 The Virginia Tech women's soccer team will take on the Clemson Tigers Thursday night at Thompson Field, before traveling to Raleigh, N.C., to faceoff with the NC State Wolfpack.

SCOUTING THE TIGERS

• The Clemson Tigers have an overall record of 5-8-0. The Tigers started out strong with a five-game winning streak, but currently hold a eight-game losing streak. Clemson has lost all six conference games so far, including a recent loss against the No. 10 North Carolina last Thursday. The Tigers average 15.2 shots per game, while averaging 2.00 goals per game.

· Junior Maddy Elder and freshman Liska Dobberstein leads the Tigers with six goals on the season with a combined 67 shots on the season. Sophomore Vanessa Laxgang follows the forward duo with four goals and one assist, while taking 34 shots with 17 on goal.

 Sophomore Lauren Arnold be in goal for Clemson. The keeper has started eight games this season, recording 22 saves and three shutouts, while allowing 14 goals.

SERIES INFO

• This will be the eighth all-time meeting between the two teams. Tech holds a 2-2-3 alltime record against Clemson, as the Hokies and Tigers first met in 2004 where No. 24 Clemson defeated Tech, 1-0, in Blacksburg and most recently saw action in 2010 where the Hokies recorded a convincing 3-0 win over the Tigers. Tech last lost to Clemson in 2005.

Tech holds a 1-1-2 all-time record against Clemson in Blacksburg.

SCOUTING THE WOLFPACK

TBA • The Wolfpack hold an overall record of 8-4-2 and are still searching for their first TBA conference victory, while being 0-3-2 in the ACC. NC State has recorded wins over LSU, TBA Navy and VCU, while tying then-No. 9 Maryland and Miami. The Wolfpack have outscored their opponents 22-16, while averaging 14.0 shots per game.

 Freshman Stephanie Bronson leads the squad with six goals, two assist and 14 points on the season. Red-shirt senior Alex Berger follows the forward with five goals and one assists, while taking 12 shots.

• In goal for NC State will be Kim Kern. The senior keeper has played all 14 games allowing 16 goals and leads the conference with 72 saves.

SERIES INFO

• The Hokies hold a 5-4-0 all-time advantage over the Wolfpack. The two teams first met in 1998 and most recently collided in 2010, when the Hokies defeated NC State, 4-0, in Blacksburg. The Hokies are 3-2-0 in Raleigh, N.C.

· Tech currently holds a four-game winning streak against the Wolfpack, their last loss was in 2006.

LAST TIME OUT

Hokies capture first ACC victory over Miami, 2-1 Shannon Mayrose notches the game-winner in the last minute

BLACKSBURG, Va. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team captured its first conference victory in a 2-1 win over Miami Friday night at Thompson Field. Jazmine Reeves and Shannon Mayrose connected on goals for the Hokies, including a header by Mayrose in the last minute to secure the win.

Tech (9-4-1, 1-3-1 ACC) came out very aggressive in the first half, taking the first shot two minutes into the game, while Miami (7-5-1, 1-4-1 ACC) responded with a shot that went wide in the fifth minute. The Hurricanes had a chance to put the first point on the board, shooting a high ball that the Hokie keeper, Dayle Colpitts, punched over the goal to tally the big save for Tech at the 21:15 mark.

Kelly Conheeney responded five minutes later with a hard shot on goal that Vikki Alonzo had to make the diving save to keep the Hokies from taking the 1-0 lead. Tech would take two more shots and a corner kick before the two teams would go into the break still tied at zero. The Hokies took the shot advantage in the first, taking seven shots to Miami's five.

The two teams continued the aggressive play at the start of the second half. The Hurricanes tallied the first shot at the 46:50 mark, while Colpitts recorded her second save of the night. Reeves took two shots on goal, before dribbling down the middle of the field causing Alonzo to come out of the box and juked the keeper to easily find the back of the net on the open goal at the 69:37 mark.

With the Hokies up 1-0, a yellow card was given to Kelsey Loupee and the Hurricanes were awarded with the free kick. Shannon Caspar connected on the loose ball in the box that slipped by Colpitts to tie the game at one apiece in the 70th minute.

The Hokies took two more shots and a corner that wasn't enough to get by Alonzo, as she tallied two saves. The game looked like it was going to go into overtime, before Amanda Gerhard lobbed a high ball into the box that Mayrose connected on as she headed the ball over Alonzo's head to secure the win at the 89:05 mark.

Tech kept the shot advantage taking 16 total, while Miami took 10 shots in the second to tally 15 on the night. Reeves tallied four shots with four on goal. Conheeney followed with four shot that all went on frame. Colpitts recorded her fourth win of the season as she made five saves, while Alzono took her fifth loss of the season and she collected eight saves.

HOKIES CALM THE HURRICANES FOR FIRST CONFERENCE WIN

• The Hokies struggled at the beginning of conference play, facing off with four NSCAA top-20 teams, including then-No. 4 Duke, then-No. 5 Wake Forest, then-No. 6 Maryland and then-No. 13 Boston College. Tech hosted Miami last Friday and recorded its first ACC win of the 2011 season. The Hokies dominated all game, downing the Hurricanes 2-1. Shannon Mayrose recorded the game-winning goal in the last minute to put Tech on top.

PARTY LIKE ITS 1994

• Before falling to Nebraska, 3-4, in double-overtime, the Hokies matched their best season start with six consectutive wins since 1994. The 1994 squad shutout five of the six opponents, while outscoring them 18-1. In the six victories this season, Tech shutout four of its six opponents, while outscoring them 19-3.

HOKIES HOST HILTON GARDEN INVITATIONAL

• The Hokies hosted the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational, inviting ACC-opponent Wake Forest, Nebraska and Loyola (Md.). Tech did not see action against Wake Forest and fell to the Nebraska Cornhuskers in a thrilling double-overtime game Saturday. Tech closed the invitational with a shutout against Loyola, including four Hokies being selected to the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational All-Tournament team. Ashley Manning, Kelly Conheeney, Brittany Popko and Anne Lumpkin all made the squad.

TECH DOMINATES WAKE FOREST TOURNAMENT

• Tech dominated the Wake Forest Tournament, recording wins over Campbell (3-2) and Connecticut (1-0). Four Hokies were named to the All-Tournament team, including Shannon Mayrose, Brittany Popko, Kelsey Loupee and Kelly Conheeney.

HOKIES RANKED NATIONALLY

• After receiving 48 votes the third week in the National Soccer Coachs Association of America poll, the Hokies entered week four at No. 25. In addition to the NSCAA Poll, Tech entered the Top-25 in the Soccer America rankings the previous week, sitting tied for 25 with Pepperdine. In week four Tech jumped up to No. 15, but fell to No. 20 in week five. Tech entered the Soccer Times Poll in week six at No. 20, but currently sits at the No. 21 spot.

FROM CORNERS TO HEADERS

• The Hokies are known to attack the goal and as a result, Tech has out cornered its opponents 85-35 this season and sit third in the conference in corner kicks. The Hokies have tallied at least two in each of the 13 games so far. On Sept. 4 against Connecticut, Tech recorded 14 corners, while the Huskies only tallied one. The Hokies also reached double-figure corners against Loyala (Md.) tallying 10, while the Greyhounds only notched one.

• Tech has really perfected its corner kicks, as the Hokies record a header shot off of nearly each play. Brittany Michels has recorded two goals this season off of headers after a corner, against App State and Loyola.

• In addition to one of Michels' diving headers off a corner against Loyola, senior Katie Cramp connected off a Kelsey Loupee corner on a diving header.

• The Hokies have recorded six goals off the corner kicks this season.

• Although it wasn't off a corner, Shannon Mayrose recorded her second game-winner off a header shot in the last minute against the Miami Hurricanes.

GOAL AFTER GOAL

• The Hokies are dominating their opponents on offense this season. Tech holds a 33-13 scoring record against its opponents in 14 games and is third in the conference in goals. Kelly Conheeney leads the team with an impressive nine goals and two assists this season. After recording her second game-winning goal against Miami, Shannon Mayrose follows Conheeney with seven goals and three assists on the season. Anne Lumpkin just tallied her third goal off a penalty kick against Boston College, while Jazmine Reeves also charted her third goal against Miami last Friday night. Four other Hokies have scored two goals and hold at least four points, including Kelsey Loupee (2g, 10pts), Katie Cramp (2g, 4pts), Julia Goldsworthy (2g, 4pts) and Brittany Michels (2g, 4pts).

• Reeves also leads the team and the ACC in assists with seven.

DEFENSE SHUT NON-CONFERENCE DOWN

• The Hokie defense shut down its non-conference opponents this season by allowing only 7 goals. Tech shut out six of the nine teams and scored atlead three goals in five of the six contests, including UNC Greensboro (4-0), High Point (3-0), Elon (5-0), Loyola (Md.) (3-0) and Appalachian State (4-0).

Tech was able to limit the Appalachian State Mountaineers to zero shots, which marks the fewest shots taken since last year against American on Aug. 23, 2010.
James Madison and Nebraska were the only two teams to be able to fire double-figure shots against the Hokies, while Elon, High Point and UNC Greensboro were limited to no more than four against Tech.

• Goalkeeper Anna Romeiser denied her first career penalty kick against Elon, while saving all three shots the Phoenix took.

SHOTS, SHOTS, SHOTS

• Tech has outshot its opponents 251-125 this season and sits third in the conference in shots, behind No. 14 Virginia (265) and No. 3 Duke (280). The Hokies average 17.93 shots per game and have tallied over 20 shots in six games, including a season-high 27 against Campbell.

• Wake Forest and Duke are the only two teams that have limited Tech to single-digit shots.

CONHEENEY HONORED BY COLLEGESOCCER360.COM

• For the opening weekend of the Divison I women's college soccer season, junior Kelly Conheeney was named a CollegeSoccer360.com Primetime Performer Honoree. Conheeney helped lead the Hokies to a 2-0 start to the 2011 season. In the season opener against UNCG, Conheeney took four shots and connected on two of them, including the game-winning goal for Tech. She has scored the game-winning goal in every season opener in her career.

2011 HOKIES OVERFLOW THE RECORD BOOKS

• Junior midfielder Kelly Conheeney has reached the top-5 in every category except two in Tech's all-time record book. She recently took over first place in game-winning goals with 11, after scoring the game-winner against Appalachian State. Conheeney is also tied for first in multiple goal games (5), tied for third in assists (17), second in points (63), fourth in goals (23) and tied for third in shots (154).

• Sophomore keeper Dayle Colpitts has reached the top-10 in every goalie category except one in Tech's all-time record book. Colpitts sits third in goals against average with 1.39, sits tied for fourth in wins (14), fifth in minutes (2,713), tied for tied for sixth in shutouts (7) and ninth in saves (101).

• Senior Brittany Michels just entered the top-5 in career games played as she sits fourth with 81. She will have a chance to beat out former teammate Jennifer Harvey (86) for the top spot towards the end of the season.

• In addition to Colpitts, redshirt-sophomore Anna Romeiser entered the Tech's all-time record books at the goal position. She currently sits tied for tenth in career shutouts (2) and tied for eleventh in career wins with five.

HOKIES LEAD ACC

• Several Hokies sit in the top-10 in all stat categories in the ACC as of Sept. 26, including Jazmine Reeves leading the conference in assists. Kelly Conheeney is listed in seven categories and is no lower than eighth place in each. See column on the left for all the Hokies in the ACC Top-10.

TOUGH COMPETITION

• Seven ACC women's soccer teams are included among the top-25 NSCAA rankings, including four teams among the top-10. Duke sits at the No. 3 spot in the poll, followed by Wake Forest at No. 4, Boston College at No. 9 and North Carolina is at No. 10. Virginia follows the Tarheels at No. 14. Maryland and Florida State are sitting at No. 16 and No. 17, respectively.

SEASONED VETS

• The Hokies return five starters and four players who have played in at least 15 games from last year's squad. Sophomores Jazmine Reeves and Dayle Colpitts both received ACC All-Freshmen accolades last season, while Kelly Conheeney was named to the 2010 VaSID All-State second team. Conheeney led the team in four categories, including shots (46), game-winning goals (3), assists (12) and points (22).

NCAA HISTORY

• The Virginia Tech women's soccer program is coming off its third consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament and fourth all-time. In 2009, the Hokies advanced to the Sweet 16, which marked the first time in school history Tech advanced in the tournament.
