THE OUTLOOK

Hokies striving to 'live up to the expectations'

The 1999 Hokie softball team did what no one thought was possible. It went 54-16 and had the best season ever in the program's short history. But as Coach Scot Thomas said, "It's easier to exceed the unexpected than to live up to the expectations." This year's team will have high expectations and goals for the 2000 season. And why not? With all but one player back from last year's squad and some solid freshmen added to the mix, the Hokies are ready to make a run at the Atlantic 10 title and an NCAA postseason berth for the first time ever.

The 2000 team will warm up for its big showdown with A-10 power Massachusetts with a tough preseason schedule. The Hokies will play in six tournaments before conference play. The most challenging will be the Speedline Invitational, where Tech will play national powers Florida and Michigan State in the preliminaries.

"Playing good teams makes you better," Thomas said. "No one will say our schedule is weak. If we can survive through spring break, then we will know where we're going to be."

The infield will be one of the solid spots for the Hokies. Seniors Laura Flowers, Kara Krumhardt and Michelle Meadows form a tremendous base because of their profound knowledge of the system. Krumhardt was named the VaSID State Player of the Year after batting .343 with seven homeruns and 40 RBI in 1999. Meadows is a weapon at the plate as well, hitting .338 with 34 RBI last season. Flowers is one of the better-fielding first basemen around and hits for power at the plate. With the addition of freshman shortstop Carmen Farmer, the fielding should become stronger. Farmer will benefit from the experience she will receive this year, paving the way for a bright future.

Senior Lauren Koelemay has been riddled with injuries throughout her career, but as long as she stays healthy, she will battle for playing time at shortstop. Junior Michelle Whitaker has seen action at third base and will provide quality depth for the Hokies. One of the faster players on the team, she also will see action as a pinch runner. Lisa Abbamonte, Maura Green and Heather Todd are three freshmen who are striving to improve their game in an effort to increase their playing time.

The Hokies return three starters from last year's outfield. Junior Ali Verbage, sophomore Tiffany Hurt, and junior Bronwyn Blair combine to form one of the best outfields in the conference. Blair is a returning all-conference player and is a

threat at the plate and in the field. Verbage is looking to return to the form of her phenomenal freshman year at the plate. If she does, she will be a major force this year. Hurt hit .220 last season with 22 RBI and gets a great jump on any ball hit her way. While three starters

return, five other players will be vying for playing time. Junior Mary Lowzinski is one of the top basestealing threats and she is looking to increase her time in the field. Freshman Mary Gardner will add speed to the outfield and on the base path. Junior Crystal Armes is a player who can play in either the outfield or infield and adds quality depth. Two other freshmen, Kelli Roznowski and Jennifer Vantucci, will look to contribute when called upon.

"The outfield is stronger than it's

ever been," Thomas said. "We have the ability to run down balls and have strong arms out there, so we'll save a lot of runs."

One of the biggest surprises of

last season was the pitching of sophomores **Ashlee Dobbe** and **Clarisa Crowell**, who combined to finish third in the nation in ERA. Dobbe broke numerous Tech pitching records in posting a 29-8 record with

an ERA of just 0.92. Crowell is a tenacious competitor who posted a 25-8 record last year with an ERA of 1.05. The two combine to form one of the best duos in collegiate softball.

"These two players need to continue pitching the way they did last year. You can't ask much more from them. They step up consistently to competition. We need to give them more hits and runs to make their jobs easier."

Newcomers **Nicole Strada** and **Heather Terry** will look to give the Hokies quality innings in relief.

Another stong spot for Tech is its catchers, as two veterans return. Senior **Jaime Love** and sophomore **Bethany Bird** will split time at the starting position. Coach Thomas says they both know the system well and they complement the pitchers. Love hit .231 with eight doubles last season while Bird committed just two errors in 236 chances. With experience, freshman **April Ellenberger** could see time at either the catcher or first base positions.

Coach Thomas believes this will be the toughest year in the A-10 because of the parity among the teams. Massachusetts will once again be at the top of the league, but lost All-American pitcher Danielle Henderson. Temple, St. Joseph's, St. Bonaventure and La Salle will all be much improved this season. Thomas believes if all the pieces fall into place, then the Hokies could earn their first conference title ever.

Leadership is the key to a successful season.
Flowers, Krumhardt and Meadows all bring a wealth of experience and talent. They have been the backbone of the program and will be looked upon to lead the team this year.

"These three must have the same fire and desire that they came with to lead the team. They must show the team the way to a championship."

THE COACHES

SCOT THOMAS

Head Coach • Fifth Year • 126-111 • ETSU, '91





Coach Scot Thomas has Virginia Tech softball on the move. A noted recruiter and strategist, Thomas has positioned Virginia Tech softball as one of the top programs in the nation. Thomas became Tech's first

head softball coach when he was hired on July 7, 1995.

In his first season, he led a team of non-scholarship athletes to a respectable 16-32 record, a total not indicative of the progress made in just one season. An all-conference player, a two-hit shutout and an eight-game winning streak were just some of the highlights of the 1996 season. Melissa Sanderson finished the season ranked eighth in the nation in triples, with eight, on her way to becoming Tech's first All-Atlantic 10 player. Tina Diamond pitched a two-hitter to record the school's first shutout in a 4-0 win over Cornell.

In 1997, Thomas' squad batted nearly .300 for the season, placed two players on the Atlantic 10 first-team All-Conference and won eight more games than during the inaugural season. In its second season, Thomas led the softball team to a 24-32 record and a fifth-place finish in the conference, just two games shy of the four-team league tournament. His first recruited class produced a solid foundation. Freshman shortstop Michelle Meadows and junior college transfer catcher Jennifer McKibben shattered almost every single-season school record and found themselves as members of the All-Atlantic 10 first team. Meadows also became Tech's first softball player named to the ECAC All-State team.

The 1998 season came to be one of the most decorated in Tech softball history. With an extremely young squad the Hokies posted the first winning season ever, with a 32-31 record, a second-place finish in the Atlantic 10, two players on the A-10 All-Conference team, two GTE Academic All-Americans, and freshman Ali Verbage was named A-10 Rookie of the Year and an

All-Southeast Region All-American. In total, the Hokies received over 25 academic and athletic awards.

The 1999 season is one that will stand out in Tech history forever. The Hokies finished a spectacular regular season ranked 25th in the nation with a 54-16 record. In just its fourth year as a varsity sport, the team placed second at the A-10 tournament, falling to UMass for the second year in a row. The Hokies' hopes for a regional

at-large bid were denied, but they did receive the national attention they had been working for.

Early games against No. 3 Washington, No. 4 Michigan and No. 20 Florida helped put the Hokies in the driver's seat for the majority of the season. Big wins came over Michigan, Kansas, Tennessee and UVa. They finished the year undefeated at home and 14-2 in A-10 play, losing only to UMass. The Hokies had the third longest winning streak in the nation at 26, and at one point won 35 of 36 games.

Two stellar freshmen pitched every game for the Hokies and combined for a team ERA of 1.03, finishing third best in the country. A-10 Rookie of the Year, All-Conference and Southeast All-Region All-American pitcher Ashlee Dobbe and A-10 All-Conference and All-Tournament pitcher/utility player Clarisa Crowell, put up impressive numbers all season and combined for 33 shutouts.

Two seasoned juniors led the Hokies' offense. All-Conference, All-Tournament, GTE District III Academic All-American and Virginia State Player of the Year Kara Krumhardt and GTE National First-Team Academic All-American Michelle Meadows each finished the season hitting over .335. Sophomore all-conference outfielder Bronwyn Blair and freshman outfielder Tiffany Hurt received A-10 all-tournament awards. Thomas was voted the A-10 and Virginia Sports Information Director's Coach of the Year for the first time.

Thomas graduated from East Tennessee State University in 1991 with a bachelor's in physical education. He is on the Louisville Slugger advisory staff for the fifth straight year.

A native of Blacksburg, Thomas graduated from Blacksburg High School where he was a member of the football and baseball

Thomas is married to the former Carolyn Croy, a Tech graduate from Blacksburg. She is employed as a third-grade teacher at Gilbert Linkous Elementary school. The couple has a son, Andrew Scot, who turned two in December.



AMY HAYES

Assistant Coach • Third Year • Evansville, '92



Former collegiate standout Amy Hayes begins her third season as the Hokies' assistant coach. Her responsibilities include working with the pitchers,

as well as recruiting and conditioning.

Under her tutelage, freshman pitchers Ashlee Dobbe and Clarisa Crowell blossomed, combining for a 54-16 record and an ERA of just 0.99. The staff had an ERA of 1.03, third best in the country, and has improved every year.

Hayes came to Tech after serving as the assistant softball coach at Bradley University. At Bradley, she served as pitching coach and coordinated recruiting, conditioning and the overall academics of the Braves' softball team.

While in Peoria, Ill., Hayes also served as a coach/ player on the Decatur Twister, a women's Amateur Softball Association major softball team and as a pitching and hitting instructor for the YMCA.


Prior to her time at Bradley, Hayes was the head softball coach at Maroa-Forsyth High School in Maroa, Ill., in 1994 and was assistant softball coach at the University of Evansville in 1993.

She also played for the Decatur Sting/Decatur Lady

Pride women's ASA major softball team from 1989-94 and helped lead them to a third-place finish at the national tournament in 1994.

Hayes also played a season of softball in New Zealand, where she received the top pitching award at New Zealand Club Nationals.

Hayes attended the University of Evansville where she was a four-year starter and guided the Aces to a third-place finish in the Mid-Western Collegiate Conference during her senior year. She also served as co-captain and was named to the MCC All-Conference team in her final season. She earned a bachelor's in sociology from there as well.





AL BRAUNS

Assistant Coach • Second Year • Penn State, '73


Al Brauns begins his second year as an assistant for the Hokies. His responsibilities include working with the outfielders, field maintenance,

equipment and recruiting. Brauns is a familiar face to Hokie sports, holding a position with the athletic department for three years prior to joining the softball staff.

Under his direction a year ago, the trio of Ali Verbage, Bronwyn Blair and Tiffany Hurt (three returning players on this year's squad) combined for a fielding percentage of .949. The three committed just eight errors in 157 chances.

Brauns started playing fastpitch in the 1960s and finished his career playing with a men's major team from 1970-74. He is originally from Uniontown, Pa., and graduated from Penn State in 1973 with a degree in criminology.

Coach Brauns and his wife, Michelle, have one child, Adam, the Hokies' batboy, who is seven. Brauns also has two other sons, Eric, 30 and Jason, 24. He has two grandchildren, Alaina and Allison.

The season started on a slow note as the Hokies lost three of their first four games. On Feb. 20, Tech jump-started its season in a big way. Thanks to a four-hitter by Clarisa Crowell and 11 hits from the offense, Tech pulled off a major upset, knocking off No. 4 Michigan, 6-2. The No. 4 ranking by the Wolverines marks the highest-ranked opponent Tech has ever defeated.

After losses to Michigan and Washington, two perennial World Series participants, Tech won five of its next six games and 11 of its next 13. The Hokies went 4-4 over the next eight games before going on one of the greatest streaks in NCAA softball history.

After a loss to nationally-ranked Southern Miss on March 20, the Hokies won 35 of their next 36 games, including 26 in-a-row from April 2 to May 1. A 3-0 loss to UMass on May 2 ended the streak. During that stretch, the Hokies knocked off such teams as Boston College (twice), SEC power Tennessee and Virginia (twice). Over the 26-game streak, Tech outscored its opponents, 137-18.

After finishing the conference schedule at 14-2, the Hokies were seeded second heading into the postseason

tournament, which was held in Salem, Va. But after a surprising 1-0 loss to St. Joseph's in the opening round, the Hokies were forced to claw their way back. With their backs to the wall, they responded by knocking off Dayton, 5-0, and St. Joseph's, 4-2, on the same day to advance to the championship game. In the title game. Massachusetts continued its mastery of Tech by defeating the Hokies, 2-0. The loss ended the Hokies' season at 54-16, by far the best in the program's short

The two, who were both named to the Virginia State Sports Information Director's All-State Team, put up impressive numbers all season and combined for 33 shutouts.

The Hokies' offense was led by two juniors, Kara Krumhardt and Michelle Meadows. Krumhardt led the team in nearly every

offensive category, hitting .343 with seven home runs and 40 RBI. She was named all-conference, all-tournament and a GTE District III Academic All-American. She also was named the Virginia SID's Player of the Year.

Meadows got it done on the field and in the classroom and was honored for her work in both areas. She was voted to the VaSID team and was named a GTE First-Team Academic All-American and a GTE District III Academic All-District. Meadows finished the season with a .338 batting average and 34 RBI.

Head Coach Scot Thomas received the Atlantic 10 and VaSID Coach of the Year Awards, while allconference outfielder Bronwyn Blair and all-tournament outfielder Tiffany Hurt also received A-10 awards.

THE FACILITIES

The Virginia Tech softball team has the luxury of playing and practicing in some of the finest facilities on the East Coast. Employing the Tech Softball Field, Rector Field House and the Jim "Bulldog" Haren weight room, the Hokies use the best in training to win championships.

The Virginia Tech Softball Field is a great complex that became even better in the offseason. The field has a playing surface that is properly maintained and upgraded as needed.

The dugouts, faced with Hokie stone, are complete with bathrooms, water

fountains and equipment rooms. They also are ADA accessible and have access to separate bullpens, making them some of the finest around.

The field, which was completed in the Fall of 1997, has dimensions of 200 feet down the lines and 220 feet to

center field. Over the past two seasons at home, the Hokies have compiled a record of 25-7, including a 15-0 campaign last season.

This past winter, permanent bench-back seats were added. With the new bleachers, the complex can easily hold up to 500 fans.

At the top of the new seats is a prefabricated, 8-by-18 foot press box. Complete with power and phone lines, it accommodates all the needs of the media.

A state-of-the-art scoreboard was installed during the 1998 season, making it easier for coaches, players and fans to keep up with the game.

When weather doesn't allow for outdoor practice, the team doesn't lose practice time by moving into Rector Field House.

Located adjacent to the playing field, the field house has an artificial surface, batting cages and ample room for drills. It is also equipped with a training room.

Locker room renovations and outdoor batting cages are projects in the works.
