

















Virginia Tech

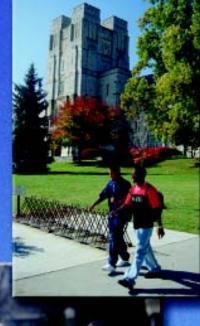
Since its founding in 1872, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, commonly known as Virginia Tech, has grown to become the state's largest university and its top research institution. It has evolved into a comprehensive university of national and international prominence.

Recognizing that higher education is a key force behind the quality of American life, its economic competitiveness, and our democratic form of government, President Charles W. Steger has now challenged the university to become one of the nation's top 30 research schools by the end of the decade.

The university is organized into eight colleges: Agriculture and Life Sciences, Architecture and Urban Studies, Arts and Sciences, Pamplin College of Business, Engineering, Human Resources and Education, Natural Resources, and Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. Together, they offer about 170 bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree programs.

Many of Virginia Tech's traditions and strengths are rooted in the university's motto, Ut Prosim: "That I May Serve," and its land-grant missions of instruction, research, and solving the problems of society through public service and outreach activities. Through the generation of new knowledge and the outreach mandate, Virginia Tech disseminates practical knowledge through the classroom and to society as a whole. The COACHES



SAM OKPODU • HEAD COACH

Sam Okpodu, a sensation as a player, continues his quest for soccer prestige for Virginia Tech as he begins his ninth season as coach of the Hokie women. Okpodu's eight-year record is 62-80-7. Okpodu has experienced success on the pitch as a player

and now he leads his team into The BIG EAST Conference, expecting the same success and hard work out of his players.

The 2000 season really put Okpodu's coaching skills to the test. Tech was competing as an independent school which threw a slew of unfamiliar opponents at the Hokies. On top of the new competition, Okpodu had to deal with a team that lost a total of eight starters to graduation and redshirting. Of the 21 players that saw action in 2000, 12 of them were playing the first college games of their career. The result – a record-tying win total for the Hokies. Okpodu's 9-10 record represented the fourth year in a row that Tech has posted nine wins in a season.

Okpodu has seen it all in his short coaching career. In 1994, he had the daunting task of blending a number of veteran players with a talented group of 17 newcomers to the program. Tech wound up with an 8-11 record in 1994, but not without some exciting moments. The Hokies won their first six games of the season, a school record. Tech also shut out its opponents for a record 530 consecutive minutes, almost six complete games.

Okpodu and the Hokies had a 6-10-1 record in 1993, their inaugural season, and he has steadily tried to make improvements. That campaign was highlighted by wins in the first four games in the history of the program and co-champion honors at the Campbell/BB&T Tournament.

The 2001 campaign will present a new challenge for Okpodu and his team to overcome. The Hokies wave goodbye to their one year of independent play and usher in conference play as members of the BIG EAST. Okpodu enters this season knowing the luxury of having a post-season conference tournament has been given back to the Hokies, but with that comes stiff competition from the BIG EAST which boasts top quality opponents like the defending NCAA champion Notre Dame Fighting Irish and past champions like the Connecticut Huskies. The high level of play and fierce competition in the BIG EAST can only bring positive things to Hokie soccer in the future and Okpodu feels it amplifies his goal of moving the Tech soccer program to the next level in a hurry.

Before joining the Hokies, Okpodu held the position of assistant coach of the women's soccer team at North Carolina State under head coach Larry Gross from 1990 to 1992. Under their leadership, the Wolfpack fielded outstanding teams, posting an overall record of

47-17-2 over the threeyear period and earning three NCAA tournament bids.

A native of Warri, Nigeria, Okpodu was a sensational player at North Carolina State from 1981 through 1984 and three times was named to the All-America team. He made the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team all four years and was voted the ACC's Most Valuable Player in 1992. He is the



ACC's all-time leading scorer, having recorded an amazing total of 193 points for goals and assists in four seasons. Following his senior season with the Wolfpack, he played for the winning West squad in the senior bowl.

A 1987 graduate of N.C. State, Okpodu worked for the International Soccer Academy in Raleigh, N.C., for a year and a half. He also played professional soccer for the Orlando Lions in 1988 and the Raleigh Flyers in the summer of 1994.

Okpodu has three children - Samelia, 15, Elizabeth, 8 and Koren, 7.

The Hokies with have a new face on the sideline this year in addition to the freshman on the roster. Joining the Hokies in 2001 will be new assistant coach Paula Duke. Duke will be responsible for assisting Coach Sam Okpodu in both in game play calling and drills in practice.

Duke joined the women's soccer program in August 2001 after serving as the assistant coach at Randolph Macon Women's College in Lynchburg, Va. Duke helped train the goalkeepers and assisted the head coach with strategy planning for upcoming matches. After leaving Randolph Macon in December of 2000, Duke worked with the

Virginia Youth Olympic Development Program in Woodbridge, Va. She was the assistant coach for the girls under-15 Olympic Development team where her duties included evaluating players for the Region I team and assisting at regional clinics and camps.

Member of the NCAA national championship team

Before joining the Tech soccer program, Duke coached for five years in San Diego, Calif., for the La Jolla Nomads soccer club as well as for the Southern California ODP.

Duke hopes to bring the same success and fire to the Hokies that she possessed as a player for the University of Vermont. Duke played for the Catamounts from 1983 until 1985. Duke graduated in 1987 with her bachelor's degree in physical education, and she currently holds a USSF national B license.

Hokies Take On BIG EAST Competition in 2001

The Hokies expect to put an experienced women's soccer team on the field in 2001, with a high-powered offense led by fifth-year seniors Joy Nsubuga and Wendy Kotwas. The two are dangerous offensive weapons that combined to produce a total of 19 goals and 50 points in 1999. After returning from redshirt years in 2000, Nsubuga and Kotwas will be even more dangerous when combined with the offensive talents that blossomed in 2000, such as sophomore Emily Barnhart and senior Linda Bruce. Barnhart led the Hokies in total points with 15 in just her first year of collegiate level soccer, and Bruce tied her for the most goals scored with five.

The young team learned some lessons in 2000 that will undoubtedly prove to be invaluable when it makes its BIG EAST Conference debut in 2001. Despite redshirting its top two scorers from 1999, and having a team made up of over 50 percent

freshmen, Tech came within one game of a winning season last fall, finishing with a 9-10 record.

Tech has more returning talent that will provide leadership and big game experience. Back to help lead the underclassmen will be senior defensive star Carmen Chestnut and senior forward Victoria Sarfo-Kantanka. Chestnut's defense helped lead the Hokie goalkeepers to five shutouts and an impressive 1.70 goals-against average. Sarfo-Kantanka, a dangerous sniper who possesses a strong shot and amazing ability to evade defenders, looks to improve on her five goals scored in 2000. With senior Kimberly Wyckoff, the Hokies have a balanced attack that provides offensive production and seasoned leadership for the younger players.


Another aspect of the 2001 squad that has Coach Sam Okpodu breathing a little easier is strong goalkeeping. Okpodu has a young but experienced keeper at the position in sophomore Katie Hancock.

Hancock received the majority of the minutes in 2000 and made the most of her time. In her 13 starts, Hancock garnished a 1.72 goals-against average and three shutouts. Hancock's knowledge of the game and athletic ability could prove to be very frustrating for opposing offenses. Add transfer Kristin Kirsch to the lineup and Coach Okpodu has two credible options for keepers.

Pairing up with the outstanding goalkeeping the Hokies will have in 2001 will be a tough defense that possesses excellent closing speed on the ball. Chestnut anchors a young defensive squad that is four deep off the bench and experienced success in 2000 with contributions from freshmen Blair Eason and Jessica Russell.

Tech's depth will prove to be one of the team's most prized assets as the season develops. The program only lost one letterwinner from last year's team that posted a nine-win season and no starters from that group were lost to graduation. Add in a solid recruting class and the Hokies have one of the deepest BIG EAST teams taking the field in 2001.

Tech could be a force to be reckoned with in the BIG EAST in their 2001 debut thanks to the return of offensive fire power and tough defense. Okpodu will have to take full advantage of his team's potential, as the BIG EAST boasts some of the nation's top teams in the Connecticut Huskies and Notre Dame Fighting Irish, as well as scrappy opponents such as Syracuse and Georgetown.

fresh faces produced a 9-10 overall record in a tough year that saw the Hokies play as an independent.

After getting off to a rocky start by dropping two tough games to Charlotte and Seton Hall, the Hokies broke into the win column with a

1-0 victory over the Liberty Flames. Tech stumbled against Kent and dropped a heartbreaking 1-2 overtime loss, but bounced back to play its most dominating game of the season when it defeated Radford, 4-0. Linda Bruce scored two goals in the victory and Carmen Chestnut clamped

down the Highlanders' offense.

The Hokies entered the JMU/Sheraton Soccer Tournament with a 2-3 record and played well. Tech would fall to the host team, James Madison, but bounced back to defeat Loyola, 2-0, thanks to Victoria Sarfo-Kantanka's two goals and Shannon Janko's shutout performance in goal.

With a 3-4 record, the Hokies returned to Blacksburg to defend their home turf against future BIG EAST rival West Virginia. The Mountaineers represented the second of two BIG EAST teams Tech would face in 2000. Although the Hokies played tough, the West Virginia defense proved to be too strong and the Hokies fell to 3-5 on the year after the 0-2 loss.

Next up was the Wake Forest/Nike Invitational Tournament in Winston-Salem, N.C. The Hokies would lose two games in the tournament, but they proved that they could play with some of the top teams in the nation. Tech dropped a 1-2 decision against the #12 ranked Missouri Tigers but held the lead well into the second half before Missouri put numbers on the board. The Hokies were also tied with Wake Forest at halftime, but fell victim to late goal scoring.

The young Tech squad could have easily become discouraged with its 3-7 record, but in true Hokie fashion it would battle back to take six out of the final nine games.

With defense becoming one of the team's major strengths, the Hokies shutout two straight opponents. First, Tech downed Old Dominion, 1-0, thanks to Sarfo-Kantanka's game-winning goal in the second half. The Hokies then held the Colonials from George Washington scoreless, rolling to a 2-0 win and a 5-7 overall record.

After stumbling on the road against St. Joe's, the Hokies produced four straight victories over Temple, Howard, Wheeling Jesuit and a very physical Marshall team. The young goal scorers for Tech provided the offensive pop during the winning streak. Freshmen Jessica Myers, Emily Barnhart and Jessica Russell combined for seven of the 12 Tech goals scored during the four-game stint.

The first winning season for Virginia Tech women's soccer was at the team's doorstep, but two tough road opponents stole the Hokies chance of reaching that goal. Tech finished with an overall record of 9-10 after losses to Dayton and Xavier.

Tech showed great resilience and strong determination to battle through a tough 2000 season. The highs and lows of the season helped prepare the young team for the standard of play in the BIG EAST Conference. The lessons learned will prove invaluable in 2001 as the Hokies make their conference debut.



Women's Soccer HISTOR

Since 1872, when Virginia Tech was founded, the university has had a tradition of progress. From enrollment, to campus size, to reputation, to academic achievement, Virginia Tech has continued to grow and prosper

Athletics, a major part of life at Virginia Tech, is a fine example of that progress. Not only have winning records increased, but Tech continues to add to the number and quality of its facilities, as well as the number of varsity sports. In 1993, women's soccer became the 19th varsity sport offered by the athletics department. Since then, Tech has added women's softball and lacrosse to increase its number of varsity sports to

Before 1993, women's soccer at Tech was a club sport. Current head coach Sam Okpodu began his career at Tech simultaneously with its metamorphosis from club to varsity status. With the prospect of starting a varsity program from scratch, Okpodu could not overlook the foundation the club had laid.

"There was a strong love for the game here," Okpodu said. "Those girls on the club squad formed the group on their own and produced.

"Despite the success, many changes were made and the demand on the players increased," Okpodu said. "The difference now is that soccer is a varsity sport and it demands a lot of time and effort. Everybody who comes to play should really want to make a difference in the game."

Tech's first varsity women's soccer team was made up of 23 members who finished their inaugural season in with a 6-10-1 record.

In 1994, the Hokies' second-year record was 8-11. With 18 new players, the Hokies began the season with six straight wins, a school record for women's soccer. They also shut out opponents for 530 consecutive minutes, a span of almost six games.

In 1995, Tech fielded its youngest team ever with 24 players who were either sophomores or freshmen. Tech upgraded its schedule to face tougher competition and finished 3-12-3 in its first year of play in the Atlantic 10 Conference.

The Hokies improved in 1996 with a 9-9-1 record, 5-3 in A-10 games. This was Tech's best record ever in conference play.

In 1997, Tech matched the previous year's overall record of 9-9-1 but fell in the A-10 with a final conference record of 4-6-1. Shannon Otto broke two school records, scoring 14 goals and 33 points.

The 1998 season was a good one for the Tech women's soccer team. The squad once again earned a record of 9-9-1 with an Atlantic 10 record of 5-6. Two freshmen stepped up as leaders. Carmen Chestnut led the team in goals (8), total points (16) and game-winning goals (3). Victoria Sarfo-Kantanka was second on the team in total points (15), goals (7) and shots taken (37).

The 1999 season marked the end of competition for the women in the A-10. Tech announced that it would be leaving the conference at the beginning of the 2000-01 school year to become a full-time member of the BIG EAST.

Instead of two freshmen stepping up to help lead the team, in 1999 it was a pair of juniors. Wendy Kotwas and Joy Nsubuga provided Tech with 50 of its 101 points in the 1999 season. Transfer Nsubuga handled the bulk of the goal scoring with 11, while Kotwas put up 24 points for the season with eight goals and eight assists. Tech finished with a 9-10 overall record in 1999.

In 2000, Tech matched its all-time win total with nine, but they had to do it playing a tough independent schedule. With Nsubuga and Kotwas redshirting, Emily Barnhart and Linda Bruce had to handle the bulk of the scoring. The two combined for 26 points, over a third of the team's total of 77.



STUDENT-ATHLETE ACADEMIC SUPPORT SERVICES

The success of Virginia Tech's athletic program rests largely on the academic progress of each student-athlete. The academic performance of Tech student-athletes has improved each year due in part to the Student Athlete Academic Support Services (SAASS).

Student-athletes devote many hours to practice, conditioning and training that are not required of all students. Due to their time commitment and their high visibility, it is an obligation and in the best interest of the university to supply these students with services which will allow them to maximize their academic potential.

SAASS provides programming for all student-athletes from their freshman year through graduation. This includes a comprehensive orientation to Tech, study hall, mentoring, tutoring, academic monitoring, academic recognition, and eligibility education. Additionally, student-athletes are referred to and encouraged to take advantage of other campus agencies charged with helping students in their academic pursuits.

Academic facilities for student-athletes include the Monogram Room, a large room used as a study hall area adjacent to the SAASS office in Cassell Coliseum. The HEAT (Hokies Engaging in Advanced Technology) Lab houses over 26 computers on the second floor of Cassell Coliseum and laptop computers are also available for Tech athletes to use when travelling to away contests. The athletic

department also provides areas for private, quiet study for the athletes' convenience.

Additionally, student-athletes can use the Center for Academic Enrichment and Excellence site

offices, located in Hillcrest and Femoyer Halls.

With the help of these resources, the Virginia Tech graduation rate for student-athletes has risen significantly in recent years and reached 67 percent in 2001 as compared to the national average of 58 percent. The projected 2002 student-athlete graduation rate is over 70 percent which will mark the fourth time in the last nine years that Tech has reached that level.

THE HOKIES' ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE PROGRAM

Thanks to the direction of Assistant Athletic Director for Athletic Performance Mike Gentry, Ed.D., the Virginia Tech strength and conditioning program is among the best in the nation.

The soccer team trains in the Jim "Bulldog" Haren Weight Room. Located in Jamerson Athletic Center, the 5,000 square foot weight room was officially dedicated in September 1985 to Haren, a former Hokie player and long-time supporter of the Virginia Tech Athletics Department.

Assisting Gentry in the weight room this year are three full-time assistant strength and conditioning coaches: Jay Johnson, assistant director of strength and conditioning, Terry Mitchell, strength and conditioning coordinator of men's Olympic sports and Emily Chones, strength and conditioning coordinator for women's Olympic sports. Gentry will also have the services of three graduate assistants - Erin O'Neil, Tim Ralph and Shannon Turly.

Chones is in her first year as the assistant strength coach. Her duties include working with women's soccer, lacrosse, cross country, swimming & diving, women's tennis, women's basketball, the HighTechs and cheerleaders.

Chones came to Virginia Tech from the University of New Mexico, where she spent one year as an assistant strength coach. Prior to her time at UNM, she was at the United States Naval Academy where she spent three years. She was directly responsible for six sports while assisting with all other Midshipmen varsity programs.

Chones is a 1998 graduate of the University of Maryland with a degree in kinesiology. She competed in lacrosse for three years, including 1994-95 when she was a starter for the nationally-ranked James Madison Dukes.

In addition to her responsibilities as coordinator of student life, Amy Freel is the athletics department's sports nutritionist.

Freel works one-on-one with student-athletes to provide them with information that they need on their diet. She also provides individual players with diet counseling on issues such as gaining lean muscle mass, losing body fat, and how to eat to improve performance.

The sports nutritionist works with the "Training Edge," a dining option for health-conscious students and athletes, to design menus for training tables and daily menu selections.

Sports Psychology

A new addition to the athletics department as of August 2000 is sports psychology. The licensed psychologists, Dr. Brenna Chirby, Dr. Gary Bennett, and Dr. Robert Miller, associate director of the Thomas E. Cook Counseling Center, counsel student-athletes either individually or as a team.

"I've always felt that (sports psychology) was an important element. We want to be a holistic model of an athletics department and we wanted to and needed to include sports psychology in that model," Gentry says.

"These are great resources for our coaches and our athletes," Gentry adds. "We've improved a lot in areas of strength and conditioning, nutrition and in sports psychology. It's all about becoming a well-rounded athletic program and helping studentathletes. We want to give them all the resources we can to put them in a position to be successful."

rosy for Virginia Tech, right?

Enter Charles W. Steger. His assessment? "We have to rev the engines even higher. If you're not moving quickly forward, you might as well be standing still," says the energetic 54-yearold president.

Appointed president by the university board effective Jan. 7, 2000, Steger possesses the breadth and depth of experience to lead Virginia Tech at the point when higher education must learn to cope with major technology changes permeating education.

Steger has lofty goals for Virginia's leading research university. "I would like to see us ranked among the nation's top 30 universities before the end of the decade," says Steger.

A registered architect and former dean of Tech's College of Architecture and Urban Studies, Steger was the architect of a different sort as the leader of the university's successful fund raising campaign. Under his leadership as vice president for development and university relations, the Campaign for Virginia Tech, which concluded in 1998, raised \$337 million, \$87 million over its goal.

Steger's ties to Virginia Tech span four decades as a student, professor, dean, vice president, and now president. While on the faculty, he twice won teaching excellence awards. When he became dean of the college in 1981, he was the youngest architecture dean in the nation at 33 years of age.

Steger received his bachelor and master's of architecture and a Ph.D., in environmental science and engineering from Virginia Tech. He and his wife Janet, have two sons, David and Christopher.



JIM WEAVER • DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

James C. Weaver, whose innovative ideas and work as a reformer have made him one of college athletics' most popular administrators, is the director of athletics at Virginia Tech.

Weaver, 56, was appointed on September 24, 1997 and has been a tireless leader in behalf of Tech athletics. In his four years on the job at Tech, Weaver has taken steps to place increased emphasis on projects benefiting student-athletes. He created a comprehensive awards program for letterwinners and has initiated and funded an annual awards banquet.

Weaver's biggest accomplishment thus far has been getting Tech admitted into an all-sports conference. Tech entered competition in the BIG EAST Conference for most sports during the 2000-2001 season.

A top personal priority for Weaver is the area of facilities, where he has major plans for the expansion of Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Virginia Tech contracted with GreenTech, Inc., of Richmond, Va., to install its highly innovative, ITM natural grass sports field system in Lane Stadium/Worsham Field for the 2001 season. Under Weaver's direction, lighted football practice fields — conveniently located in the center of the athletics complex — were completed during the spring.

With the football team moving to the new practice complex this fall, the former football practice field will be used for the Tech men's and women's soccer teams this fall and the women's lacrosse team in the spring. Previously these teams used the infield at the Johnson-Miller Outdoor track complex. The upper field will be used as the game field with the lower fields used for practice. The addition of a new scoreboard is only the start of plans to upgrade the facility. Some repairs to the fields will be made this fall with extensive improvements, including lasergrading to remove the crown, to take place in the near future. Future plans also include the addition of bleacher seating and a press box.

"Jim Weaver was the unanimous choice of our search committee," retired Tech President Paul Torgersen said at a Blacksburg news conference when the new AD was introduced. "The committee was searching for someone with extensive Division I experience, a commitment to compliance, a commitment to gender equity, a commitment to all 21 varsity sports and a vision for conference
