SCOUTING THE DEACONS

• The No. 5 Wake Forest Deacons have started the 2011 season 10-1-0 with a recent 4-1 conference win over Miami Sunday night. The Deacons are currently on a seven-game winning streak, including big wins over Florida State and South Carolina. Wake Forest averages 2.64 goals per game, while averaging 15.1 shots per game. The Deacons have outscored their opponents 29-6, while outshooting their opponents, 166-83.

• Last week's ACC Player of the Week and NSCAA and Soccer America National Player of the Week, Katie Stengel, leads the Deacons with 13 goals and four assists on the season, while taking 46 shots. The Preseason Soccer America All-American, ranks first in the ACC and tied for fourth nationally in goals.

• Rachel Nuzzolese follows Stengel with six goals and one assist, while two other Deacons have scored two goals on the season.

• Sophomore Aubrey Bledsoe will be in goal for Wake Forest. The keeper has started all 11 games so far, recording 24 saves and six shutouts, while allowing six goals this season.

LAST TIME OUT

No. 13 Boston College rallies past women's soccer 2-1 in double overtime Anne Lumpkin connects on a penalty kick for her third goal of the season

BLACKSBURG, Va. - The No. 13 Boston College Eagles rallied past the Virginia Tech women's soccer team, 2-1, in double overtime on Sunday afternoon at Thompson Field. The Hokies fall to 8-3-0 overall and 0-2-0 in the ACC, while the Eagles remain undefeated with an 8-0-2 on the season and 3-0-0 in the conference. Junior Anne Lumpkin connected on the goal for Tech off a penalty kick in the second half.

The two teams battled from the start of the game as they traded a number of shots in the first half. The Hokies had a number of chances to find the back of the net but the Boston College keeper, Jillian Mastroianni, played very well picking up six saves in the first. Sophomore Jazmine Reeves attacked the goal five times, including two back-to-back shots in the 25th minute.

The Eagles put the first point on the board when Kristen Mewis found the back of the net off a pass from Stephanie McCaffrey at the 39:54 mark that sneaked past Tech's keeper, Dayle Colpitts. The two teams went into the half with Boston College up 1-0.

The Hokies came out strong in the second taking four shots and four corner kicks, before the Eagles committed a foul inside the box to setup Lumpkin for a penalty kick in the 64th minute. Lumpkin buried the goal with ease to tie the game at one apiece. Tech continued to attack as it took five more shots, including a shot from Ashley Manning at the last second but could not break the tie, as the game would go into the first overtime.

Tech continued to attack but couldn't connect on anything, as it took two corner kicks and two headers. Although, the defense stepped up to limited the Eagles to nothing in the first overtime.

Going into double-overtime, Manning broke away and had a chance to end the game firing a hard shot in the 103rd minute, but Mastroianni recorded a huge save to keep the game going. Minutes later, McCaffrey took control of a loose ball that Colpitts tried to snag as she came out of the box, but McCaffrey slid it to Alicia Blose for the open goal to end the game at the 105:56 mark.

As a team, Tech once again outshot its opponent 20-15, while taking eight corner kicks. Mastroianni recorded the win for the Eagles as she played an impressive game, picking up 10 saves. Colpitts took the loss for the Hokies, as she tallied a season-high eight stops.

PARTY LIKE ITS 1994

 Before falling to Nebraska, 3-4, in double-overtime, the Hokies matched their best season start with six consectutive wins since 1994. The 1994 squad shutout five of the six opponents, while outscoring them 18-1. In the six victories this season, Tech shutout four of its six opponents, while outscoring them 19-3.

HOKIES HOST HILTON GARDEN INVITATIONAL

 The Hokies hosted the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational, inviting ACC-opponent Wake Forest, Nebraska and Loyola (Md.). Tech did not see action against Wake Forest and fell to the Nebraska Cornhuskers in a thrilling double-overtime game Saturday. Tech closed the invitational with a shutout against Loyola, including four Hokies being selected to the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational All-Tournament team. Ashley Manning, Kelly Conheeney, Brittany Popko and Anne Lumpkin all made the squad.

TECH DOMINATES WAKE FOREST TOURNAMENT

• Tech dominated the Wake Forest Tournament, recording wins over Campbell (3-2) and Connecticut (1-0). Four Hokies were named to the All-Tournament team, including Shannon Mayrose, Brittany Popko, Kelsey Loupee and Kelly Conheeney.

HOKIES RANKED NATIONALLY

• After receiving 48 votes the third week in the National Soccer Coachs Association of America poll, the Hokies entered week four at No. 25. In addition to the NSCAA Poll, Tech entered the Top-25 in the Soccer America rankings the previous week, sitting tied for 25 with Pepperdine. In week four Tech jumped up to No. 15, but fell to No. 20 in week five. Tech entered the Soccer Times Poll in week six at No. 20, but currently sits tied at No. 25 with Notre Dame.

2011 HOKIES OVERFLOW THE RECORD BOOKS

• Junior midfielder Kelly Conheeney has reached the top-5 in every category except two in Tech's all-time record book. She recently took over first place in game-winning goals with 11, after scoring the game-winner against Appalachian State. Conheeney is also tied for first in multiple-goal games (5), tied for third in assists (17), second in points (63), fourth in goals (23) and fifth in shots (148).

• Sophomore keeper Dayle Colpitts has reached the top-10 in every goalie category except two in Tech's all-time record book. Colpitts sits first in goals against average with 1.000, tied for fifth in wins (13), sixth in minutes (2,423) and tied for seventh in shutouts (6).

• Senior Brittany Michels entered the top-10 this season in career games played as she sits tied for sixth with 78. She will have a chance to beat out former teammate Jennifer Harvey (86) for the top spot towards the end of the season.

• In addition to Colpitts, redshirt-sophomore Anna Romeiser entered the Tech's all-time record books at the goal position. She currently sits tied for tenth in career shutouts (2) and tied for 11th in career wins with five.

GOALS, GOALS, GOALS

The Hokies are dominating their opponents on offense this season. Tech holds a 31-11 scoring record against its opponents in 11 games. Kelly Conheeney leads the team with an impressive nine goals and two assists this season. Coming off her first multigoal game, Shannon Mayrose follows Conheeney with six goals and three assists on the season. Anne Lumpkin just tallied her third goal off a penalty kick against Boston College. Five other Hokies have scored two goals and hold at least four points for the Hokies, including Jazmine Reeves (2g, 11pts), Kelsey Loupee (2g, 10pts), Katie Cramp (2g, 4pts), Julia Goldsworthy (2g, 4pts) and Brittany Michels (2g, 4pts).
Reeves also leads the team and the ACC in assists with seven.

DEFENSE SHUTS IT DOWN

• The Hokie defense continues to shut down its opponents by allowing only 11 goals so far. James Madison, Campbell, Nebraska, Maryland and Boston College are the only teams to find the back of the net against the Hokies.

• Tech was able to limit the Appalachian State Mountaineers to zero shots, which marks the fewest shots taken since last year against American on Aug. 23, 2010. James Madison, Nebraska and Boston College were the only teams to be able to fire double-figure shots against the Hokies, while Elon, High Point and UNC Greensboro were limited to no more than four against Tech. Goalkeeper Anna Romeiser denied her first career penalty kick against Elon, while saving all three shots the Phoenix took. Sophomore Dayle Colpitts tallied a season-high 8 saves against Boston College.

CONHEENEY HONORED BY COLLEGESOCCER360.COM

• For the opening weekend of the Divison I women's college soccer season, junior Kelly Conheeney was named a CollegeSoccer360.com Primetime Performer Honoree. Conheeney helped lead the Hokies to a 2-0 start to the 2011 season. In the season opener against UNCG, Conheeney took four shots and connected on two of them, including the game-winning goal for Tech. She has scored the game-winning goal in every season opener in her career.

Sophomores Jazmine Reeves and Dayle Colpitts both received ACC All-Freshmen accolades last season, while Kelly Conheeney was named to the 2010 VaSID All-State second team. Conheeney led the team in four categories, including shots (46), game-winning goals (3), assists (12) and points (22).

After Tech took two more corner kicks, Manning recorded her first goal of the season when Reeves fired a ball across the box and Manning ran in to tap the ball into the net to give the Hokies a two-point advantage in the 63rd minute.

The Huskers did not give up, as Jackson connected on a shot from the right side of the box from 12 yards back to close on the Hokie lead at the 78:51 mark. Seven minutes later, Morgan Marlborough dribbled down the field and fired a shot from the top of the box 20 yards back passed the hands of Romeiser to tie the game at three in the 82nd minute.

Nebraska out shot the Hokies six to four in the first overtime, but neither team could find the back of the net. Double-overtime lasted about three minutes when Jackson shot a ball that bounced off the crossbar and Stacy Bartels ran in and dished it in to end the game.

The Hokies out shot Nebraska 25-18 and took eight corner kicks, while limiting the Huskers to just one the entire game. Dayle Colpits started the game for Tech, but left 28 minutes in due to injury. Romeiser recorded the loss for the Hokies, while Emma Stevens picked up her third win on the season.

TECH CLOSES HILTON GARDEN HOKIE INVITATIONAL WITH A 3-0 WIN OVER LOYOLA

BLACKSBURG, Va. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team closed out the Hilton Garden Invitational with a 3-0 victory over the Loyola Greyhounds Sunday afternoon on Thompson Field. Brittany Michels, Katie Cramp and Kelly Conheeney each connected on one goal each for the Hokies.

Shannon Mayrose led the way for the Hokies with two goals, while seven different ent Tech players earned a point in the game.

Tech (8-1-0) controlled the game from the start, rarely letting the Mountaineers (3-4-0) touch the ball. The Hokies took a 4-0 advantage, as well as the 10-0 shooting edge into the halftime break.

Junior Anne Lumpkin connected on the goal for Tech off a penalty kick in the second half.

The two teams battled from start of the game as they traded a number of shots in the first half. The Hokies had a number of chances to find the back of the net but the Boston College keeper, Jillian Mastroianni, played very well picking up six saves in the first. Sophomore Jazmine Reeves attacked the goal five times, including two back-to-back shots in the 25th minute.
