• The Hokies enter the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second time in program history and will face Texas A&M for the first time in the postseason. This is the fourth-consecutive year the Hokies have earned an NCAA Tournament bid, marking its longest stretch of showings. All Tech's postseason appearances, including conference tournaments, have come as a member of the ACC.

SCOUTING THE AGGIES

• The Aggies are coming off a convincing 4-0 win over LSU last Friday and recently won their 12th-and-final Big 12 Championship two weeks ago. Texas A&M will continue its chase for its first ever NCAA Tournament title on Friday, putting together a 16-5-2 overall record this season. The Aggies faced two ACC opponents earlier this season, dropping a 7-2 loss to Duke, while defeating North Carolina 4-3.

• The Aggies have outscored their opponents 75-25 this season, while outshooting their opponents 499-246. The Big 12 Champions are No. 1 in the nation in scoring offense, averaging 3.26 goals per game, while taking 21.7 shots per game.

• Kelley Monogue leads the team with 19 goals, nine assists and 47 points on the year, while Frances Silva is close behind with 14 goals. Bry McCarthy leads the squad in assists with 13. Four other Aggies have tallied at least six goals this season.

• In goal, Jordan Day has played 18 games and has allowed 18 goals this season. The keeper has a tallied 70 saves and has earned nine shutouts this year.

SERIES INFO

• This will be the third all-time meeting between the two schools. Texas A&M is 2-0-0 alltime against the Hokies, with one contest played in Blacksburg in 2008 and one at Texas A&M in 2010. In both contests the Aggies won by a two-point margin.

• The two teams have never faced each other in the NCAA Tournament.

POST SEASON HISTORY

• This marks the fifth overall bid to the NCAA Tournament, including Tech's fourth-straight season. The Hokies recently wrapped up their fourth-consecutive ACC Tournament appearance with a tough, 1-0, loss to top-seeded Duke. All of Tech's NCAA Tournament bids have come after an ACC Tournament run.

• The Hokies are 3-4 all-time in the NCAA Tournament with the recent 1-0 win over West Virginia. Tech advanced all the way to the Sweet 16 in 2009. The 2009 appearance also earned the Hokies their first-ever Tournament victories.

• Juniors Kelly Conheeney and Anne Lumpkin are the only current members of the team who has earned a point in the post season. Conheeney scored a goal against Dayton in 2009 and most recently against West Virginia on Saturday. Lumpkin assisted Conheeney's goal against the Mountaineers.

• Seniors Katie Cramp, Rachel Beaumont, Brittany Michels and Brittany Popko are the first class in the program make it to four-straight NCAA and ACC Tournament appearances.

LAST TIME OUT

Tech stuns West Virginia 1-0 in first round of NCAA Tournament Kelly Conheeney notches the game-winner in the 17th minute

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team defeated BIG EAST champion West Virginia 1-0 in the first round of the 2011 NCAA Tournament on Saturday night at the Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium. Kelly Conheeney connected on her 13th career game-winner in the 17th minute.

This is the second time in program history that the Hokies have advanced in the NCAA Tournament. In 2009, Tech made it all the way to the Sweet 16, earning the program's first Tournament victories in the process.

The Mountaineers finished with a 17-5-0 record on the season and saw their 10-game winning streak at home snapped. Tech improved to 13-7-1 overall. This is only the fourth time in 12 tries that WVU has not advanced in the NCAA Tournament.

The Hokies came out strong in the first half, creating an early opportunity two minutes into the game when Jazmine Reeves sent a cross into the box to Conheeney, who was close to the goal. Conheeney tried to sneak it in, but WVU's keeper was there to make the save.

At the 16:56 mark, the Hokies put the only point on the board when Anne Lumpkin slotted a ball into the box to Conheeney, who sent a line drive past the Mountaineer keeper to put Tech up 1-0. Conheeney tallied her 11th goal of the season.

Conheeney's goal was the first time the Hokies had found the back of the net in the first half since Oct. 13 when Tech defeated Clemson 3-0.

Tech outshot the Mountaineers 7-3 in the first, while taking five corner kicks to WVU's one. Both goalies notched one save each, while Conheeney and Lumpkin led the Hokies with two shots apiece.

In the second, the two teams came out aggressively, as Tech committed five fouls in the first 10 minutes. Five yellow cards were given, all in the second, with the Mountaineers receiving four.

WVU created a number of chances to try to tie the score, but its 11 shots with only two on goal were not enough to find the back of the net. The Hokies took six shots, but focused more on shutting out the Mountaineers.

As a team, the Mountaineers outshot the Hokies 14-13, while Tech out-cornered WVU 8-2. Dayle Colpitts recorded the win for the Hokies, making three saves and recording her

11th career shutout. In goal for WVU was Sara Keane, who made two saves on the night. Colpitts moved up in Tech's all-time record book, as she sits tied for second in career

shutouts as a sophomore.

CONHEENEY NOTCHES WEEKLY HONORS

For the second time this season, junior Kelly Conheeney receives CollegeSoccer360.
com honors. For her game-winning performance against No. 9 West Virginia, the Ridgewood, N.J., native was named one of CS360's Performers of the Week on Tuesday.
In addition to CS360 honors, Conheeney was named Virginia Tech's Hardee's Star of the Week also for the second time this season.

ACC SWEEPS FIRST ROUND OF NCAA TOURNAMENT

• The strong Atlantic Coast Conference completed the 9-0 sweep in the first round of the NCAA Tournament Sunday. Six of the nine teams recorded shutouts, including a 5-0 Duke win over Radford and a 6-0 Boston College win over Marist.

ACC PLACES RECORD NINE TEAMS IN 2011 NCAA TOURNAMENT

• Highlighted by three No. 1 national seeds, the Atlantic Coast Conference placed a league record nine teams in the 2011 NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championship field. ACC champion Florida State, regular season first-place finisher Duke and Wake Forest were awarded No. 1 seeds. Joining those three schools in the 64-team field are Boston College, Maryland, Miami, North Carolina, Virginia and Virginia Tech.

CONHEENEY, REEVES EARN ACC HONORS

Junior Kelly Conheeney and sophomore Jazmine Reeves were named to the 2011 All-ACC Second Team, announced by the conference office Nov. 3. This marked the first year Tech has had two women's soccer athletes named to the All-ACC second team.
This is the second-consecutive ACC honor for Reeves. Last season she was named to the 2010 ACC All-Freshman squad.

HOKIES SET NEW SCHOOL RECORD

• After defeating then-No. 8 North Carolina, 1-0, the Hokies notched a new school record with 10 shutouts during a single season. In 2008 Tech set a record with nine and then matched that record in 2009. The Hokies currently have 11 shutout this season.

HOKIES CALM THE HURRICANES FOR FIRST CONFERENCE WIN

• The Hokies struggled at the beginning of conference play, facing off with four NSCAA top-20 teams, including then-No. 4 Duke, then-No. 5 Wake Forest, then-No. 6 Maryland and then-No. 13 Boston College. Tech hosted Miami Friday, Oct. 7 and recorded its first ACC win of the 2011 season. The Hokies dominated all game, downing the Hurricanes 2-1. Shannon Mayrose recorded the game-winning goal in the last minute to put Tech on top.

THREE HOKIES NOTCH WEEKLY HONORS

 This week Dayle Colpitts notched her first Virginia Tech Hardee's Star of the Week honor this season as she remained perfect in the win against then-No. 8 North Carolina. The sophomore goalkeeper tallied six saves as she collected the 10th shutout of her career.

· Monday, Oct. 17, Kelly Conheeney was named Virginia Tech's Hardee's Star of the Week, while sophomore Jazmine Reeves was selected to the TopDrawerSoccer.com Team of the Week for their efforts over the weekend.

 Conheeney notched all three assists in the 3-0 win against Clemson on Thursday, Oct. 13. It allowed her to take sole possession over the Virginia Tech's career points category in the all-time record books as a junior with 67. Conheeney is the first female at Tech to have 20 goals and 20 assists (24g, 21a).

· Reeves led the team this past weekend with two goals, four points and five shots, including the game-winning goal against NC State.

PARTY LIKE ITS 1994

· Before falling to Nebraska, 3-4, in double-overtime, the Hokies matched their best season start with six consectutive wins since 1994. The 1994 squad shutout five of the six opponents, while outscoring them 18-1. In the six victories this season, Tech shutout four of its six opponents, while outscoring them 19-3.

TECH DOMINATES WAKE FOREST TOURNAMENT

• Tech dominated the Wake Forest Tournament, recording wins over Campbell (3-2) and Connecticut (1-0). Four Hokies were named to the All-Tournament team, including Shannon Mayrose, Brittany Popko, Kelsey Loupee and Kelly Conheeney.

HOKIES HOST HILTON GARDEN INVITATIONAL


• The Hokies hosted the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational, inviting ACC-opponent Wake Forest, Nebraska and Loyola (Md.). Tech did not see action against Wake Forest and fell to the Nebraska Cornhuskers in a thrilling double-overtime game Saturday. Tech closed the invitational with a shutout against Loyola, including four Hokies being selected to the Hilton Garden Hokie Invitational All-Tournament team. Ashley Manning, Kelly Conheeney, Brittany Popko and Anne Lumpkin all made the squad.

HOKIES RANKED NATIONALLY

 After receiving 48 votes the third week in the National Soccer Coachs Association of America poll, the Hokies entered week four at No. 25. In addition to the NSCAA Poll, Tech entered the Top-25 in the Soccer America rankings the previous week. sitting tied for 25 with Pepperdine. In week four Tech jumped up to No. 15, but fell to No. 20 in week five. Tech finished the regular season at the No. 24 spot in the TopDrawerSoccer.com poll and 25th in Soccer America.

FROM CORNERS TO HEADERS

• The Hokies are known to attack the goal and as a result. Tech has out-cornered its opponents 121-59 this season and sits third in the conference in corner kicks. The Hokies have tallied at least two in each of the 21 games so far. On Sept. 4 against Connecticut, Tech recorded 14 corners, while the Huskies only tallied one. The Hokies also reached double-figure corners against Loyala (Md.) tallying 10, while the Greyhounds only notched one.

• Tech has really perfected its corner kicks, as the Hokies record a header shot off of nearly each play. Brittany Michels has recorded two goals this season off of headers after a corner, against App State and Loyola.

• In addition to one of Michels' diving headers off a corner against Loyola, senior Katie Cramp connected off a Kelsey Loupee corner with a diving header.

• The Hokies have recorded six goals off the corner kicks this season.

• Although it wasn't off a corner, Shannon Mayrose recorded her second game-winner off a header shot in the last minute against the Miami Hurricanes, while Jazmine Reeves recorded header goals against Clemson and NC State.

GOAL AFTER GOAL

• The Hokies are dominating their opponents on offense this season. Tech holds a 39-20 scoring record against its opponents in 21 games and is sixth in the conference in goals. Kelly Conheeney leads the team with an impressive 11 goals and six assists this season after she notched the game-winning goal against West Virginia. Shannon Mayrose follows Conheeney with eight goals and three assists on the season.

Jazmine Reeves charted her fifth goal against NC State last Sunday, while Anne Lumpkin tallied her third goal off a penalty kick against Boston College. Three other Hokies have scored two goals and hold at least four points, including Kelsey Loupee (2g, 10pts), Julia Goldsworthy (2g, 4pts) and Brittany Michels (2g, 4pts).

• Reeves also leads the team and is tied for second in the ACC in assists with eight.

HOKIES LEAD ACC

• Several Hokies sit in the top-10 in all stat categories in the ACC, including Jazmine Reeves who is tied for second in the conference in assists. Kelly Conheeney is listed in all nine categories, including sitting tied for first in game-winning goals with five. Sophomore Dayle Colpitts is listed in every goalie category and sits at sixth place or better. See column on the left for all the Hokies in the ACC Top-10.

DEFENSE SHUT NON-CONFERENCE DOWN

• The Hokie defense shut down its non-conference opponents this season by allowing only seven goals. Tech shut out six of the nine teams and scored at least three goals in five of the six contests, including UNC Greensboro (4-0), High Point (3-0), Elon (5-0), Loyola (Md.) (3-0) and Appalachian State (4-0).

Tech was able to limit the Appalachian State Mountaineers to zero shots, which marks the fewest shots taken since last year against American on Aug. 23, 2010.
James Madison and Nebraska were the only two teams to be able to fire double-

figure shots against the Hokies, while Elon, High Point and UNC Greensboro were limited to no more than four against Tech.

• Goalkeeper Anna Romeiser denied her first career penalty kick against Elon, while saving all three shots the Phoenix took.

SHOTS, SHOTS, SHOTS

• Tech has outshot its opponents 326-212 this season and sits third in the conference in shots, behind Duke (394) and Virginia (397). The Hokies average 15.5 shots per game and tallied over 20 shots in the first six games, including a season-high 27 against Campbell.

• Wake Forest, NC State, Duke and Florida State are the only teams that have limited Tech to single-digit shots.

CONHEENEY HONORED BY COLLEGESOCCER360.COM

• For the opening weekend of the Divison I women's college soccer season, junior Kelly Conheeney was named a CollegeSoccer360.com Primetime Performer Honoree. Conheeney helped lead the Hokies to a 2-0 start to the 2011 season. In the season opener against UNCG, Conheeney took four shots and connected on two of them, including the game-winning goal for Tech. She has scored the game-winning goal in every season opener in her career.

2011 HOKIES OVERFLOW THE RECORD BOOKS

• Junior midfielder Kelly Conheeney has reached the top-5 in every category except two in Tech's all-time record book. She took over first place in career points with 71 as she assisted all three goals against Clemson. Conheeney is also first in game-winning goals with 13, after scoring the game-winner against West Virginia. She is tied for first in multiple goal games (5), second in assists (21), third in goals (25) and in shots (170).

• Sophomore keeper Dayle Colpitts has reached the top-5 in every goalie category except one in Tech's all-time record book. Colpitts sits second in goals against average with 1.35, third in wins with 18 and tied for second in shutouts with 11. She sits fourth in minutes (3,343) and in saves (132).

• Senior Brittany Michels is first in career games played with 88. She also sits sixth in career starts with 73.

• In addition to Colpitts, redshirt-sophomore Anna Romeiser entered the Tech's all-time record books at the goal position. She currently sits tied for tenth in career shutouts (2) and tied for eleventh in career wins with five.

TOUGH COMPETITION

• Seven ACC women's soccer teams finished among the top-25 NSCAA rankings, including four teams among the top-10. Duke sits at the No. 3 spot in the poll, followed by Wake Forest at No. 6, Virginia at No. 8 and Florida State at No. 9. Maryland and North Carolina sit at the No. 18 and No. 19 spots, respectively, while Boston College rounds out the ACC at No. 21 in the poll.

SEASONED VETS

• The Hokies return five starters and four players who have played in at least 15 games from last year's squad. Sophomores Jazmine Reeves and Dayle Colpitts both received ACC All-Freshmen accolades last season, while Kelly Conheeney was named to the 2010 VaSID All-State second team. Conheeney led the team in four categories, including shots (46), game-winning goals (3), assists (12) and points (22).

ALL AROUND THE WORLD

• The Hokies welcome 10 newcomers to the 2011-12 roster that consists of nine freshmen and a transfer from six different areas. Helen Butler and Victoria Parkinson have the longest travels from California and Canada, respectively. Kelsey Loupee is from Littleton, Colorado, while Jodie Zelenky is from Pennsylvania. Although Georgie Highton is from Connecticut, she was born in England, while Samantha Cormode, Katie Yensen, Danielle King, Ellie Zoepfl and transfer Kimberley Anderson all reside in northern Virginia.

HOKIES GO LIVE

The Hokies will be live on the Fox Soccer Network when they travel to Charlottesville, Va., to take on conference-rival Virginia on Oct. 20 at 7 p.m.



GREENSBORO, N.C. – The Hokie women's soccer squad opened the 2011 season with a 4-0 road victory over the UNC Greensboro Spartans Friday evening. Kelly Conheeney, Anne Lumpkin and freshman Kelsey Loupee were the point-earners, including two goals from Conheeney for Tech. Madison Dukes, 3-1, on Sunday evening. Katie Yensen, Shannon Mayrose and Jazmine Reeves were the point-earners, for Tech. This is the second consecutive win for the Hokies (2-0) as they opened their 2011 season with a road win over UNC Greensboro Friday night.

The Hokies' offense pushed the ball from the start of the game as it recorded four shots in the first 15 minutes of play. Yensen, a freshman, had five chances by the 21:09 mark, before she connected on a ball that Amanda Gerhard sent into the box that Yenson shot from 12-yards out into the left corner of the goal 27 minutes into the game to put Tech on the board, 1-0.

Conheeney went back to take the corner and sent a nice ball into the box where Mayrose headed the ball over the keeper's head for her eighth goal of the season. The two teams would go into the break with the Hokies up 2-0.

The shots were even at seven apiece at the end of the first half, while Clemson (5-9-0, 0-7-0 ACC) had the corner advantage at 2-1.

Early in the second half, Clemson's keeper Morgan Hert left the game due to injury and Lauren Arnold was sent into the game. Hert would leave the game with two saves.

RALEIGH, N.C. – Sophomore Jazmine Reeves recorded the game-winning goal to lift the Virginia Tech women's soccer team over the NC State Wolfpack, 1-0, in ACC action Sunday afternoon at Dail Soccer Field. The Hokies improved to 11-4-1 overall and 3-3-1 in the conference, while NC State fell to 9-6-2 on the season and 0-4-2 in the ACC.

The Hokies came out strong in the first, as Kelly Conheeney took the first shot a minute in, but hit the cross bar. Dayle Colpitts made the first save of the game when NC State's Kristina Argiroff took a hard shot on goal at the 15:36 mark. The two teams traded shots back and forth but could not find the back of the net and would go into the break still 0-0.

Tech took the shot advantage in the first half, taking five to the Wolfpack's four. Colpitts finished the half with three saves, while in goal for NC State Kim Kern stopped one. Argiroff took the first shot early in the second half for the Wolfpack in the 46th minute, but went wide. The Hokies responded 10 minutes later with a shot by Kelsey Loupee that went high and a corner kick taken by Anne Lumpkin at the 56:05 mark.

Kern recorded the loss for NC State as she tallied one save for the day. The Wolfpack outshot Tech 9-7, while the Hokies outcornered NC State 3-1.

HOKIES FALL TO THE NO. 11 VIRGINIA CAVALIERS, 4-0

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team fell to the No. 11 Virginia Cavaliers, 4-0, in ACC action Thursday night at Klockner Stadium. The Hokies fell to 11-5-1 overall and 3-4-1 in the conference, while the Cavaliers improved to 12-3-1 on the season and 6-2-1 in the ACC.

Virginia came out strong in the first half, taking the first shot of the game two minutes in, but Tech's keeper Dayle Colpitts was there to make the stop. The Hokies took the first corner kick of the game at the 5:41 mark and the strong Cavalier defense was there to flush the ball out of the box.

The Cavaliers continued to attack as Caroline Miller shot a high ball that ricocheted off the cross bar into the back of the goal over Colpitts' head. Morgan Brian and Erica Hollenberg recorded the assists to help put the first point on the board at the 12:33 mark. Tech started to come alive taking two shots on goal and a corner kick in the 27th minute, but a foul on the Hokies rewarded Virginia with a free kick at the top of the box about 20 yards out. Julia Roberts fired a high ball over Colpitts' head to make it a 2-0 lead at 30:42. The Hokies recorded four more shots and a corner kick but was not enough to find the back of the net. The two teams would go into the intermission with the Cavaliers up 2-0.

Virginia took the shot advantage in the first half, taking seven to Tech's six, while the Hokies recorded three corners.

The Cavaliers continued the momentum at the start of the second half, as Brian headed a goal off a long cross from Amanda Fancher and Julia Roberts to put Virginia up 3-0 at the 53:11 mark.

Seven minutes later, the Cavaliers connected on the last goal of the game, when Miller found the back of the net off a Hollenberg cross from 12 yards out.

The Hokies had four chances in the second, along with three corners to find the back of the net but was not enough. Despite allowing four goals, Colpitts recorded four saves in goal throughout the night. Virginia's Chantel Jones recorded the win for the Cavaliers and tallied three saves.

The Cavaliers outshot the Hokies 13-10, while Tech out cornered the Cavaliers 6-2. Junior Kelly Conheeney led the Hokies with three shots on the night.

HOKIES STUN NO. 8 NORTH CAROLINA, 1-0

BLACKSBURG, Va. – Junior Kelly Conheeney lifts the Virginia Tech women's soccer team over the No. 8 North Carolina Tar Heels, 1-0, in the 49th minute with the game-winning goal. The victory marks the second defeat over the Tar Heels in Tech's program history. Oct. 4, 2009 was the first time the Hokies defeated North Carolina by the same score in Blacksburg.

Conheeney's game-winner was the first time this year she scored on an ACC opponent as well as her 12th career game-winning goal. As a junior, she sits first in Tech's all-time record books in game-winning goals, three higher than the runner-up, former-teammate Marika Gray, who was the first Hokie to score in a win over the Tar Heels two years ago.

North Carolina (11-3-1, 6-2-1 ACC) came out taking the first shot of the game by Courtney Jones but it went wide, while Tech (12-5-1, 4-4-1 ACC) responded with three back-toback shots and a corner kick. The Hokies had numerous chances to find the back of the net but all went shy of the goal. Tech's keeper Dayle Colpitts made the only save of the half six minutes in when the Tar Heels fired a low shot from 15 yards out.

Tech took the shot advantage in the first half, shooting eight to the Tar Heel's five. Sophomore Jazmine Reeves led both teams going into the break, taking four shots but it was not enough to put a point on the board. The two teams would go into the break still scoreless.

The two teams came out in the second right where they left off, North Carolina recorded two corner kicks early at the start of play but Tech's defense was there to flush the ball out. North Carolina's Meg Morris took the first shot of the half in the 48th minute, before Conheeney was set up by a Reeves cross and fired one low in the far corner past the Tar Heels' new keeper, Anna Sieloff, to put the only point on the board at the 49:13 mark.

North Carolina turned the intensity up finishing the half with eight more shots and five on goal, but was not enough to tie the score. Tech had a chance to make the score 2-0 late in the game in the 84th minute when Reeves dribbled the ball down the field, juking the keeper and firing a hard shot that hit the post and Anne Lumpkin tried to rebound the ball, but shot went just wide of the goal.

As a team, the Hokies outshot the Tarheels 15-14, while North Carolina out cornered Tech 9-3. Reeves led both teams with six shots, while Conheeney and freshman Kelsey Loupee each recorded two. The Hokies'15 shots marks the first time in six years that Tech has recorded double-figure shots against North Carolina.

Colpitts finished the day recording her 10th career shutout, including six on the season for the Hokies. The sophomore keeper charted six saves this afternoon, while improving to 7-4-1 on the year. Adelaide Gay and Anna Sieloff split time in the goal, while Sieloff tallied two saves and was charted for the loss bringing her to 3-3-1 on the season.

TECH FALLS TO NO. 17 FLORIDA STATE, 2-0

BLACKSBURG, VA. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team came up just short against the No. 17 Florida State Seminoles, falling 2-0 at Thompson Field Thursday evening. The Hokies honored the team's four senior, Brittany Michels, Rachel Beaumont, Katie Cramp and Brittany Popko, prior to the game as they took to Thompson Field for the final time in their Tech career.

Florida State (12-6-0, 5-5-0 ACC) began the game attacking early as it fired two shots and earned a corner kick in the opening seven minutes of the match. Play would continue on to be back-and-forth from there. Tech (12-6-1, 4-5-1 ACC) first struck in the 21st minute when Kelly Conheeney struck, but the ball soared high.

Though the Seminoles did not dominate the first half, they controlled possession for much of the period and it eventually paid off in the 34th minute when Tiffany McCarty buried a shot into the bottom right side of the net, just beyond the reach of Tech's keeper Dayle Colpitts. McCarty received a pass up the field from Tori Huster and she quickly took off down the middle of the field straight for the goal, releasing the shot just inside the 18-yard box.

Taking that lead into the halftime break, Florida State outshot the Hokies 7-1 in the opening period with McCarty taking three shots as the only player to strike more than once. Colpitts tallied three saves in the half.

The second half began in similar fashion, but the Seminoles were able to capitalize much earlier on as Huster made it 2-0 in the 55th minute. Huster had an open look on net from about seven yards out after receiving a cross pass that was relayed down the field by McCarty and Jessica Price.

Tech upped its time of possession in the second half as play often remained in the middle of the field. Conheeney struck again for the Hokies, this time in the 63rd minute but her shot was blocked from 12 yards out, forcing a corner kick. Kelsey Loupee served the ball in on the corner but the aggressive Florida State defense quickly cleared it out. Balanced play dominated the closing minutes of the match as Amanda Gerhard's shot in the 82nd minute was the only attempt taken by either team in the closing 20 minutes of the game.

Florida State outshot the Hokies 9-3 in the match, though Tech held the Seminoles to just two shots in the second half.

Conheeney finished the match with two shots, while Colpitts played the complete game in net and tallied three saves on the evening.

McCarty led the way for the Seminoles with three shots and three points as she put away the go-ahead goal and assisted the second score. Huster was the only other player in the match to tally more than one shot as she fired twice and finished the day with three points as well. Kelsey Wys got the win for Florida State but was not forced to make a save in the match.

HOKIES BATTLE BUT FALL SHORT TO DUKE, 1-0

DURHAM, N.C. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team fell short to the top-seeded Duke Blue Devils, 1-0, in the first round of the ACC Tournament Sunday afternoon at Koskinen Stadium. Duke recorded an early first-half goal to secure the victory.

Two minutes into the first half, Duke (17-2-1) found the back of the net after the Blue Devils were awarded a free kick on the near side about 25 yards out. Molly Patham took a shot that the Tech defense deflected and Laura Weinberg dished the ball to Kelly Cobb that sneaked past the Hokie keeper, Dayle Colpitts as the 2:51 mark.

Tech (12-7-1) responded with the first corner kick of the game a few seconds later, but the Blue Devil defense flushed the ball out of the box. Senior Katie Cramp had a chance to tie the game, when Jazmine Reeves dribbled down the far sideline and dished it to Cramp 20 yards out but her shot just missed the goal.

The two teams traded a couple shots before Duke tried to put another point of the board but Colpitts was there to make the big save for the Hokies in the 31st minute.

In the 42nd minute the Blue Devils recorded two shots and two corners but the Tech defense remained strong and kept Duke out of the net. The half would end with the Blue Devils still up 1-0.

In an intense half, Duke outshot the Hokies 11-5, while Colpitts remained strong in goal picking up four saves. Tech recorded two corner kicks, while the Blue Devils charted three.

The intensity picked up right where the two teams left off from the first half, Shannon Mayrose took the first shot of the second but it hit the crossbar. Tech turned up the momentum and had several opportunities to put a point on the board, but the new Duke keeper Meghan Thomas was there to stop each shot.

In the final two minutes, Tech recorded two shots and three corner kicks, including two corners in the final seconds of the game. The Hokies brought all 11 players into the box to try to tie the score but Duke's tall keeper grabbed the ball to let the final ticks run out.

The Hokies recorded nine shots in the half, but the Blue Devils outshot Tech 19-14. Despite allowing one goal Colpitts played strong the entire game, picking up six saves on the day. Tara Campbell started the day for Duke, but left midway through the first due to injury. Thomas recorded the win for the Blue Devils, while stopping three shots.

TECH STUNS WEST VIRGINIA 1-0 IN FIRST ROUND OF NCAA TOURNAMENT

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. – The Virginia Tech women's soccer team defeated BIG EAST champion West Virginia 1-0 in the first round of the 2011 NCAA Tournament on Saturday night at the Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium. Kelly Conheeney connected on her 13th career game-winner in the 17th minute.

This is the second time in program history that the Hokies have advanced in the NCAA Tournament. In 2009, Tech made it all the way to the Sweet 16, earning the program's first Tournament victories in the process.

The Mountaineers finished with a 17-5-0 record on the season and saw their 10-game winning streak at home snapped. Tech improved to 13-7-1 overall. This is only the fourth time in 12 tries that WVU has not advanced in the NCAA Tournament.

The Hokies came out strong in the first half, creating an early opportunity two minutes into the game when Jazmine Reeves sent a cross into the box to Conheeney, who was close to the goal. Conheeney tried to sneak it in, but WVU's keeper was there to make the save.

At the 16:56 mark, the Hokies put the only point on the board when Anne Lumpkin slotted a ball into the box to Conheeney, who sent a line drive past the Mountaineer keeper to put Tech up 1-0. Conheeney tallied her 11th goal of the season.

Conheeney's goal was the first time the Hokies had found the back of the net in the first half since Oct. 13 when Tech defeated Clemson 3-0.

Tech outshot the Mountaineers 7-3 in the first, while taking five corner kicks to WVU's one. Both goalies notched one save each, while Conheeney and Lumpkin led the Hokies with two shots apiece.

In the second, the two teams came out aggressively, as Tech committed five fouls in the first 10 minutes. Five yellow cards were given, all in the second, with the Mountaineers receiving four.

WVU created a number of chances to try to tie the score, but its 11 shots with only two on goal were not enough to find the back of the net. The Hokies took six shots, but focused more on shutting out the Mountaineers.

As a team, the Mountaineers outshot the Hokies 14-13, while Tech out-cornered WVU 8-2. Dayle Colpitts recorded the win for the Hokies, making three saves and recording her

11th career shutout. In goal for WVU was Sara Keane, who made two saves on the night. Colpitts moved up in Tech's all-time record book, as she sits tied for second in career shutouts as a soohomore.
