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Facilities

The Virginia Tech volleyball team plays and trains in some of the finest facilities in the country.

Cassell Coliseum, the 10,052-seat home of the Virginia Tech volleyball team, is home to a winning tradition. Rivals have had little success playing the Hokies in Cassell, winning only 87 of 290 visits.

Construction for the main portion of Cassell Coliseum began in 1961. It was completed in December 1964, at a cost of \$2.7 million. Built by T.C. Brittain and Company of Decatur, Ga., it houses an arena, locker rooms, two auxiliary gymnasiums, offices and other athletic facilities.

Cassell Coliseum has undergone extensive renovations to both the exterior and interior of the building, as well as structural systems. Prior to the 1988-89 season, a new spring-loaded playing floor was installed. During 1996-97, the facility was given a new roof and paint application. This past summer, the playing floor was resurfaced and given a new look.

The Hokies train in the Merryman Athletic Center. The sparkling \$10.6 million facility contains 17,000 square feet of strength and conditioning space.

The Merryman Center was dedicated Sept., 26, 1998, and is named for the F.W. (Sonny) Merryman family of Rustburg, Va., which presented the university with a major gift to kick off a fund-raising campaign.



The Hokies' locker room (above) was renovated this past

summer. The team plays in Cassell Coliseum. The floor of the Coliseum was refinished this past summer, as well.

DIRECTIONS TO BLACKSBURG

From the north or east, take Interstate 81 south to exit 118. Exit and turn right. Make a right at the first signal, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From the south, take Interstate 81 north to exit 118. Turn left onto US 460 west. Make a right at the first signal, following US 460 west to Blacksburg.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the signal at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed onehalf mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road, just before the football stadium. Cassell Coliseum will then be on the right.

2000 Outlook

Young Hokies looking to turn heads in 2000

A new millennium and a new coach have brought new expectations and goals for the 2000 Virginia Tech volleyball team. Led by first-year head coach Greg Smith, the Hokies are looking to regroup and improve on a disappointing 1999 campaign.

Tech has three starters returning, making the hopes high for a promising season. With middle blockers **Christine Shubat** and **Cheryl Stinson** and outside hitter **Holly Disser** all returning to the starting lineup, the Hokies are looking to make Coach Smith's first season as a head coach a memorable one.

MIDDLE BLOCKERS

Shubat led the team in blocking a year ago and returns for her junior year. The Ft. Wayne, Ind., native recorded 107 total blocks a season ago and was also a top offensive threat. Stinson returns as the team's leading attacker. The sophomore from Ottawa, Ontario, had an attack percentage of .260 last season, knocking down 183 kills in 470 attempts with just 61 errors. While expected to contribute offensively, the two must also combine to be a solid blocking duo for the Hokies this season.

Also battling for playing time will be **Sarah Rogers** and **Jamie Meyer**. Rogers, a sophomore from Marietta, Ga., played

in 29 games, recording 39 kills. Rogers had a career-high 10 kills at Duquesne on Sept. 18. Meyer, a Ft. Wayne, Ind., native, is coming off a redshirt season and is one of the Hokies' strongest players.

"We have four good athletes who, with a lot of reps and playing time, will advance in their skill level a great deal this year," Smith said. "We have experienced middles that will only get better as the season goes on."


OUTSIDE HITTERS

Disser is the lone returning starter at the outside hitter position for the Hokies. The rising junior from Overland Park, Kan., had 280 kills last season, including 27 versus Northern Illinois. Disser will be expected to be one of the leaders for the Hokies this season.

Junior Christine Shubat led the team in total blocks last season. She will be joined on the outside by sophomore Ana Lang.

Ana Lang and Candice Lahm will likely see action at this spot. Lang is one of the Hokies' best athletes who was a valuable contributor a year ago until she broke her hand. She finished her freshman campaign with 67 kills and 106 digs. Lahm is one of the Hokies' best servers who saw most of her action at the defensive specialist spot a year ago.

"We have smart players at the outside hitter position who can handle the ball well," Smith said. "We may not be as big on the outside as other

team, but I think we make up for that in their ability to play the game as complete players."

SETTERS

Tech has to deal with the loss of four-year starter Britton Julian. Stepping in for her at the setter position will be junior **Renee Collins**. Collins has experience running the offense and recorded 39 assists in her action last season. The Shawnee, Kan., native tore her ACL in spring practice but is expected to be back at full strength before the season starts.

Freshman **Kelli O'Dell** is expected to push Collins for playing time at the position. O'Dell is a 5-10 native of Kingwood, Texas, who knows how to run an offense. When she becomes adjusted to the collegiate game, she could be an impact player.

"We have two players who know the game," Smith said. "They're two different types of setters that are going to make this a very strong position for us. On any given night, either one is capable of stepping in and running the team."

RIGHT SIDE

The right-side position is the big question mark for the Hokies heading into the season. Tech lost starter Kristin Wright and reserve Ashley Axson, leaving the position wide open. Smith said any one of three players — Meyer, Stinson or incoming freshman **Jenny Hill** — will see playing time here. Hill is a 6-footer from Holland, Mich., who was a first-team all-state selection as a senior.

"We're not as deep here as we are at the other positions," Smith said. "It's going to be a case where we have to wait and see what happens when fall practice opens up. Any one of those three is athletic enough to play the position, it's just a matter of getting them experience in that position."



DEFENSIVE SPECIALISTS

Any one of three

players could see time at the defensive specialist spot. Sophomore **Kim Amos** and Lahm are the two who return to the position from last year's squad. Amos, a native of Roanoke, Va., was redshirted last season but brings athleticism to the spot. Lahm played in 73 games last season, recording 89 digs. Smith also expects walk-on **Elizabeth Jeffers** to battle for playing time.

"We're going to be fairly deep at the defensive specialist spot," Smith said. "They're going to add good ball handling to the team and will be an important part of our team."

THE OUTLOOK

The Hokies will be playing an independent schedule this season before heading into the BIG EAST Conference next

pressure to finish in a certain position. Our main goal is to improve as players and as a team each time we step on the court. We want to bring back the pride and positive attitude to the program."

The team will be a young one, with no seniors on the squad. But nine players return from last year's team, seven of whom saw playing time last year.

"I'm really looking forward to working with this young team knowing that we'll be together for two straight years," Smith said.

So with three starters returning, a new coach with a new philosophy and a solid group of underclassmen ready to step in, the pieces are in place to make Coach Smith's first season in Blacksburg a successful one.

"The goal for us this year is to prepare us for 2001," Smith said. "This first year is going to be a transitional year where we get used to each other and the new system. It's great that we're not in a conference because there's no

Head Coach Greg Smith

A young and energetic coach, Greg Smith enters his first season as a collegiate head coach with the Virginia Tech volleyball program. Smith comes to Virginia Tech from Ohio State, where he served as an assistant coach the past three seasons.

Smith was successful as an assistant at OSU, helping coach the Buckeyes to the NCAA Tournament each year. His duties included assisting in recruiting and training the team, both on the court and in its physical conditioning.

Prior to his stint in Columbus, Smith spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Hofstra University. While at Hofstra, he helped lead the team to two consecutive American East Conference tournament championships and two NCAA tournament appearances. In all, Smith has coached in the NCAA Tournament each of the last five seasons.


Before his coaching duties at Hofstra, he was an assistant coach at the University of Indianapolis in 1994. During that time he also served as one of the head volleyball coaches for the Circle City Volleyball Club and worked with the Junior National Team Program.

Prior to coaching at the University of Indianapolis, Smith was an assistant varsity coach at Rochester (Ind.) High from September, 1992 through October, 1993. He also was head coach



1999 Review

Bright spots emerge from disappointing 1999 season

The 1999 Virginia Tech volleyball squad went through a season of ups and downs in finishing with a 9-19 record. Although the end result was a disappointment, there were several bright spots for the Hokies. The program saw the graduation of two of its best players ever and also witnessed the emergence of three young players who consistently produced in the starting lineup. Factor in a couple of big wins and the Hokies had a better season than their record depicted.

The season started with a match against in-state rival Virginia at Charlottesville. Though the Hokies lost 3-0, Renee Collins started at setter and ran the offense nicely in the absence of an injured Britton Julian. Tech picked up its first win of the season on Sept. 4 when it downed Villanova, 3-0, at the Hokie Classic. The Hokies came close to winning the next two matches of the tournament, but fell to Kentucky, 3-1, and Northern Illinois, 3-1. In the NIU match, Britton Julian dished out a school-record 79 assists and Holly Disser recorded a career-high 27 kills.

The Hokies then headed to Atlanta for the Courtyard by Marriott Classic at Georgia Tech. The field included four perennial NCAA



Tournament participants in Cal-Santa Barbara. Arizona State, South Carolina and Georgia Tech. And while the Hokies fell in all four matches, they came away with valuable experience against some of the nation's top programs. Following the tournament

the tournament in Atlanta, the Hokies opened conference play by downing a scrappy Fordham squad, 3-2, on the road. After taking a 1-0 lead in the match, the Rams stormed back to take games two and three. But the Hokies regrouped and came back to take the final two games and the match. Kristin Wright led the way, knocking down 23 kills while senior Rachel Julian had 20 kills of her own.

Including the Fordham match, Tech won four of its next six matches, playing solid volleyball during that stretch. The Hokies came back from a 2-0 deficit against La Salle on Sept. 24 to win the final three games and the match, 3-2, at home. The following day, Tech came back to knock off A-10 champion Temple. 3-

2. The Hokies weren't done yet, defeating George Washington 3-1 on Oct. 1. During that six-match streak, the Hokies played in five consecutive five-game matches, winning three of them.

After struggling through a three-match losing streak, Tech rebounded on Oct. 15 by downing Rhode Island, 3-0 at home. The Hokies then upset Massachusetts, 3-1, the next day. In the UMass match, Disser recorded a double-double in knocking down 18 kills with 20 digs.

On Oct. 23, the Hokies defeated Fordham to sweep the season series. Freshman Cheryl Stinson had 17 kills in the match and hit .455. The final win for the Hokies was a big one as they knocked off Xavier, 3-0, at home. Sophomore Christine Shubat led the way with 13 kills, hitting over .300 for the match.

In the end, Tech finished the season with a 9-19 overall record and an 8-10 mark in the conference. The Hokies missed the postseason tournament after finishing seventh. While the record may seem to dictate a negative season, one can find many positives in the outcome. Britton and Rachel Julian graduated after having two stellar careers in Blacksburg. Britton left with over 4,000 assists, second best at Tech all-time and Rachel left as one of only three players ever at Tech to record 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs.

The emergence of Shubat and Stinson in the middle and Disser on the outside gave the Hokies high hopes for the 2000 season. And probably the brightest spot was the fact that Tech had a victory over each of the participants in the 1999 Atlantic 10 Tournament — Temple, Rhode Island, Xavier and George Washington. So while the 1999 season wasn't as successful as many had hoped, the future looks bright for a young and talented Virginia Tech volleyball squad.



Steger was the architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which concluded in 1998, raised \$337 million, \$87 million over its goal.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his Bachelor and Masters of Architecture and a Ph.D. in Environmental Science and Engineering from Virginia Tech. He and his wife Janet, have two sons, David and Christopher.



Jim Weaver • Director of Athletics

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 55, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his three years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting studentathletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech enters competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001 season.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Already complete is the expansion of the North end zone for the 2000 season that will total over 5,000 permanent seats. South end zone bleachers will be replaced by permanent double-deck stands with seating for approximately 12,000 fans.

Weaver will oversee the construction of new athletic fields, and video boards for both Lane Stadium and Cassell Coliseum in 2000-2001.

A native of Harrisburg, Pa., Weaver came to Tech from Western Michigan University where he was director of athletics from January, 1996 until he came to Blacksburg. Prior to that, he was AD for three and a half years at UNLV, where he reconstructed a troubled athletic department.

Prior to landing the athletic director's job at UNLV, Weaver spent nine years at the University of Florida. He was a strong force at Florida in the field of

compliance and concluded his time there as associate athletic director.

"Jim Weaver was the unanimous choice of our search committee," retired Tech President Paul Torgersen said at a Blacksburg news conference when the new AD was introduced. "The committee was searching for someone with extensive Division I experience, a commitment to compliance, a commitment to gender equity, a commitment to all 21 varsity sports and a vision for conference alignment."

Weaver and his wife Traci have three sons - Josh, Paul and Cole.

Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs

The success of Virginia Tech's volleyball program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student-athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs (SAOAEP).

Student-athletes are the most visible student component of a university. They delight and entertain thousands of fans, students and alumni. Their athletic ability and achievement is the primary focus for national media attention.

Athletic events not only bring back faithful alumni, but are a welcome mat for potential new students.

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential. To accommodate the many facets of assistance needed for studentathletes, Virginia Tech's mission is eight fold:

1. To provide our services to all student-athletes including any student participating in any varsity sport, managers, trainers, cheerleaders and HighTechs.

2. To provide academic support through tutoring programs, computer facilities and software which are necessary for the individual needs of each student

3. To require a mandatory study hall for students below expected QCA levels in order that we might better assist the at risk student-athletes.

4. To provide adequate study facilities and a computer lab which are conveniently located to the training areas and coaching areas.

5. To provide mentoring, counseling, academic assistance, advising and to work closely with other academic offices on campus for the welfare of our students.

6. To work closely with the athletic department for the academic welfare of each student-athlete and to help in the development of an effective student life program.

7. To closely monitor the academic success of each student to help ensure academic progress toward a degree and maintenance of academic and athletic eligibility.

8. To encourage former athletes to be actively involved with our present athletes and to provide our services to former athletes who did not graduate and assist them in their academic planning toward a degree.

The ultimate goal is for all student-athletes to successfully complete their degrees. The expectations of the Virginia Tech community

assistance, facilities and encouragement, these potentials can become a reality. Tech has made tremendous strides in recent years. The 1999 NCAA **Division I Graduation Report** states that for student-athletes who have exhausted their eligibility at Tech, 81 percent have graduated. Last spring, the Athletic Director's Honors Breakfast paid tribute to a record 358 student-athletes, student trainers, student managers, cheerleaders and High Techs who posted 3.0 or greater QCAs in the 1999 calendar year.

The Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs provides programming for student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring,

academic recognition and eligibility education

Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAOAEP office in Cassell Coliseum.

The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab houses over 26 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum. Room 160 in Cassell Coliseum provides an area for private quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Additionally, student-athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site offices located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls. Together, these spaces provide the student-athlete with a variety of study environments conducive to their success. Athletes can use these facilities between classes. after practice, or in the evenings, with flexible hours tailored to make the most of a student-athlete's limited time

The coordinator, Chris Helms. begins his second year at Virginia Tech and is responsible for the development and leadership of the Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs.

Colin Howlett begins his fourth year with Virginia Tech as an assistant coordinator of the Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs. In addition

to assisting the coordinator in all facets of the program, Howlett oversees the advisement of football and volleyball student-athletes with regard to satisfactory progress, eligibility and degree completion as set forth by the NCAA, BIG EAST and Virginia Tech. He also helps coordinate support services for the football program including tutorial support, mentoring, organized study table and major and career counseling.

Lois Berg, associate coordinator, begins her 12th year at Tech. She is primarily in charge of developing the freshman orientation

program. which ensures the studentathlete a smooth transition from high school to the university. Katie

an assistant coordinator who begins her second year and is in charge with the operation of the HEAT lab and other computing resources available for student-athletes. Ammons is a former standout Hokie student-athlete.

Terrie Repass begins her 26th year of service at Virginia Tech. She serves as the office receptionist and "first contact" person for the Student-Athlete Office of Academic Enrichment Programs.

Strength and Conditioning

Under the direction of assistant athletic director for athletic performance Mike Gentry, a 13-year member of the Tech athletic department, and his staff, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

One of the main support centers of Tech volleyball is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by not only the staff but the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies become stronger and faster every year.

The volleyball team trains in the beautiful 17,000-square foot training center on the first level of the Merryman Athletic Center. The weight room facility features new free-weight equipment, a full line of Hammer Strength equipment, 12 platforms and a 6,000-square foot state-of-the-art speed and agility room.

Tech volleyball players used to train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department. With the two facilities, the Hokies have over 22,000-square feet of strength and conditioning training space.

The strength and conditioning staff is also very involved in nutritional education and supplementation as related to athletic performance.

The "Training Edge" dining facility has been touted by visiting coaches as one of the

best in the country. It features a comprehensive system of eating for championship performance. "Our system of nutritional supplementation and performancebased eating has made a tremendous difference in the gains our athletes have experienced over the past year," Gentry said. "We plan to continue

to improve and promote the 'Training Edge'. "By the beginning of the 2000 season, a registered dietitian will be on staff as part of the athletic performance team to assist the athletes with their sports nutritional goals."

A native of Durham, N.C., Gentry received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Western Carolina University in 1979 and received his master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1981. He completed his doctorate in curriculum and instruction, with an emphasis in motor behavior from Virginia Tech in 1999. Gentry worked as an assistant strength coach at UNC and as the head strength coach at East Carolina University prior to coming to Virginia Tech in 1987.

In 1995 and 1996, Gentry was recognized by the National Strength and

Conditioning Association as a finalist for the National Strength and Conditioning Professional of

the Year. Assisting Gentry this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Sonny Sano, director of strength and conditioning, Jay Johnson, strength and conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports and Michelle Boswell, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports.

Sano will take over the reins of training the volleyball squad this year. He will be responsible for the strength and conditioning of the team.

Gentry will also be assisted by four graduate assistants — Paula Allan, Angelo Gingerelli, Erin O'Neil and Danny Wheel.

Last season, former Hokie volleyball player Allison Suggs was named a National Strength and Conditioning All-American for her work in the weight room.

Office of Student Life

The Office of Student Life within the Virginia Tech Department of Athletics is dedicated to enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting through its various programs. The HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program was created to achieve its mission.

The HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program (Hokies Turning Opportunities into Personal Success) provides a well-rounded program for student-athletes to develop the individual skills necessary to lead successful and productive lives.

"The HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills program is an excellent way to enhance the total development of students participating in intercollegiate athletics," Jermaine Holmes, director of student life said.

The program's goal is to enhance five areas of commitments that are vital to personal growth of student-athletes. Those areas are service; academic excellence; career development; athletic excellence; and personal development. Throughout the career of every student-athlete, this program attempts to build individual confidence, promote respect for diversity, enhance interpersonal relationships, develop leadership skills and enable each one to make a valuable contribution to the community.

Service

The Tech volleyball program takes great pride in its community service projects. Many players take part in various programs such as Hokie Readers, Kid Fest, Special Olympics, Canned Food Drive and VT Night at local elementary schools.

Academic Excellence

Academic excellence is promoted through a full range of services available for any student-athlete. HiTOPS is committed to effective study skills programs which facilitate the development of student-athletes as critical thinkers with a variety of integrated learning skills. A monitored study hall, assigned academic advisors, A-Tech (computer integrated classes) and honors, awards and recognition, such as the Athletic Director's Honor Roll and the Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholars, are all offered by Virginia Tech to help with academics.



Career Development

HiTOPS is committed to the goal of assisting student-athletes in the process of career development. It is the program's intention to provide a developmental approach that begins with career awareness which then leads to career exploration and, finally, job placement.

Athletic Excellence

CHAMPS/Life Skills programs encourage student-athletes to transfer the lessons learned in athletic participation to their daily life experiences.

Virginia Tech strives to provide its student-athletes with excellent facilities, staff, equipment and support programs.

Personal Development

HiTOPS is committed to the goal of assisting in developing the total person. Student-athletes are given opportunities to acquire appropriate communication skills and decision-making skills that will enable them to manage their personal and professional lives.

Pursuit of Excellence

Tech's overriding goal continues to be a combination of excellence in both athletic competition and academic achievement. These five commitments of the HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills programs help lead to the development of productive, responsible and successful lives for Virginia Tech student-athletes.

The Office of Student Life is headed by Holmes and Freel. Holmes is in his second year as the director of student life for Virginia Tech and third year working in the department of athletics.

Holmes, a former star receiver for the Hokies, oversees the day-to-



day operation of the office of student life, directs the HiTOPS CHAMPS/Life Skills Program and serves on various student-related committees on campus.

Amy Freel is in her second year as the coordinator of student life at Virginia Tech. She came to Blacksburg in September, 1999, after serving as a registered dietitian at a nearby hospital in Salem, Va.

In her capacity with student life, Freel serves as the community service coordinator, assists with the development and implementation of alcohol, tobacco and drug awareness

programs, manages the mentors for new Hokies programs and serves on various committees on campus.
