THE 2010 SEASON OUTLOOK

The 2010 Hokies return a wealth of experience from last year's history-making team and will look to keep the program's success going as they return the majority of their starters from last season. The well-balanced squad will see a senior captain in three of the four positional areas of the field and will look to those players to help replace the important and influential leadership that was lost in the off-season. Tech will face one of its most difficult non-conference schedules this year, while play in the powerful Atlantic Coast Conference will not be far behind.

"We are very excited to begin our 2010 season," said head coach Kelly Cagle. "While we will miss the contributions of our outstanding graduating class from 2009, we are confident in our current leadership and in our returning group. These players have seen what it takes to get to the postseason now for two consecutive years, and we are looking to those experiences to help us get back to the NCAA tournament again. We welcome our newcomers and we will look for their impact to be immediate, as we will need their contributions to face the challenging schedule that lies ahead."

FORWARDS

The forward position is where the Hokies lost the most depth in the off-season. Tech graduated three veteran leaders and experienced playmakers in Emily Jukich, Julian Johnson and Robin Chidester. Senior captain Marika Gray is the most experienced player returning to the frontline, while redshirt-sophomore Amanda Gerhard,



who saw limited playing time in her first active season, has shown much improvement and will be called upon to perform.

Gray led the team in scoring last season with 10 goals, while also coming up big for her team in the clutch, finishing her junior season with five game-winning goals. Gray scored the



only goal of the game to top then-No. 1 North Carolina and tallied three of the team's six NCAA Tournament goals.

Newcomers Jazmine Reeves, Katie DeTuro and Taylor Boone will all compete for quality minutes up front in their collegiate premiers. Reeves is a two-time Gatorade and Delaware Player of the Year out of Caesar Rodney High School, while DeTuro finished her Monsignor Donovan career with 95 goals, 28 assists and 218 points as a two-year team captain. Boone also captained the East Chapel Hill team for two of her fouryears and was named an All-American after her final season.

MIDFIELDERS

The midfield returns the most experience and is the team's deepest position in terms of talent. Senior leader Jennifer Harvey has been the stronghold for Tech in the middle of the field for the past two seasons and she took her offensive game one step further last season, tallying nine goals and going 5-for-5 on penalty kicks. Fellow classmate and captain Kelsey Billups, who has been a real utility player for Tech and has contributed from nearly every position, will also look to command the field as a true offensive and defensive threat in the middle of the field.

Sophomore Kelly Conheeney had a breakout season as a freshman in 2009, and she returns to pick up right where she left off. Conheeney finished her first season with nine goals, four game-winners and numerous postseason accolades. The young player provides a strong offensive threat from the midfield with great field presence and play-making ability.

Junior Brittany Popko will also return to a starting role in the midfield for the 2010 season,

and will be joined by junior Katie Cramp, redshirt-junior Stephanie Hylton and sophomore Anne Lumpkin, who will all compete for playing time early on.

DEFENDERS

The defensive unit remains intact from last season and will again be led by senior Kelly Lynch, who has missed just one start in her 65-game Tech career. Lynch has been the key leader on defense for the past two seasons and will be joined for the second-straight year by junior Brittany Michels and sophomore Kelsey Mitchell, who each made at least 22 starts last season on the back line. The Hokie defense has been a big part of the team's success over the past few seasons as it assisted in setting a new school record in 2008 with nine defensive shutouts, helping tie that record again in 2009.

Joining last year's key players on the backline will be sophomore Julia Goldsworthy, who made seven starts on defense last season but gave the Hokies quality minutes in her 22 appearances. Newcomer Taylor Antolino will fight for playing time as well, despite starting the season with a minor ankle injury.

GOALKEEPERS

Tech will see a new face in goal this season as freshman Dayle Colpitts will likely take on the starting role but will compete with senior Rebekah Brook to maintain that position.

"We hope that the goalkeeping position is competitive, and we expect Dayle to compete for the starting job right away. She and Rebekah will work well together. She's going to be an unbelievable part of our team culture, which is especially important from that goalkeeping position as a leader in the back," Cagle said.


Colpitts joins the team from Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada, and has spent time on the U20 and Women's Canadian National Teams. The young keeper spent her summer playing for the Ottawa Fury before arriving on campus.

SCHEDULE

The Hokies open their season with one of the most difficult non-conference schedules they have ever seen only to look forward to a gritty conference slate in the extremely talented and competitive ACC. Tech will take on LSU and Texas A&M right away; both finished the 2009 season ranked in the top 15 by the NSCAA, as well as NCAA Tournament participant Villanova.

After closing its non-conference schedule at home with James Madison, the team will begin ACC play with Virginia. Back-and-forth home-and-away play will ensue as Tech travels to Chapel Hill to take on the defending national champion Tar Heels, only to return to Thompson Field to host Maryland. A week later the Hokies take off for Boston College and then spend a week at home with the likes of Wake Forest and Duke. The team will begin its voyage to the south to face Miami, Florida State and Clemson, in that order, before closing out the season at home with NC State.

With last season's Sweet 16 run still on their minds, the Hokies will chase their thirdconsecutive NCAA Tournament bid as they look to make another run to and through the postseason.

Kelly Cagle accepted the Virginia Tech women's soccer head coach position on December 18, 2002, and has brought the young program to a new level, preparing her team to compete with, and as, some of the top competition in the nation, also priming her teams for consistent postseason play. Cagle has accumulated a 66-60-14 record so far in her career at Tech.

During Cagle's tenure, which includes six seasons in the treacherous Atlantic Coast Conference, the team has posted four winning seasons, earned three NCAA Tournament berths (2004, 2008 & 2009), defeated 12 top-25 teams and placed 10 athletes on the All-Mid Atlantic Region team. The 2009 season was a program-changing season for the Hokies as Cagle and her staff propelled the program into the national spotlight, guiding the talented squad all the way to the Sweet 16 for the first time after achieving numerous programfirsts in the regular season. The team took down a school-record five top-25 opponents that season and concluded a school record, seven-game win streak with its first defeat of a top-ranked team and North Carolina. The victory made Cagle the only ACC head coach to defeat the Tar Heels as a player, assistant coach and head coach. For all of her success and the success and perseverance of her team, Cagle was named VaSID Coach of the Year in 2009.

The 2008 season was a very accomplished one for Cagle and the Hokies, also a stepping-stone for the success of the 2009 season. The team returned to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in school history after advancing all the way to the ACC Tournament championship game, a first for the program. En route to its postseason success, the 2008 team put together its best conference record since its first season in the ACC and earned its first victories over top-25 teams, Duke and Virginia. After the historic run and history-making season, Cagle was honored for her coaching in 2008 as she was named the Mid Atlantic Region Coach of the Year, an award that she continuously refers to as a "Staff of the Year" award due to the hard work that both her assistant coaches put in to assemble and advance the talented team.

Besides placing three women on Freshman All-America teams since Cagle arrived at Tech, the Hokies have also rewritten the record book, recording the highest number of wins in a season

(16, 2009), goals scored (43, 2004), shutouts (9, 2008 & 2009) and fewest goals allowed (20, 2007). Since joining the ACC in 2004, the program has received 10 All-League selections and one Freshman of the Year award.

In addition, Cagle helped mentor goalkeeper Mallory Soldner, who finished first on Tech's career list in wins (28) and shutouts (20) and second in saves (328). Soldner received both BIG EAST and ACC Player of the Week honors and became the first player in program history to not only receive CoSIDA Academic All-District honors but also become an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipient.

Prior to taking the reins in Blacksburg, Cagle spent two seasons playing for the Women's United Soccer Association's Atlanta Beat. Before being selected in the 10th round of the WUSA draft, Cagle served as an assistant coach at Wake Forest, where she was also the recruiting coordinator. During her time at Wake Forest, the Demon Deacons were ACC finalists in 1999, made four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and were a top-20 program from 1997-2000. Prior to her stint at Wake Forest, Cagle was an assistant coach at the University of Texas during the 1996 season. She also was a coach in the Atlanta Youth Soccer Association, where she was the co-director of the youth developmental program and summer camps in 2002. From 1997-2000, Cagle was co-director of the Tony da Luz Soccer Camp. She has extensive coaching experience at various levels and earned her National "C" license in 2000.

Cagle graduated from Duke in 1996 with a degree in sociology while also earning four varsity letters in soccer. She was a three-time All-American and All-ACC selection in 1993, 1994 and 1995. Cagle was named the ACC Player of the Year in 1995 during her senior year while serving as team captain. Tech's head coach was selected to the ACC 50th Anniversary Soccer Team and was named to the list of Top 10 athletes at Duke during the 1990s.

Duke was national runner-up in 1992 and made four straight NCAA Tournament appearances during Cagle's playing days. Cagle holds single-season and career records for shots, goals and points at Duke. She started all 90 games of her career with the Blue Devils and was a member of the U.S. National Team program from 1992-95 and again in 1999.

Kelly Cagle (formerly Walbert) is married to Dan Cagle. The couple has two daughters, Maggie and Nancy.

CHARLES ADAIR

Associate Head Coach Fifth Season University of San Diego '93

Charles "Chugger" Adair enters his fifth season with the Virginia Tech women's soccer program and has been a big part of the program's success over the past four years. Adair's wealth of soccer knowledge and organization coupled with his extensive experience as both a player and coach are just a few key elements that Adair adds to the staff, and reasons why Coach Cagle credits her supporting staff with her Mid Atlantic Region Coach of the Year honors. Cagle states that in her opinion the award is a "Staff of the Year award," and to get the program to where it is now has taken a real team effort.

Adair joined the Hokies after serving two seasons as Associate Head Coach for the UC Santa Barbara women's soccer team, where he was involved in all aspects of the soccer program, including recruiting, coaching, scouting, player management, community relations and camps.

Since April 2004, Adair has been an assistant coach and scout on the Cal-South Olympic Development staff. In 2003, he was an Assistant Coach with the San Diego Spirit of the Women's United Soccer Association. Adair was a youth soccer coach/ Assistant Director of Competitive Older Ages for the Del Mar Sharks competitive soccer program for eight years.

Along with his time at UC Santa Barbara, Adair has significant experience coaching at the collegiate level. He spent one season as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's teams at Pacific University in Portland, Ore. He also was an assistant coach for the University of San Diego's men's team from 1998-2000.

Adair has recorded numerous minutes as a player as well as a coach. He competed professionally for 10 years, including with the Los Angeles Galaxy of Major League Soccer and the U.S. National Futsal Team. He also spent time playing for the San Diego Sockers, Wichita Wings, Portland Timbers, San Diego Flash, Minnesota Thunder, Seattle Sounders, Milwaukee Wave, Carolina Dynamo and A.A. Ghent (Belgium) from 1993-2003.

A first round draft pick of the San Diego Sockers and the Wichita Wings, Adair spent three years (1990-1992) at the University of San Diego. At San Diego, he was an All-American, a two-year team captain and a member of the NCAA Finalist Team. He played one year at San Diego State before transferring to USD.

Adair earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from USD in 1993 and his MBA from USD in 1996. He also has a United States Soccer Federation "A" Coaching License. Adair has three children: Alexandra, Jack and Madeline.



MATT **GWILLIAM**

Assistant Coach Third Season Elizabethtown College '01

Matt Gwilliam begins his third season with the Virginia Tech Hokies after spending three seasons as the top assistant coach at Marshall University. In his first year, Gwilliam primed his keepers for a successful season in 2008 as they played a huge part in the team's success. In his first two seasons on the staff, Gwilliam's keepers have earned back-to-back nine-shutout seasons, a new school record that was achieve in 2008 and repeated in 2009. Though head coach Kelly Cagle herself was honored with the Mid Atlantic Coach of the Year award, she instead considers it to be a "Staff of the Year" award to acknowledge and show appreciation for the work her assistant coaches have put in to getting the program to where it is.

On the field, Gwilliam will work primarily with the goalkeepers while also assisting in recruiting and overall team management in the office, tasks at which he has many years of experience. At Marshall, he coached the school's first-ever Conference USA Player of the Week honoree and also recruited the team's 92nd nationally ranked class in 2007, the highest-ever ranking for Marshall by Soccer Buzz. Two of his recruits were listed as top international recruits by Soccer Buzz in 2006 and 2007.

Before moving to Huntington, WV, he served as The Citadel's top assistant for three seasons and also as interim head coach for the spring of 2005. Prior to his stint with the Bulldogs, he spent a season as the men's assistant coach at Dickinson College.

A native of Quakertown, PA, Gwilliam graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Social Studies Education from Elizabethtown College in 2001 and a master's degree in health and physical education from The Citadel in 2004. He also has an advanced national diploma and a national goalkeeping diploma from the NSCAA.

Also a four-year goalkeeper at Elizabethtown, Gwilliam earned Mid-Atlantic Conference first-team recognition and four all-academic team honors while guiding the Blue Jays to a conference championship and NCAA Division III Tournament berth.





The Hokies opened their season on a high note as freshmen Kelly Conheeney and Kelsey Mitchell set the tone early in their careers, connecting on the team's first goal of the season. The 2-0 win over the High Point Panthers gave Tech its fourth opening win under Coach Cagle and put the team one step ahead of where it was in 2008. Though the team had the luxury of opening its season at home, challenging road play took over as the Hokies worked out the kinks and went 2-2 over the next two weeks. The team fell in double overtime to Villanova, 2-1, and, later in the weekend, bounced back with a 1-0 win over Lehigh. The following weekend Tech battled out another overtime game, sneaking by VCU, but was later trounced by then-No. 4 Stanford, 5-0.

HOKIE INVITATIONAL

Tech finally returned home to Thompson Field to host its annual weekend tournament. The Hokies picked up right where they left off at home, dominating their competition. Junior Marika Gray led the team with two goals, while freshman Kelly Conheeney extended her home scoring streak with a score of her own in the 4-0 defeat of UNC Greensboro.

Junior Jennifer Harvey stole the show in the second game of the weekend against the College of Charleston, making Hokie history as she tallied a hat trick and scored the only goals of the game. Harvey became just the 11th Hokie to accomplish such a feat and the first since 2006.

ENTERING THE ACCTION

The Hokies continued to dominate Thompson Field rolling into ACC play, which it also opened at home, as the team continued to make history. Tech defeated Clemson in overtime, 2-1, as senior Julian Johnson put the game-winner away just after the halfway point in overtime to make it five victories in a row at home. The Hokies took the 7-2 show on the road for its next two games and tacked on another historic victory in the process after defeating No. 18 Virginia in Charlottesville. The victory marked the first on the road against the Cavaliers.

ON TOP OF THE WORLD

At 9-2 on the year, the Hokies were playing some of their best soccer and were in the midst of record-breaking overall and home winning streaks. The pressure was on in the sixth home game of the season, as the team was set to host No. 1 North Carolina, a team it had never beaten in six all-time meetings. The Tar Heels entered the mid-season match-up unbeaten in their last 34 games.

An early bicycle kick score from senior leader Emily Jukich in the opening minute went on to be called off due to offsides, but the opportunity set the tone and let the Tar Heels know the Hokies came to play.

Minutes out of the halftime break, junior Marika Gray got tangled up with the Carolina goalie outside of the box and came out of the scrum with the ball, burying it in the back of the net seconds later to give Tech the 1-0 lead. Quality play from the outstanding Hokie defense would dominate much of the remaining minutes, as they allowed the Tar Heels few opportunities and helped the Hokies to their first-ever defeat of a No.1 team and North Carolina. The victory propelled Tech into the national rankings, putting them at No. 6 in the NSCAA poll, the highest-ever ranking for the program.

BACK TO REALITY

The Hokies were coming off one of the biggest wins in program history, but their invincible feeling was soon rocked as they fell to No. 19 Maryland, 3-1, in College Park, ending their historic seven-game win streak. Their home streak would also be halted, despite tacking on one more against Longwood; Tech fell again in conference play to No. 8 Boston College, 1-0, at Thompson Field.

Tech regrouped for a huge 4-3 win at No. 5 Wake Forest, another first on the road for the Hokies, courtesy of Marika Gray and Kelly Conheeney, who combined for seven of Tech's nine points in the game.

The team went on to win one of its final three regular season games, thanks to Emily Jukich's last second heroics against Miami at home. Despite the roller coaster play that plagued the end of the season, Tech earned its best conference finish and put itself in prime position to make another run in the ACC Tournament.

ACC TOURNAMENT

The Hokies were pitted against No. 10 Wake Forest in the first round of the ACC Tournament, a team they already took down on the road, even with a higher ranking. The well-played game seemed very evenly matched, as neither team was able to score

in regulation, forcing the first overtime game of the tournament and the first between the two teams. Once again, freshman Kelly Conheeney came up big for her team, netting the golden goal in the sixth minute of overtime play to advance Tech to the next round, giving them just their second tournament

victory of all-time. No. 6 Florida State, the same team that ended Tech's regular season with a loss on Senior Day was next up for the Hokies in the semifinals. The talented conference foe held Tech's number in this match, shutting the team out, 2-0, leaving the fate of the Hokies' 2009 season in the hands of the NCAA selection committee.

BACK-TO-BACK NCAA TOURNAMENT APPEARANCES

Tech earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament for the second year in a row and third time overall, with all three appearances coming under Coach Cagle. The team would ship out to Dayton, Ohio, for the first two rounds of the Tournament, in search of its first-ever postseason victory.

First up was Murray State, an unranked team making its postseason debut. The Hokies dominated the Racers, topping them 2-0 en route to their historic first NCAA Tournament win.

ON TO THE NEXT ONE

Tech was hungry for more after getting its first postseason victory, as was the undefeated home team, Dayton. The Flyers hadn't lost a game all season and were looking to keep their run going. The Hokies proved to be the better team, outing the 23rd -ranked Flyers 3-1 on their home field, with much help from Marika Gray who had two of the team's three goals, punching their ticket to the Sweet 16.

PORTLAND BOUND

Tech embarked on a cross-country trip to Portland, Ore., just days after returning home from Ohio, as it prepared for its first-ever Sweet 16 appearance. The No. 2 team in the nation, the Pioneers were waiting for Tech in the daunting and dark city of Portland. Tech's historic run would come to an end on the west coast as the Pioneers dominated the entire game, topping the Hokies 4-1 after a powerful downpour welcomed the team during the entire pre-game warm-up. Despite the Sweet 16 loss, the Hokies ended the historical and program-changing season on a good note. The team finished the year ranked 12th in the country, the program's highest final ranking ever. Marika Gray was named to the All-ACC team for the second time in her career, while Kelly Conheeney garnered numerous honors including ACC All-Freshman Team and *Soccer America* All-Freshman second team accolades. Conheeney, Gray and Jennifer Harvey earned VaSID All-State honors, while Coach Cagle garnered Coach of the Year honors, and Harvey and Emily Jukich were named to CoSIDA All-Academic District III teams. The team's graduating seniors took over the all-time record books, as three different members of the class currently hold a top spot in Hokie history, and the 16-8-0 record from the 2009 season sits as the best the program has ever seen.

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 58th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 120 national championships, including 64 in women's competition and 56 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 130 times in men's competition and 91 times in women's action.

The conference made an immediate impact in women's soccer on the national college scene in the fall of 1987, when North Carolina captured the first of what would eventually be 16 NCAA titles for the ACC since recognizing women's soccer as a championship sport. The Tar Heels have laid claim to 16 of the last 23 national championships, including eight consecutive titles between 1987 and 1994. North Carolina claimed its 21st overall national women's soccer title in 2009 (20 NCAA championships and one AIAW championship in 1981).

With its 20th NCAA women's soccer championship in 27 years, North Carolina finished up a stellar year for ACC teams in 2009 postseason play. Eight ACC teams finished 20-7-1 in NCAA Tournament play, setting a league record for collective wins in a postseason. Eight ACC teams finish a combined 17-7 in 2008 postseason play.

The ACC's eight teams in the postseason tied a league record. Six entered as national seeds (North Carolina and Florida State No. 1, Boston College No. 2, Wake Forest and Virginia Tech No. 3 and Maryland No. 4), also tying a league mark. A record seven ACC teams reached the Final 16 of the 2009 NCAA Tournament, and four advanced to the Final Eight. Two of the seven losses suffered by ACC teams in the NCAAs came in head-to-head meetings between conference teams (UNC's thirdround win over Maryland and the Tar Heels' victory over Wake Forest in the quarterfinals).

ACC teams finished 86-24-7 against nonconference opposition during the 2009 season, a winning percentage of .765. ACC champion North Carolina, along with regular-season co-champions Florida State and Boston College, were ranked among the nation's Top 10 throughout the season. Wake Forest, Maryland and Virginia Tech were also ranked among the Top 10 much of the year, and all six of those teams entered the NCAA Tournament ranked among the nation's Top 20. Virginia and Duke were also nationally ranked during the 2009 season.

North Carolina completed its NCAA title run with a 1-0 win over previously unbeaten Stanford on Dec. 6. The weeks that followed were also good ones for the ACC, as UNC's Whitney Engen was named the Honda Award winner for Women's Soccer and Boston College's Victoria DiMartino was named Soccer America's Freshman of the Year.

Meanwhile, North Carolina's Anson Dorrance became the first head coach to win 20 NCAA titles in any sport. Dorrance owns a 696-36-22 record in 31 seasons at UNC, a winning percentage of .963.

North Carolina owns an all-time record of 106-7-1 in NCAA Tournament competition. ACC member schools are a collective 223-114-23.

National recognition poured in for ACC schools in 2009, as seven teams capped off the season ranked among the top 25 in at least one major poll (Soccer America, Soccer Times and the NSCAA).

Thirteen ACC student-athletes earned first-, second- or third-team All-America recognition, and four were named first- or second-team Academic All-Americans.

The 11 schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have garnered 142 first, second or third team NSCAA All-America distinctions, 55 National Player of the Year titles and 16 National Rookie of the Year honors. The ACC has also amassed 52 Academic All-Americans since 1986.

2009-10 IN REVIEW

The 2009-10 academic year saw league teams capture an all-time high eight national team titles and nine individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 50 national team titles over the last 13 years. The ACC has won two or more NCAA titles in 28 of the past 30 years.

The ACC was the only conference in America to place four of its teams in the final Top 10 rankings of the 2009-10 Learfield Director's Cup Standings – symbolic of the nation's top overall programs – as Virginia (3rd), Florida State (5th), North Carolina (7th) and Duke (10th) all were ranked nationally in the Top 10. The Pac-10 placed three teams in the Top 10, while the SEC and Big 12 had one each.

A total of 123 ACC teams placed in NCAA post-season competition in 2009-10. League teams compiled a 116-64-3 (.637) mark against opponents in NCAA championship competition.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2010-11 academic year – 12 for men and 13 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing with volleyball deciding its champion by regular season play.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest – drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.


Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

HOKIE HISTORY Sweet 16 and Back-to-Back NCAA Tournament Appearances Highlight Tech's Progress









In 1993 then-Athletics Director David Braine promoted the women's club soccer team to varsity status and entrusted former NC State assistant coach Sam Okpudu with the task of leading the Hokies in their inaugural season at the Division I level. Okpudu would guide the Hokies through their first two seasons of independent play before joining the Atlantic 10 Conference in 1995. The Hokies would later make the move to the BIG EAST Conference in 2001, after posting a 62-80-7 record in the A-10, but guickly transitioned again to the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004, just after head coach Kelly Cagle's inaugural season in 2003.

2006

Since the transition, Tech has made three NCAA Tournament appearances, including backto-back showings 2008 and 2009, advanced all the way to the ACC Tournament finals, had four winning seasons and claimed victory over 12 top-25 teams, including two wins over in-state rival Virginia and then-No. 1 North Carolina. This past season, the Hokies set a new bar for the program as they not only earned their first postseason win, but advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time. The times have changed for the Hokies as they propelled themselves onto the national stage in the past few seasons. As they fight to remain among the nation's elite, the women's soccer team continues to write the pages of their Hokie History.

2002: Former Duke standout Kelly Cagle was hired as the Hokies new head coach. Since taking over, the seasoned ACC veteran has taken Tech's program to new heights, accomplished numerous program firsts and, in a short time, propelled the program onto the national stage.

2004: The women's soccer team claimed the school's first ACC victory in its first season in the conference. The Hokies defeated Maryland in College Park, 2-0. The 2004 season still remains one of the best seasons in program history. The Hokies finished 11-9 that season and made their first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance.

2004-2006: In Tech's first few seasons in the ACC, the Hokies began a trend with extremely talented freshmen as four different players were named to the All-Mid Atlantic Region Freshman team through the three-year span, and the same number garnered ACC All-Freshman team honors, including Tech's all-time assists leader Julian Johnson.

2007: Things would begin to change for the Hokies as the freshman success continued. Forward Marika Gray and defender Kelly Lynch arrived at Tech in 2007 and embraced the expectations awaiting them. Grav made Tech history as she became the first Hokie to be named to an All-Conference team, earning All-ACC second team honors. Lynch was named a Soccer Buzz Freshman All-American along with Gray in the same season. The pair also earned All-Conference and All-Mid Atlantic Region Freshman team accolades, qualifying for the U-20 team in their collegiate debuts as well.

The Hokies would finish the 2007 season with an 8-7-3 record, which marked their first winning season since their NCAA Tournament run in 2004.

2008: The Hokies made it back-to-back winning seasons as they finished with a 10-9-4













record, topping the season off with their second NCAA Tournament appearance and a trip to Provo, Utah, to face BYU. En route to NCAAs, the Hokies also made a run to the ACC Tournament finals, surviving two double-overtime games, advancing on penalty kicks to get there. The Hokies made even more history in 2008 as they took down nationally ranked Virginia for the first time in program history during the regular season and advanced past it in the postseason. Tech claimed victory over three top-25 opponents in 2008 while also advancing past two more.

2008: Forward Emily Jukich set the new Hokie career scoring record in her junior year, raising the mark to 29 total goals by the end of her senior season, after nearly claiming the single-season record with 15 goals in 2008.

2009: Tech's defeat of top-ranked North Carolina was just one of many accomplishments during the 2009 season that brought the women's soccer program to a new level. It was the winningest season in program history and also the most accomplished. En route to a successful 16-8-0 record, the Hokies ousted a new program-best, five top-25 teams and concluded a school-record seven-game win streak with their first-ever defeat of a top-ranked team and North Carolina. The team also tied the school record of nine shutouts, set in 2008, while also claiming it first road victories over top-25 ACC foes Virginia and Wake Forest.

2009: For the first time in program history, the Hokies would participate in back-to-back NCAA Tournaments as they earned the four-seed in the UCLA region of the bracket. Tech traveled to Dayton, Ohio, for the first and second rounds of the Tournament, earning its first-ever Tournament victory after defeating Murray State, 2-0.

2009: The Hokies advanced all the way to the Sweet 16 after handing Dayton its first loss of the year. The history-making run would end in Portland, Ore., as the Hokies fell to a very talented Portland team but finished the season as the No. 12 team in the country. The ranking remains their best and only end-of-the-season ranking to date.

2009: Midfielder Kelly Conheeney had one of the best freshman campaigns in Tech history after finishing her collegiate premiere tied for second on the squad in scoring with nine goals, while also garnering numerous postseason awards. Conheeney was named to the All-ACC Tournament team as well as the ACC and Soccer America All-Freshman teams.

2009: Seniors Julian Johnson and Robin Chidester finished their careers at Tech as gamechangers and leaders on the squad. Johnson, Tech's all-time leader in assists, placed herself in the top 10 on the single-season assists list in each of her four seasons, while also ranking seventh all-time with five-career game-winners. Chidester holds the top spot in the record book for games played after seeing time in 82 matches, two more than Johnson and three more than classmate and all-time leading scorer Emily Jukich. Chidester played with a teamfirst attitude, playing goalie at times for her team, as well as her natural forward position.





Thompson Field Among the NCAA's Finest

In 2003, the Hokies began play at Thompson Field. Located in the center of the Virginia Tech athletic complex, the facility has become one of the finest places to play in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

In their first seven seasons of play at the stadium, the Hokies have posted an overall mark of 36-22-7 (.621), including a 9-2 record in 2004. During that memorable season, Tech defeated then-nationally ranked No. 19 Wake Forest, 3-2, en route to the ACC and NCAA Tournaments. In 2008,

the Hokies topped two top-10 ACC foes as they downed in-state rival No.8 Virginia, 1-0, and No. 11 Duke by the same score on their way to their second ever NCAA Tournament appearance. The 2009 season was another remarkable one at home as the Hokies topped then-No. 1 North Carolina, while also setting a new home win streak record with seven consecutive wins on Thompson Field.

The bluegrass playing surface measures approximately 75 by 120 yards. The field is equipped with an underground irrigation system



so the pitch can be drained and ready to play in rapid time. The wireless scoreboard allows fans to have a full score update, while a permanent Hubble lighting system allows for night games.

One of the finest facilities in the conference for spectators, the stadium features approximately 2,028 bench-back seats, where each fan has an unobstructed view of the playing surface. Spacious area around the field allows for nearly 1,500 additional fans to watch the games.

During the summer of 2008, a new game operations center was erected atop the stadium. The approximately 900-square foot facility enhances the continued growth of the stadium. The center includes two dedicated broadcast booths, two covered areas available to broadcast and videographers' cameras and a large working area for media covering the Hokies. The climate-controlled facility contains a state-of-the-art sound system and Ethernet capability. The Internet-ready facility allows Tech's official athletic Web site, hokiesports.com, to originate live audio broadcasts and live stats of the Hokies' matches from the press box.

Between each team's bench area is the Sandy D. Thompson Press Box. Formerly the press operations center for the field, the facility is now used as a half-time room for game officials and as an auxiliary area for press and game operations.

Thompson Field and Tech's practice fields are located in the middle of the athletics complex.

The university's undergraduate engineering program is 14th among the nation's engineering schools and seventh among public universities, according to U.S. News & World Report. Nine of the college's undergraduate programs rank in the top 25.
 U.S. News & World Report ranks the College of

Engineering's graduate program 25th nationally, with four individual undergraduate programs in the top 10.

The Pamplin College of Business undergraduate program was ranked 42nd in the nation and 24th among public schools by U.S. News & World Report.
Virginia Tech consistently ranks among the top 15 schools in the nation in number of patents received.

• *DesignIntelligence* ranks Virginia Tech's undergraduate architecture program as one of America's World-Class Schools of Architecture with highest distinction. STUDENT-ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

Providing the Tools Needed for Success in the Classroom

Expectations placed on Virginia Tech studentathletes are high both in the classroom and on the field. Working together with the Tech Athletics Department, Student-Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS) acts as the backbone for Hokie student-athletes in order to help them achieve their full potential, both inside and outside of athletics. Tutors, study assistance, computer and technology aid and individual skill development programs are just some of the services available.

In addition, SAASS assists students in arranging appointments with various University departments, such as their academic advisors, the Registrar, the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid, deans offices, Career Services and the Cook Counseling Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence.

SAASS is committed to providing a comprehensive academic and personal development program with counseling and advising for student-athletes, offering academic counseling to ensure students receive a complete system of support.

Student-athletes have access to the department's spacious facilities, located in the West Side of Lane Stadium. Opened during the 2006-07 academic year, the SAASS suite, located in the Quillen Family Academic Center, features 18 private tutor rooms, a

state-of-the-art classroom, a 36-station computer lab with printer access, a conference room, three quiet areas for reading and studying and a reference library. The office is available between classes, after practice and in the evenings. Hours of operation are flexible and may be tailored to maximize the student-athlete's limited time. The collection of SAASS programs housed in Lane Stadium guarantees that all student-athletes achieve success during their time at Virginia Tech.



STUDENT LIFE

Assisting in the Development of the Total Person

At Virginia Tech, student-athletes don't just play sports. With help from the Athletics Office of Student Life, Hokie student-athletes work outside the athletic venue to develop into community assets and responsible adults.

Led by the Virginia Tech Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Hokie student-athletes volunteered countless hours in the local community last year. In addition, over 300 Virginia Tech student-athletes earned a 3.00 grade point average during one or both semesters, while achieving great success within athletics as well.

Inspired by the NCAA/CHAMPS (Changing Athletes' Minds for Personal Success) Life Skills Program, the Athletics Office of Student Life creates programs designed to enhance student-athletes in five areas of commitment: athletic excellence, academic excellence, personal and leadership development, community service and career development. The program has been previously honored for its commitment to serving the good of the student-athletes by the Division I-A Athletic Director's Association as a program of excellence.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is a committee made up of student-

athletes assembled to provide insight on the student-athlete experience. They also offer input on the rules, regulations and policies that affect student-athletes' lives on NCAA member institution campuses. Two members of each sports team serve on SAAC each academic year.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Life aims to help studentathletes lead balanced lifestyles, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills. Each team attends two personal development workshops during the year to educate members in healthy living, service learning, career development, diversity and life skills.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Virginia Tech student-athletes savor their collegiate athletic experiences with the understanding that they will need to secure a job upon graduation. The Office of Student Life works to enhance student-athlete career development by collaborating with the Virginia Tech Career Services Office. Student-athletes also receive assistance in learning about majors and minors, preparing for career fairs, and obtaining scholarships and internships.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The Office of Student Life is also responsible for nominating student-athletes for academic honors and awards. Athletes are nominated for on-campus, Atlantic Coast Conference and national awards. Student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA are rewarded and honored on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. In 2009-10, 370 student-athletes were named to this prestigious list, an increase of nearly 30 from 2008-09.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Virginia Tech student-athletes are now involved more than ever in the local community. In conjunction with the mission of the Office of Student Life and the Ut Prosim motto, studentathletes are encouraged to volunteer throughout their college experience. Each team partners with a local community organization and volunteers time at community-wide events. Along with large volunteer efforts, student-athletes engage in community support with visits to local hospitals and elementary and middle schools. Community organizations can also request Tech student-athletes to attend local outreach events. Involvement in this program helps maintain and improve the positive relationship between studentathletes and the surrounding community.

SPORTS MEDICINE

Providing the Hokies with Experienced, Professional Care

The Sports Medicine Department at Virginia Tech is constantly evolving to incorporate new ideas utilizing state-of-the-art resources for the betterment of all Hokie student-athletes. Under the leadership of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Training Mike Goforth, the department is constantly improving and developing new strategies to provide the most current and comprehensive care.

Their team of certified athletic trainers, orthopaedic surgeons, Board Certified primary care physicians, chiropractors, physical therapists, sport psychologists, nutritionists, massage therapists and orthotists are available on site to manage the health care needs of Tech athletes. The staff continually looks for ways to enhance the services provided for their athletes as evidenced by its participation in local and national projects pertaining to related topics such as concussion management, prevention of antibiotic resistant types of staph infection (MRSA), high ankle sprains and collegiate health care management strategies. Research is considered instrumental to the sports medicine department. The department has participated in several projects with the engineering department and school of education, respectively.

The 4,300-square-foot Eddie Ferrell Memorial Training Room gives the training staff a centralized area to care for the needs of all Virginia Tech student-athletes. There is topof-the-line equipment and a unique style of architecture, developed by Glenn Reynolds, AIA and Larry Perry as the consulting engineer. In 2010, Reynolds again helped Tech spearhead another 3,000-square-foot expansion of the training room to encompass the weight room.

The Ferrell Training Room nearly doubled the

size of the former Merryman Center facility. Tech now has more than 10,000 square feet dedicated to sports medicine, placing it in the top five percent nationally. The \$10 million Merryman Center includes 2,400 square feet of medical space and a physician's suite. The suite is equipped with a new state-of-the-art X-ray system, a fluoroscopy unit and a minor procedure room. The training room also has offices for the staff, dozens of training tables, two cold tubs, whirlpools, an underwater treadmill, a Biodex System 3 and various other pieces of rehabilitation equipment and treatment modalities.

Athletes have many options to help prevent or protect them from injuries. The sports medicine staff takes great pride in treating athletes year-round. Special attention is paid to off-season activity. The staff will analyze past injury data from each participant and construct a preventative program that is followed over a nine-week period between the end of the season and the beginning of spring practice. This same procedure is followed during the summer.

Katie Baer is entering her fifth season with the Hokies, serving as the primary athletic trainer with the women's soccer team. She attends all team practices, games and events. Baer, who is also a massage therapist, graduated from East Carolina with a degree in athletic training in 2004 and received a masters in sport management from East Carolina in 2007. Assisting Baer during the team's spring workouts and games, while also lending a hand in the fall, is graduate assistant Freddy Purnell.



ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE

Keeping the Student-Athlete Ready to Play

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletics Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation. One of the main supporters of Tech soccer is the strength and conditioning program. The results of hard work by the staff and the student-athletes have paid huge dividends as the Hokies continue to improve in the ACC.

Tech soccer players train in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in the Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000-square foot weight was offically dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time suporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department.

SPORT NUTRITION

Eating healthy and choosing nutritious diets are important aspects of a Virginia Tech student-athlete's life and that's why in July 2002, the athletics department implemented the sports nutrition program. Amy Freel serves as the director. Freel, who is one of 16 full-time college dietitians in the country, also serves on the nutrition and performance committee with Dr. Gary Bennett.

"It is extremely beneficial for our studentathletes to have nutrition education and counseling available to them in order for them to remain successful in their sports and outside of athletics," Freel said. "The individualized nutrition education allows the athletes and me to get very specific on their nutritional, personal and sport-specific goals."

The Sports Nutrition Program has helped countless Tech athletes maximize their athletic performance. Freel will be aided by Jennie Schafer, who is a graduate assistant.

SPORT PSYCHOLOGY

Virginia Tech offers another important service to all of its student-athletes – sport psychology. Dr. Gary Bennett coordinates the sport psychology department, which offers psychological and performance enhancement services for student-athletes. Bennett and counselor Kellie Moran-Miller, Ph.D., work together to serve the needs of Tech studentathletes. Both are also employed at the Cook Counseling Center on campus.

The sport psychology department offers an injury group to afford injured athletes the opportunity to meet with a sport psychologist and other injured athletes and talk about the recovery process. On average, Bennett conducts 30 individual sessions per week and meets weekly with teams as the need arises.

The response to the sport psychology program has been positive. The studentathletes are very receptive to the services offered by the doctors. The sport psychology office reaches out to athletes who may not have considered going to the counseling service that is offered to all students at Virginia Tech.

Coach Cagle is usually available for interviews during morning office hours Monday through Thursday. Interviews with players will be available according to class and practice schedules. At no time will an athlete's telephone number be released to the media. Members of the media are asked not to contact an athlete at home or on their cell phone.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Coach Cagle and players will be available for interviews after home contests on the field at the Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium. Please make all requests for interviews to Perreault in the press box.

Box scores will be available immediately following the conclusion of the game and will also be available at hokiesports.com. A short AP-style story will be faxed to all major media outlets in Virginia and also will be made available online.

From West Virginia, take Interstate 77 south (West Virginia Turnpike) to exit 9. Exit and turn left onto 460 east. Follow 460 east to Blacksburg.

Once in Blacksburg, use the 460 bypass around the downtown area. Follow 460 to the traffic light at Southgate Drive (Va. 314). Turn into campus, and proceed one-half mile on Southgate Drive. Turn left onto Spring Road at the traffic light, just before the football stadium. The Virginia Tech Soccer Stadium is on the left, just across the parking lot from Lane Stadium and the Jamerson Athletic Center.



BY THE WAY ... WHAT IS A HOKIE?

The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the word was solely the product of his

BLACKSBURG, VA.
