaluations.

In 2006 the SAASS office will be moving to the West Side of Lane Stadium. Here, student-athletes will have access to state-of-the-art technology, quiet study facilities, individualized tutorial rooms, and direct access to the SAASS staff. This complex will be a focal point for the Athletics Department, both aesthetically and pragmatically, and provide a centralized place for student-athlete services.

The new facility features more than 18,000 square feet of functional space, 10 staff offices, 18 private tutor rooms, a state-of-the-art classroom, a 45-station computer lab, three reading/study rooms, a conference room and a reference library.

Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes, after practice or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time.

The SAASS office is comprised of a team of nine full-time professionals, directed by Chris Helms. Jessica

Hegr begins her first year as an assistant director. Hegr provides academic support for the men's and women's tennis teams as well as student-athletes in the baseball, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving programs. Hegr is also responsible for the instruction of the studentathlete first-year seminar course.

ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

There's much more to athletic performance than weight training. At Virginia Tech, nutrition and sports psychology are also a part of the student-athlete's preparation — not just for athletics, but also for life after college. Virginia Tech tries to provide the best services, facilities and support staff for all of its student-athletes, to make them better athletes and better people.

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

The tennis team trains in the 5,000-square foot Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room, located in Jamerson Athletic Center. All told, the Hokies have more than 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning

coaches: Jay Johnson, director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, assistant director of strength and conditioning, who works primarily with the men's tennis team, and Jamie Meyer, strength and conditioning coordinator for Olympic sports. Gentry has the services of three graduate assistants — Megan Evans, Mike Crist and Myriam Souava.

Amy Freel serves as the Director of Sports Nutrition at Virginia Tech and works oneon-one with student-athletes to provide them with information that they need on their diet. She also provides players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and how to eat to improve performance.

Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-

athletes. He meets with studentathletes on an individual basis and works on team building, communication and performance enhancement. The psychologists also offer an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet and talk about their recovery process.

OFFICE OF STUDENT LIFE

The Athletics Office of Student Life at Virginia Tech is committed to developing the total studentathlete. Megan Armbruster and Jessica Hood are dedicated to enhancing the quality of the studentathlete experience through the programs that this office administers.

Virginia Tech student-athletes obtain personal development education through workshops and mandatory speakers. Presentation topics include gambling, alcohol abuse, sexual violence and healthy relationships, media relations, and manners and etiquette dinners.

In close collaboration with the Virginia Tech Career Services Center, career development programs are designed specifically for student-athletes. Resumé design, career fair etiquette, mock interviews, interview attire and mini-career fairs are just a few examples of workshops hosted by the Athletics Office of Student Life. Student-athletes are encouraged to participate in on-campus interviewing and eRecruiting along with securing internships and co-ops during their college careers.

The Virginia Tech Athletics Office of Student Life is responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Several athletes from the Virginia Tech women's tennis team have received various academic awards. Eight Hokies were named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2004. Several athletes from the Virginia Tech men's tennis team have received various academic awards. Six Hokies were named to the Athletic Director's Honor Roll in 2004. Akil Burgess was named to Tech's All-Academic Team for attaining the highest GPA on the men's tennis team.

The Virginia Tech Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) promotes effective communication between athletic administration and student-athletes. SAAC is comprised of two representatives from each sport. These representatives meet twice a month to discuss issues and concerns regarding their sports, department of athletics, ACC and NCAA legislation. The men's tennis team representatives are Arvid Puranen and Alexei Sergeev.

Sports Medicine & Athletic Training

The Virginia Tech Sports Medicine Department is an ever-changing and developing unit that strives to provide the most current and comprehensive care to all student-athletes. The department is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas and state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of student-athletes.

A professional staff — including primary care physicians who are Board certified in family medicine and sports medicine, orthopaedic surgeons, certified athletic trainers, physical therapists, chiropractors, massage therapists, sports psychologists, nutritionists and orthotists — is available to manage the health care of Tech's student-athletes.

The 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial

Training Room gives the training staff a centralized area to care for student-athletes. Tech has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally.

TECH CAMPUS IS HOME TO A FIRST-CLASS TENNIS FACILITY

The Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center is one of many first-class facilities at Virginia Tech. The Hokies have an athletic complex that is among the best in the nation and an administration that is dedicated to seeing the facilities continue to improve.

The tennis center, located across from Lane Stadium, offers six outdoor courts with bleacher seating, six indoor courts with a mezzanine viewing area with bleachers, locker rooms, coaches' offices, a team room and a social area. The Hokies' locker room in the facility was upgraded and remodeled in the spring of 2004.

The newest addition to the tennis center occurred last spring with the placement of digital video cameras on each indoor court. The system, created by XOS Technologies, records competition and team practices simultaniously on all six courts. The cameras are mounted at the back of each court in the center and are connected to a DVD recorder located in the tennis coach's office. The Virginia Tech system is one of the first all-digital systems in the nation. The system is also used by members of the tennis center and other local patrons for stroke analysis.

The tennis center, which opened in 1992, was made possible by gifts from Dave and Betty Burrows of Roanoke; their son Jack Burrows and his wife Lee, of Roanoke; and their daughter Beverly and her husband, Bobby Burleson, of Tallahassee, Fla. Jack Burrows and Bobby Burleson were teammates on Tech's tennis team in the late 60's. Burrows was an NCAA participant and is a member of the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame.

Jerry Stevens is in his 13th year as director of the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center at Virginia Tech.

When the varsity teams are not using the facility, the tennis center is operated as a self-sustaining club with over 400 members.

In 1988, Stevens retired from the United States Navy after completing a 29-year career. His last tour was as commanding officer of the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corp at Virginia Tech. He then volunteered to work in the Tech athletic department until moving to the Burrows-Burleson Tennis Center in 1993.

Stevens' services have greatly benefited Virginia Tech and have have not gone unnoticed. In 1999 the center received a United States Tennis Association's Outstanding Tennis Facility Award for excellence among all public tennis facilities.



With annual research expenditures of about \$269 million, Virginia Tech consistently ranks among the top research universities in the United States.
